







Cooke, Gloucester Regiment, wounded in right knee, captured on the Somme, July 21, 1916; Pte. F. Price, Gloucester Regt., wounded five times, losing an eye, and captured with Pte. Cooke on same date; and Pte. C. Smith, wounded in head, and captured at Loos in 1915. The latter's home is at Cirencester. They are now splendidly treated, and are fast recovering.



A former conscientious objector told the Hornsey Tribuna, that after 20 months' Red Cross work in France he had decided to join a fighting unit.

While at mining rescue practice at Pontyrhyl, South Wales, Edward Thorne, a rescue instructor, and John Evans, master haulier, were suffocated.








