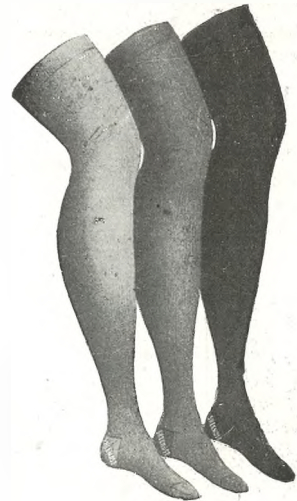

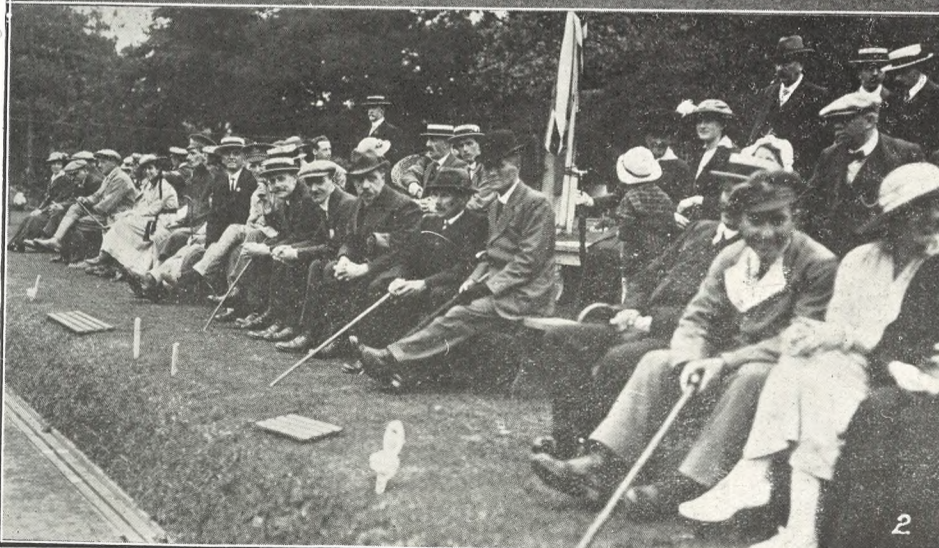

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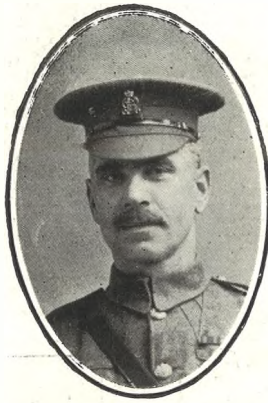
ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.

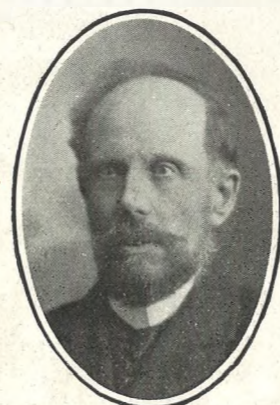

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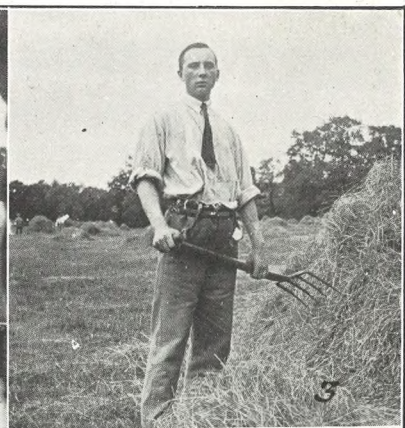

CAPT. E. J. MILLIN, Highland Light Infantry, killed in action in France on July 1. He received the *Medaille Militaire* for distinguished conduct at Mons. He lived at Ampney St. Peter, Cirencester, where his widow and children now reside.



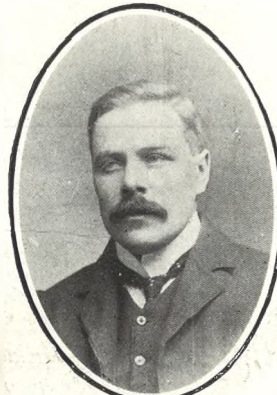
PTE. F. BIRT, Gloucester Regiment, wounded in action in France, and now in hospital at St. Helens, Lancs. Son of Mr. and Mrs. T. Birt, 7 Whitecross-square, Cheltenham.



1st-CLASS PETTY OFFICER WALTER L. JONES, R.N., Killed in action May 31st, in the great naval action. Son of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Jones, 17 Northfield-terrace, Cheltenham. He received the long service medal last February.



PTE. GEORGE THOMAS SHEPPARD, Grenadier Guards, who died of wounds received in action in Flanders on May 9, 1916, aged 30 years. Son of Mrs. Hamblett, of Lower Guiting. He leaves a widow and four young children.



L.-CORPL. ARTHUR EDWIN LAWRENCE, 10th Batt. 1st Overseas Contingent, reported missing after battle of St. Julien, and now officially reported killed in action, April 23 or 24, 1915, aged 34 years. Eldest son of the late Ald. E. Lawrence, of Cheltenham, and of Mrs. Lawrence, now of Calgary, Canada.



PTE. REGINALD LAWRENCE, 10th Batt. 1st Overseas Contingent, reported missing after battle of St. Julien, and now officially reported killed in action, April 23 or 24, 1915, aged 33 years. Second son of the late Ald. E. Lawrence, and brother of Lce.-Corpl. Arthur E. Lawrence.



PTE. ARTHUR PHILIP HAYLING, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action in France July 3, aged 21 years. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Hayling, 3 Moorend-crescent, Cheltenham. He was the well-known Rugby football forward who played for Cheltenham Town and Naunton Park.



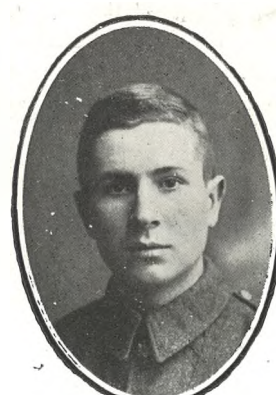
PTE. HARRY COLLINS, Worcestershire Regt., killed in action on July 4, in France. Husband of Mrs. Collins, 2a Clare-street, Gloucester. He was the old Gloucester footballer. He was previously wounded on January 9, 1915, and was in Ladysmith during the Boer War. He leaves three young children.

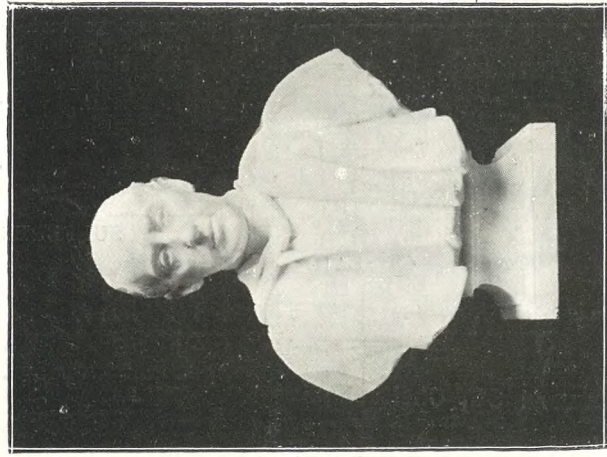

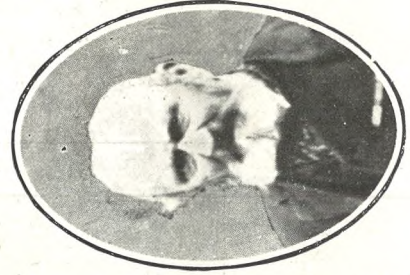

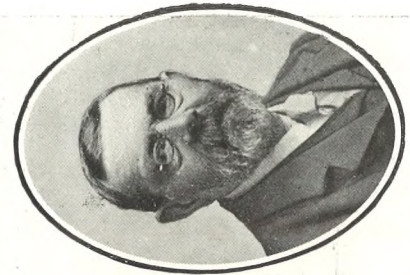
