- 3.—Mr. Alfred Mace, late Col.-Sergt. 28th Regiment, a Crimean and Mutiny veteran, aged 81 years, but still hale and hearty, as is Mrs. Mace.
- 4.—Sergt. F. C. Mace, R.F.A. He has served over 21 years. Now in India, where he has been twice engaged in the Khyber Pass against Mahnuds. He served through the South African War.
- 5.—Corpl. Wallace B. Mace, R.F.A., 54th Brigade, now serving in France.

14th King's Hussars, who died in hospital at Amara, Mesopotamia, in January, 1916. He was a brother of Mrs. Stephens, 20 Sherborne-place, and was born in Cheltenham, but was educated at Gordon Boys' Orphanage, Dover. He had seen twelve years' service (ten in India). His only brother was killed at Mons.



PTE. C. P. EVANS,
Gloucester Regiment, invalided from France with trench feet, and now in Liverpool Hospital, aged 19 years. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Evans, 30 Duke-street, Cheltenham.



PTE. H. G. POOLE,
2nd Worcester Regt., wounded in action in France on March 13, 1916, and now in a London hospital. Only son of Mrs. Burford, 8 Russell-terrace, Russell-street, Cheltenham.



PTE. H. J. ("JACK") MASON,
Worcester Regiment, who was killed by a bomb from a trench mortar while engaged in sniping on March 19th. He was a machinist at the "Echo" Office, and enlisted at the commencement of the war. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Mason, 24 Albert-street, St. Peter's, Cheltenham, who have two other sons at the front.

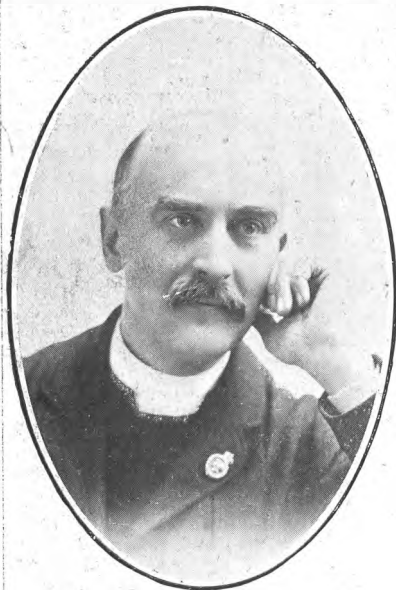

IN THE TRACK OF THE GREAT BLIZZARD.

ONE OF THE MOST FURIOUS STORMS OF WIND AND SNOW AN ABSOLUTE BLIZZARD, RAGED OVER ENGLAND ON THE NIGHT OF MONDAY AND ALL DAY TUESDAY, MARCH 27 AND 28, 1916. IN CHELTENHAM THE STORM WAS SEVERELY FELT, AND MASSIVE TREES WERE BLOWN DOWN IN ALL DIRECTIONS, AND A NEARLY COMPLETE SWEEP WAS MADE OF ALL TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH LINES OF THE WHOLE DISTRICT, COMPLETELY CUTTING OFF THE TOWN FROM EVERYWHERE.

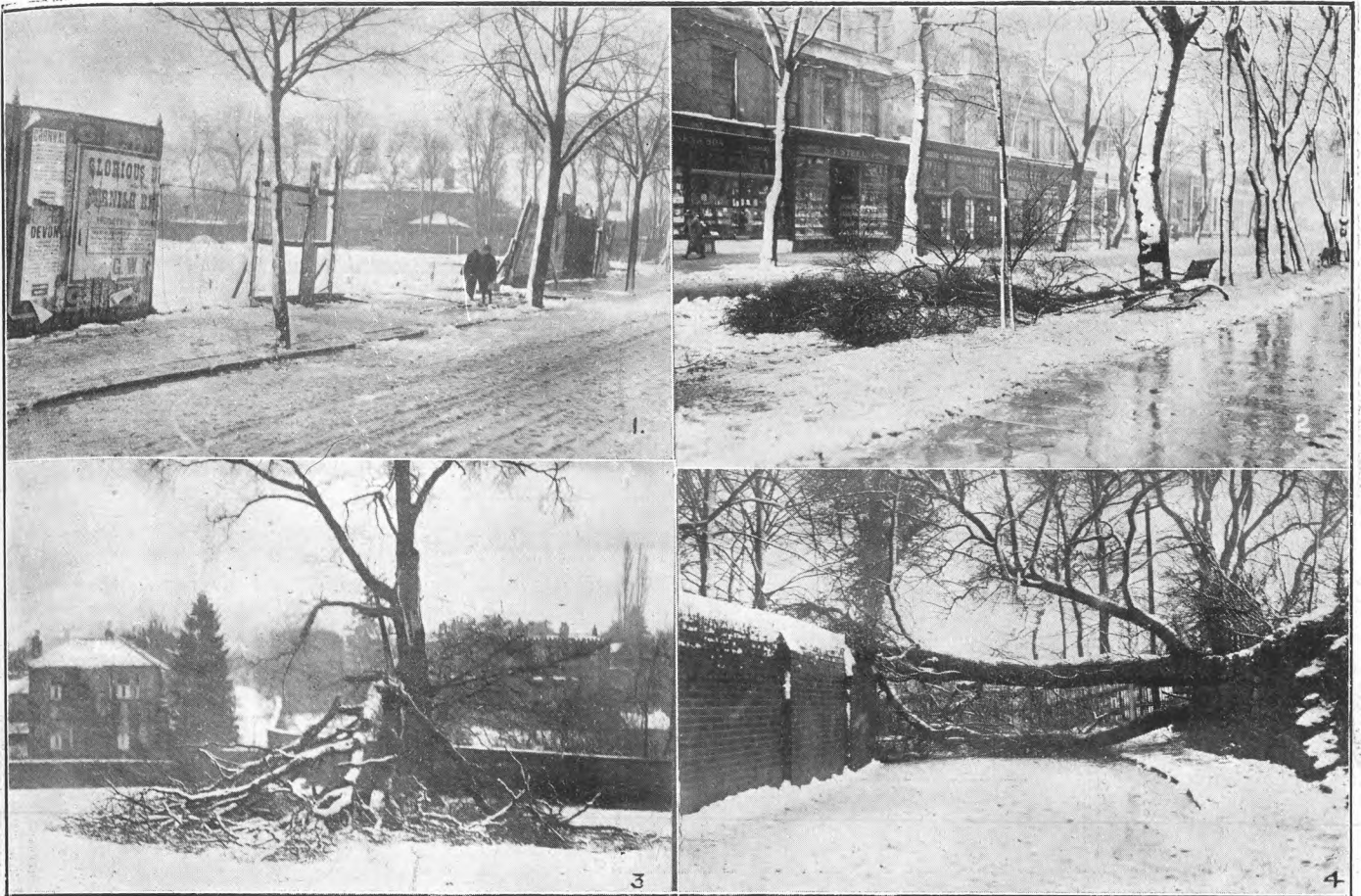
1.—A huge elm blown down in Pittville Villae-road, completely blocking the road.

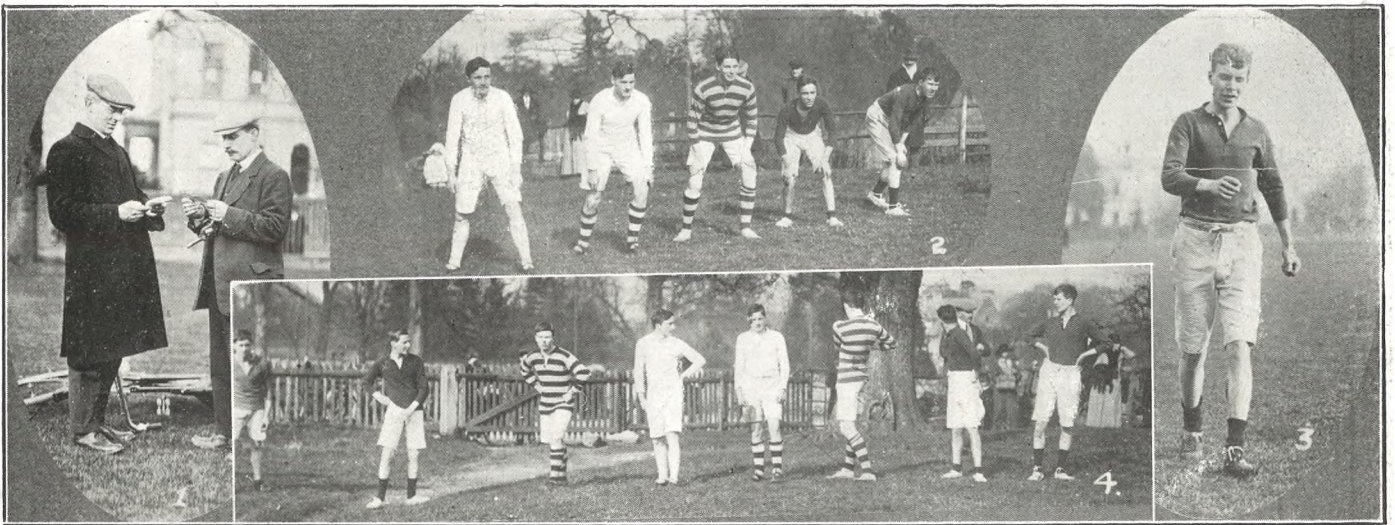

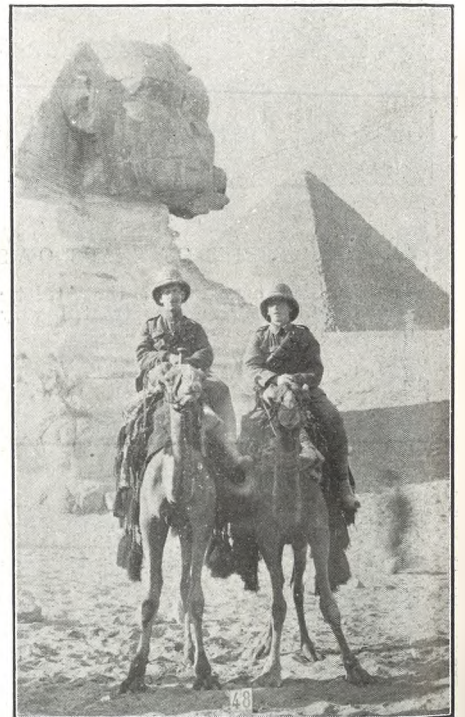

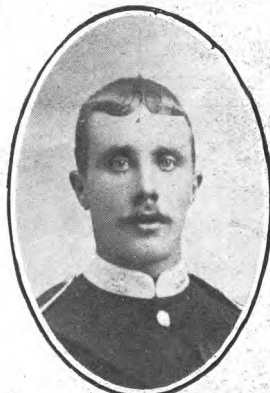
SERGT. J. NEWMAN, 1st Gloucester Regiment, who has been awarded the D.C.M. "for conspicuous gallantry and determination." "He remained all night on the top of a crater, covering a working party," and although struck twice by shell fragments and knocked over, he returned to his post and hung on. He is a son of Mr. E. Newman, of 4 Jersey-street, Cheltenham, and is the first Cheltonian in the battalion to win the D.C.M.



PTE. H. HUMPHRIES, 11th Essex Regiment (late R.F.A.), invalided from France with bronchitis and Bright's disease, and now in Reading Hospital. Son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Humphries, Arle, near Cheltenham, who have another son in the 7th Gloucesters.



PTE. H. BURROWS, 1st Gloucester Regiment, was wounded on October 30, 1914, in face near Ypres. After recovering he was again invalided home with frostbite in April, 1915. Again recovering, he joined the 10th Gloucesters, and was accidentally killed while on duty in the trenches near Loos. He was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. T. Burrows, of Milton-under-Wychwood.



PTE. S. LANGFORD, 4th Worcesters, reported missing on August 6, 1915, now reported killed at the Dardanelles. He joined the colours at the outbreak of war. He was a sergeant in the Militia during the South African War, and is a brother to Mrs. Lewis, Bristol-road, Gloucester.



PTE. F. C. RUCK, 1st Gloucester Regt., killed in action February 20, 1916, aged 17 years. Youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. F. Ruck, of 72 Tower Hill, Stroud, who have two other sons serving, one in France and one wounded in hospital at Lincoln



LCE.-CORPL. T. J. FRANCIS, 8th Gloucester Regiment, killed in action in France October 19, 1915. Son of Mrs. Francis, 66 Millbrook-st., Gloucester.



PTE. W. C. HOWE, 1st Gloucester Regiment, killed in action October 29th, 1914. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Howe, Great Farmcote, near Winchcombe.



PTE. W. E. EWERS, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action March 12, 1916. Youngest son of Mrs. E. Ewers, Lower Westgate-street, Gloucester.

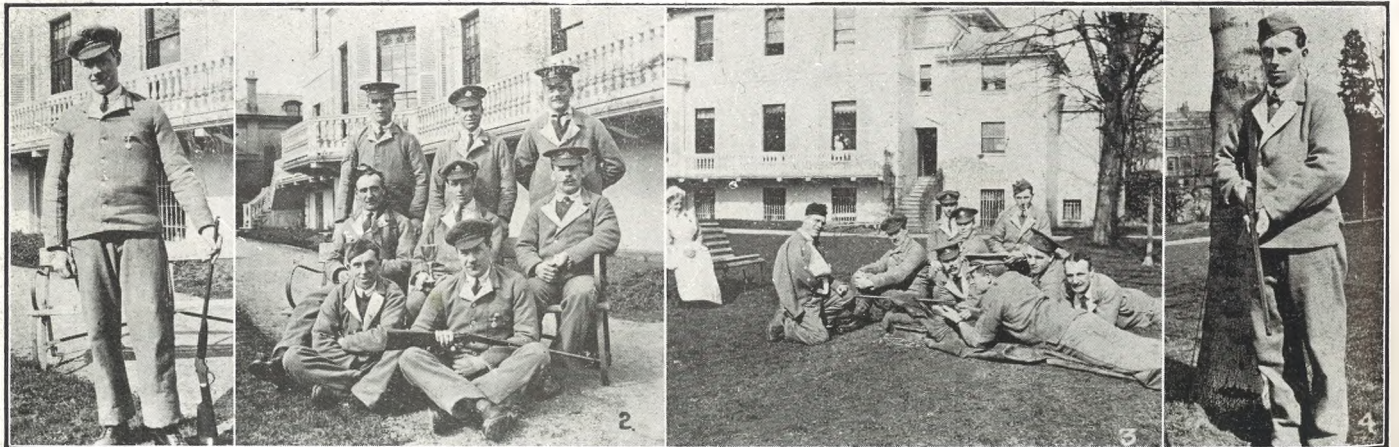

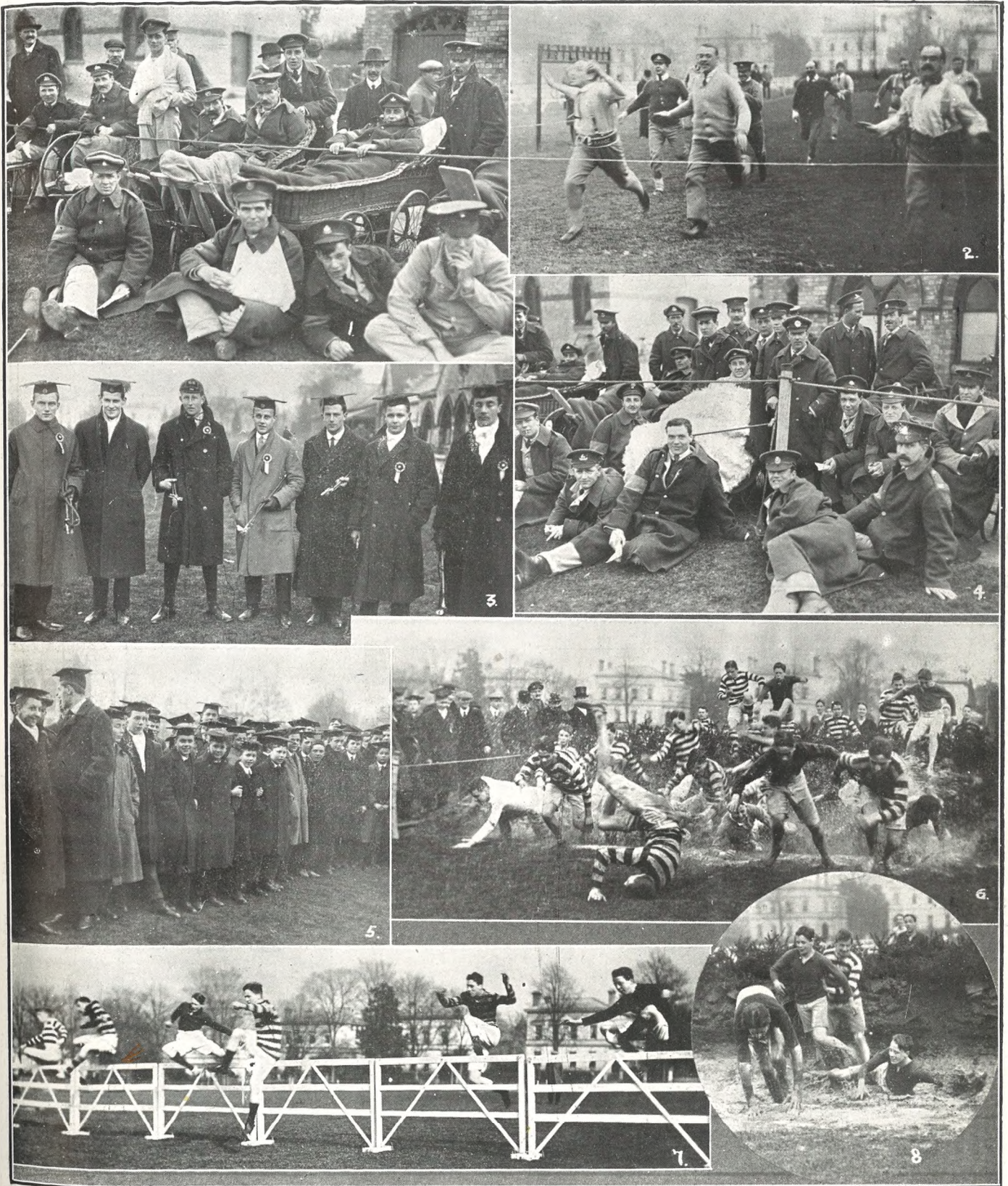

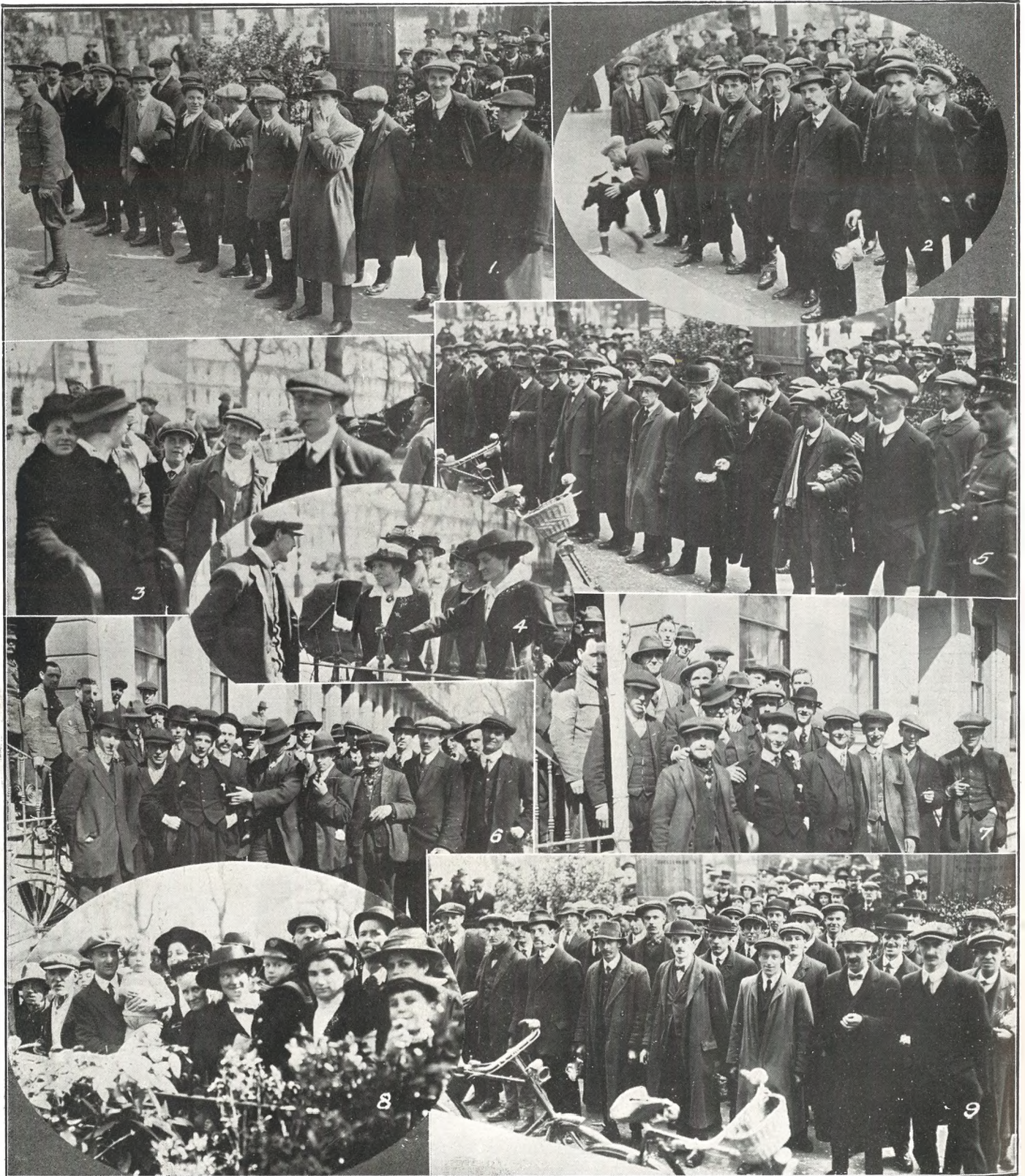

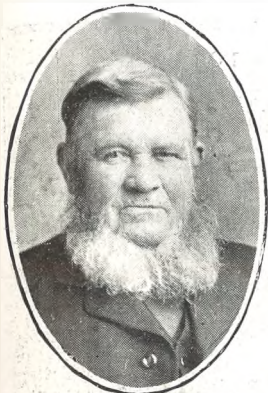

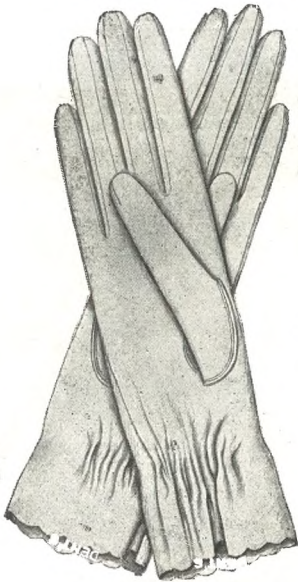

MAJOR ARTHUR FORBES,
128th Pioneers, killed in action April 17-18, aged 35 years. He was the elder son of the late Col. and Mrs. Forbes, Pittville Lawn, Cheltenham, and brother of Capt. Hunter Forbes. Both were killed at the same place.



CAPT. HUNTER FORBES,
Captain 51st Sikhs, killed in action, April 6th, aged 29 years. He had only just recovered from one wound. He was the younger son of the late Col. and Mrs. Forbes, Pittville Lawn, Cheltenham.



CAPT. W. P. PRITCHETT,
Gloucester Regt. (in which he was granted a commission for good service in a colonial contingent in the Boer War), died of wounds in December, 1914. He married a sister of Maj. Arthur Forbes and Capt. Hunter Forbes, who have both been killed.



SECOND-LIEUTENANT E. O. BROWNING,
Gloucester Regt., killed in action, was aged 21, and the elder son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Browning, of St. Margaret's, Cheltenham. Before receiving his commission he served in the R.G.H. Yeomanry.



PTE. STANLEY BROWN,
Gloucester Regiment, killed in action in the trenches by a shell, April 17th. He was the well-known Cheltenham Harrier, and was the son of Mr. W. J. Brown, of 21 Henrietta-street, and in pre-war days worked for Mr. E. J. Brown, builder. His father is in the R.E.



SECOND-LIEUT. HUBERT WILLIAM CORKE,
Gloucester Regiment, killed in action on 19th April, aged 22 years. He was a son of the Rev. H. A. Corke, vicar of Holy Apostles', Cheltenham, and an Old Patesian.



SECOND-LIEUT. WILFRED WYNTER MORGAN,
1st Gloucester Regiment, who has been awarded the Military Cross for conspicuous gallantry in rescuing four men imprisoned in an old mine under heavy shell fire. He is the son of the late Mr. E. K. and Mrs. Morgan, of Slimbridge, Gloucestershire, and is an old Wycliffe Collegian.



PTE. REG. COOK
1/5th Gloucester Regiment, who died in Suffolk Hall Hospital, Cheltenham, March 22, aged 21 years, and was buried with military honours March 25th. He was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Cook, The Rowans, St. Mark's, Cheltenham, and husband of Mrs. Leah Cook, Moseley, Birmingham.

Gloucester Regiment, killed on sentry duty in the trenches on April 17th, 1916, aged 17 years. Youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Smith, 24 Edwy-parade, Kingsholm, Gloucester.

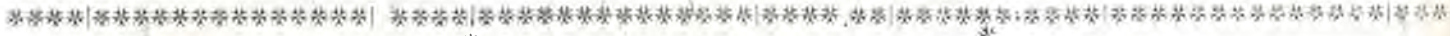

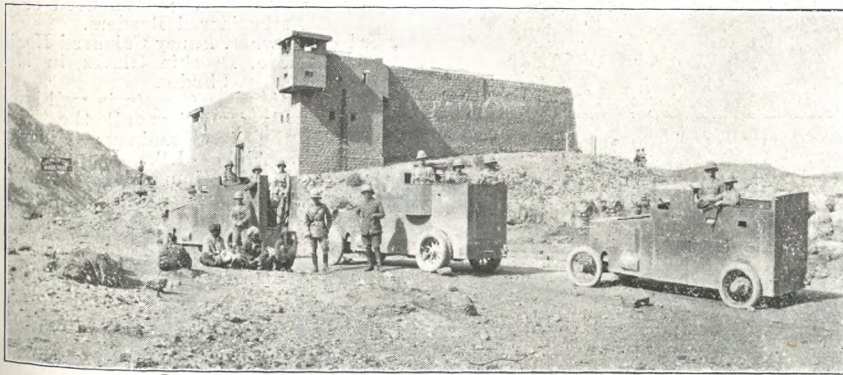
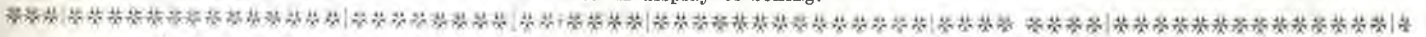
