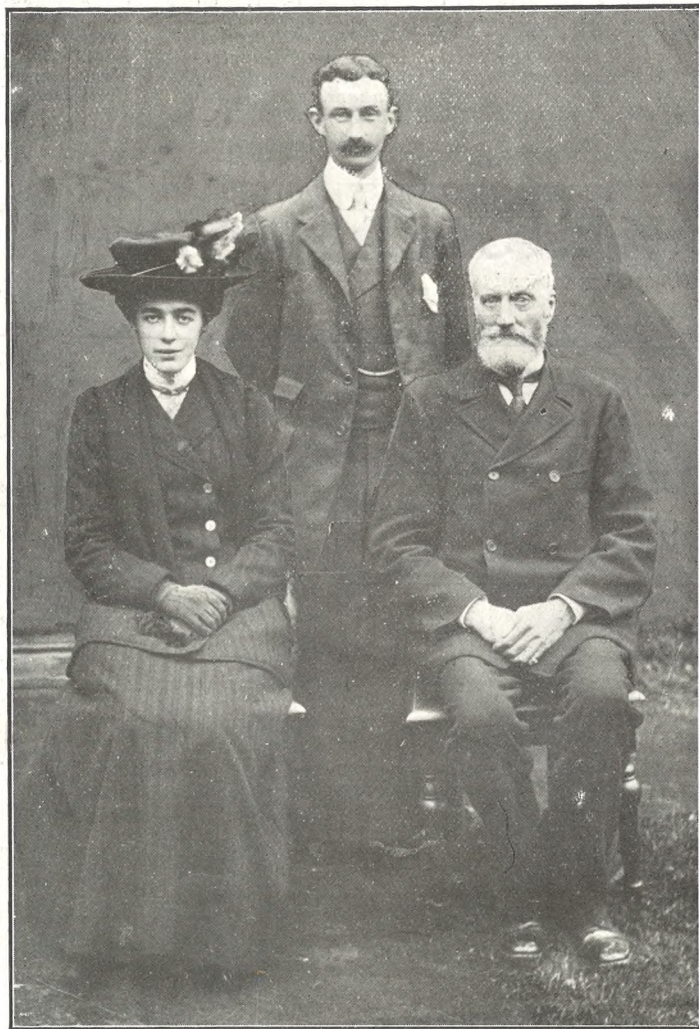

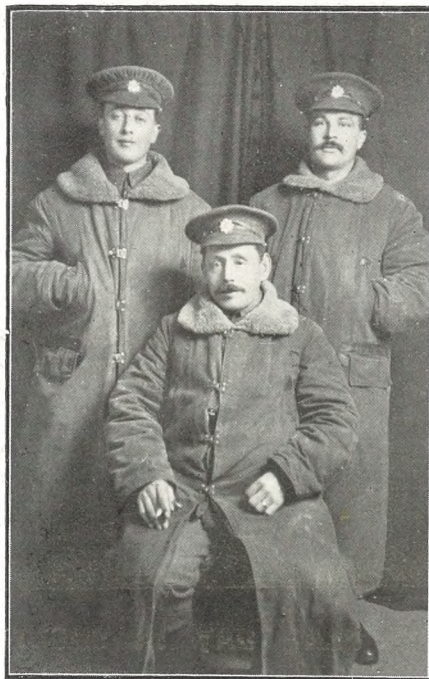

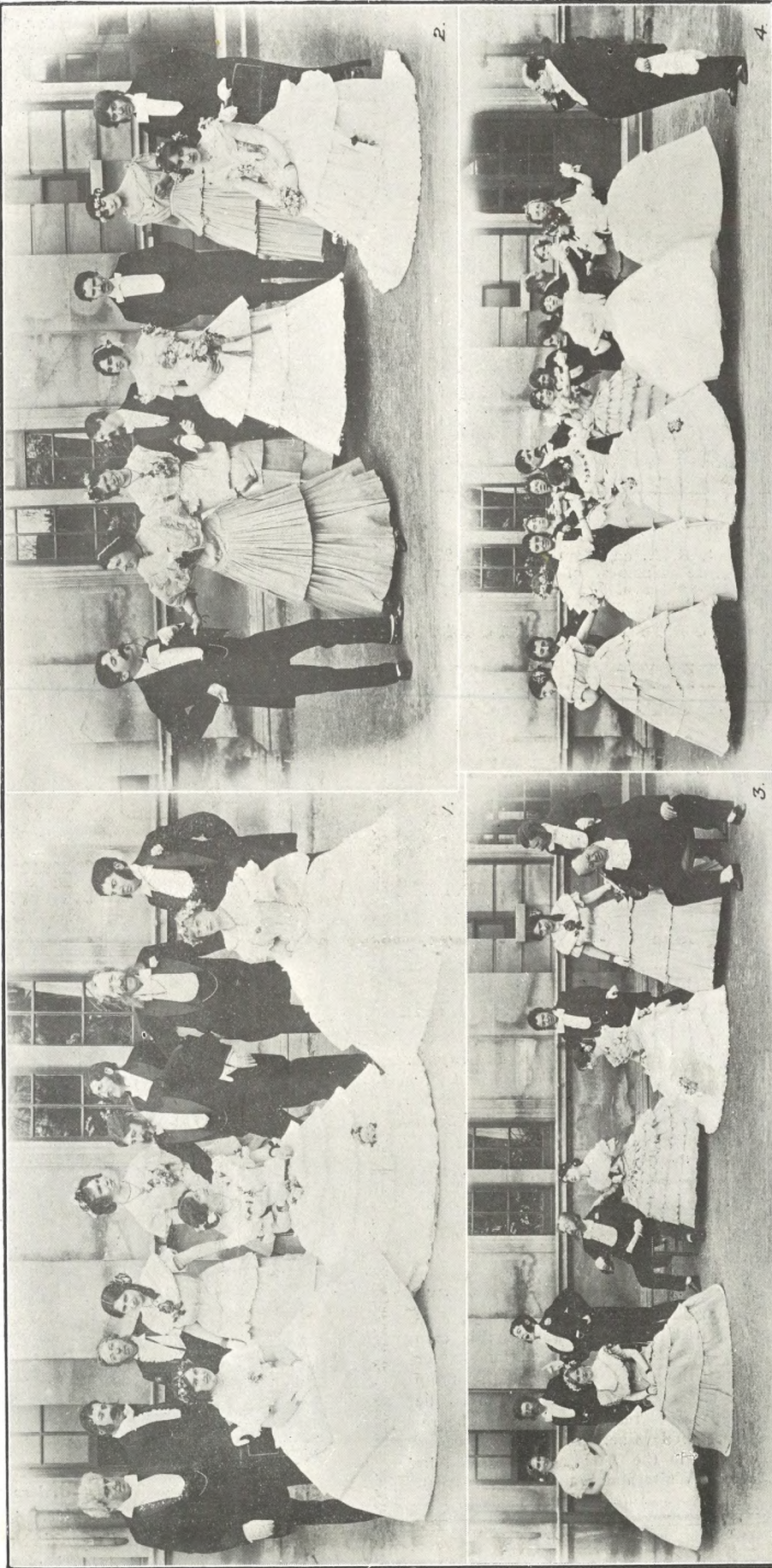

killed in action in Egypt on
Easter Sunday, after being
first reported "missing."
Son of Mr. Millard, builder,
Ottago-place, St. Luke's, who
has three other sons serving.



TPR. ERIC H. SIMPSON,
Royal Gloucestershire Hussars,
killed in action in Egypt on
Easter Sunday, aged 20 years.
He was the son of P.C. M. T.
Simpson, of Kingsmuir, Pitt-
ville, Cheltenham, and was
an assistant at Blinkhorn's,
Gloucester, and a former
employee of "The Famous,"
Cheltenham.



TPR. HARRY HOLBOROW,
Royal Gloucestershire Hussars,
severely wounded at the fight-
ing in Egypt on Easter Sun-
day, being shot through the
lung and lumbar. He is now
in hospital at Port Said. Son
of Mrs. Holborow, of the
Gloucestershire Dairy, Chel-
tenham, who has two other
sons in the Yeomanry, both
of whom were casualties from
Gallipoli.

3rd Gloucester Regt., who died at Stroud Hospital after a brief illness while on a short furlough from his regiment for agricultural work at Standish. 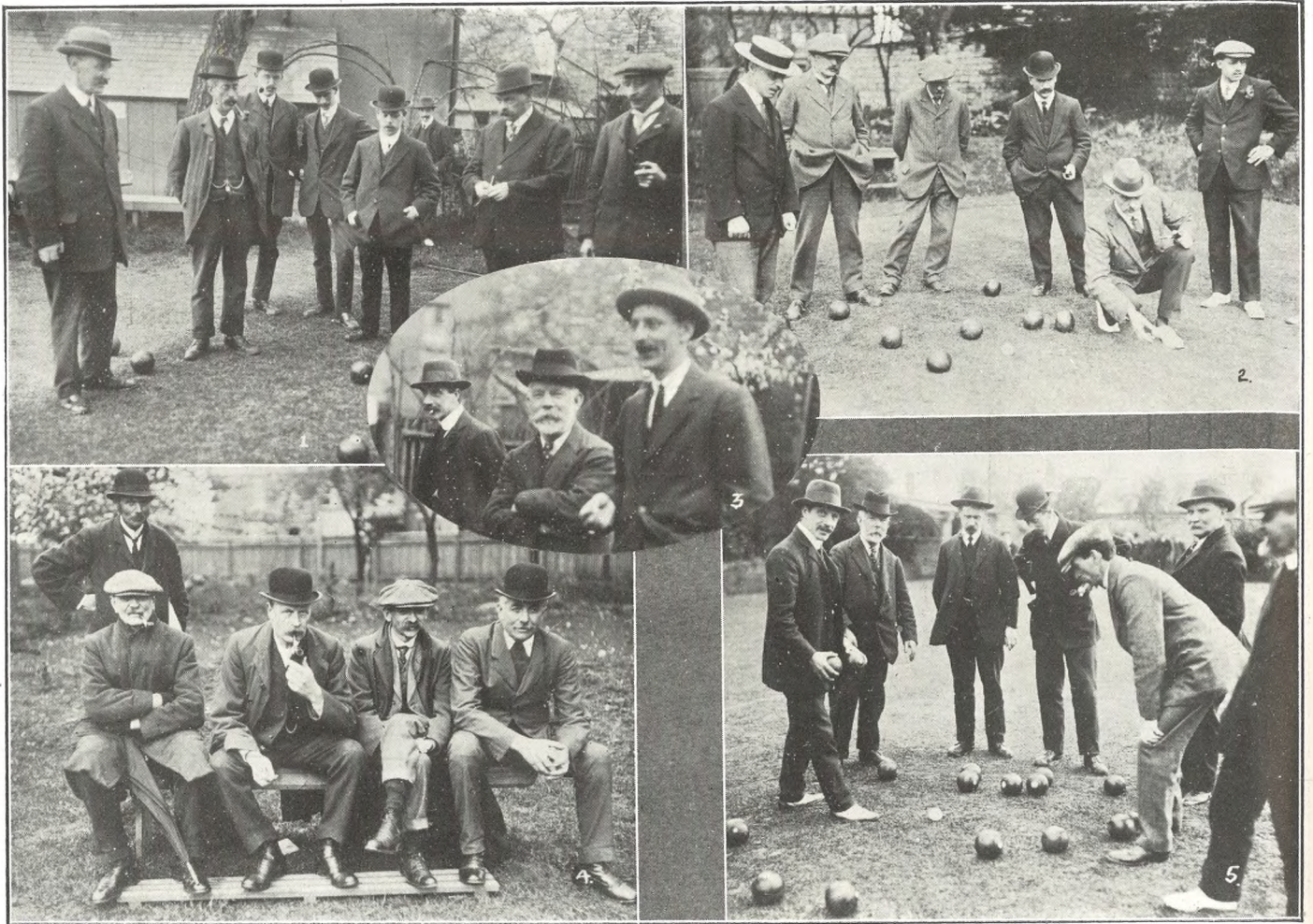

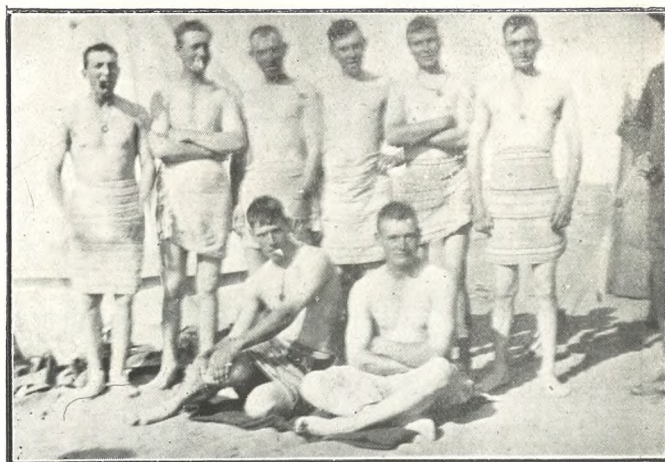

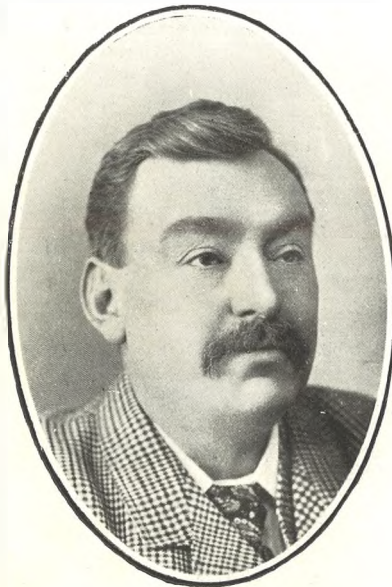

WHO has not felt the fascination of the old?—the subtle allure of old prints, old paintings, old furniture, old china? These things are the poetry of the past in concrete form; the product of an age when the worker was more than worthy of his hire, because he cared less about his hire than about the beauty of his work; the product of an age when men made things with their hands, and imparted to each thing that they made an individuality, and that other elusive, indefinable quality which we associate with individuals—charm.

To-day we rely in many ways upon machines, and value mainly for their utility the things that machinery multiplies for our use. But the quest of beauty leads us always to the products of the past; to the old-fashioned things that are more fashionable than ever to-day, not merely because it is a fashion to admire old-fashioned things, but because those things were so perfectly fashioned when first they saw light.

Consider quite apart from the master touch the marvellous colours in a painting by an Old Master—the colours which time cannot age, though time may crack the varnish and tatter the canvas. Consider the restful massivity of a Jacobean side-board; the fragile splendour of a Chippendale chair, so vastly longer lived than its wonderful maker. Consider the miracle that lies in the glaze of a bit of rare old Chelsea; the transparent delicacy of a piece of true Sevres; the incredible lustre of a Jaeger cabinet of the K'ang He period.

Is it extraordinary that the old, the rare, and the quaint, whose very imperfections are perfection itself, should captivate the minds of those who have eyes that appreciate, fingers that are sensitive, purses that are long?

But the quaint has its duplicators as well as its devotees: its fakers as well as its high priests. There is a glamour about the relics of bygone days, but out of the glamour is born the snare.

Ever since man was born he has been imbued with the instinct to worship, and ever since he began to worship he has betrayed a tendency to be led astray by false gods—to accept the gilt for the gold, the false for the true, the rubbish for the real. The worship of beauty has set man questing after the beautiful down many paths, but too often he is beguiled by tricksters on the way. His eyes are cheated by cunning; he is misled by labels; fascinated by fake.

The art of other days has been counterfeited by the artifice of to-day. All is not Chippendale that stands upon claw legs; all is not ancient oak that is riddled with worm-holes; all is not genuine that masquerades as Chelsea china; and Worcester is as notorious for its imitations as for its sauce. Age, with the unscrupulous, has become largely a question of acids. An imitation of a beautiful thing may be beautiful in itself, but it is only an imitation. It bears the same relationship to the original as the limelight to the sunlight. But the dishonest dealer sells the imitation as the original and pockets the larger profit for his plausibility. He sell' glitter for gold.

the work of the faker for the work of the master. Beauty is not truth with him, nor truth beauty.

Collecting is a cult: the play of "Quinneys'" is an inspiration. In "Quinneys'" the great scene of the successful Haymarket comedy is the "sanctuary" of Joseph Quinney, an antique dealer. Here he surrounds himself with all the beautiful treasures he does not care to sell. Here is the artist first and the dealer afterwards. Here he insensibly satisfies his soul at the expense of his pocket. Here his worship of the rich and rare in things dominates his being. Is he to be blamed?

You should see "Quinneys'" for it is a comedy of artistic distinction. To know Quinney is a liberal education. To see "Quinneys'" is to learn something of the snares of the sinful.

To assure you of two beautiful love stories of old and young hearts is one's duty to the inherent charm of the play.

To promise laughter and laughter again is but the true prescription of the honest physician.

To herald that the human heart-touches, the quaint humour, the love idyll, come over the footlights as a romance of the rare—a perfect piece of exquisite bric-a-brac, is but to quote the words of a great writer.

To introduce you to quaint characters is a joy. Joseph Quinney—the warm-hearted, fiery-tempered Yorkshireman, full of grit, as honest as the day, proud of having worked his way up in the world, is afraid of no man, and, withal, a magnificent egoist. You gaze at his strong jaws and at his resolute mouth, you become acutely conscious of his keen dominating eyes, you realise the virile strength of a lasting tongue, and you recognise a personality bound to attain whatever he might set out to accomplish in life.

You wonder what years of struggle and hardship went to the making of his proud position amongst the great art dealers of London. You wonder what he was before he became what he is. You speculate concerning the purely human side of the man—how did he do it? How did he win through?

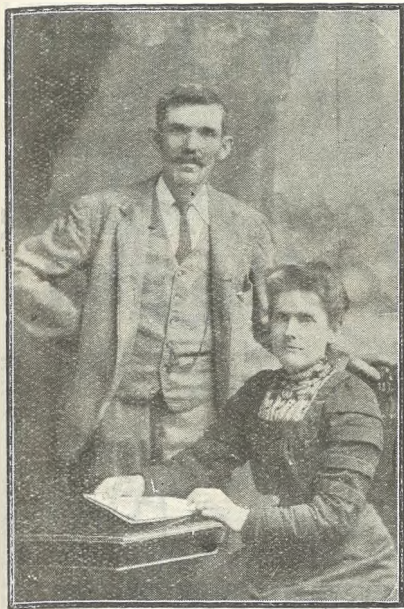

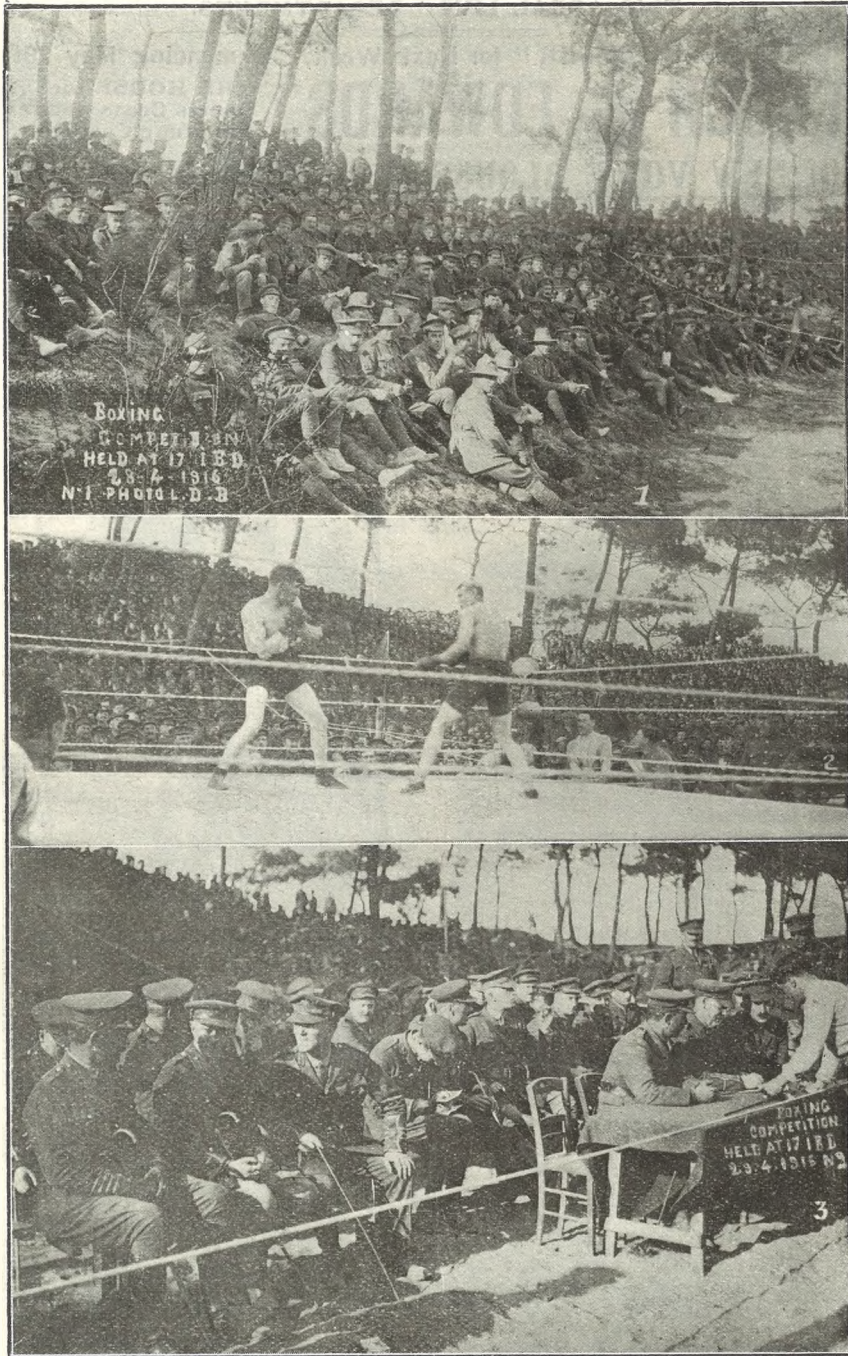
