

NEW PENSIONS SCHEME.

GRAN'TS TO COST YEAR. £50,600 000

When Mr G. N. Barass, the Pensions Minister, fully unfolds his new scheme in a few weeks' time it will be found that it will probably cost the country no. less than £50,000,000 a year. If this annual figure were capitalised or a 5 per cent. basis it would represent a sum of £1,000 000,000. Widespread interest has been aroused by Mr. Barnes's forecast of his scheme. The Minister's pledge to give a minimum of £1 a week to soldiers' and sailors' widows who are unable to do any sort of wage-earning work, and to pay definite sums of money to disfigured or cr-ppled men irrespective of their ability to return to active civilian life, are the points which give the greatest sais faction to the Army and Navy. In the case of women with families, it may be recessary in a large number of instances to grant considerably more than £1 a week. The position of the family before the war may warrant the payment of £2 or £3 a week










