ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



SERGT. JACK F. LOVESY, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action on May 1st, his 26th birthday. He was the son of Mr. H. G. Lovesy, Canterbury Villa, Copt Elm-road, Charlton Kings, and before the war was for 8½ years in the employ of Mr. Marfell, of the Cosy Corner, Promenade.



PTE. W. J. BATES, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action on July 17, 1916, aged 26 years. He was first reported missing, now it is confirmed he was killed. Son of Mrs. J. Bates, 2 Millbrook-place, Charlton Kings, Cheltenham.



SIGNALLER A. E. HEARNE, Loyal North Lancashire, mortally wounded about a month ago. Aged 21 years. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Hearne, 48 Bloomfield-road, Gloucester. He was employed at Price, Walker, and Co.'s, Gloucester, at outbreak of war.



PTE. ERNEST H. HARRIS, Middlesex Regt. (R.A.M.C.), believed drowned. The hospital ship *Salta* on which he sailed on Easter Tuesday struck a mine on April 10th, and nothing has been heard of him since. Only son of Mrs. J. H. Harris, and grandson of Mrs. Harrison, Piff's Ebn, near Cheltenham.



PTE. HARRY BROTHERIDGE, Gloucester Regiment, wounded in chest, April 25th, and now in hospital in Salonika. Son of Mr. E. Brotheridge, 58 Worcester-street, Cheltenham. He was formerly employed by the Cheltenham and District Light Railway.



PTE. W. G. HABBITTS, Gloucester Regiment, wounded in face and right arm on April 25th, and now in the Canadian Hospital, Salonika. Fourth son of Mr. and Mrs. G. Habbitts, Condicote, near Stow-on-the-Wold, Glos.



PTE. C. SANDFORD, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action on April 22nd, aged 24 years. Fifth son of Mrs. T. Sandford, Chance-street, Tewkesbury. He joined the Army in October, 1914.



PTE. OLIVER PRICE, Yeomanry, transferred to the Middlesex Regt., wounded in action April 23rd, now in hospital in France. He was called up at the outbreak of war. Son of Sergt.-Major and Mrs. D. Price, Cutwell Farm, Tetbury.



SAPPER ALF MANSFIELD, Royal Engineers, wounded on May 14th, and died on May 17th, whilst road making in France. His home was at 49 Tivoli-street, Cheltenham, and he was a nephew of Mr. Geo. H. Lane, St. Philip's-terrace, Cheltenham.



PTE. WALTER LANCHBURY, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action in an Eastern campaign on April 25th, aged 33 years. Third son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Lanchbury, of Higgate, Elkstone.



PTE. ALEC GRAY, Gloucester Regiment, wounded in France April 5th, and now in hospital in Manchester. His brother Victor was killed in France June 3rd, 1916. Sons of Mrs. Gray, Weston-super-Mare, and late of Lansdown, Stroud.

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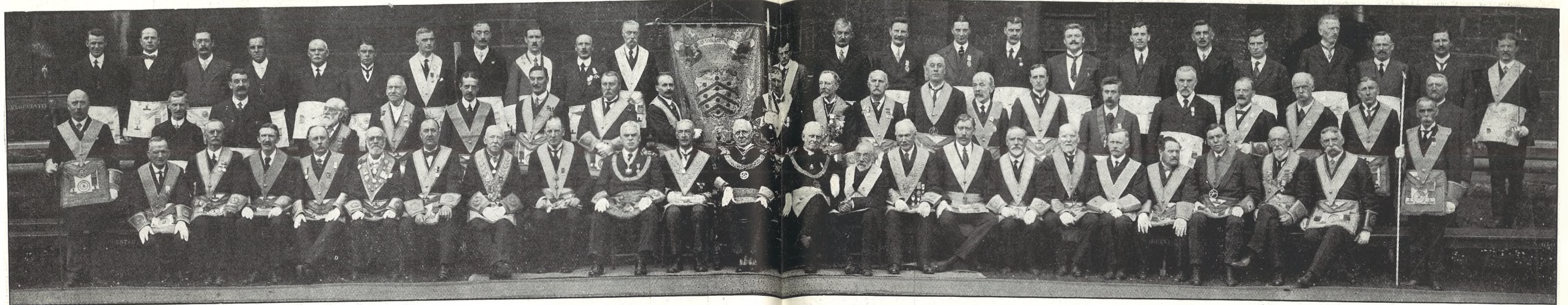

WOUNDED SOLDIERS' GYMKHANA ON WHIT-MONDAY.

A GYMKHANA FOR WOUNDED SOLDIERS IN LOCAL MILITARY HOSPITALS WAS HELD IN MONTPELLIER GARDENS ON MONDAY AFTERNOON, OVER 3,000 PERSONS PAYING FOR ADMISSION AND ABOUT 700 WOUNDED SOLDIERS BEING PRESENT. THE BAND OF THE 1st GLOUCESTERS WAS ENGAGED AND PAID FOR BY COL. ASHBURNER, AND THE WHOLE AFFAIR WAS RUN BY THE TRADERS' ASSOCIATION, HALF OF THE PROFITS GOING TO THE CHELTENHAM HOSPITALS' FUND.

They were picked up by an English destroyer after cruising for eleven hours in an open boat.

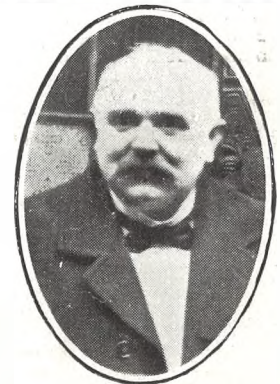

PTE. B. HAYCOX,
Dorset Regt., officially reported wounded and missing since April 15th. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Haycox, 55 Duke-street, Cheltenham. He joined up in August, 1914; was gassed at Hill 60 in May, 1915; wounded on the Somme in 1916; and although only slightly wounded on April 15, was apparently killed on his way back to the dressing station.



PTE. W. A. URSELL,
Gloucester Regiment, missing August 16, 1916, now officially reported killed in action on same date. Son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Ursell, of Elm View House, Swindon-road, Cheltenham. He was formerly employed at Hopwood's, High-street, and joined up in June, 1915. His only brother was killed in Gallipoli.



PTE. L. GARDNER,
Loyal North Lancs., severely wounded abroad. Son of Com.-Sergt.-Major Gardner, now with the R.E.'s in France, and Mrs. Gardner, of 40 St. George's-street, Cheltenham. Aged 18 years. Formerly employed at Saqui and Lawrence, Cheltenham.



L.-SERGT. F. DAVIS,
Gloucester Regiment, severely wounded in arm, and now in a Manchester hospital. This is the third time within twelve months he has been wounded, and he has just received notice that he has been awarded the D.C.M. He is a son of Mrs. Davis, of King's Court, Stroud, and is one of the old Stroud Territorials who was called up the first week of war.



PTE. C. L. SHEPPARD,
Sherwood Foresters, formerly of the Sherwood Rangers Yeomanry, invalidated home from France with poisoned foot, and now in Northumberland War Hospital. His home is at Linslade, Gloucester-road, Cheltenham.



RIFLEMAN H. J. EAST,
Wounded in action in France, April 23, 1917, and now in hospital in Manchester. His home is Ivor Cottage, Swindon-road, Cheltenham.



GUNNER A. J. GARDENER,
R.G.A., wounded in action abroad on Easter Sunday, and now in a Portsmouth hospital. Husband of Mrs. A. J. Gardener, and son of Mr. J. T. Gardener, 18 Promenade, Cheltenham.



PTE. CHARLES GLEED,
Gloucester Regiment, seriously wounded on April 30th, and now in 28th General Hospital, Salonika. He is the second son to be wounded of Mr. and Mrs. John Gleed, Naunton, near Cheltenham.

CHELTENHAM HOSPITALS' DAY.

" ECHO " and " CHRONICLE " SHILLING FUND.

A strong and influential body of Cheltenham residents, with the Mayor at their head, have decided upon holding a great Hospitals' Day in Cheltenham on Thursday, July 5th next, on lines similar to the great event of last summer popularly known as Prisoners' Day.

The local hospitals to be benefitted by the forthcoming Festival will be the General Hospital, who will receive 50 per cent. of the receipts, the Eye, Ear, and Throat Hospital (20 per cent.), the Victoria Nursing Home (9 per cent.), the Children's Hospital (9 per cent.), the Creche (6 per cent.), and the Voluntary Help and Child Welfare Society (6 p.c.).

That each of these institutions has suffered considerably from loss of income owing to

the war, and also had to meet large increases in the cost of working, is apparent to all, and it is with the object of helping to put matters straight that the public of Cheltenham and district are to be appealed to in the special manner described.

The magnificent work carried on by the institutions named is known to all, and that a big sum of money will be raised goes without saying. The promoters of the Hospitals' Day have been good enough to say, however, that if the "Echo" and "Chronicle" would open their columns once more for a fund and also lend their aid in other ways, the success of the venture would be practically assured.

Well, we have never yet appealed to our generous readers in vain, especially when the cause was a good one, as in the present instance, and so we have pleasure in falling in with the suggestion of the committee. Thus the "Echo" on Monday last opened **A SHILLING FUND,**

and the effort is now backed by the "Chronicle." FIVE NEW PEERS.
TWENTY-FIVE BARONETS.**

HONOUR FOR MR. VASSAR SMITH.
Sunday was the King's birthday, and the list of Honours granted by the King on the occasion of its celebration was issued in the evening.
Viscount French has been appointed a Knight of St. Patrick.
The dignity of a Viscount of the United Kingdom has been conferred on Lord Devonport, until lately Food Controller, on Lord Farquhar, and Lord Astor; and Baronies of the United Kingdom have been awarded to Colonel Lockwood, M.P., Colonel Chalener, M.P., Sir Frederick Smith, Major-General Sir Ivor Herbert, M.P., and Sir William Lever.
Eight additions have been made to the

Privy Council, the new members being Mr. H. W. Forster, M.P., Captain Pretymann, M.P., Lord Claud Hamilton, M.P., Mr. Evelyn Cecil, M.P., Mr. H. Pike Pease, M.P., Mr. J. H. Thomas, M.P., the Hon. Neil Primrose, M.P., and Mr. Thomas Ashton; while the roll of the Irish Privy Council has been supplemented by the names of the Earl of Arran and Sir William Goulding.
Twenty-five baronetcies have been conferred, including Mr. A. Steel-Maitland, M.P., Mr. J. F. Remnant, M.P., Sir William Dunn, Lord Mayor of London, Sir J. G. Nairne, Chief Cashier of the Bank of England, and Col. Alan Sykes, M.P. Among the new Knights are Mr. W. H. Thornycroft, sculptor, Mr. A. S. Cope, R.A., Professor Ashley, Mr. T. Gregory Foster, Provost of University College, London, and Mr. A. F. Robbins and Mr. J. Foster Fraser, the well-known journalists. Mr. D. J. Shackleton becomes a Knight Commander of the Bath.

The Earl of Rosebery receives the Chain of the Royal Victorian Order. Sir Maurice Bonham-Carter, formerly private secretary to Mr. Asquith, who received a K.C.B. on Mr. Asquith's retirement, now receives the K.C.V.O. Sir W. R. Birdwood and Sir Eric Geddes each get a K.C.B. Sir Eyre Crowe, of the Foreign Office, who was already K.C.M.G., also receives a K.C.B.

LOCAL NAMES IN THE LIST.

Chief in point of local interest is the bestowal of a baronetcy upon Mr. Richard Vassar Vassar-Smith, J.P., of Charlton Park, Cheltenham, chairman of Lloyds Bank, Ltd., and closely connected with many business concerns in this county, whilst socially he is most popular and respected.

Another new baronet is Sir Richard Mathias, erstwhile Radical M.P. for Cheltenham, who was unseated on petition six years ago. He is a member of the shipowning firm of J. Mathias and Co., of Cardiff and Aberystwyth, the fleet of vessels belonging to the syndicate being named after British public schools.

Capt. Beville Stanier, M.P., another new baronet, married a sister of Mr. J. S. Gibbons, J.P., of Boddington Manor, and was educated at the R.A.C., Cirencester. He was elected for North Shropshire at a bye-election in 1908. He has been chairman of numerous agricultural bodies and of committees appointed to inquire into agricultural and rural questions, and has done much valuable practical experimental work on his own estate in Shropshire.

Sir Thomas Dewar, who becomes a baronet, is managing director of John Dewar and Sons, distillers, and chairman of A. F. Pears, Ltd. He is a brother of Mr. J. G. Dewar, of Cheltenham.

Among the new knights is Lieut. Colonel W. Houghton Gastrell, Unionist M.P. for North Lambeth since 1910, and now in command of the A.S.C. in the Woolwich district. He is the son of the late Mr. F. F. Gastrell, of 6 Park-place, Cheltenham. He has for many years been officially connected with many of the principal charitable institutions in London, is a member of the Grand Council of the Primrose League, and has also been a member of the London County Council.

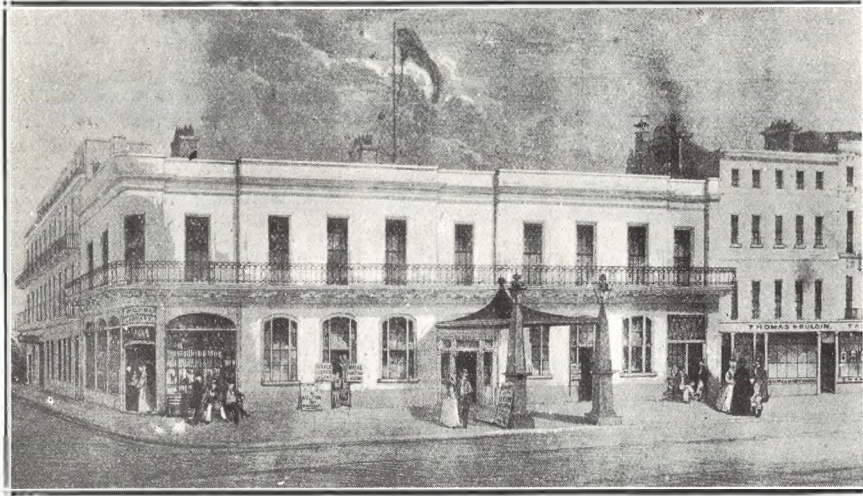
CONGRATULATIONS TO SIR R. V. VASSAR-SMITH, BART.

At the Gloucester Police-court on Monday, Mr. Harley K. Butt (chairman) said that before commencing the business—he was pleased to find there was very little to do—he wished on behalf of his brother magistrates and himself to most heartily congratulate Mr. Richard Vassar-Smith on his being created a baronet. Perhaps it was not generally known that Sir Richard was the senior magistrate of the city, he having been appointed on July 15th, 1885, and had therefore served 32 years. His numerous duties prevented him attending the court as regularly as in his earlier days, but when he attended he gave the best of his abilities. Sir Richard did yeoman service for the county; indeed, it was impossible for him (Mr. Butt) to name all the appointments he held. He was chairman of Lloyds Bank, which one would think was sufficient for one man, chairman of the Gloucester Railway Carriage and Wagon Co., chairman of the Gloucester Gas Co., and practically the head of the Ladies' College, Cheltenham; while he also took an immense interest in Masonry and performed many other public duties with marked ability. 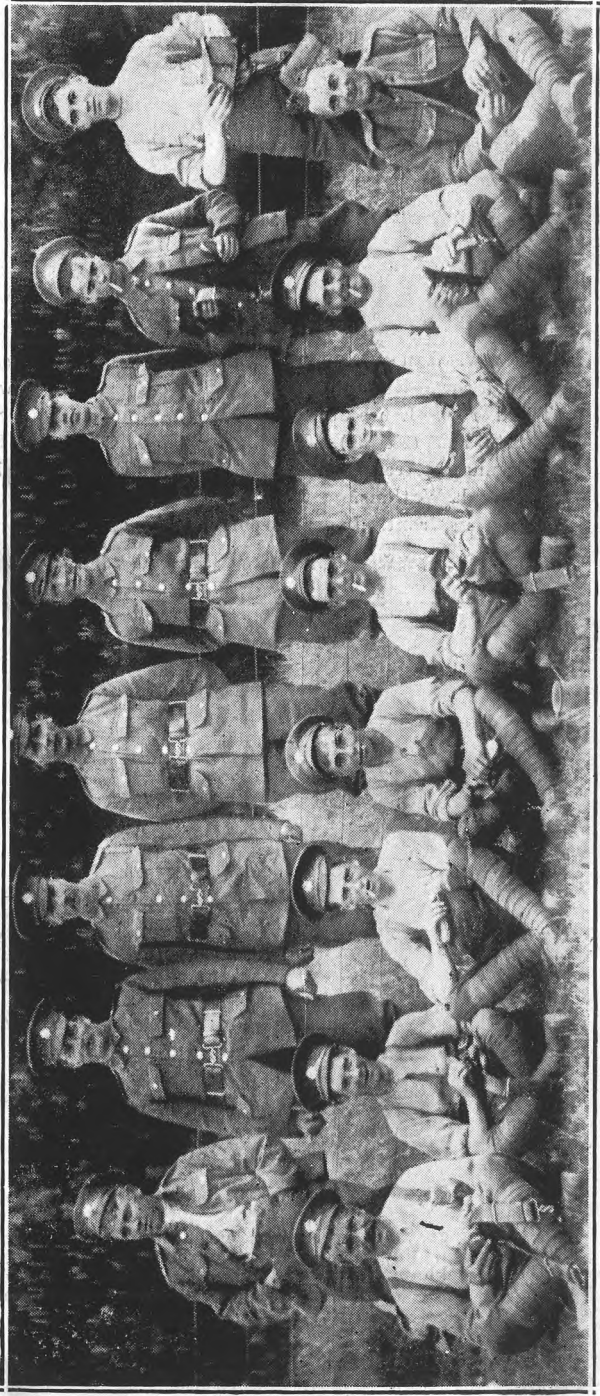

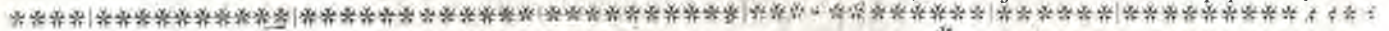

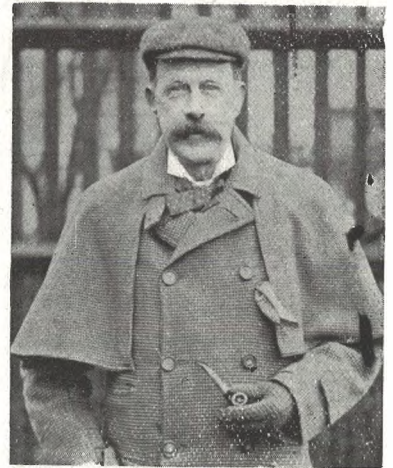

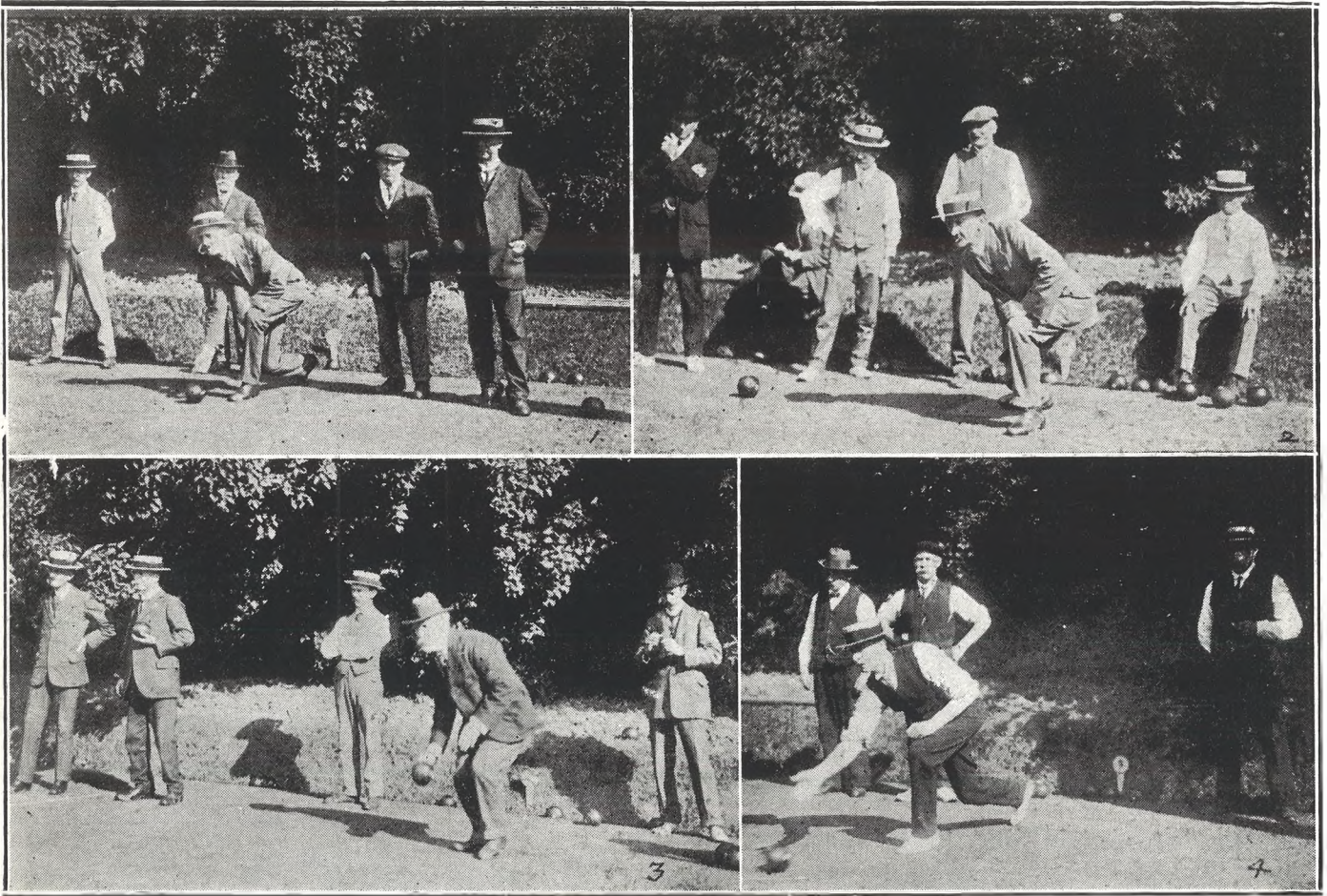

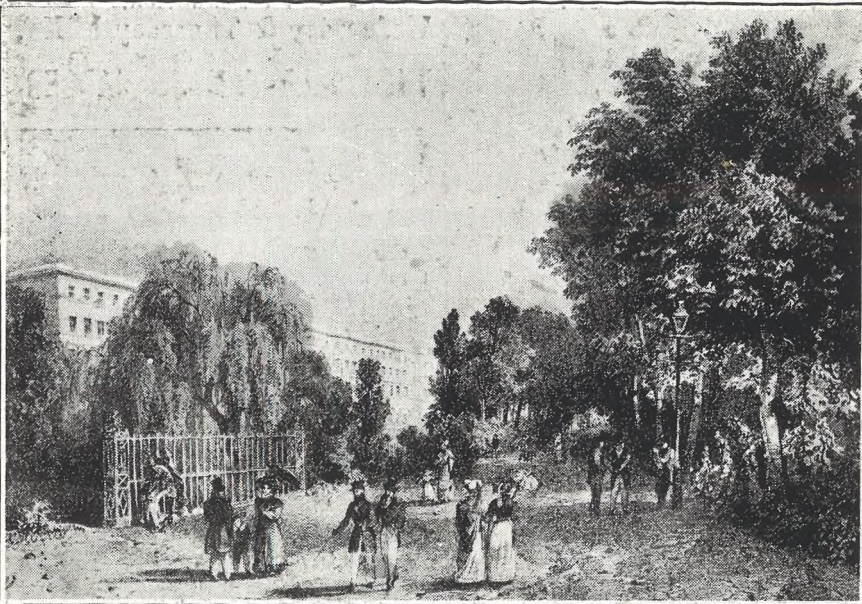

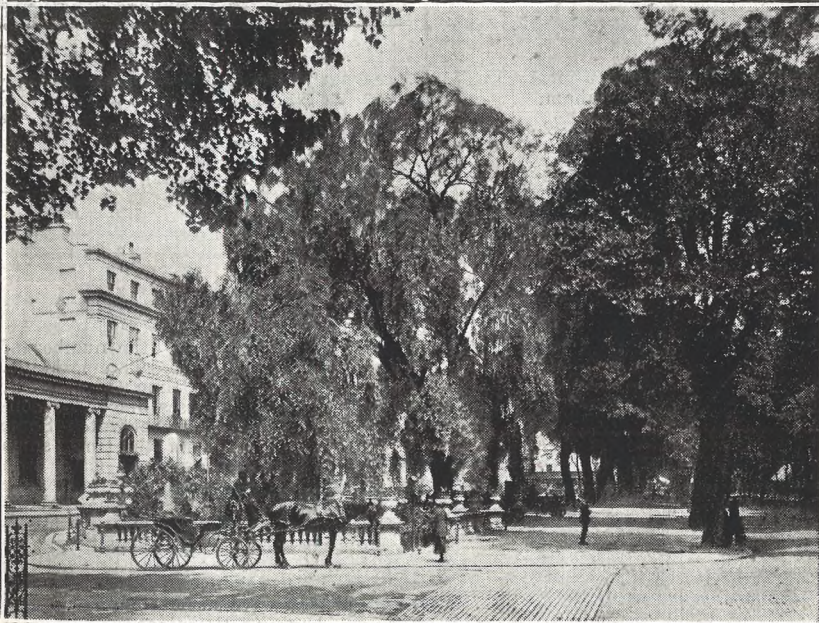
DEATH OF MR. A. W. VEARS.

It is with sincere regret we record the death of Mr. A. W. Vears, which occurred at his residence, Minoru, Dean's-way, at half-past seven on Wednesday morning. Deceased had been ill for about three weeks and a week ago, when he took to his bed, the doctor gave no hope of recovery. Deceased was a native of Market Harborough, and after serving 12 years in the navy, and retiring with the rank of assistant-paymaster, he went into business at Llanthony, Gloucester, as a timber merchant, from which he retired some years ago. His death creates a great void in sporting and athletic circles in the city, he being closely associated with the football, cricket, and athletic clubs, and also the county cricket club. In fact, he took the keenest interest in all branches of sport, and enjoyed a wide popularity. Deceased was 67 years of age, and leaves a widow, one daughter, and three sons—Sec. Lieut. Lindsay Vears, Sec.-Lieut. Noel Vears, and Mr. Gordon Vears, each of whom possesses the same sporting instincts as their father, and have rendered the Gloucester football and cricket clubs invaluable services. In politics the late Mr. Vears was a staunch Conservative. He was known among the more intimate of his acquaintances as "The Commodore," and his passing will be deeply regretted. He was buried on Friday afternoon in Barnwood churchyard, where lie the remains of his old friend Mr. H. J. ("Jimmy") Boughton, ex-captain of the Gloucester football and cricket clubs.

NEW EDUCATION BILL.

Lord Crawford, in the Second Chamber on Tuesday, made the interesting announcement that the Board of Education were now engaged in the task of framing a Bill on the lines of the speech recently made in the House of Commons by Mr. Fisher, the Minister for Education. He was informed that the Bill would assume the status quo; that was to say, that the structure of the Education Act of 1902—the controversial Act which was the foundation of our educational system—was to be the basis of the new Bill, and therefore the religious settlement, so far as it was a settlement in that Act, for the moment stood. The silence of Mr. Fisher on the religious aspect of education must not, said his lordship, be taken to mean that the subject had been forgotten; but it would be unreasonable to ask the Department to revive old denominational controversies. The Department would not be justified in imperilling measures of development that were universally admitted to be essential to the progress of education, by doing anything that would raise acute controversial issues.

CHELTONIAN WOUNDED.

Pte. H. Flory, of the 5th Devons, whose home is at Glendine, St. Mark's, Cheltenham, has been admitted to the Netley Hospital with a severe gunshot wound in the leg, received on April 4th.

MENTIONED IN DESPATCHES.

The names of several English and Indian officers and men have been brought to the notice of the Secretary of State for War for distinguished services rendered in connection with the operations at Shaiba, Mesopotamia, in April, 1915. Among them is Capt. Milo Richard Beaumont Onslow, of the Indian Cavalry, second son of the late Col. G. P. C. Onslow and Mrs. Onslow, and grandson of the late Mr. William Donald, of Lisle House, Cheltenham. He has been wounded on two occasions.

M.M. FOR FORMER CHELTONIAN.

Mr. James Nash, now of South Wales, but formerly of Edward-street, Cheltenham, and who was for several years in the employ of the Cheltenham Corporation, has received a message of congratulation from the n.c.o.'s and men of the 9th Battalion North Staffs. Regiment (Pioneers), on his son, Sergt. Wm. Nash, of 27 Woodland-road, Tylorstown, S. Wales, receiving the Military Medal. The message says that by his fearlessness and goodwill Sergt. Nash has won for himself the honour of being placed as a hero on the roll of the gallant sons of Wales, and is honoured by his comrades not only as a Military Medallist, but as "the pride and hope of the regiment." Sergt. Nash has two brothers serving in the Army.

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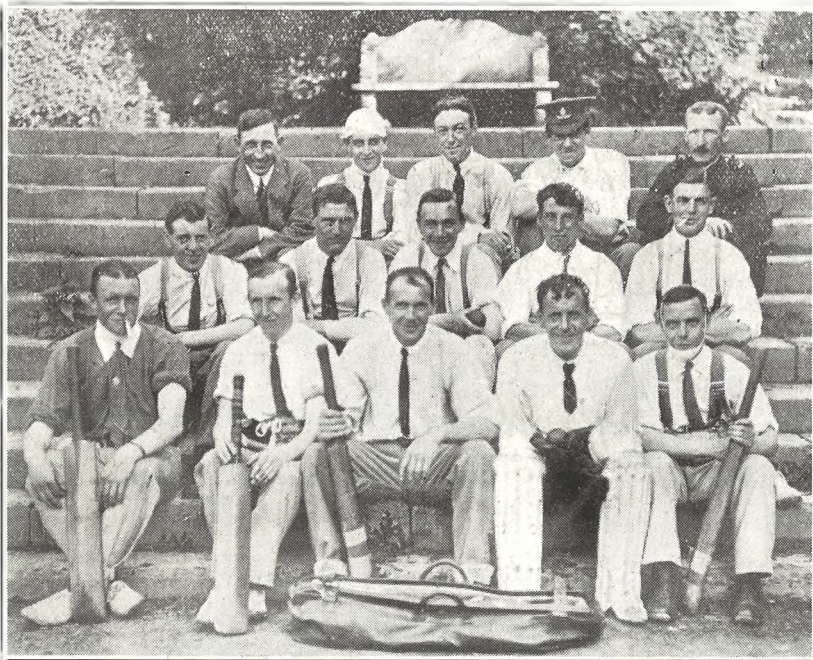

SERGT. W. LARGE, Medical Staff, Canadian Infantry, mentioned in Sir Douglas Haig's dispatches of April 9th, 1917. Son of Mr. J. Large, of Winchcombe, Glos.



PTE. W. G. BUNKER, South Lancashire Regiment, wounded in action on June 7th by gunshots in both feet, and now in Royal Herbert Hospital, Woolwich. Brother of Police-Sergt. Bunker, he himself was formerly in the Cheltenham Police. He had only been out two months for the second time.



GUNNER CRISPUS JEWELL, Royal Garrison Artillery, killed in action May 19th, 1917, aged 35 years. He is the first from the little Cotswold village of Clapton to be killed in the present war. Son of Mrs. Jewell, Clapton, near Bourton-on-the-Water.



LCE-CORPL. J. A. JENKINS, Machine Gun Corps., killed in action on the 4th June, aged 21 years. Dearly-loved son of Mr. and Mrs. Jenkins, Hinton Lodge, St. George's-road, Cheltenham.



CORPL. W. B. COOK, Royal Garrison Artillery, killed in action April 24th, 1917, aged 27 years. Only son of Mr. G. B. Cook, Cemetery-walk, Stow-on-the-Wold.



PTE. JOHN RIDDEY, Honourable Artillery Company, killed in action April 29th, 1917, aged 20 years. Only son of Mr. J. A. Riddey, manager of the Capital and Counties Bank, Moreton-in-Marsh.



LCE-CPL. ARTHUR FRANK WILLIAMS, Oxford and Bucks Light Infantry, killed in action April 28th last, aged 19 years. He was the youngest son of Mr. James Williams, of Upper Oddington, near Moreton-in-Marsh, Glos.



PTE. W. M. LARNER, Gloucester Regiment, invalidated with shell shock on April 28th, and now in a rest camp in Salonika. Third son of Mrs. Larner, Condicote, Stow-on-the-Wold, Glos.



PTE. A. R. PRESTON, Royal Berkshire Regt., formerly of the Gloucesters, wounded in action March 5th, and now in Arnsbrae Hospital, Cambus, Scotland. Eldest son of Mr. Walter Preston, St. James's-square, Cheltenham.

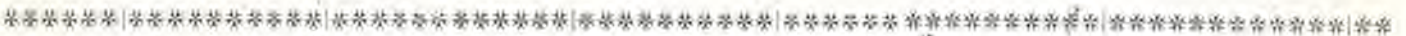
SEC.-LIEUT. I. W. F. AGABEG (O.C.).

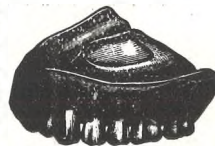

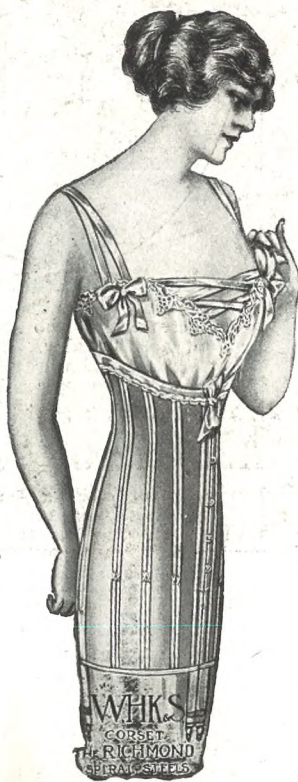
