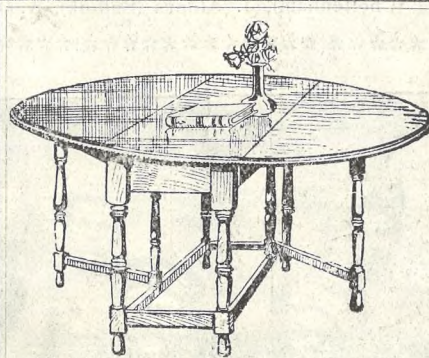

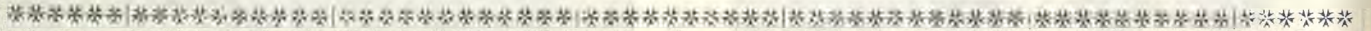

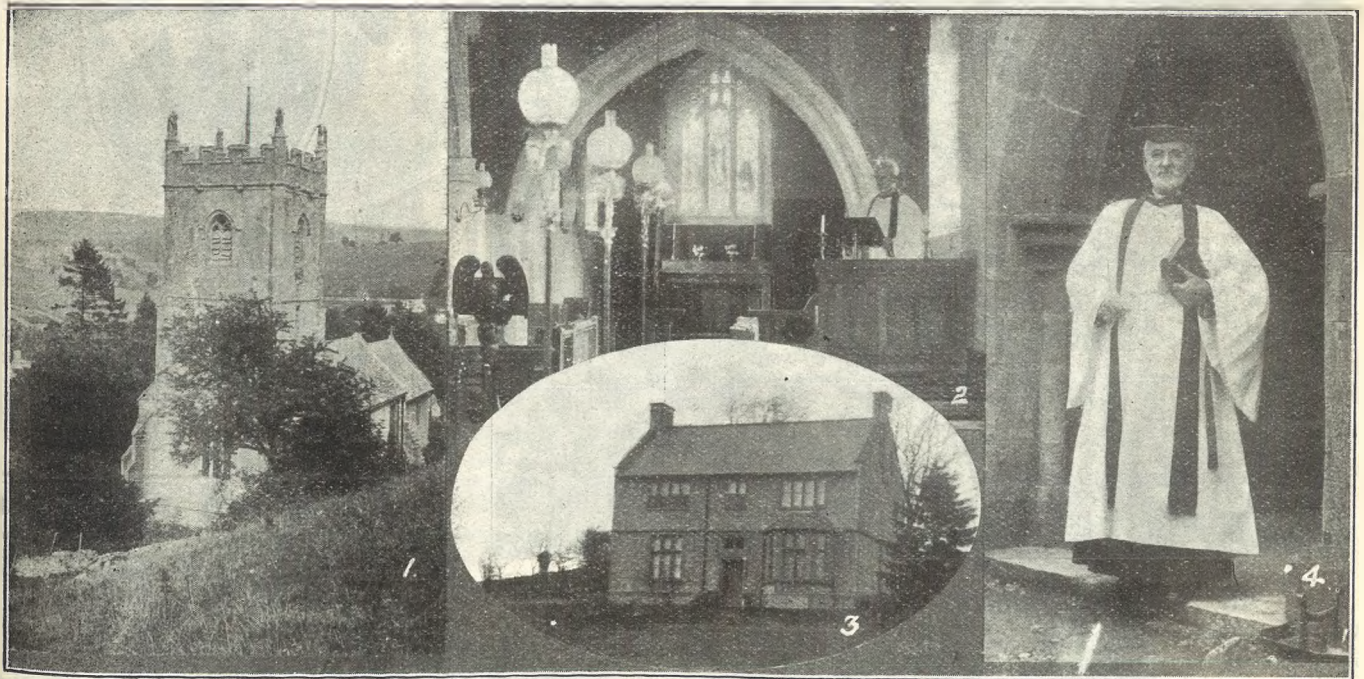

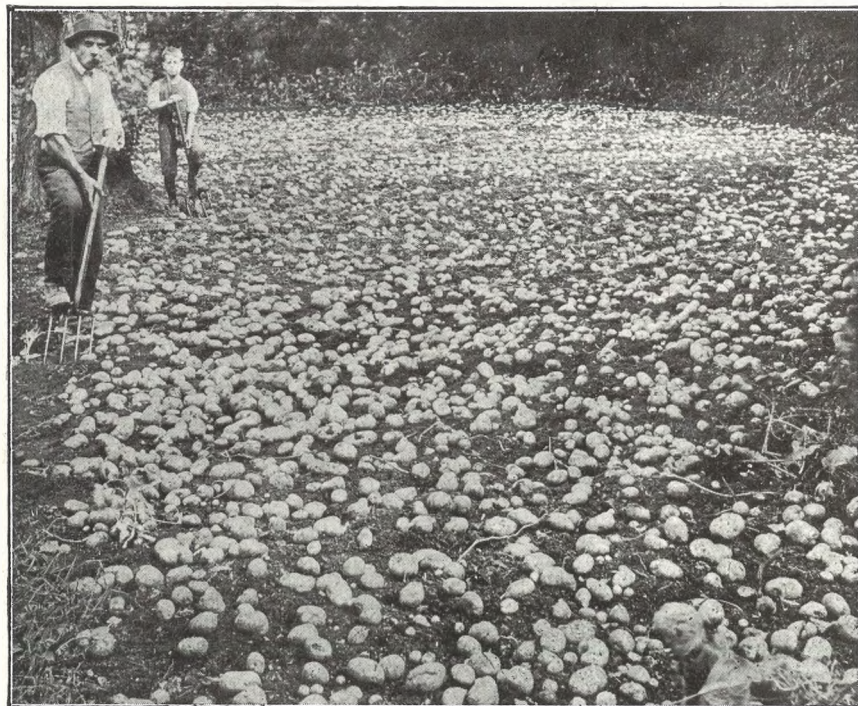

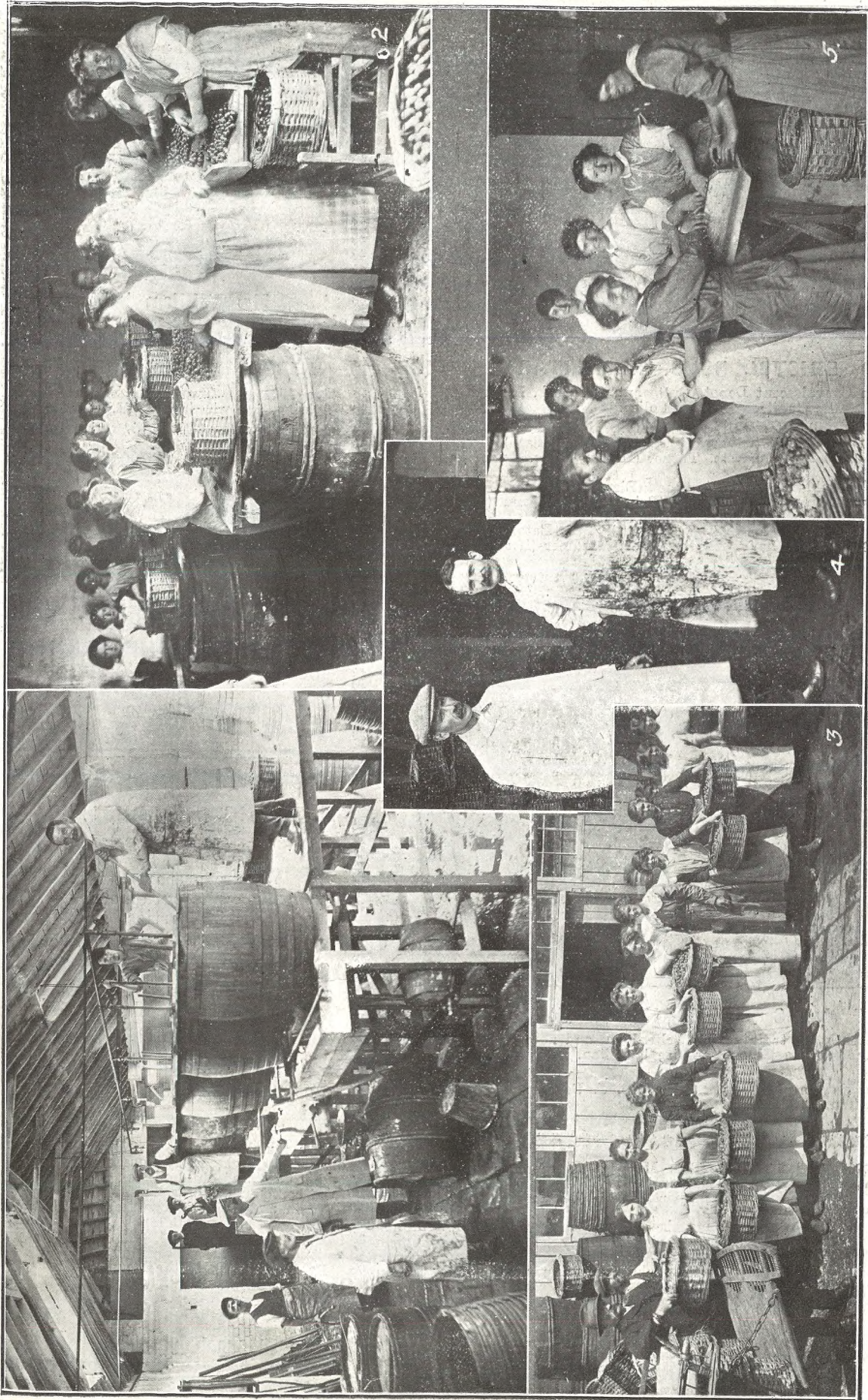

ON SATURDAY LAST A FRUIT-PULPING AND VEGETABLE-DRYING FACTORY WAS OPENED AT THE PREMISES IN ALBION STREET, CHELTEMHAM, FORMERLY KNOWN AS STIBB'S BREWERY. IT IS UNDER GOVERNMENT CONTROL, THE RESPONSIBLE AUTHORITY BEING THE FOOD PRODUCTION DEPARTMENT. AT THE PRESENT TIME ONLY PLUMS ARE BEING PULPED.

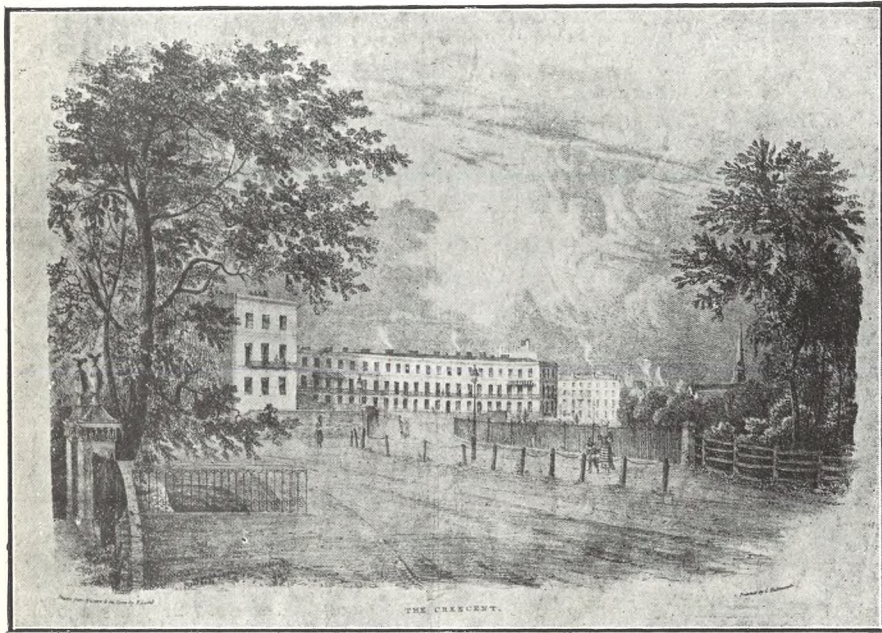

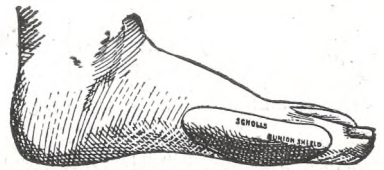
