# ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



PTE. A. L. WHITE, Gloucester Regiment, who was killed in action on Feb. 17th instantaneously by a shell, aged 19 years. He is a son of Mrs. M. J. White, of 53 St. James'-street, Cheltenham, and was the first telegraph messenger from Cheltenham P.O. to join up, the date being Sept. 7th, 1914.



PTE. F. C. WRIGHT, Gloucester Regiment, invalided to England with trench feet, and now in hospital in S. Wales. Only son of Mr. and Mrs. Wright, Brimpsfield, near Gloucester. He was previously employed by Mr. Peel, Coates, near Cirencester.



PTE. W. BARNFIELD, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action in Eastern campaign, Feb. 10th, aged 24 years. He was with his regiment in the Dardanelles in 1915, and was invalided with dysentery. Youngest son of Mrs. H. Barnfield, Brotheridge, Cranham.



L.-CORPL. R. J. COBB, Gloucester Regiment, invalided from front with trench fever on Dec. 16, 1916, and now in Stubbins Vale Hospital, Ramsbottom, Lancs. Youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Cobb, 60 Adelaide-street, and husband of Mrs. R. J. Cobb, 58 Adelaide-street, Gloucester.



PTE. A. ROBERTS, Monmouthshire Regt., twice wounded in action, aged 23 years. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Roberts, The Purples, Coalway, Coleford, and nephew of Mrs. J. W. Tarren, 7 Clarence-street, Cheltenham.



SAPPER G. WHALE, R.E., killed in action on Jan. 15th, aged 19 years. Brother of Pte. F. J. Whale, and son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Bowles, of Clattergrove, Painswick.



PTE. REG. A. WHEELER, Gloucester Regiment, died of wounds Dec. 20 in Boulogne Hospital, aged 27 years. Youngest and dearly-loved son of Mrs. Wheeler, Trevine, Old Bath-road, Cheltenham.



PTE. C. H. W. PEARCE, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action on Feb. 10th. He was the son of Mr. J. W. Pearce, 8 St. Paul's-parade, Cheltenham, and worked with his father as a decorator until he enlisted in August, 1914.



SIGNALLER W. J. VARNEY, Duke of Wellington's Regt. (West Riding), who has been awarded the Military Medal for bravery under shell fire. He is the only son of Mrs. J. Smith, Woodbridge, Withington, Glos.



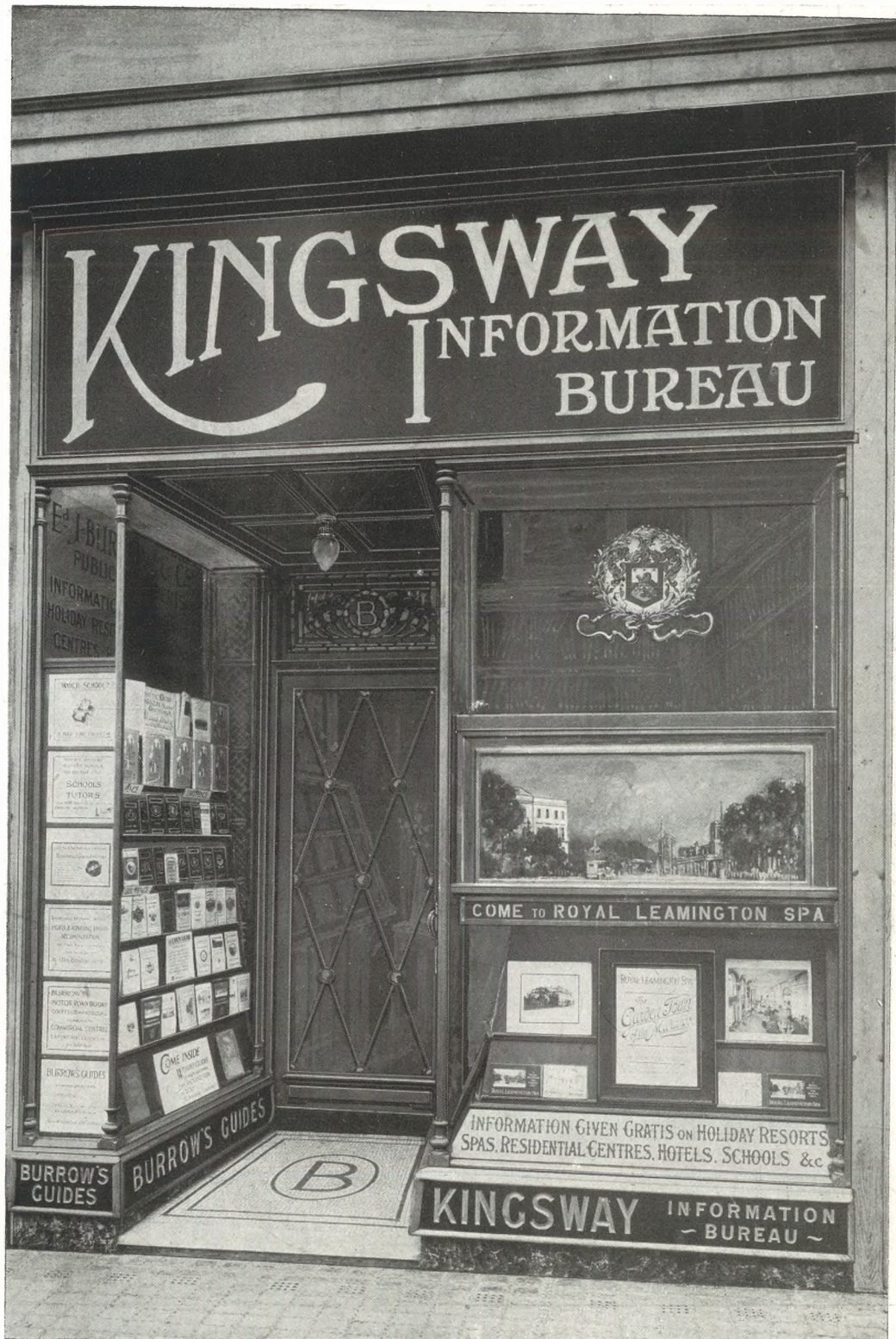

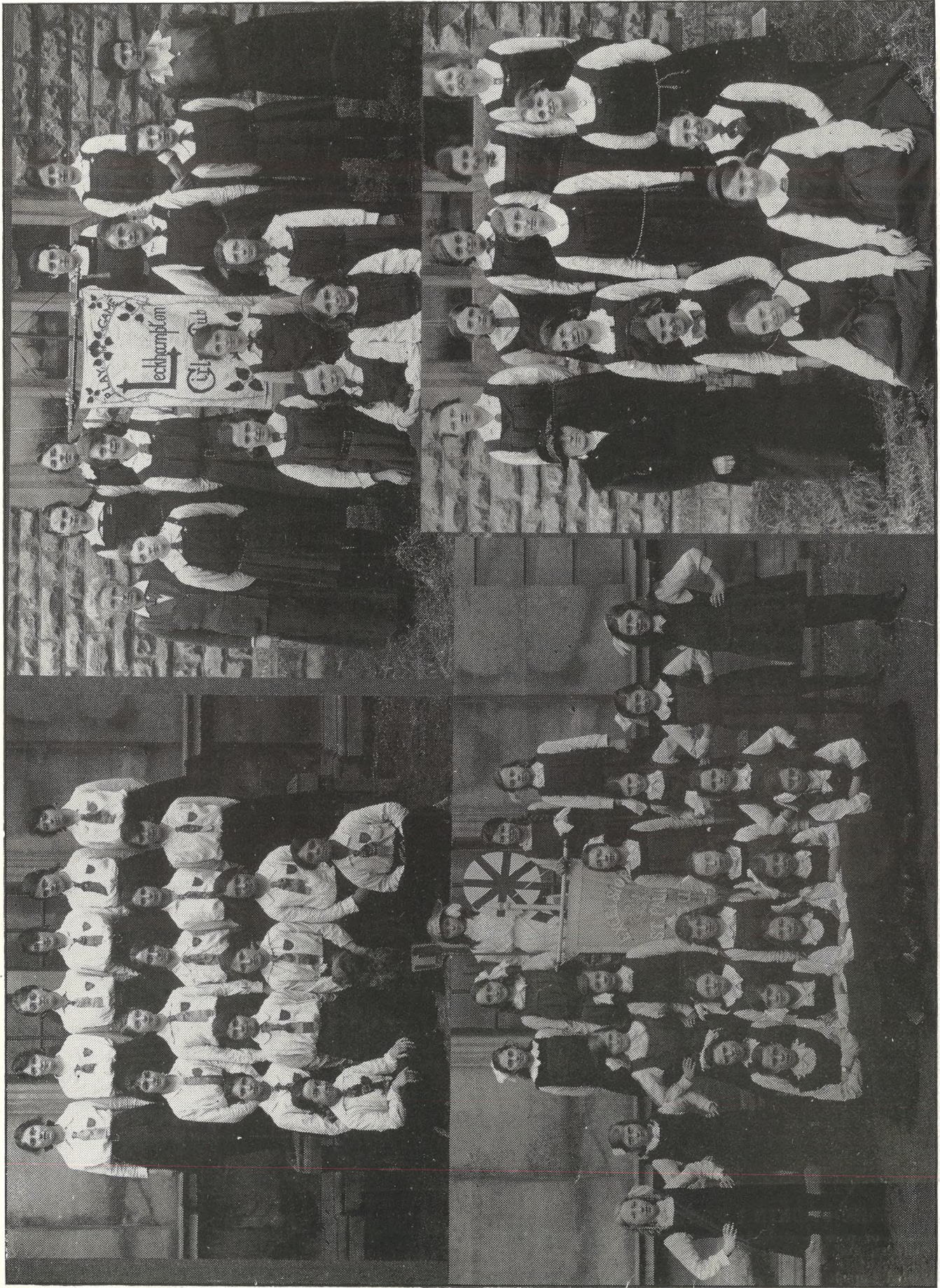

Mrs. Shaw has interested herself in the prisoners of war from the first, and now the numbers have so increased, she was bound to have recourse to funds provided by the great success of Prisoners' Day in Cheltenham, which are now being used. 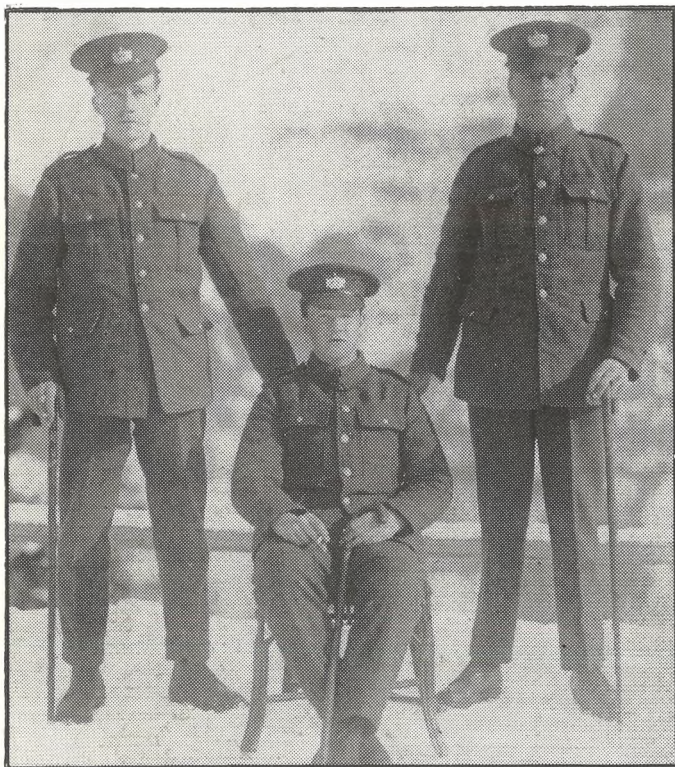

Three badly wounded soldier prisoners exchanged by Germany and interned at Murren, Switzerland. They are Pte. V. E. W. Cooke, Gloucester Regiment, wounded in right knee, captured on the Somme, July 21, 1916; Pte. F. Price, Gloucester Regt., wounded five times, losing an eye, and captured with Pte. Cooke on same date; and Pte. C. Smith, wounded in head, and captured at Loos in 1915. The latter's home is at Cirencester. They are now splendidly treated, and are fast recovering.

SGT-MAJOR C. WILLIAMS, 3/2nd S.M. Field Ambulance, R.A.M.C., who was presented with the Long Service and Good Conduct Medals on Thursday, March 8th, by O.C. S.M. Res. Field Ambulances in Cheltenham at a public parade. He has seen 23 years 191 days' service with the Regular Army, and was mentioned in despatches Dec. 31st, 1915.



SERGT. HARRY JEYNES, Lincoln Regiment, who was presented by the Mayor of Gloucester with the Military Medal at a meeting of the City Council last week. He is a son of Mrs. E. Jeynes, of Moreton-cottages, Barton-street, Gloucester, and a grandson of a former Mayor of Tewkesbury.



PTE. VERNON HEALING, Wilts. Regiment, wounded in action on July 25, 1916, and still in hospital at Liverpool. He enlisted at outbreak of war, and was an old All Saints' choir boy. Son of the late Mrs. Healing, 20 Sherborne-place, Cheltenham, and brother of Mrs. Smith, 14 Fairfield-walk, Leckhampton.



RIFLEMAN STEPHEN BLACKPOOL, Killed in action Feb. 15th, 1917. Dearly loved husband of Mrs. Blackpool, of 9 Springfield-place, Cheltenham. He was amongst the first draft of troops to go abroad at the outbreak of war in August, 1914, and had been in the thickest of the fighting from Mons onwards to the time of his death.



SAPPER ALFRED HAINES, R.E., slightly wounded in France on July 16th, 1916. He has been in France since October, 1915, and left a wife and ten children at his home, Great Washbourne, near Tewkesbury. He was a plasterer employed by Messrs. Collins and Godfrey, Tewkesbury.



PTE. CHAS. DAVIS, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action Feb. 18th, 1917, in an Eastern campaign, aged 31 years. Second son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Davis, Naunton, and dearly-loved husband of Mrs. Emily F. Davis, Sunny Cottages, Naunton. He leaves one child.



GUNNER J. SKERRY, R.F.A., wounded in action on Feb. 6th, and suffering from burns from explosion. Now in Netley Hospital. Youngest son of Mrs. Skerry, 26 North-place, Cheltenham, and husband of Mrs. Skerry, 19 Arthur-street, Pembroke Dock, South Wales.



CORPL. E. C. PEARCE, Rifle Brigade, 5 Victoria-parade, Moorend-crescent, Leckhampton, severely wounded on Feb. 14. He was head gardener for Mr. Kenworthy, of Smeaton House, Cheltenham. He is now in St. Bartholomew's Hospital, London, making a good recovery from his wound.



PTE. A. E. TAYLOR, R.M.L.I., killed in action by a shell on Feb. 17th, aged 19 years. He was the beloved son of Mr. and Mrs. Taylor, of Brandon, Tewkesbury-road, Cheltenham. He formerly worked at the Cheltenham Original Brewery.



E. W. JOYNER, A.B., H.M.S. Warspite, who went through the Jutland Battle, now somewhere on the North Sea. Son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Joyner, 11 Naunton-crescent, Cheltenham. Has just been promoted.



TPR. FRANK T. GILL, Yeomanry, wounded and captured by Turks at Katia last Easter, and died at Angora in September of dysentery whilst a prisoner of war. Aged 20 years. His home was in Cheltenham.

**RED CROSS NURSE'S MILITARY FUNERAL IN CHELTENHAM.**

THE FUNERAL OF MISS ANNA MADELINE SHAW, ONE OF THE NURSING STAFF AT NEW COURT RED CROSS HOSPITAL, AND DAUGHTER OF THE LATE REV. J. H. SHAW AND MRS. SHAW, OF LYPIATT TERRACE, CHELTENHAM, TOOK PLACE ON WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, MARCH 7, A SERVICE BEING FIRST HELD AT THE PARISH CHURCH. A NUMBER OF THE PATIENTS FOLLOWED, A FIRING PARTY WAS FORMED BY THE A.S.C. IN CHELTENHAM, AND FOUR BUGLERS FROM THE R.A.M.C. ATTENDED TO SOUND THE "LAST POST."

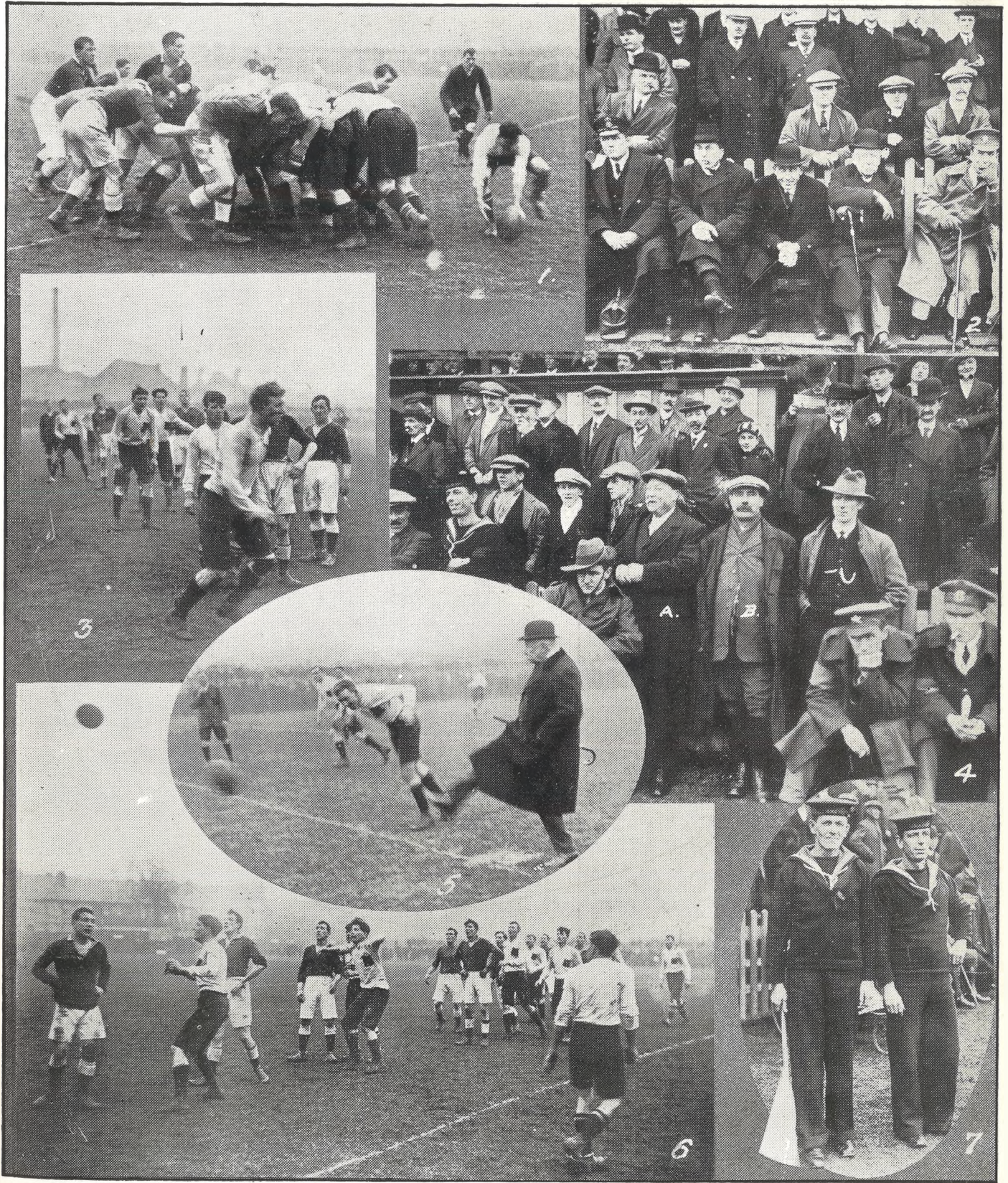
The Australian Parliament has extended its life to October 8 next or six months after the declaration of peace, whichever comes first.

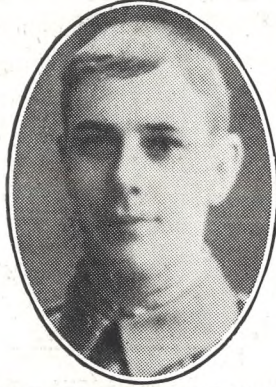
# ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.

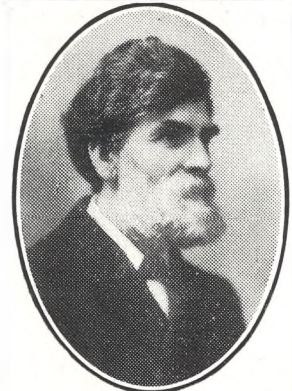

**25 Years Police Court Missioner.**

Mr. W. Mortlock came to Cheltenham from Devonshire on March 28th, 1892, to take up his present work as Police Court Missioner and Probation Officer. During that time much has been accomplished from his labours amongst the poor and downcast. Homes have been brightened, lives have been improved, characters have been redeemed, sorrow has been lessened, and happiness has been increased. Young lads and girls, instead of being made the associates of criminals, have been restored to their friends or placed in homes and shielded from temptations. He also carried on work outside the Police-court for fifteen years—a most successful Mission and Institute in the poorer part of the town (St. Peter's parish), his daughter chiefly working amongst the young, which brought about quite a reformation. He also held short services in the lodging-houses of Grove and Stanhope streets. Mr. Mortlock put forth a special effort for two years amongst the male residents of Grove-street in a mission cottage (St. Mary's parish), which at times was filled by men, who on account of their clothes were not found to attend any place of worship. Mr. Mortlock is the author of several books and poems, copies having been received and kindly acknowledged by H.M. King George, and the late Queen Victoria, King Edward VII., and Lord Roberts. Many copies were sent out to troops in the South African and the present war. Thankful acknowledgments have also been received from the trenches. Forty-six of his Bible Class members are now serving in the Army. To the Magistrates, Magistrates' Clerk, Superintendent of the Police, and Court Officials, Mr. Mortlock tenders his hearty thanks for the great help given to him, for without their hearty co-operation his efforts would be almost useless. Miss Mortlock renders valuable help to her father in dealing with the cases of women and young girls. His son is a clergyman and a Fellow of the Philosophical Society.

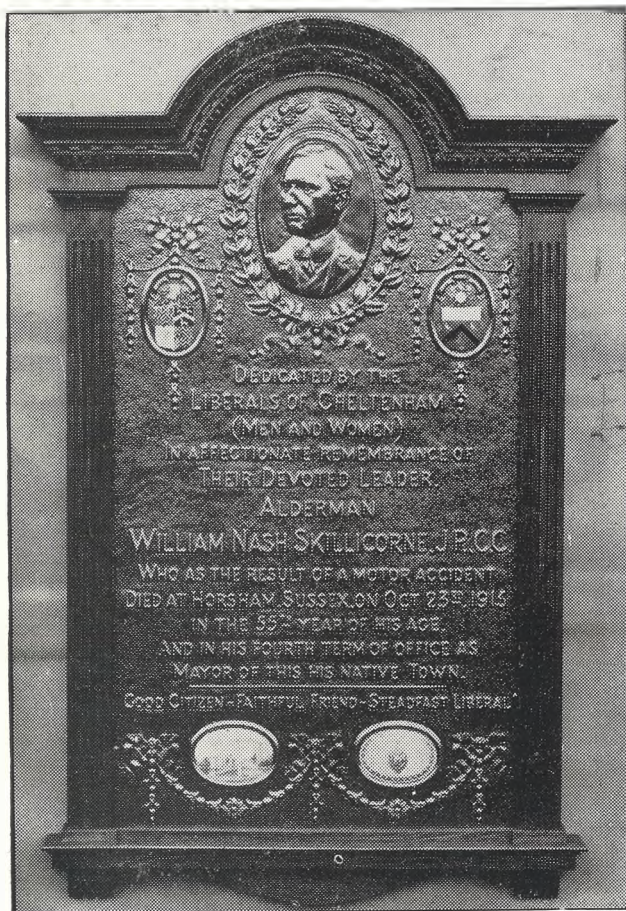

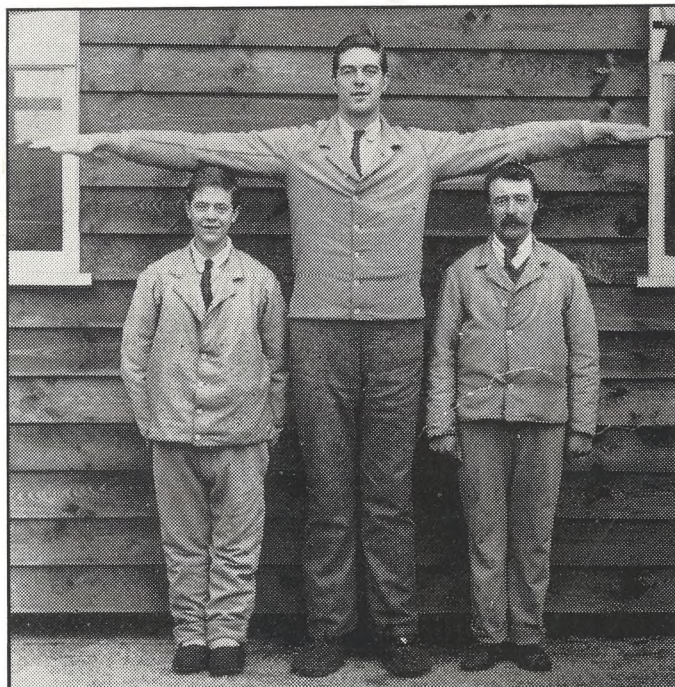

Major-Gen. Sir Francis Howard, K.C.B., C.M.G., of Castle Godwyn, Painswick, entered his 70th year on Monday.

The pair of antique silver spoons given by Sir J. T. Agg-Gardner, M.P., to the sale at Christie's of works of art for the benefit of the British Prisoners of War Fund of the British Red Cross Society and the Order of St. John, realised £21.

Mr. Edward Arthur Smalley Potter, of Castle Priory, Wallingford, has died in London, aged 48 years. He was the eldest son of Mr. Edward Smalley Potter, of Fulwood Park, Cheltenham, and was educated at Eton and at Exeter Collge and at Charsley's Hall, Oxford.

Mr. J. A. R. Marriott, Fellow of Worcester College, and a well-known lecturer for the Oxford University Extension Delegacy who has often visited Cheltenham, has been adopted as Conservative candidate for the vacancy in the representation of the University caused by the elevation of Viscount Valentia to the English Peerage.

The War Cabinet has sanctioned the proposal of the First Commissioner of Works (Sir Alfred Mond) to set up a National War Museum to collect and ultimately exhibit naval and military trophies, books, maps, posters, and other things dealing with the war. Among the committee appointed to carry out the scheme includes Prof. C. W. Oman, of Oxford, formerly of St. Philip's Lodge, Cheltenham.

The death occurred on Sunday at High Grove, Tetbury, of Mr. Arthur Charles Mitchell at the age of 69. He was the youngest son of the late Mr. Francis Henry Mitchell, and was twice married, first to a sister of the late Viscount St. Aldwyn, who died in 1874, and secondly to a sister of Mr. H. J. Elwes, of Colesborne. He was a J.P. for Wiltshire and for Gloucestershire, and at one time was a captain in the 4th Batt. Gloucestershire Regiment. He leaves several sons in the army.

The Earl of Coventry on Monday was re-elected president of the South Worcestershire Conservative and Unionist Association at the annual meeting at Evesham. Lord Deerhurst, Mr. J. Sladden, Capt. E. G. Spencer Churchill, Sir G. Bullough, and Mr. J. Faulkner were elected vice-presidents. Mr. A. F. Alcock was re-elected hon. treasurer and Mr. W. Collinge hon. secretary. A vote of confidence was passed in the Government and in Commander Eyres-Monsell, M.P. for the division.

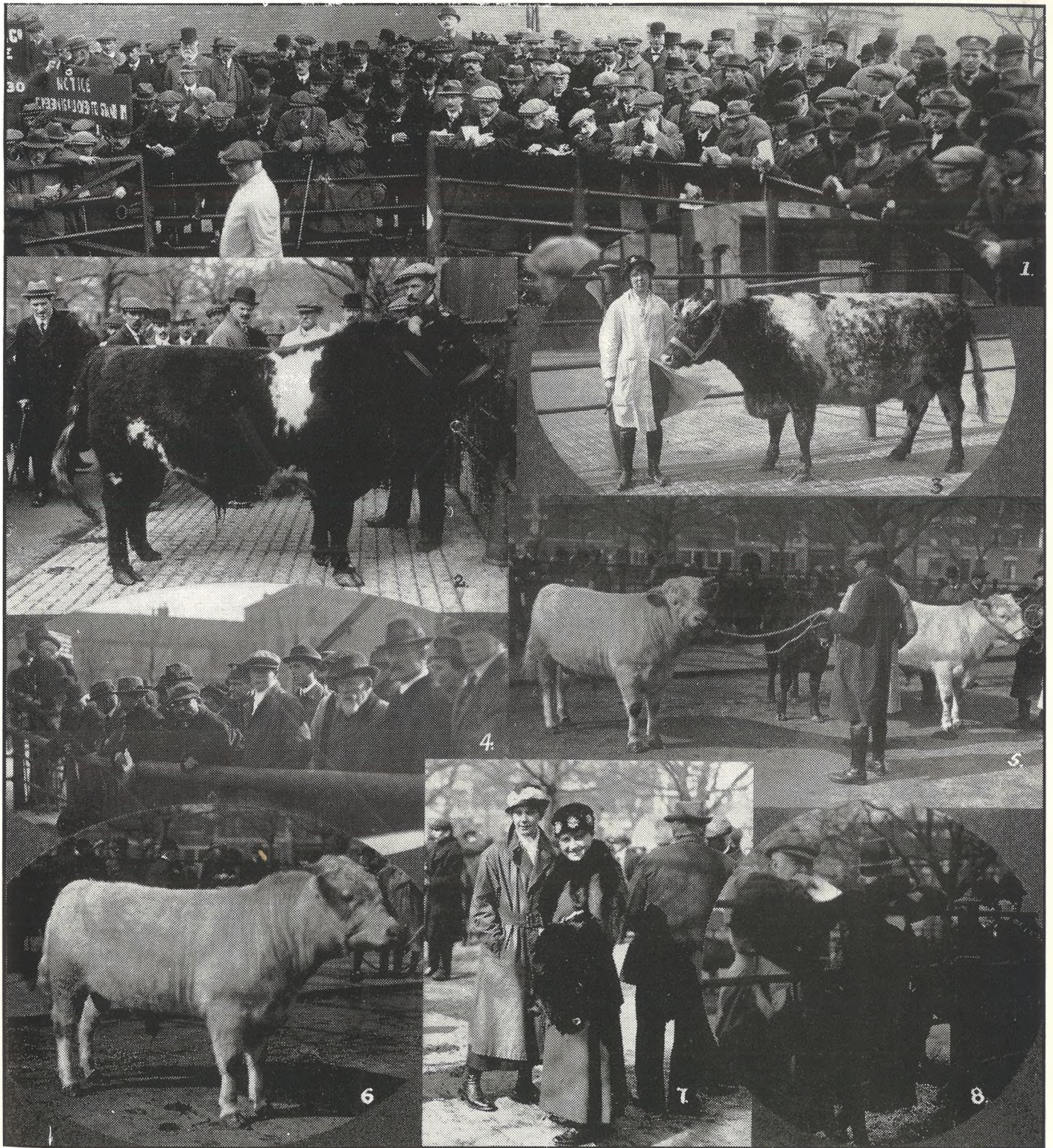

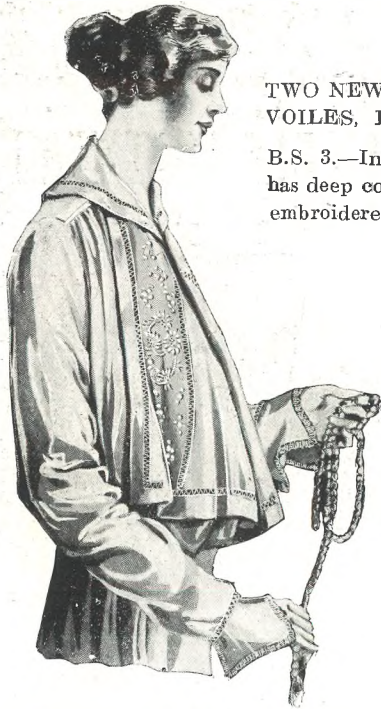

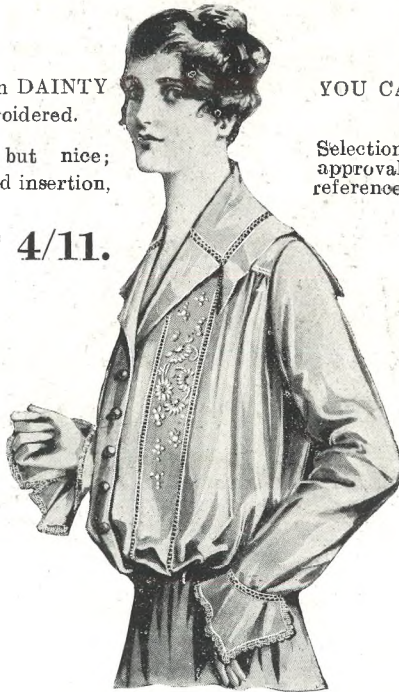
