# ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



**SEC.-LIEUT. S. G. BENNETT,** Gloucester Regt., wounded on July 29th in action in France. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. G. F. Bennett, Cinderford. He was in the Civil Service in Gloucester previous to the war, and joined the 1/5th Gloucesters, and after promotion to sergeant was given a commission in Bristol's Own.



**PTE. FRANK TOWNSEND,** Gloucester Regt., who travelled 10,000 miles from Chili to enlist. He was formerly with Messrs. Brydges, Mellersh, and Co., Cheltenham, and was a well-known Stroud swimmer. He has travelled in many countries as contractors' representative. He returned to Stroud last week for the first time for twelve years.



**PTE. W. E. PEARCE,** Gloucester Regt., who has been awarded the Military Medal for gallantry on the field. He is a son of Mr. H. B. Pearce, of Hamilton-place, Charlton Kings, and a member of the "Echo" office staff.



**PTE. FREDK. GEORGE ("DICK") MASON,** Gloucester Regt., killed in action in trenches on August 19th, in France. He was scarcely 18 years of age. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Mason, of 25 Albert-street, St. Peter's, Cheltenham. He was a popular member of the "Echo" staff when he enlisted during Capt. Baldwin's recruiting campaign.



**PTE. A. G. W. ("BERT") BROWN,** Gloucester Regt., wounded at La Boiselle on July 5th, since when nothing has been heard of him. Son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Brown, Beech Cottage, Slad, near Stroud, who would be deeply grateful for any information of him.



**LCE.-SERGT. FRED COOLE,** Gloucester Regt. (Territorials), missing since going into action, July 21st. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. T. G. Coole, 11 Albert-place, Pittville, Cheltenham. He was the winner of a Marksman's Badge and Star.



**LCE.-CPL. GEO. STEPHENS,** Worcester Regt., missing since going into action, July 22nd or 23rd. Has now written saying he is a prisoner of war at Dulmen-in-Westphalia, Germany. Husband of Mrs. G. Stephens, Union-street, Stow-on-the-Wold.



**PTE. ERIC T. SHEPARD,** Royal Fusiliers (Bankers' Bati.), wounded in action in France three times in an attack on a German trench, and now in St. Mark's Hospital, Kempdown, Brighton. Son of Mr. and Mrs. G. T. Shepard, The Creamery, Cheltenham.



**PTE. W. H. N. KEYTE,** Worcester Regt., wounded in action, July 4th, and now in Chatham Hospital. Only son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Keyte, 4 Swindon-road North, Cheltenham.



**PTE. ROBERT WEBLEY,** Gloucester Regt., died from heat in Mesopotamia, aged 32 years. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Webley, Chapel-street, Stow-on-the-Wold.



**SERGT. FRANK D. WOODWARD,** Canadian Infantry, killed in action in France on June 13.



**PTE. T. C. SUTTON,** Gloucester Regt. (Territorials), badly wounded by shrapnel while bombing the German trenches, June 20th, and now lying in a Welsh Military Hospital. Son of Mr. and Mrs. F. Sutton, Arle, Cheltenham.

Gloucester Regt. (Territorials),  
reported missing on July 21st,  
with no hope of being found  
alive. His parents, Mr. and  
Mrs. W. Harding, 3 Nauntton-  
cottages, Leckhampton, have  
now received a card from him  
saying he is a prisoner in  
Germany, and in perfect  
health.



**SERGT. EDWARD GARNER,**  
Gloucester Regt. (Territorials),  
killed in action in France by  
a shell on August 15th.  
Younger son of the late Mr.  
Edward Garner, Albuera,  
Painswick-road, Cheltenham.  
His only brother was killed  
in September last at Loos.



**PTE. A. E. COX,**  
Gloucester Regt. (Territorials),  
severely wounded in action in  
France on July 22nd, and still  
in a French hospital. Second  
son of Mr. and Mrs. E. G.  
Cox, The Woodbines, Up  
Hatherley, near Cheltenham.



**GUNNER J. H. MORRELL,**  
Mountain Battery, R.G.A., in-  
valided from Salonika, and  
now in Valetta Hospital,  
Malta. Only son of Mr. and  
Mrs. Morrell, 24 All Saints'-  
road, Cheltenham. He was  
formerly clerk to Mr. F. R.  
Franklin, Charlton Kings,  
and has served in France,  
enlisting at outbreak of war.



**PTE. H. RALPH,**  
Gloucester Regt. (Territorials),  
killed in action in France on  
July 23rd, aged 19 years.  
Second son of Mr. and Mrs.  
Ralph, 14 Prince's-terrace,  
Tivoli, Cheltenham.



**PTE. JOHN JAS. SULLIVAN,**  
Worcester Regt., wounded in  
action in shoulder on July  
3rd in France, aged 22 years.  
Second son of Mr. and Mrs.  
Sullivan, 32 King-street,  
Cheltenham



**CORPL. WM. ("DAN")  
SULLIVAN,**  
Gloucester Regt. (Territorials),  
killed in action July 21st,  
aged 28 years. Brother of Pte.  
J. J. Sullivan. He was the  
well-known Cheltenham Town  
footballer.



**PTE. ARTHUR SIMS,**  
Gloucester Regt. (Territorials),  
missing after going into action  
on July 23rd in France. Son  
of Mrs. Sims, 8 Fairfield-  
walk, Leckhampton, who  
would be grateful for any in-  
formation of him.



**PTE. A. WINSTONE,**  
Worcester Regt., wounded in  
action in France on July  
3rd during the big offen-  
sive. His wife and child re-  
side at 8 Bafford-terrace,  
Charlton Kings, Cheltenham.



**PTE. W. C. COATES,**  
Welsh Borderers, wounded in  
action in big offensive in  
France. Aged 19 years. Son  
of Mr. and Mrs. W. Coates,  
Vernon-place, Cheltenham.



**PTE. H. A. PRIVETT,**  
Gloucester Regt. Died from  
heat in Mesopotamia in July.  
Husband of Mrs. Privett, 8  
Jersey-street, Cheltenham

late Mr. Chas. Martin and of

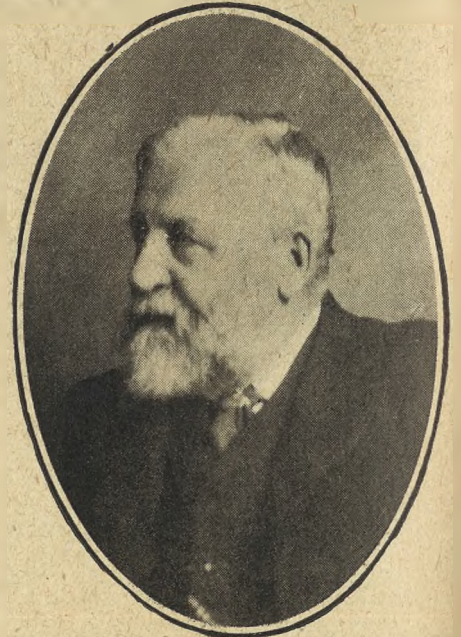

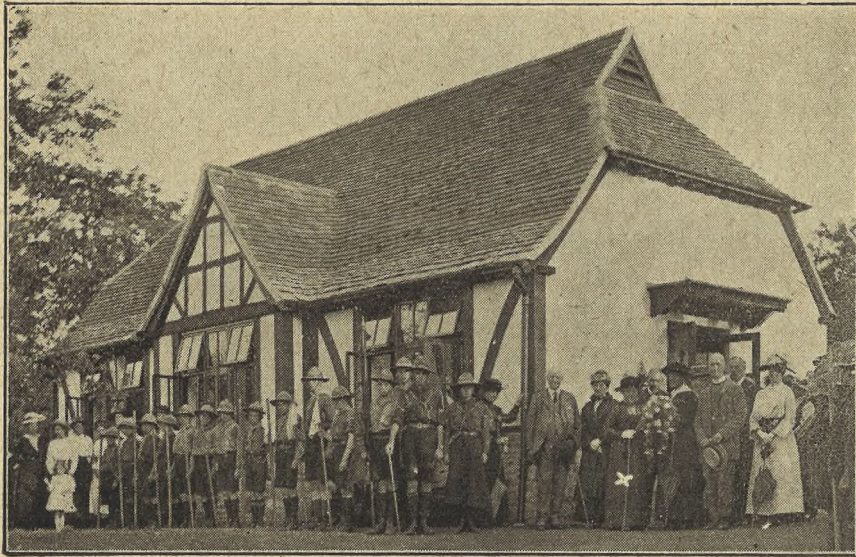

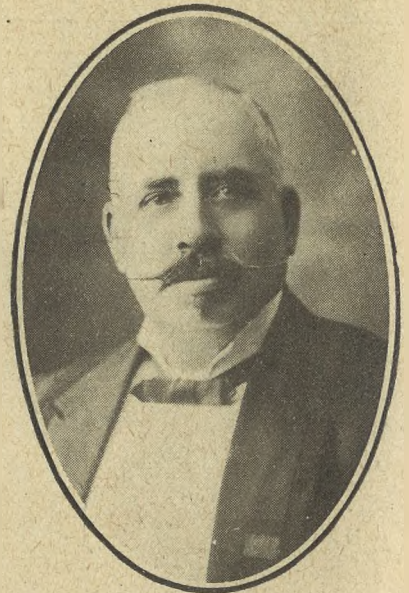

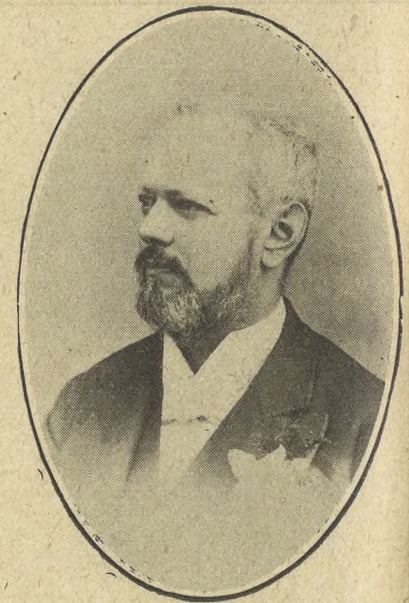

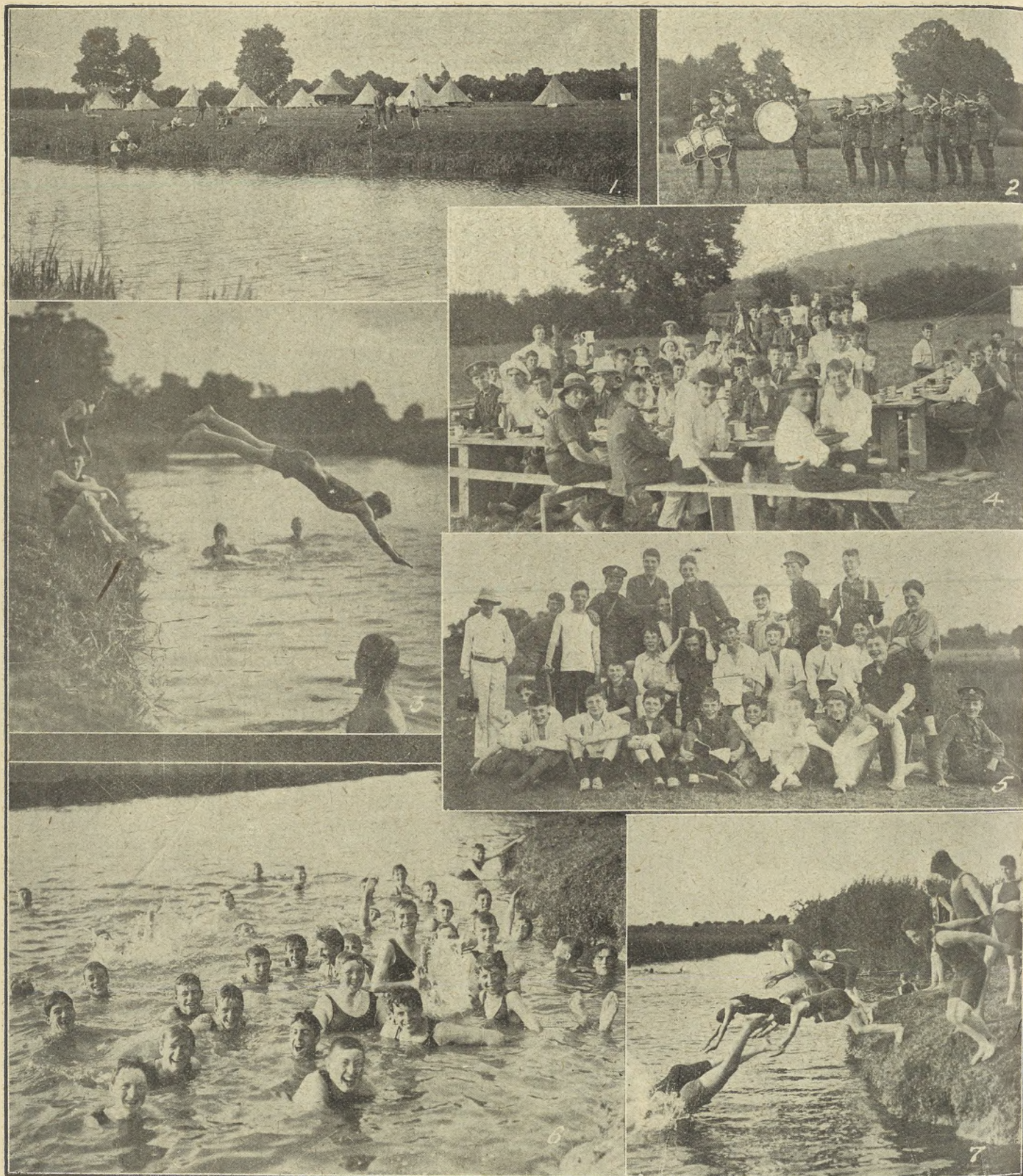

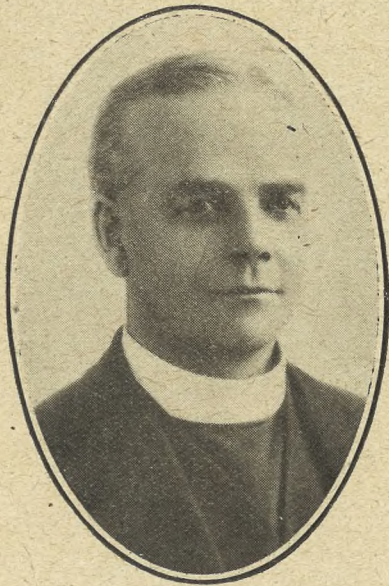

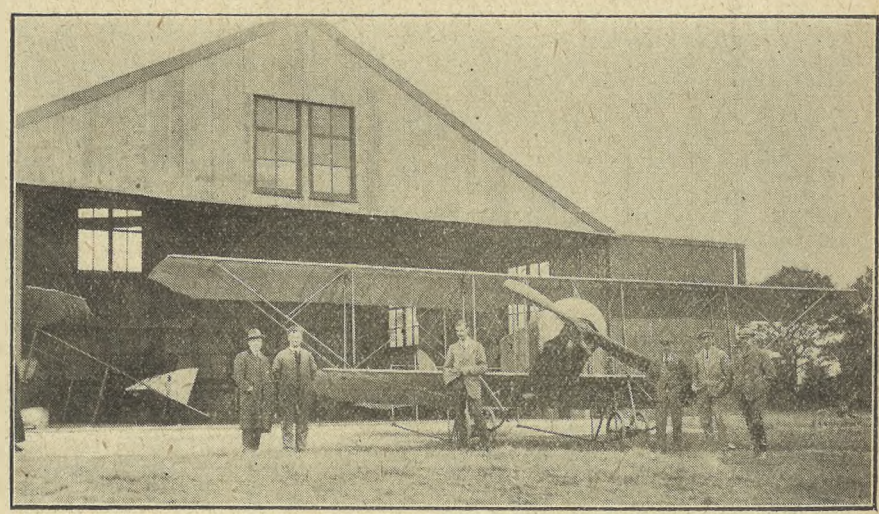
