1ST CLASS PETTY OFFICER A. DIDCOTE,

PTE. BOB LEESON,
Middlesex Regiment, one of the gallant boys who went through the "Birkenhead" drill on the Tyndareus when that transport was sinking recently. He is a son of Mrs. Leeson, formerly of Normal-terrace, Cheltenham, and brother of Mr. Frank Leeson, of 8 New-street, Cheltenham. He was formerly a waiter at the Queen's Hotel.



CORPL. BERT LEESON,
Warwickshire Regt (Machine Gun Corps), who has received the Military Medal for gallantry in the field. He is a brother of Pte. Bob Leeson, and was an assistant to the Mayor of Cheltenham (Mr. Rees Jones) at his drapery establishment before the war.



PTE. A. WILLIAMS,
Gloucester Regiment, killed in action Feb. 27th, 1917. He was the second son of Mr. Williams, of 39 Bloomsbury-street, Cheltenham, and husband of Mrs. A. Williams, of 25 Rutland-street, whom he leaves with one child. He was a Reservist, and previously worked for Messrs. A. C. Billings and Sons. His brother Fred was killed on June 10, 1915, in France.



PTE. T. JONES,
Middlesex Regt., another of the brave boys who stood at ease in the ranks on the Tyndareus while that transport was sinking after striking a mine off the Cape of Good Hope. He is a son of Mrs. Jones, The Almshouse, Tetbury, Gos.



PTE. A. W. HEYDEN,
Gloucester Regiment, wounded in action and now in British General Hospital, Amara. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Heyden, of Withington, near Andoversford, Gos.



PTE. LIONEL HUBERT FRANK REEVES,
Yeomanry, transferred to Gloucester Regiment, killed in action on March 15th, aged 19 years. Only beloved son of Mr. and Mrs. F. S. Reeves, 5 High-street, Cheltenham.



PTE. MARTIN BLACKWELL,
Gloucester Regiment, killed in action on Feb. 25th, 1917, aged 39 years. Deceased, whose home was at 14 Sheep-street, Cirencester, leaves a widow and eight children, the youngest being only six weeks old.

GLOUCESTER STREET TRAGEDY.

Considerable excitement was caused in the Bristol-road district of Gloucester on Thursday evening, March 29th, when two women who lived in Theresa-street were shot by a neighbour while talking at their gate. One of the women, Mrs. Martha Morgan, of 67 Theresa-street, fell and died in the street; but Mrs. Blake, of 26 Theresa-street, was only slightly wounded. Our illustration shows the scene of the tragedy. The gun was fired out of the lower window of No. 71, as shown at "B"; while the three women (Mrs. Dawe was uninjured) were talking where the three girls are marked xxx at the door of Mrs. Blake's residence (No. 26). Mrs. Morgan lived a few doors away, at No. 67, shown as "A," where her step daughter is standing in the picture. A man named George Williams, of 71 Theresa-street, is charged with the murder.

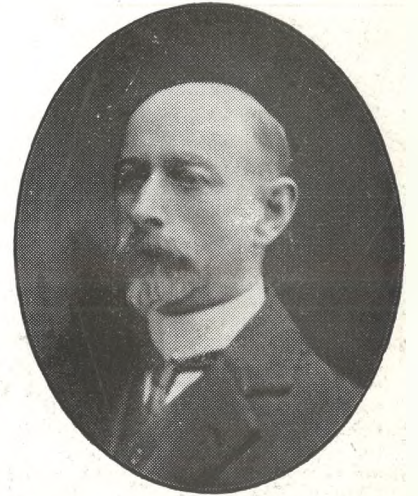
The Two Victims.

Mrs. Martha Morgan,

Of 67 Theresa-street, who was shot, and died immediately, in the street opposite her own home, while chatting with two friends. She was the wife of Mr. Chas. Morgan, blacksmith.

Mrs. Caroline Elizabeth Blake,

Of 26 Theresa-street, who was shot at the same time, but was only slightly injured. They were chatting by Mrs. Blake's gate, which is opposite the house of the accused man, George Williams.



Mr. George H. Spender,

Of 84 Henry-road, Gloucester, who died at his residence on Sunday, April 1st, from pneumonia. He was local representative of the Prudential Assurance Co., with whom he had been for 25 years. He was a strong Conservative, and was a chorister at St. Mary de Crypt Church, and formerly at All Saints' Church, Cheltenham.

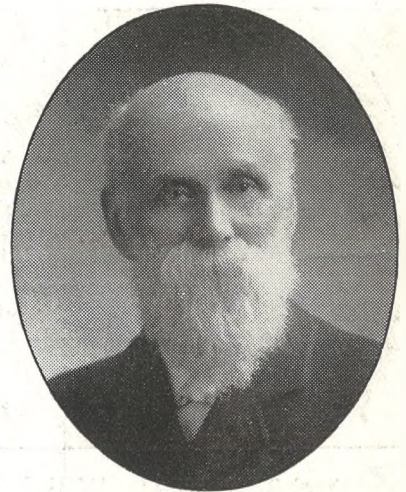

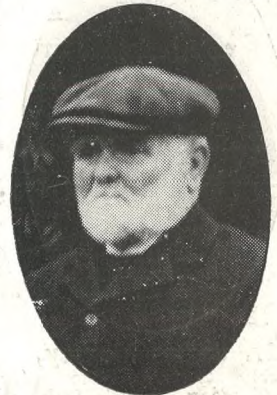

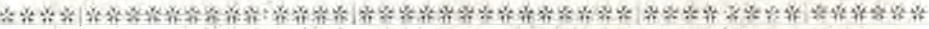
Mr. James Maysey,

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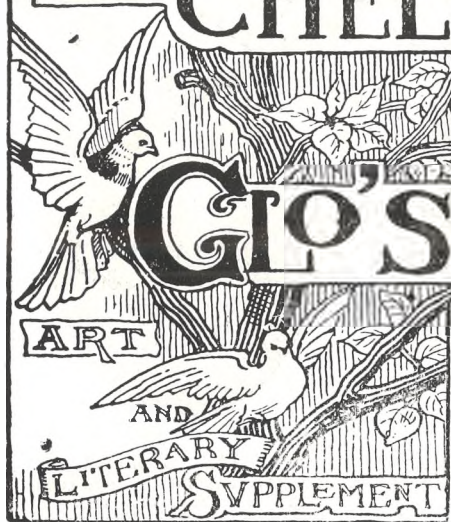

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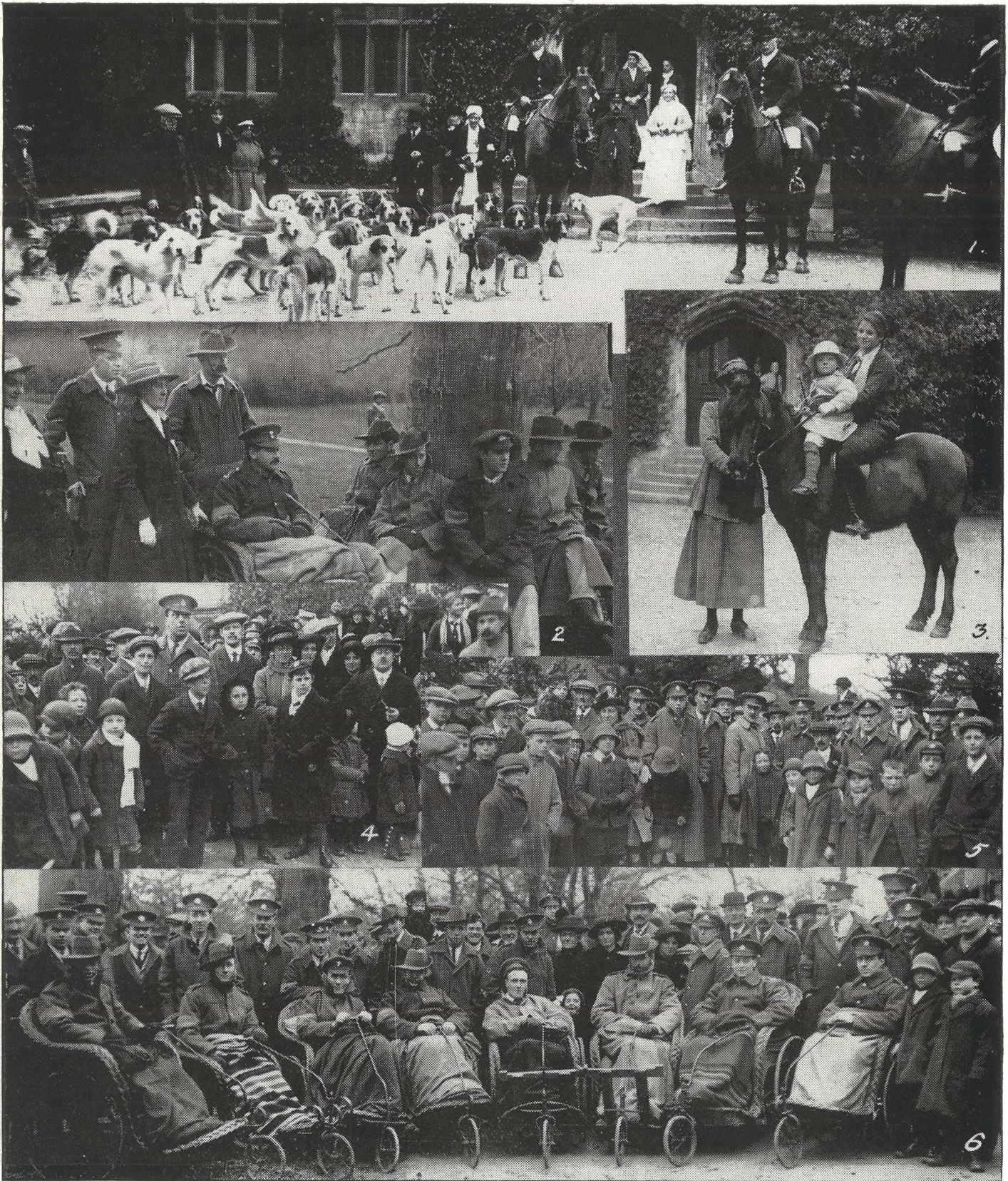

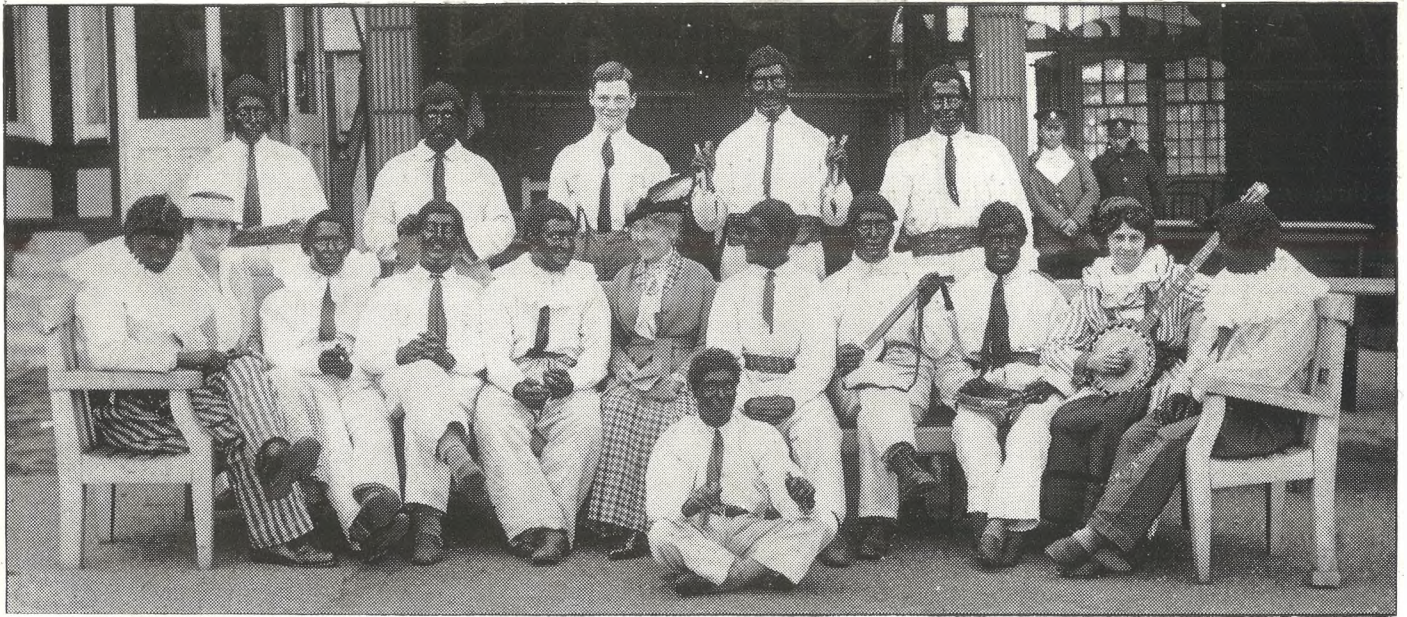

LIEUT. ALBERT GREEN, Welsh Regiment, wounded in action, winner of the Military Cross for bravery, son of Mr. John Green, of Blackwood, Mon., and nephew of Mr. and Mrs. C. Crouch, of High-street, Tewkesbury.

CO-SERJT. MAJOR F. (TIM) FINCH, Gloucester Regiment, wounded in action in arm on April 5th, and now in General Hospital, Le Havre. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Finch, 13 Albert-place, Pittville, Cheltenham. He was sergeant in the local Terriers when called up the first week of war.

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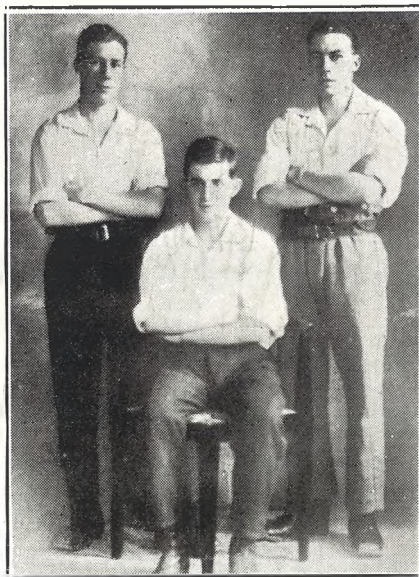
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Three Cheltonians in a South African Hospital.
