DRIVER H. C. MARKEY,
Killed in action in France on May 3rd. Husband of Mrs. Markey, St. Paul's-road, Gloucester, and son of Mr. E. Markey, 40 Worcester-street, Gloucester.



SERGT. HARRY HEATH,
R.F.A., who died in a Birmingham hospital on April 27 from wounds received in France, and was buried with military honours at Dursley on May 1st. Only son of Mrs. Heath, of Parsonage-street, Dursley.



LCE.-CORPL. A. HOPKINS,
North Staffordshire Regiment, died from gas poisoning received in action on April 30. Husband of Mrs. Hopkins, 46 Townsend-street, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Hopkins, 3 Russell-street, Cheltenham.



TROOPER F. A. HOPKINS,
Royal Gloucestershire Hussars, reported missing in Egypt since the fight on Easter Sunday, April 23rd. Only son of Mr. and Mrs. F. Hopkins, Postlip Farm, near Winchcombe.



PTE. L. VARDER,
Canadian Highlanders, killed in action on April 18th. He was a son of Mr. Samuel Varder, formerly an auctioneer and estate agent in Cheltenham, and with him emigrated to Canada two years ago. He was educated at Douglas and Northampton House Schools, Cheltenham.



PTE. BERNARD COX,
Wiltshire Regiment, wounded in action on April 9th, and died on April 17th from his wounds. Aged 25 years. His home was at 1 Berkeley-cottages, Chequers-lane, Gloucester, and he worked before the war for Mr. Constable, Bristol-road, Gloucester.

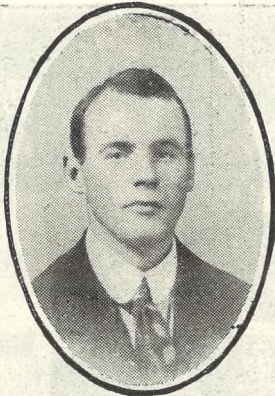

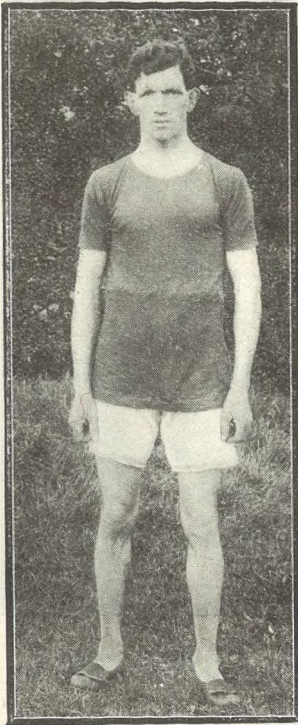

ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



LT.-COM. ARTHUR GERALD ONSLOW, D.S.O., R.N., Who was in command of H.M. Destroyer *Onslaught*, and was killed in action off the coast of Jutland on May 31st, aged 31 years. He was the eldest son of the late Col. Gerald C. P. Onslow, R.E., and of Mrs. Onslow, of Camperdown, Crowborough, and grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. Donald, of Lisle House, Cheltenham.



MIDSHIPMAN PAUL HOPCRAFT, R.N., Killed in action on the *Queen Mary* off the coast of Jutland, on May 31st, aged 16 years. He was the son of Mr. G. P. Hopcraft, of Southam, the respected general manager of Cheltenham Original Brewery. He only joined the *Queen Mary* in January, 1916.



SGT. A. WALFORD, D.C.M., Gloucestershire Regiment, died of wounds on April 9th, aged 25 years. He received the D.C.M. for conspicuous bravery at Hebuterne on October 5th. He was due to come home on leave two hours after he received his wounds, from which he died. Son of Mrs. Walford, The Lodge, Hucclecote.



SECOND-LIEUT. WALLACE D. BOULTON, Gloucestershire Regt., killed in action April 20, aged 21 years. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Boulton, Innsworth, Gloucester. A Gloucester King's School Old Boy, keen cricketer and footballer, late secretary of the Y.M.C.A. (Gloucester) Thursday Clubs.



LANCE-CORPL. W. J. HOLYOAKE, Gloucestershire Regt., wounded with Indian Expeditionary Force on Good Friday, and now in hospital at Basra. Son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Holyoake, of Shipton Oliffe, Andoversford.



PTE. W. J. RICKETTS, Yorks. and Lancs. Regiment, wounded in France, and died in hospital on April 9th, after serving in Egypt for some time. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. R. Ricketts, Coney Hill, Gloucester. He leaves a widow and child.

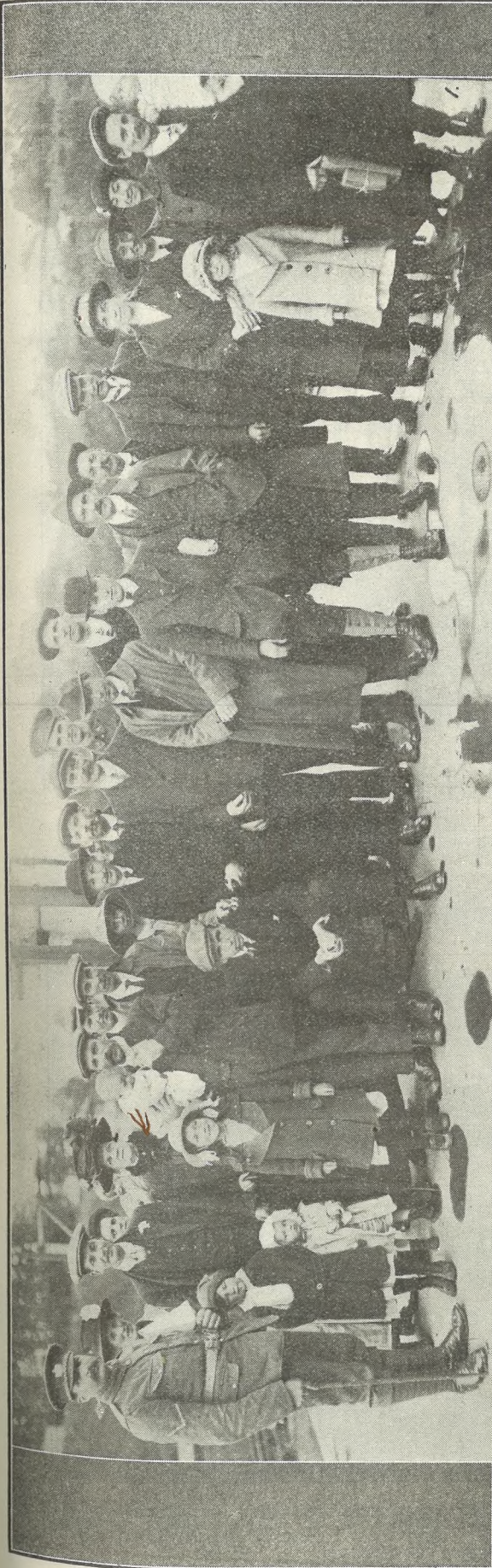

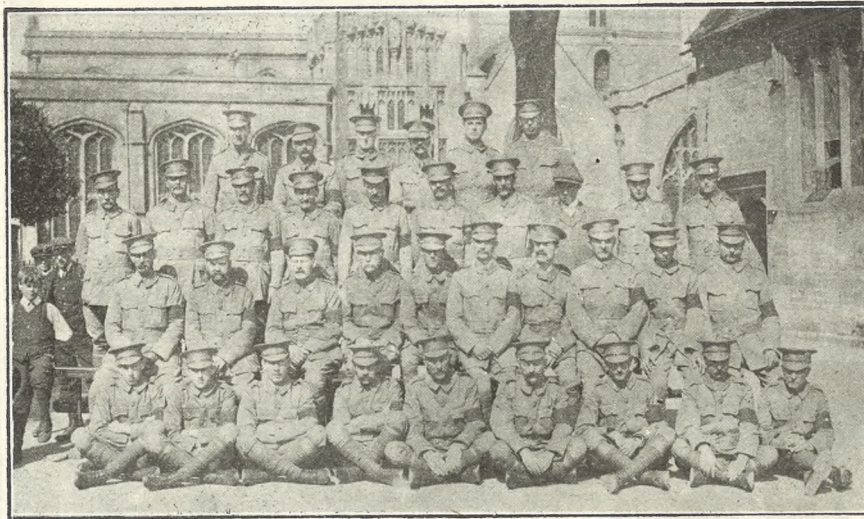

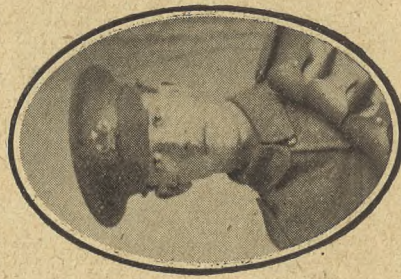

PETTY OFFICER WM. GEO. ALLSOPP, R.N.,
Killed in action on H.M.S. Defence when that vessel was sunk in the great naval battle on May 31st. Second son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Allsopp, Pauntley, Newent, and husband of Mrs. Eva Allsopp, Market Square, Newent.



SERGT. S. R. WRIGHT,
Berkshire Regiment, who has been killed in action. He was an assistant master at the Parish Church Boys' School, Devonshire-street, Cheltenham, a capable musician, pianist, & organist. He is the first local school-master to die in the war, though others have been wounded.



CPL R. H. (BOB) EATON,
Royal Gloucestershire Hussars, who had a remarkable escape from Katia on Easter Sunday. He was one of only nine who got away when "A" Squadron was surrounded. He had three horses shot under him, and it took the fourth to get into Kantara, a distance of 35 miles, that night.



TROOPER CYRIL WILLIAM JOHNSTONE,
Royal Gloucestershire Hussars, reported missing since engagement in Egypt on Easter Sunday. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Johnstone, of Somerset House, Knapp-road, Cheltenham. He is only 17.



LCE.-CORPL. C. H. WARD,
Gloucester Regiment, killed in the trenches, June 2nd, aged 30 years. Second son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Ward, 14 Albert-street, St. Peter's, Cheltenham.



PTE. VICTOR GRAY,
Canadian Contingent, killed in action in France, June, 1916. Eldest son of Mrs. Gray, Lansdown, Stroud. He had been previously wounded at Ypres in April, 1915.



PTE P. R. KENT,
Grenadier Guards, killed in action on April 19th abroad, aged 23 years. He was previously wounded in October, 1914. His father is on active service, and his mother, Mrs. Kent, lives at 39 Great Western-road, Gloucester.

Killed in action on H.M.S. Defence when that vessel sank during the great naval battle of May 31. Brother of Mrs. A. Hardman, 25 Norfolk-street, Gloucester.

Killed in action on H.M.S. Defence when that vessel was sunk in the great naval action on May 31st, aged 20 years. He lived at 1 Andover-street, Cheltenham.

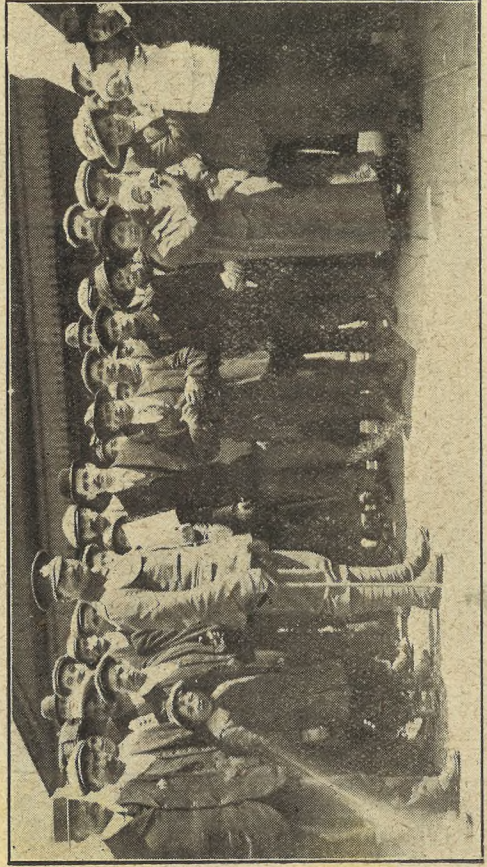
