# ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



**STROUD V.C. HERO.**  
Capt. Paul Bennett, of the Worcester Regt., son of Mr. Charles Bennett, of Fromehurst, Frome Park-road, Stroud, who has been awarded the V.C. for magnificent bravery. He was already a Military Cross man, and prior to enlisting he was a clerk in the Bank of England. Aged 23 years.



**CAPT. JOHN W. W. NASON,**  
R.F.C., killed in action recently. He had only been in the Flying Corps since Sept., 1916. He was the well-known Gloucestershire and Sussex county cricketer, who played so well for the former county in 1913 and 1914.



**SECOND OFFICER HOWARD DUTSON BOULTON,**  
Who was killed by the torpedoing of his ship and buried at Alderney the week preceding Christmas. He was the younger son of Mr. Lockwood D. Boulton, Selby Lodge, Cambray, Cheltenham. His mother was so shocked by the news that she sank and died within a week.



**SQUADRON-COMMANDER CHAS. E. H. RATHBORNE,**  
R.N.A.S., promoted to be Wing Commander in New Year Honours for services to his country. His home is at Camden Lodge, Pittville, Cheltenham.



**PTE. W. F. S. RADBURN,**  
Gloucester Regiment, invalided home from trenches on Dec. 2nd, and now in hospital at Preston, Lancs. His home is at Knowsley House, Cheltenham.



**GUNNER A. CURTIS,**  
R.G.A., now in action somewhere in France. He is a native of Cirencester, Glos.



**GUNNER W. T. POCKETT,**  
R.G.A. now in action somewhere in France. His home is at Crickley Hill, Wilcombe, Glos.



**PTE. HUBERT GODDARD,**  
Gloucester Regiment, wounded at Gallipoli, Aug. 12th, 1915. Now killed in action, Dec. 15th, 1916. Third son of the late Mr. Jas. Goddard, of Llanthony, Gloucester.



**PTE. JOSEPH MANSELL,**  
Grenadier Guards, accidentally killed at the front by being knocked down by a railway engine on Dec. 7th. Youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Mansell, of Kilkenny, near Andoversford, to whom he was much attached. He worked before the war as foreman in engineering department of G.P.O.



**PTE. F. H. UNDERWOOD,**  
Gloucester Regiment, first reported missing, now reported wounded and lying in General Hospital, Salonika. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Underwood, Pamington, Ashchurch, Tewkesbury.



**PTE. EDWARD CHEAPE BIR'WHISTLE GRIFFITHS**  
("TEDDY")  
Worcester Regiment, died of wounds received in action in the Far East. Son of the late H. B. Griffiths, Marle Hill, Cheltenham, and of Mrs. Goodman, 101 Wilton-road, Sparkbrook, Birmingham, and nephew of the late Geo. Summers Griffiths, barrister-at-law.



**BUGLER H. W. MITCHELL,**  
Gloucester Regiment, received shrapnel wound in right thigh in action, Dec. 2nd, and now in Chester Hospital. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Mitchell, The Villa, Coberley, and late of Charlton Kings. He is eldest grandson of late Mr. Geo. Mitchell, Ryeworth Farm.

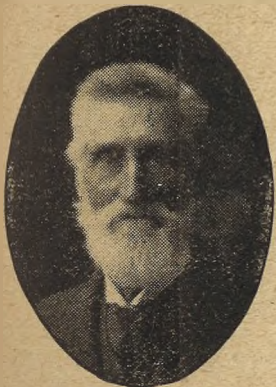




**GLOUCESTER OFFICERS LEAVING CHELTENHAM FOR THE FRONT.**

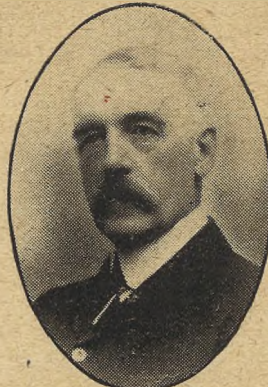

MR. WILLIAM PRESTON, Of Cullendale, King's-road, Cheltenham, who died on Tuesday, January 2nd, 1917, aged 69 years. He was for many years head-master of Highbury School and secretary to Cheltenham Education Committee from its formation in 1903 until his death. He was in his younger days a useful cricketer, and a captain and secretary of the Cheltenham club for several seasons. He leaves a widow and three children.



MR. GEORGE NUGENT McCARTHY, Proprietor of the Plough Hotel, Cheltenham, who died very suddenly on Dec. 20th, aged 40 years. He was a son of the late Jonadab McCarthy, and brother of Miss Lillah McCarthy (Mrs. Granville Barker), the famous London actress.



MRS. LOCKWOOD D. BOULTON, Of Selby Lodge, Cambray, Cheltenham, who died on Friday, Dec. 29th, aged 58 years. She received such a shock the previous Saturday on opening a telegram saying her younger son had been killed on his ship by a submarine that she took to her bed and gradually sank, practically of a broken heart.



MR. G. TOWNSEND, Of 2 Alexandra-street, Tivoli, Cheltenham, who died on Sunday, Dec. 31st, aged 33 years. He had seen service with the Gloucesters in India and South Africa, and afterwards joined the Gloucestershire Constabulary, first at Tewkesbury, then at Cheltenham, serving nine years. He was invalided out of the force eighteen months ago with creeping paralysis, which eventually carried him off.

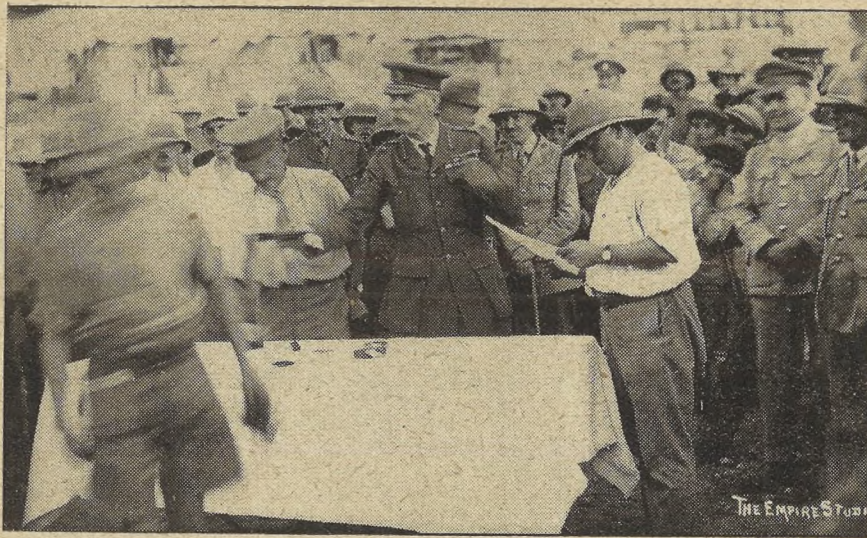

**CAPT. ARTHUR VINCENT HOLMAN**, Herefordshire Regt., who died in Cheltenham from pneumonia on Tuesday, Jan. 9, while on sick leave after going through the Dardanelles campaign and serving some time in Egypt. Aged 40 years. He was the only son of the late Mr. Geo. C. Holman and Mrs. Holman, and married Miss Elsie Wilkins, of Melfort, Cheltenham.



**PTE. PERCY GOSLING**, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action on Dec. 24th, a shell exploding close to him while at his post, killing also two others. Aged 20 years. He was the eldest son of Police-Constable and Mrs. Gosling, 17 Ormond-terrace, Cheltenham, and was engaged with Mr. Sutton Gardner, dentist, before the war.

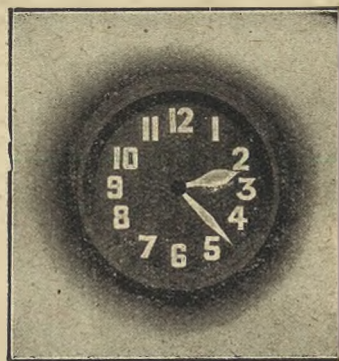


**P.C. Robert Howe,**

**POST FOR SIR SAM FAY.**

**CONTROL OF MILITARY TRAINS.**  
 It is announced that Sir Sam Fay, general manager of the Great Central Railway, has been appointed to the control of the military and munition train movements in this country, under the Department of Military Railways, of which Sir Eric Geddes is in charge, with headquarters in France.

Commencing at the bottom of the ladder as a junior clerk in the traffic department of the London and South-Western Railway at the age of 16, Sir Sam Fay has had a distinguished career as a railway administrator. Rising through the positions of second clerk, chief clerk, superintendent, and assistant storekeeper, he left the service of the company in 1892 on appointment as general manager of the Midland and South-Western Junction Railway. After seven years he returned to Waterloo, as superintendent of the line. In March, 1902, Sir Sam was chosen to succeed the late Sir Wm. Poulitt as general manager of the Great Central Railway. He is a member of the Railway Executive Committee and of the Ports and Transit Executive Committee, and a lieutenant colonel of the Engineer and Railway Staff Corps. Sir Sam Fay is 61 years of age, and received the honour of knight hood when the Immingham Dock was opened in 1912.

The death has occurred in a Southampton hospital of Joseph Beckman, a Belgian soldier, who was wounded in the retreat from Antwerp, and survived his injuries more than two years. Recently he was decorated with the Leopold the Second Cross and the Croix de Guerre. He will be buried with military honours in Southampton Cemetery.

**DEATH OF BUFFALO BILL.**

SCOUT, HUNTER, AND SHOWMAN.

Col. W. F. Cody ("Buffalo Bill") died at Denver on Wednesday. He was born in Scott County, Iowa, in 1846. When quite a lad he migrated with his father to the West, where his life of adventure began, and in Kansas his first contact with the lawlessness of the times was experienced. His father had spoken against slavery to a mob who had no sympathy with the negro. A desperado drew a knife and stabbed the elder Cody. As the father fell young Cody turned to the assailant, saying "You have killed my father. When I'm a man I'll kill you." Though the elder Cody recovered, his health was damaged, and he died from the effects of the wound in 1857. The support of the family devolved upon the son. He joined a "bull-train" of overland carriers, and while engaged in that he had his first encounter with Indians, and killed his first Indian. For this exploit he was known as the "Boy Indian Slayer."

It was about this time that he conceived the idea of one day becoming a showman. During the gold fever in 1860 he made for the fields, but on his way took service as a pony express rider, an occupation that had its perils from Indians and thieves. During one of his rides he took prisoner a thief, who attempted to steal a mailbag. Quitting this means of livelihood, he acted as scout to a trapping expedition, and killed his first bear. In chasing some elk he broke his leg, and had to remain alone for a month while his friend sought assistance a hundred miles away. In 1863 he joined the United States Army. By this time he was known as a great scout. He was employed on missions within the Confederate lines, and succeeded in obtaining valuable information. For these services he obtained mention from the superiors. Later he was made Chief Scout of the Fifth Cavalry by General Sheridan.

In 1867 he made a contract for supplying the Kansas Pacific Railway with meat for its employees while the line was being extended through the wilderness, and in 18 months killed 4,820 buffaloes—whence his sobriquet. In 1868-72 he served as a Government scout against the Sioux and Cheyenne Indians, and in the latter year became a member of the Nebraska House of Representatives. During the Sioux Cheyenne war of 1876 he served in the 5th United States Cavalry, and at the battle of Indian Creek killed the Cheyenne chief Yellow Hand in single combat. He again served against the Sioux in the Nebraska National Guard in 1890-1891.

He will be best remembered as the organizer of the "Wild West Show," which visited Europe for the first time in 1887, and came to England again in 1902. He visited Cheltenham in the summer of 1903.

**NEW PENSIONS SCHEME.**

GRANTS TO COST £50,000,000 A YEAR.

When Mr. G. N. Barnes, the Pensions Minister, fully unfolds his new scheme in a few weeks' time it will be found that it will probably cost the country no less than £50,000,000 a year. If this annual figure were capitalised on a 5 per cent. basis it would represent a sum of £1,000,000,000.

Widespread interest has been aroused by Mr. Barnes's forecast of his scheme. The Minister's pledge to give a minimum of £1 a week to soldiers' and sailors' widows who are unable to do any sort of wage-earning work, and to pay definite sums of money to disabled or crippled men irrespective of their ability to return to active civilian life, are the points which give the greatest satisfaction to the Army and Navy.

In the case of women with families, it may be necessary in a large number of instances to grant considerably more than £1 a week. The position of the family before the war may warrant the payment of £2 or £3 a week.

Yeomanry, wounded in action in recent fighting on the Turkish frontier. He has seen previous service, and received temporary promotion to field rank last February. He has been in the Yeomanry for a number of years.



**MAJOR H. F. CLIFFORD,**  
Yeomanry, who was killed in action in recent fighting on Turkish frontier. Aged 45 years. His home was at Frampton, near Gloucester. He served throughout the S. African War, and had been in the Yeomanry ever since.



**LIEUT. LORD APSLEY,**  
Yeomanry, wounded in action on the Turkish frontier. He is the eldest son and heir of Earl Bathurst, of Cirencester House, and only came of age last August, when the townspeople cabled him their congratulations.



**SEC.-LT. A. H. SYMONDS,**  
Gloucester Regiment, injured in left knee by shell, now in hospital at Oxford. Son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Symonds, 5 Langton Grove-road, Charlton Kings.



**SERGT. A. MATTHEWS,**  
R.E., who was mentioned in Sir Douglas Haig's despatches on Jan. 3rd. Previous to enlisting in the company formed by Major (now Col.) Peake, he was second in command of Cheltenham Fire Brigade. He had been a Volunteer (R.E.) for over 34 years before joining the regular army.

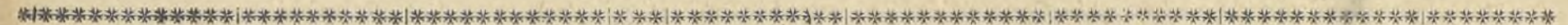
