Gloucestershire Regt., killed in
action on Sept. 25th, aged 19
years. Fourth son of Mr.
and Mrs. Dartnall, 42 Win-
stonian-road, Cheltenham. He
enlisted in August, 1914.



PTE. O. TAYLOR,
Gloucestershire Regt., killed in
action on Sept. 9th, 1916.
Son of Mr. Taylor and
brother of Mrs. Howlett, 3
Milsom-street, Cheltenham.
He was a regular soldier



PTE. O. W. DEVEREUX,
Gloucestershire Regt., killed in
action on August 30th, 1916.
Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs.
Devereux, Overbury, Teukes-
bury.



PTE. F. W. GAGE
Gloucestershire Regt., killed in
action on Sept. 11th, 1916,
aged 22 years. Dearly-loved
son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam
Gage, of 2 Berkeley-avenue,
Winchcombe-street, Chelten-
ham.



PTE. A. COLLINS,
Gloucestershire Regt., killed in
action on Sept. 8th, 1916, aged
21 years. Son of Mr. and
Mrs. Collins, of Dowdeswell,
Glos. He joined the army in
April, 1915, and was previ-
ously engaged on G.W.R. at
Grange Court, Glos.



PTE. L. ORGAN,
Gloucestershire Regt., died Sept.
2nd, 1916, from wounds re-
ceived in action on August 30,
aged 34 years. His home was
at 59 Queen-street, Chelten-
ham. He was an employe of
Mr. H. Packer, enlisting at
outbreak of war.



PTE. FREDK. C. BOWKETT,
Gloucestershire Regt., reported
missing since going into
action on October 13th, 1915,
and now officially reported
killed. Eldest son of Mr.
and Mrs. Chas. Bowkett, of
Little London, Longhope,
Gloucestershire.



L.-CORPL. FRANK WILLIS,
Gloucestershire Regt., wounded
in action on Sept. 25th in
right thigh, and now in
Exeter Hospital. Son of Mrs.
John Willis, of Cromwell-
road, Cheltenham. He was an
employe of Mr. Wheway. He
enlisted March 28th, 1916



PTE. T. HATHAWAY
Gloucestershire Regt., died of
wounds received in action on
Sept. 23rd, 1916, aged 23 years.
He joined the colours on Aug.
10th, 1914. Third son of Mr.
and Mrs. G. Hathaway, of
Naunton, Cheltenham, who
have three other sons serving
abroad.



PTE. E. C. WALKER,
Gloucestershire Regt., wounded
in action on July 23rd. He
had previously fought in the
big battle of Loos. Son of
Mrs. Walker, of Wishinger,
near Miserden. He joined the
army two years ago, when he
was a gardener to Mr. Holt,
at Miserden.



L.-CORPL. H. CAUDLE,
Gloucestershire Regt., wounded
in action August 27th, 1916,
and now in hospital in
France. Son of Mrs. Caudle,
1 Bedford-place, Prestbury-
road, Cheltenham. He had
previously been invalided
home from the front, and
returned to duty in May last.



L.-CORPL. ALEX. DAY,
Gloucestershire Regt., died of
wounds on August 1st re-
ceived in action on July 23rd.
He had been previously
wounded. Aged 23 years. Son
of Mr. and Mrs. Day, 20 The
Mews, Windsor. He was foot-
man to Mrs. Eyres Monsell,
Dumbleton Hall.

Gloucestershire Regt., killed in action on July 20th. He was the son of Mr. Geo. Cook, Waterloo House, Bredon, and volunteered for service on August 7th, 1914, collecting ten more comrades from the old company of Territorials, Bredon Hill section.



PTE. E. J. AMERY
Gloucestershire Regt., killed in action on July 23rd, aged 20 years. Previously reported wounded and missing. Only son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Amery, 31 Ail Saints'-terrace, Cheltenham. He was an old Patesian, and was an employee of the Cheltenham Building Society.



PTE. T. H. DODWELL,
Gloucestershire Regt. (attached to Devon Regt.), wounded through chest and back in action, and now lying in Northfields Hospital. Aged 29 years. Husband of Mrs. T. H. Dodwell, 3 Swindon-terrace, Swindon-road, Cheltenham.



PTE. ARTHUR LEWIS,
Gloucestershire Regt., killed in action by shrapnel on August 30th, aged 23 years. He was trained in Cheltenham with the 9th Gloucesters, and afterwards transferred to another battalion. Fourth son of Mr. Thos Lewis, Broadwell Lane End, near Coleford, Glos.



PTE. BASIL G. BOOY,
Gloucestershire Regt., invalided home from the front, and now in Sheffield Hospital. Son of Mr. and Mrs Booy, late of Upper Bath-street, Cheltenham.



LCE.-CORPL. W. J. BLISS,
Gloucestershire Regt., killed in action on Sept. 4th, 1916, aged 26 years. He was previously wounded at Loos on Sept. 25, 1915. Son of Mr. E. Bliss, St. Paul's, Cheltenham.



PTE. JAS. WYMAN,
Gloucestershire Regt., wounded in action Sept. 3rd, 1916, in right arm and chest. Son of Mrs. Wyman, Gotherington, near Cheltenham.

Gloucestershire Regt., missing since going into action on July 23rd, 1916. His fiancée, Miss Williams, York Cottage, Hewlett-road, Cheltenham, would be grateful for any information of him.

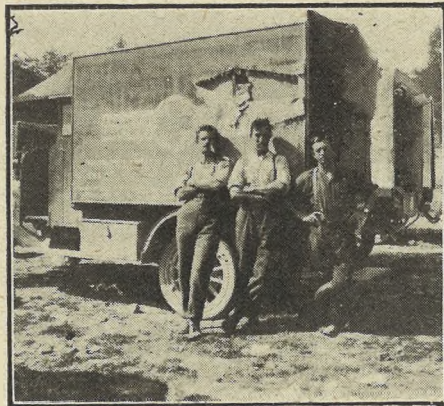

London Regiment, killed in action 8th September, 1916. Husband of Mrs. Wheeler, 37 Fairview-street, and youngest son of Mrs. G. Wheeler, 12 Albert-place, Pittville. He was for twelve years with Messrs. Jessop and Son, solicitors, Cheltenham.



CORPL. JOHN SCREEN,
(Late sergeant Gloucestershire Regt.), died suddenly on Sept. 25th, 1916, whilst serving with the Royal Defence Corps at Abbeywood. Husband of Mrs. Screen, 6 Bloomsbury-street, Cheltenham.



QR.-MASTER-SGT. FRANCIS HENRY SCREEN,
Gloucestershire Regt., died from heat stroke whilst serving with the Indian Expeditionary Force in Mesopotamia, July 28th, 1916, aged 29 years. Husband of Mrs. Lily Screen, of Berkeley, and nephew of Cpl. John Screen.



PTE. W. A. HACKFORD,
Gloucestershire Regt., awarded the Military Medal for gallantry in the same action that Sergt.-Major Tibbles gained the Military Cross. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Hackford, 1 Oakland-avenue, Prestbury-road, Cheltenham.



PTE. E. C. HOPKINS,
Gloucestershire Regt., twice wounded in action, and now in hospital at Epsom. Son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Hopkins, Petone, Cromwell-road, Cheltenham. Apprenticed to Mr. Knight, builder, before war.



PTE. REGINALD JAS. AGG,
Gloucestershire Regt., killed in action on Sept. 25th, 1916, aged 20 years. Youngest and dearly-loved son of Mr. and Mrs. Agg, Post Office, Alderton, Tewkesbury.



PTE. ALBERT EDWARD AGG,
Gloucestershire Regt., gassed in battle of Loos, Sept. 25th, 1915, and again gassed and wounded on Sept. 3rd, 1916, and now in hospital at Stoke-on-Trent. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Agg, Post Office, Alderton, Tewkesbury.



PTE. A. E. TRIGG,
Gloucestershire Regt., wounded in action in September, 1916, aged 21 years. Son of Mr. Alfred Trigg, 4 Grosvenor-cottages, Cheltenham. He was a member of the Cheltenham Old Boys' Rugby team.



PTE. H. GREATOREX SIMS,
Gloucestershire Regt. (Machine Gun Section), died at First Eastern General Hospital, Cambridge, Sept. 26th, 1916, from wounds received in action July 23, aged 22 years. Buried in Charlton Kings Cemetery October 2nd. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Sims, confectioners, Horsefair-street, Charlton Kings.



PTE. H. A. LANE,
Gloucestershire Regt., missing since going into action on July 23rd, with no hope of being found alive. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Lane, of Northampton House, Cheltenham, who would be grateful for any information concerning him. He was promoted to N.C.O. rank the night before the action.



GUNNER E. H. HEWETT,
R.F.A., blown up by shell, breaking left leg and arm in falling and injuring hand. Eldest son of Mr. Harry Hewett, Gainsborough House, Tewkesbury (scenic artist).



PTE. CHAS. PEACHEY,
Gloucestershire Regt., badly wounded on Sept. 10th in action, and died from his wounds on the 15th, after having his leg amputated. Third son of Mr. and Mrs. Peachey, of Fox Farm Cottages, Upper Swell, Stow-on-the-Wold.

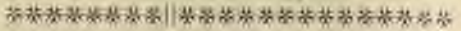

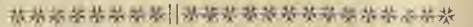

ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



LIEUT. CYRIL W. WINTERBOTHAM, Gloucestershire Regt. (T.F.), killed in action on Aug. 27th, aged 29 years, while attacking a German trench. He was the youngest son of the late Alderman J. B. Winterbotham and Mrs. Winterbotham, of Cranley Lodge, Cheltenham, and was the Liberal candidate for the Cirencester Division.



CORPL. GEO. F. HAWLING, Gloucestershire R.F.A., wounded in back in action on Sept. 4th, and also suffering from deafness. Only son of Mrs. Hawling, 19 Royal-parade, Cheltenham. He has been at the front since March, 1915. Formerly a draughtsman at Messrs. H. H. Martyn and Co., Ltd.



PTE. W. TURFREY, Gloucestershire Regt., wounded in action on Sept. 9th, 1916, and now in hospital. He had previously been sent home from the Dardanelles with frost bite in Nov., 1915. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. S. Turfrey, Stowell Park, Chedworth, and husband of Mrs. Turfrey, Mill End, Northleach.



CORPL. R. C. NORRIS, Gloucestershire Regt., killed in action on Oct. 4th in a distant scene of warfare, aged 25 years. Younger son of Mr. and Mrs. Norris, Holiday Cottage, Gotherington, and late of Cheltenham. He was an employee of Buckle's, Ltd., Bath-road, Cheltenham.



PTE. F. WILLIAMS, Gloucestershire Regt., missing since going into action on Sept. 3rd, and presumed by his officers to be killed. Son of Mrs. J. Williams, Lower Swell, near Stow-on-the-Wold, Glos., who would be grateful for information of him.



PTE. JACK RICHARDSON, Welsh Regt., killed in action on July 12th, 1916. His home was at 23 Longsmith-street, Gloucester.



L.-CORPL. P. J. THOMAS, Killed in action on Oct. 5th, aged 19 years. Third son of Mr. and Mrs. John Thomas, 2 Napier-cottages, Regent-street, Cheltenham.



L.-CORPL. C. NEWMAN, Gloucestershire Regt., wounded in action on Sept. 8th, and now in War Hospital, Bradford. Second son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Newman, Post Office, Elkstone, near Cheltenham.



PTE. J. T. PHILPOT, Gloucestershire Regt., died of wounds received in action on Oct. 5th, aged 25 years. Only son of Mrs. Philpot, Bushley Green, near Tewkesbury. He was trained in Cheltenham and killed in Eastern Europe.



CORPL. FRANK JONES, Grenadier Guards (Gun Section), killed in action on Sept. 14th. Youngest brother of Sapper W. F. Jones, 113 Co. R.E., of 15 Malvern-street, Cheltenham. He leaves a widow and one child at King's-road, Chelsea, London.



CORPL. E. GRIST, R. Munster Fusiliers, wounded on three separate occasions, first at Dardanelles, second in France, and again on July 4. Son of Mrs. Ames, 2 Victoria-parade, Gloucester-road, Cheltenham. Formerly employed at the "Looker-On."



PIONEER S. T. WARING, R.E., invalidated from Salonika with malarial fever and dysentery, and now in St. Andrew's Hospital, Malta, aged 19 years. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Waring, 12 Hamilton-place, St. Paul's, Cheltenham.

CORPL. A. G. BRIDGES, Gloucestershire Regt., killed in action Sept. 30th, 1916, aged 20 years. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Bridges, Gotherington Station, formerly of Ascott-under-Wychwood. He was an employe at Cavendish House, and joined at outbreak of war. He was previously wounded at second battle of Ypres.



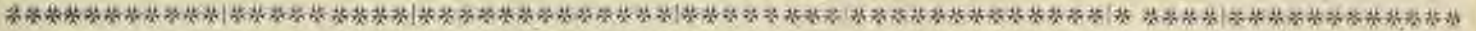
PTE. WILLIAM KNIGHT, Gloucestershire Regiment, died from dysentery Dec. 7th, 1915, at Mudros, Lemnos. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Knight, Gotherington. He worked at Cavendish House with Corpl. A. G. Bridges, a great friend of his, before the war.



PTE. R. W. HARRIS, Gloucestershire Regt., died of wounds on Oct. 13th received in action. Aged 22 years. Eldest son of Mr. Edward Harris, Willersey, Broadway, for many years head gardener to Madame de Navarro, of Broadway. He had been wounded twice before. He enlisted Sept. 30th, 1914.



PTE. R. H. BLACKABY, East Kent Regt. (The Buffs), wounded in action Sept. 15th, from which he died on Sept. 18th, aged 25 years. Son of Rev. and Mrs. F. E. Blackaby, of The Manse, Eastcombe, Glos., who lived for seventeen years at Stow-on-the-Wold, leaving in 1898. He was first in the Royal West Kents.

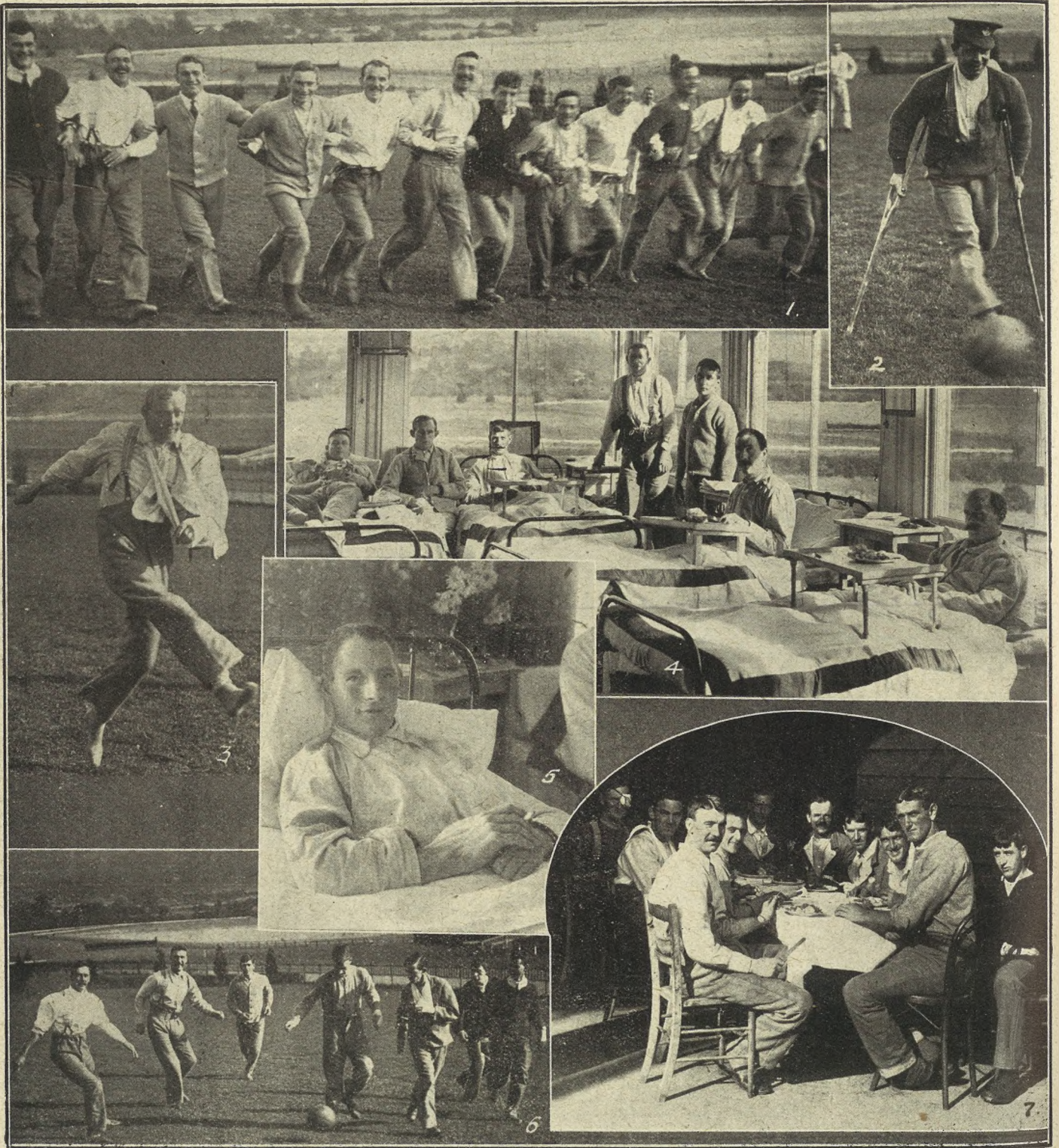
