R.F.A., killed in action July 26th, aged 27 years. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Gardner, of St. Paul's, Cheltenham, he was educated at Cheltenham Practising and Grammar Schools and at Bristol and London Universities, where he took honours in physics.



SECOND-LIEUT. PERCY BADHAM,
Gloucester Regt. (Territorials), wounded in arm and hip in action during the big offensive in France. Son of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Badham, senr., of Moffat House, Tewkesbury.



LCE.-CPL. C. E. RACHAEL,
Royal Warwick Regt., killed in action while leading his section during the recent big advance in France. He was a most popular man in his regiment. Son of Mrs. Rachael, Wyck Rissington, Stow-on-the-Wold.



TPR. "BERT" EAGLES,
Royal Gloucester Hussars, who escaped from Katia on Easter Sunday, being one of the eight who got away when "A" Squadron was surrounded. Second son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Eagles, Boxbush-road, Coleford, Glos., aged 17 years.



LCE.-CORPL. S. F. JONES,
Worcester Regt., killed in action July 3rd, aged 26 years. He was formerly employed by the Midland Railway Co., and was the husband of Mrs. S. Jones, 81 Melbourn-street, Gloucester.



CORPL. AUSTIN C. PAPPS,
Royal Berks Regt., killed in action while bombing the Germans on July 24th, aged 18 years. Son of Ald. H. H. and Mrs. Papps, Tewkesbury.



PTE. HARRY SHARP,
Gloucester Regt. (Territorials), reported missing since going into action in France during the big offensive. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Sharp, 4 Beaufort-buildings, Pittville, Cheltenham.



PETTY OFFICER ALBERT POWERS,
Royal Navy, who went down with one of H.M. ships whilst on war service. Husband of Mrs. Powers, 46 St. Mary's-square, Gloucester. He leaves three children.



PTE. E. C. JENKINS,
Gloucester Regt. (Territorials), missing with no hope of being found alive since going into action during the present big offensive. Son of Pte. J. J. Jenkins, 1st Gloucester Regt., and of Mrs. Jenkins, 9 Hermitage-street, Bath-road, Cheltenham.



PTE. JACK JAMES,
Gloucester Regt. (Territorials), missing since going into action July 23rd in France. Grandson of Mr. and Mrs. T. James, Pigeon House Farm, Southam, near Cheltenham, who would be grateful for any information of him.



PTE. THOS. W. HARRIS,
Gloucester Regiment, killed in action July 3rd in France. Son of Mrs. Harris, 6 Moreton-terrace, Charlton Kings. He joined the 11th Gloucesters ten months ago, but was drafted into another battalion. He previously worked for Mr. Cripps, fly proprietor.



PTE. V. W. FRY,
Gloucester Regt. (Territorials), missing in action with no hope of being found alive during the big advance in France. Son of Mrs. Fry, Eton Cottage, Prestbury-road, he was for years with Mr. E. T. Taylor, Winchcombe-street, Chelt.

ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



LANCE-CORPL. J. MITCHELL, Gloucester Regiment, wounded in action in France three times, and now in hospital. Son of Mr. and Mrs. G. Mitchell, 3 Victoria-parade, Gloucester-road, Cheltenham.

SERG. CHAS. W. NORRIS, Gloucester Regt. (Territorials), wounded in action July 22nd by shrapnel in back and bullet in hip. Second son of Mrs. Norris, Devonshire Dairy, Cheltenham.

SGT. ALBERT H. NORRIS, Gloucester Regt. (Territorials), wounded in action in France through thigh on July 2nd. Fourth son of Mrs. Norris, Devonshire Dairy, Cheltenham.

PTE. GEORGE SUMMERS, Worcester Regt., died of wounds received in action July 4th in France. Husband of Mrs. Summers, 102 Alma-place, Gloucester. He leaves two children.



PTE. W. ("TOPPER") HAREWELL, Gloucester Regiment, died July 16th from wounds received in action during the present big offensive in France. He was a brother of Mrs. H. Lowe, 5 Marsh-lane, Swindon-road, and of Mrs. Hawling, 72 Queen-street, Cheltenham. He went through the Boer war, and volunteered for service on the outbreak of war.

SAPPER ARTHUR GILES, R.E. (Railway Co.), accidentally killed with four more comrades in France on July 21st, and buried at Calais Cemetery with full military honours. He formerly lived at Wincombe, and worked on G.W.R. His wife now lives at 3 Churchill-road, Naunton Park, Cheltenham.

SAPPER T. F. JAMES, Royal Engineers, invalided with dysentery and malaria while on active service in Salonika. Now in St. Patrick's Hospital, Malta. Son of Mr. and Mrs. C. James, Marle Hill-road, Cheltenham.

L.CE.-CORPL. A. ENOCH, Gloucester Regt. (Territorials), missing, believed killed, on July 23rd in the heavy fighting. He was a time-expired Territorial, and re-joined in August, 1914. Son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Enoch, Campden, Croft-street, Leckhampton, who have another son in France in same regiment.

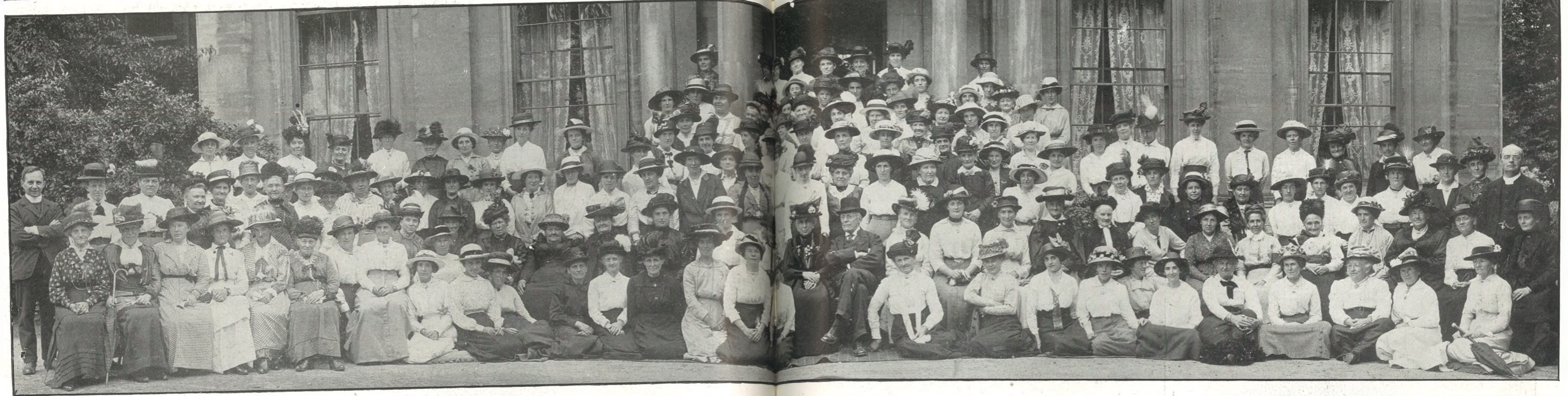

PTE. WALTER G. H. PROTHEROUGH, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action in France July 3rd, aged 20 years. Only son of Mrs. Protherough, 12 Croft-road, Charlton Kings.

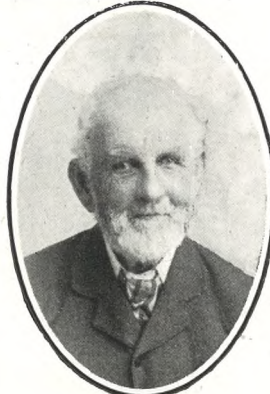

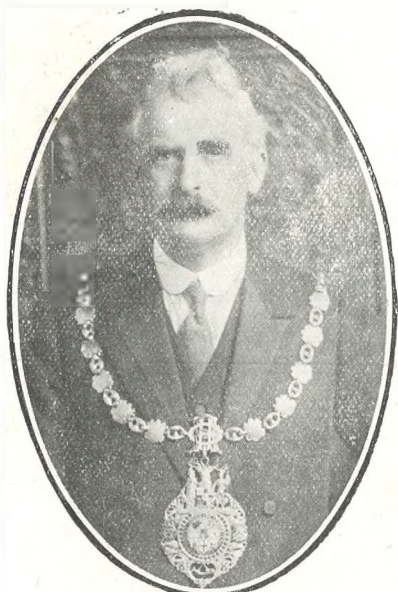

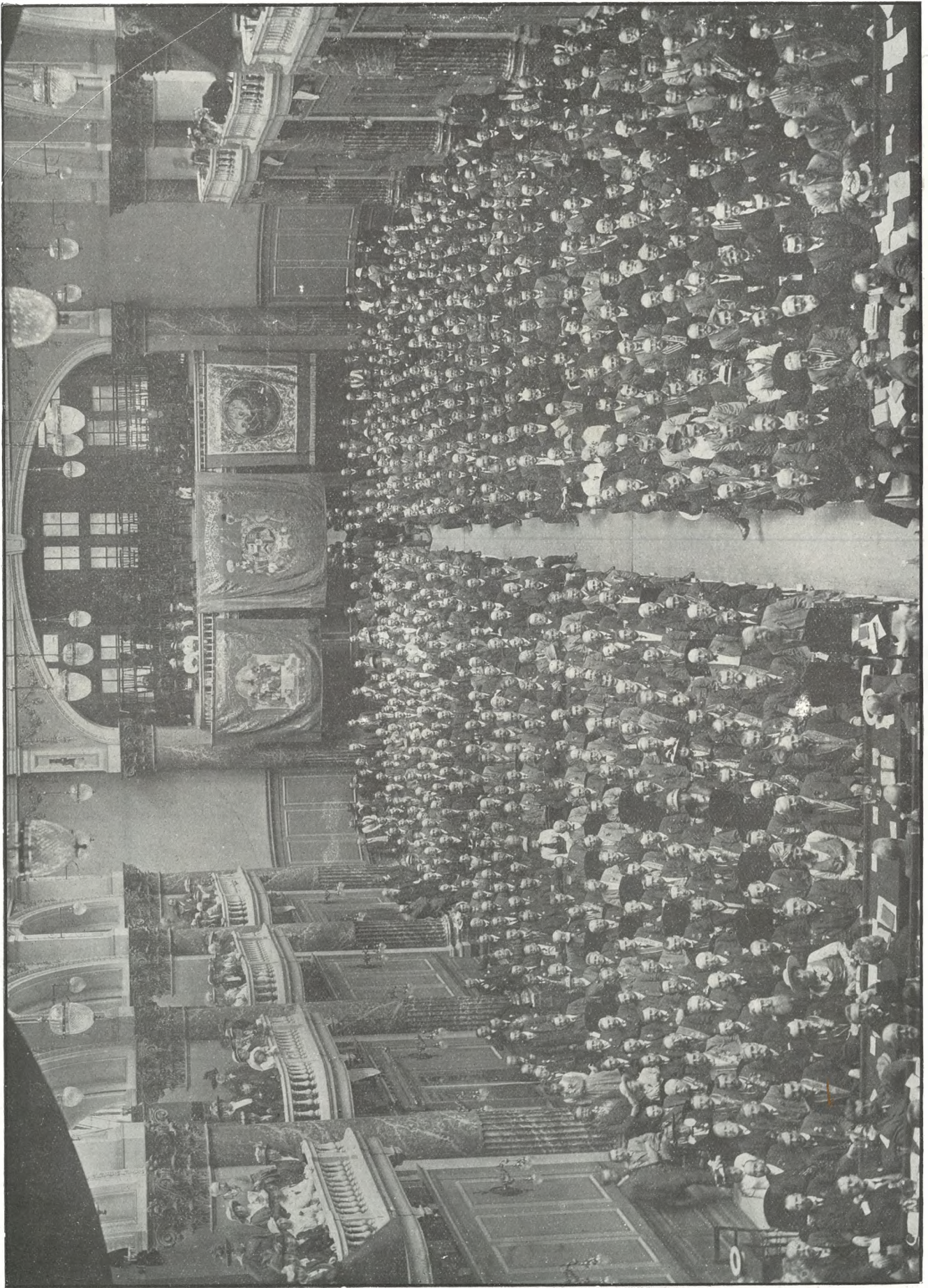

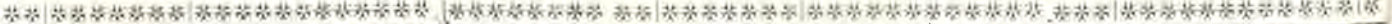

Gloucester Regt. (Territorials), missing since going into action July 21st-23rd in the big offensive in France. He was a well-known postman in Cheltenham: His wife, Mrs. H. Young, 1 Sandford-terrace, Keynsham-road, Cheltenham, would be grateful for any information of him.



PTE. FRANK PARRIS,
Gloucester Regt. (Territorial second line), wounded in action in France and now in a London hospital. His wife lives at Cirencester Lodge, Fairview, Cheltenham. Before joining the army he worked at "The Famous," Cheltenham.



PTE. G. F. FEAR,

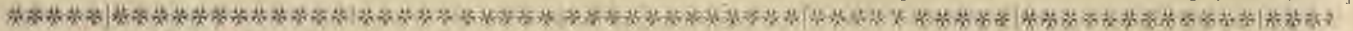

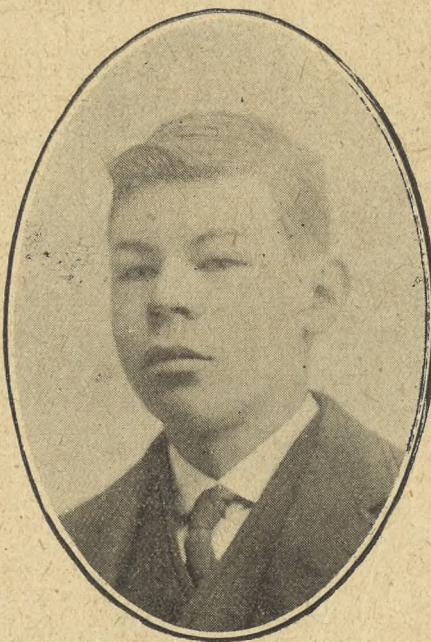

THE GLOUCESTER TAXI-CAB TRAGEDY.

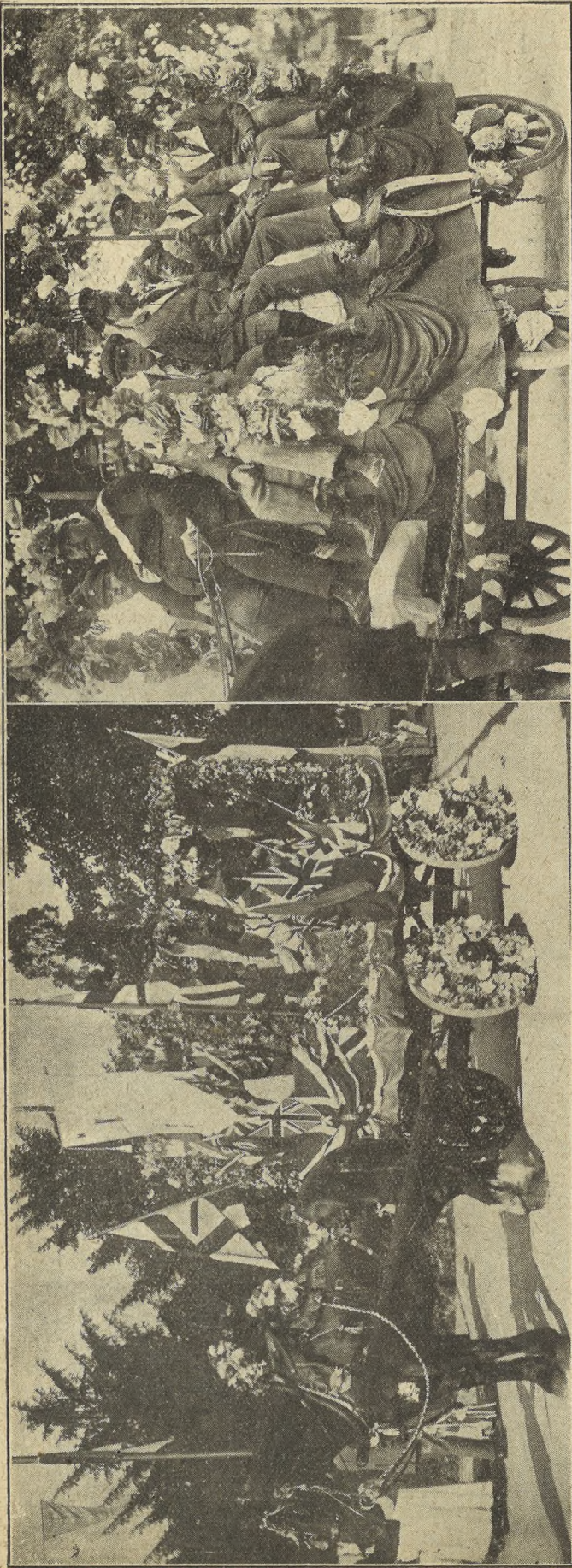
