# ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



COMP. SIGNLR. W. E. LANE, Gloucester Regiment, invaded home with trench fever and now in Birmingham Hospital. Only son of Police-Inspector and Mrs. Lane, of Tewkesbury Police-station. He was formerly master's clerk at Hammersmith Workhouse.



FLIGHT-SERGT. F. G. MATTHEWS, R.F.C., killed in flying accident in France, June 25, 1917, aged 25 years. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Matthews, 3 Blenheim-terrace, Cheltenham.



GUNNER W. H. MATTHEWS, Gloucester Regiment, died in France, December 21, 1915, aged 21 years. Youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Matthews, 3 Blenheim-terrace, Cheltenham.



FITTER ALBERT V. WAKEFIELD, R.F.A., died from sudden heart failure following dysentery while in Mesopotamia. Before joining the Army he was employed at Messrs. Barron and Sons, millwright engineers, Gloucester.



PTE. JOHN RAWCLIFFE, East Lancs. Regiment, who has been awarded the Military Medal for gallant conduct on June 10th, 1917. He was previously wounded and a patient at New Court Hospital for six months. He married Mrs. R. Russell, a conductress on the Light Railway for the past two years, whose first husband was drowned in the submarine A7, January 16th, 1914.



PTE. C. V. FRITH, H.A.C. (attached Trench Mortar Battery), wounded by bomb from German aeroplane while in rest billets on June 3rd, and died from gas gangrene on June 9th, aged 29 years. He was formerly in Wilts and Dorset Bank, Cheltenham, and was a prominent and much-liked member of the Cotswold Hills Golf Club.



BOMEDR. J. WHEELER, R.F.A., called up as reservist at outbreak of war, and fought in the retreat from Mons. After 16 months in France he went to Mesopotamia, and is now having his first leave in India. Only son of Mrs. C. Hopkins, 3 Elmdale-cottages, Fairfield-parade, Leckhampton.



LCE.-CPL. GEORGE BOWEN, Machine Gun Corps, killed in action on June 8th, aged 32 years. Son of Mr. and Mrs. T. Bowen, 39 St. James'-street, Cheltenham. He was for nearly 20 years confectioner with Mr. Margrett and with George's Ltd., and was the well-known Cheltenham Town and Naunton Park footballer.



PTE. C. F. WHITE, Loyal North Lancs. Regiment, formerly in Gloucester Regiment, severely wounded in left arm and thigh on June 9th, now in Greenhill Hospital, Dorset. Son of Mrs. White, 53 St. James'-street, Cheltenham. He was a Cheltenham postman before the war.



PTE. W. J. BAYLISS, Machine Gun Section, Worcestershire Regiment, killed in action on June 3rd, 1916. Son of Mr. and Mrs. John Bayliss, of The Vines, Staunton, and brother of P.C. Bayliss, Tewkesbury. He was 27 years of age.



SAPPER A. MANSFIELD, The Royal Engineers, died from wounds received in action on May 14th, 1917. Son of Mrs. S. Mansfield, of 18 Flaxton-road, Plumstead, Kent, and formerly of 49 Tivoli-street, Cheltenham, who has three other sons serving abroad.



CORPL. W. J. FEBERY, South Lancs. Regiment, missing since July 23, 1916, and now reported killed in action. His widow, Mrs. Febery, 1 Swindon-terrace, Swindon-road, Cheltenham, would be very grateful for any news of him.

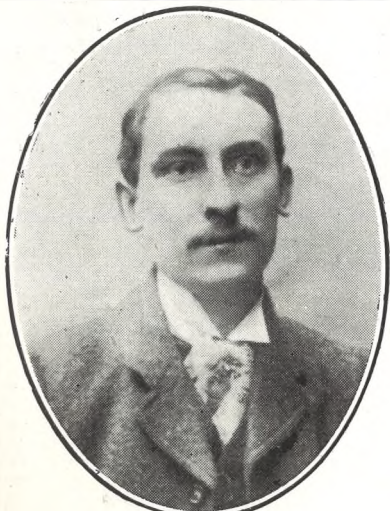

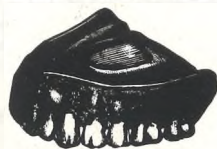

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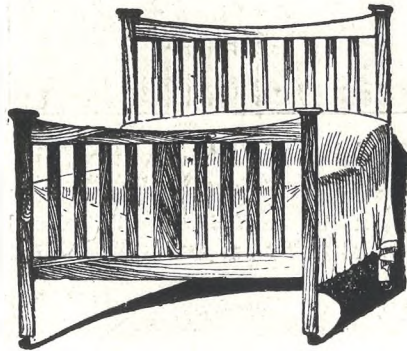
**WOUNDED SOLDIERS ENTERTAINED IN CHELTENHAM.**

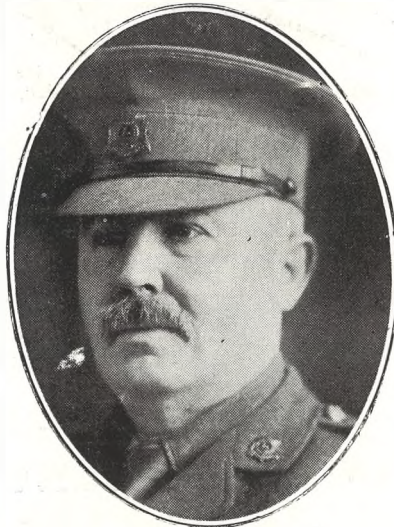

SERGT. MAURICE CARTER, Gloucester Regt., reported missing on May 8th, 1917, now a prisoner of war in Germany. Youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Carter, Norton House, Longhope, Glos. He was an old Crypt Grammar School boy.



CORPL. P. G. TOLLEY, Gloucester Regt., awarded the M.M. for gallantry in the field on the night he was wounded (at the end of May). He is now in hospital at Aberdeen. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Tolley, of 3 Alpine-villas, Gloucester-road, Cheltenham, and was in Messrs. Martyn and Co.'s offices before the war.



LCE.-CORPL. FRANCIS GEO. BRAIN COLLETT, Gloucester Regt., wounded in action on April 11th, 1917. Now in Convalescent Camp in Amara. Elder son of Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Collett, Upper Slaughter.



PTE. J. ILOTT, S.W. Borderers, wounded in action on June 7th, 1917, and now in hospital at Alcester, Warwickshire. Before enlisting he was assistant at the Cash Clothing Co., High-street, Cheltenham. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Ilott, 3 Gloucester-cottages, Gloucester-road, Cheltenham.



PTE. HARRY LAWSON MORSE, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action by an enemy sniper on June 8th when helping in a wounded comrade. He was a native of Chedworth, and was much respected.

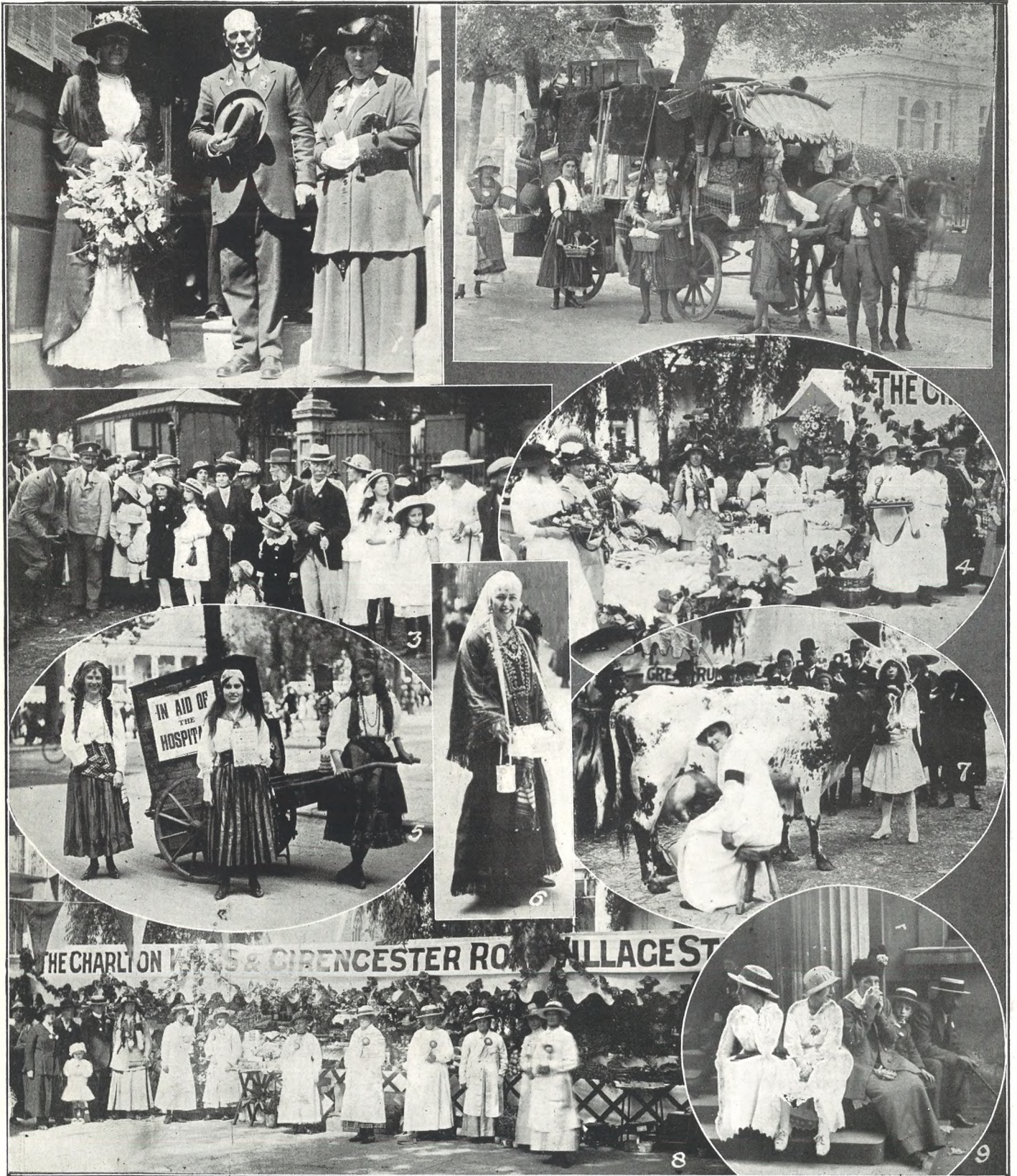

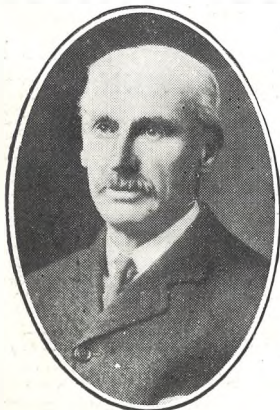

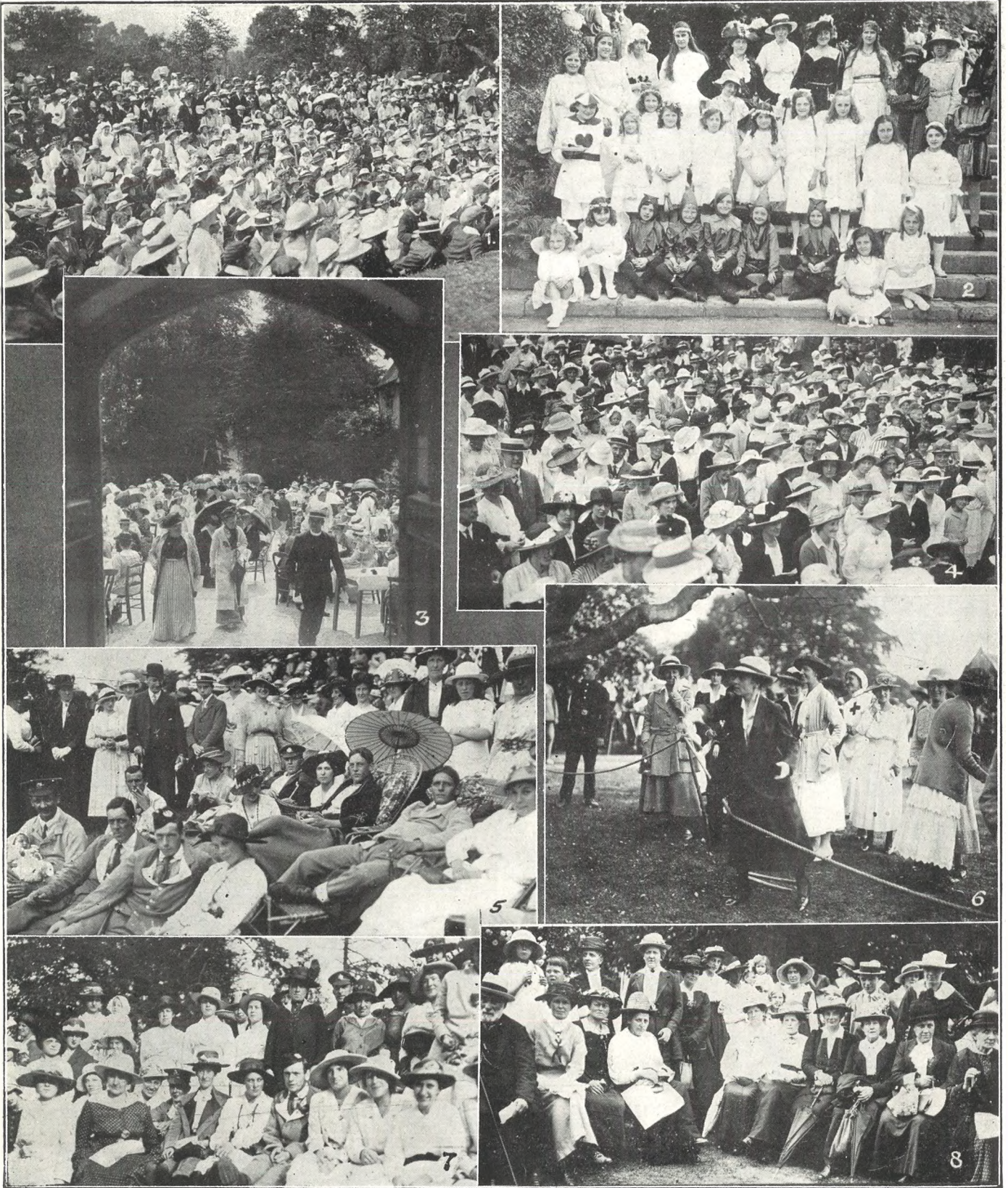

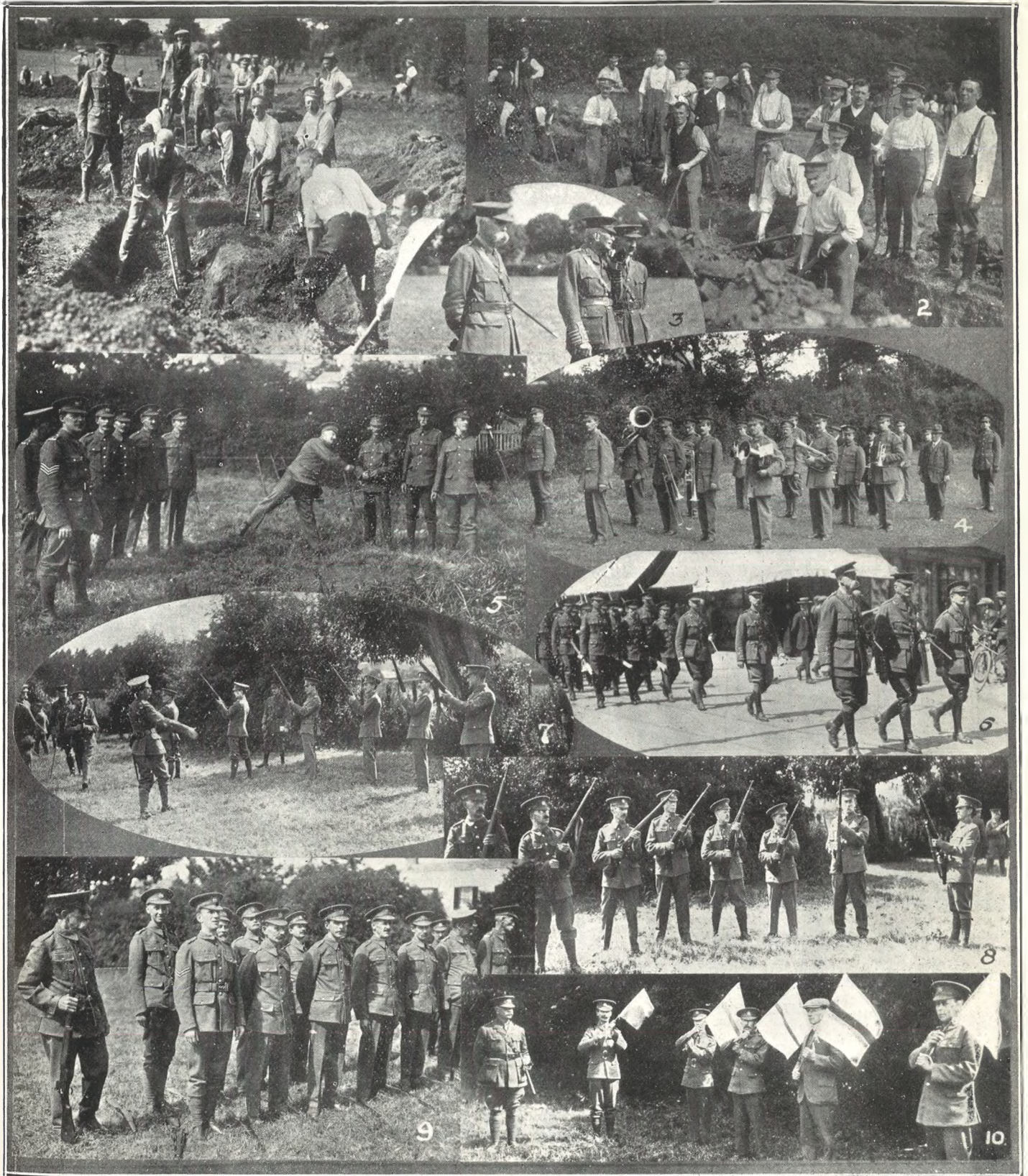

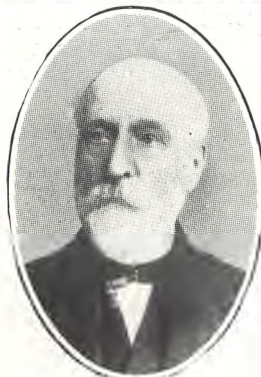

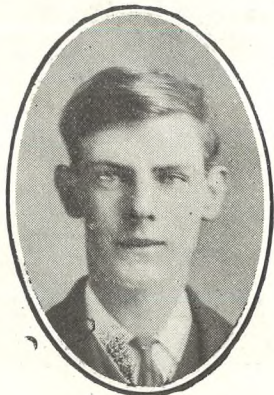
**PTE. EDWIN L. BOWDEN,**

**FRUIT CROPS AND FRUIT PRICES.**

**VEGETABLE PROSPECTS IMPROVED.**

Fruit crops in the Vale of Evesham are good and prices so far very remunerative to growers. Pershore plums will not be a large crop, for they are thick on the trees in many gardens, though thick here and there. But most other varieties of plums will yield heavily. The high wind of Wednesday did considerable damage to the heavily laden trees in places, branches thick with plums being torn off many trees. Fruit continues to sell well in the Evesham markets. Last week good quality raspberries, which have yielded well, made from 5d. to 7d. per pound; red currants, which have been a large crop, went up to 4d. and 5d. per pound; black currants, which have also been a good crop, made from 5d. to 7d., and loganberries from 3d. to 5d. per pound. Cherries have been an excellent crop, and they are finishing at high prices, good quality making up to 38s. per pot (63lb.) last week. Strawberries have been a light crop, but they have sold well. Gooseberries are still making high prices, though the crop has been large. Apples are a fairly good crop, and good supplies of the

early cookers, such as Lord Grosvenor, Suffolk, Keswicks, and early Victoria, are now coming in and making from 7s. to 14s. per pot of 56lb. Pears will yield heavily. Recent rains have improved vegetable prospects, and there is the promise of abundant supplies of all kinds. Potatoes look very vigorous and healthy, and runner and dwarf beans never looked better.

The assumption is that he must have lost his sister's photograph, in moving about.

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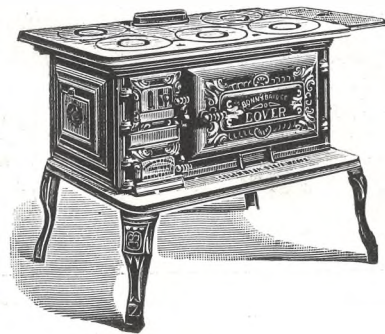
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**A GLOUCESTER GOLDEN WEDDING.**
