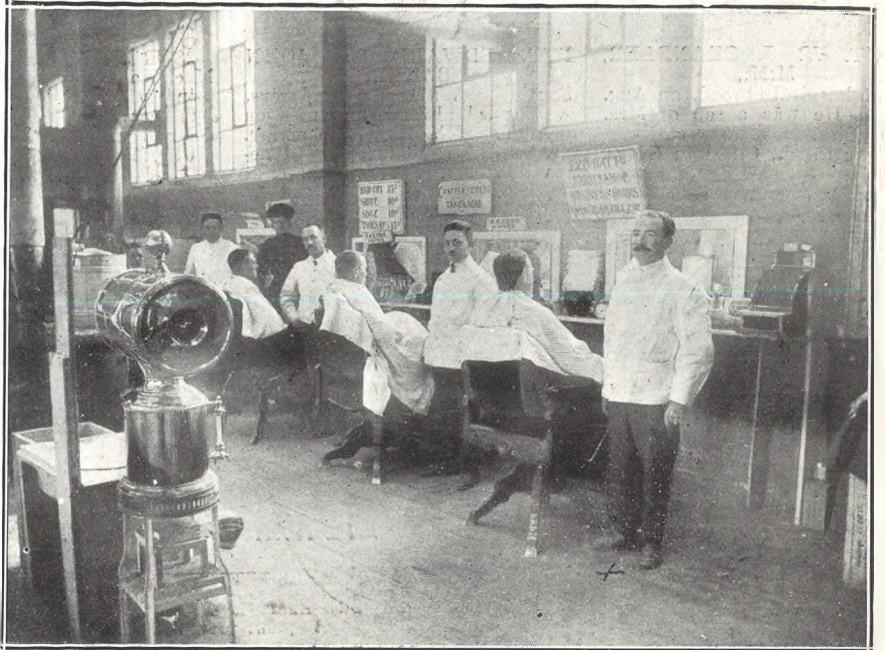

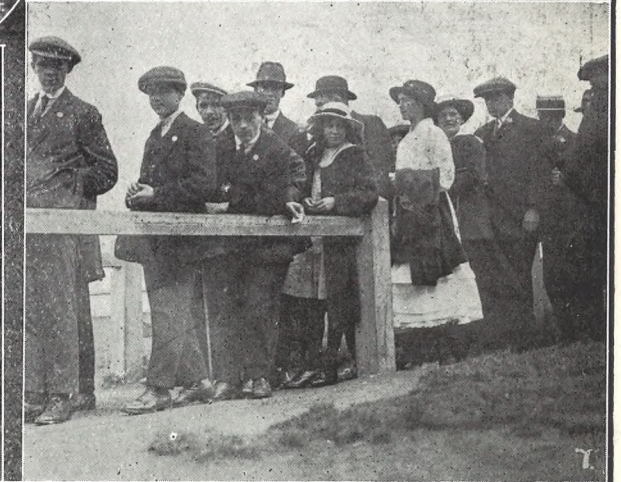
WORKERS AT PLAY.

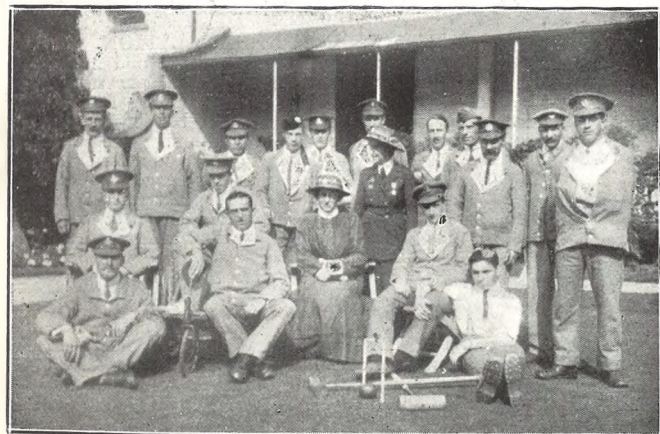

**CAMPDEN MAN WOUNDED FOR THE
THIRD TIME.**

An official notification has been received
that Pte. Alfred James, of the Royal War-
wickshire Regt., was wounded severely in
the thigh by gunshot, and was admitted into
a Red Cross Hospital abroad on August 15.
News has since been received by his wife to
the effect that he has been sent to England,
and is now in hospital in Cambridge.

PASSED FOR REPATRIATION.

Among the British officers interned in the
Montreux region who have been passed for
repatriation is Major A. S. Peebles, D.S.O.,
of the Suffolk Regt., son of the late Col.
Peebles, of Haddo, Cheltenham. He was
one of a trio of brothers, all educated at
Cheltenham College, who achieved honour
and distinction in the South African War.
He was posted as missing in the first week
of September, 1914, and afterwards reported
to be a prisoner in Germany. He has been
in captivity, therefore, for three years.

D.C.M. FOR GLOUCESTERS.

The "Gazette" on Monday night an-
nounced that his Majesty the King has been
graciously pleased to approve of the award
of the Distinguished Conduct Medal to the
undermentioned for acts of gallantry in the
field:—

duty in going out alone and silencing enemy
snipers, who were causing casualties to his
platoon. He was wounded while doing so,
and his courageous bearing throughout was
a fine example to his men.

Trunkfield, 2664 C.S.M. J. J., Glos. Regt.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion
to duty. Although wounded, he remained
with his company until the objective was
reached, rendering very valuable assistance
to his commander. He has on numerous
occasions done exceedingly good work.

SGT. ERNEST BLACKWELL, Gloucester Regt., of 27 School-lane, Cirencester, killed in action July 31st, aged 41 years. He leaves a widow and eight children. He lost his son (Reginald) in the war four months ago, as well as a brother.



SERG. W. H. FLETCHER, King's Royal Rifle Corps (formerly of the Gloucesters), officially reported missing. Husband of Mrs. Fletcher (nee Linda Herbert), Rye-worth Bank, Charlton Kings, who would be grateful for any news concerning him.

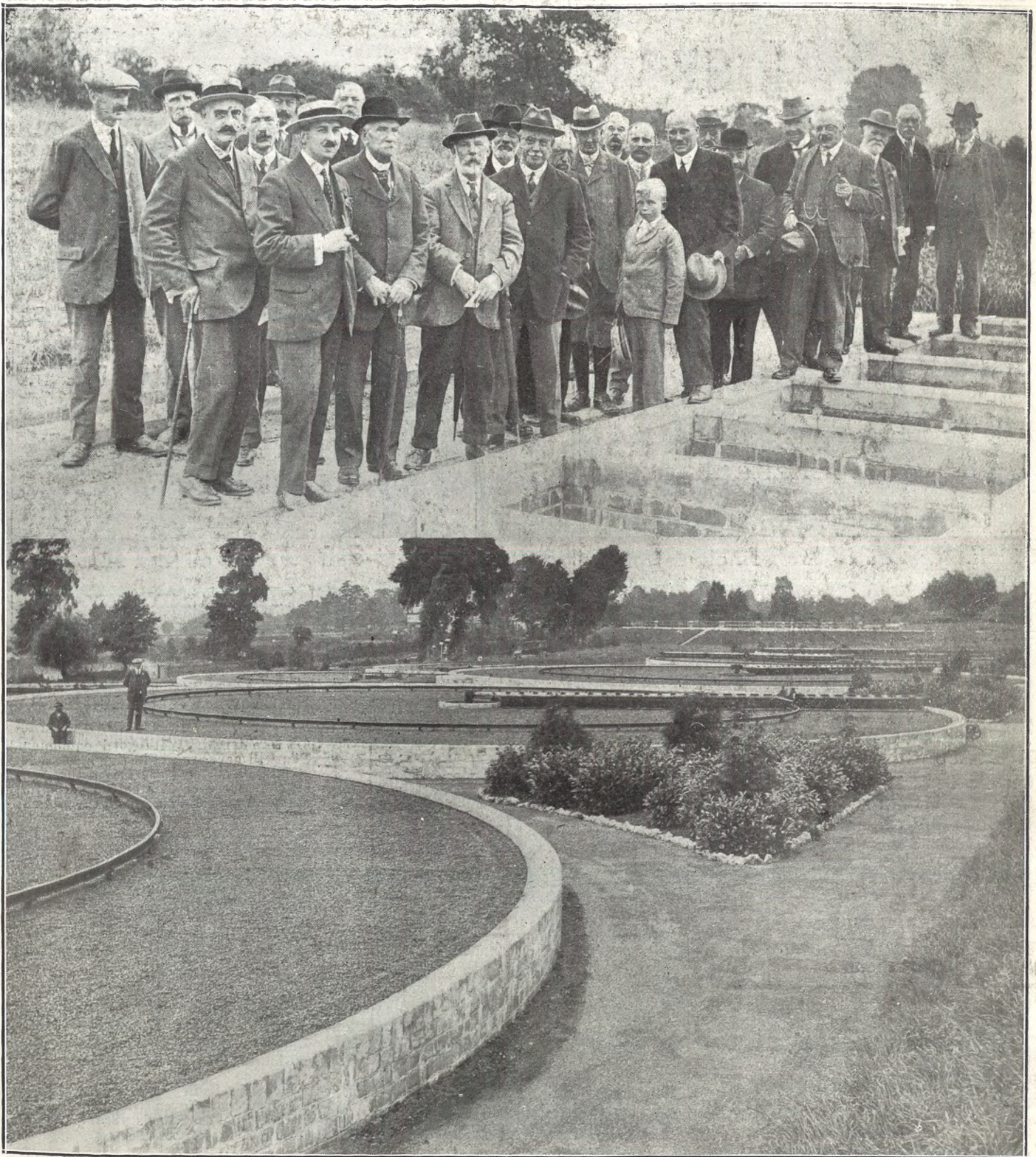

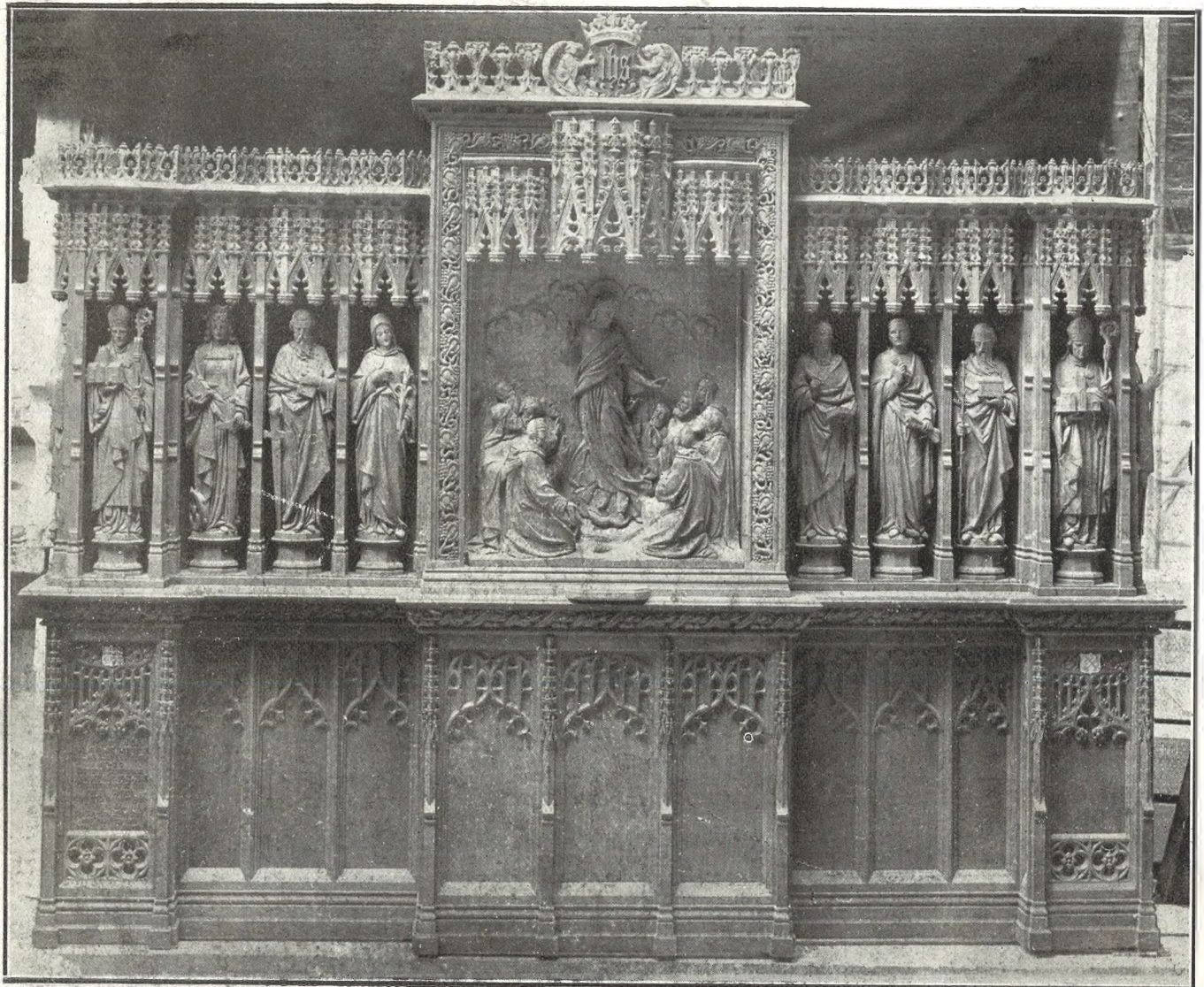

DEDICATION BY THE BISHOP OF GLOUCESTER ON FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 14, 1917, IN THE PARISH CHURCH, CHELTENHAM, OF THE REREDOS AND COMMUNION RAILS, ERECTED IN MEMORY OF THE LATE ALDERMAN WILLIAM NASH SKILLICORNE, J.P., C.C. (MAYOR OF CHELTENHAM, 1905-1907 AND 1913-1915, AND CHURCHWARDEN OF THE PARISH CHURCH), WHO DIED ON OCTOBER 23, 1915, AS THE RESULT OF A MOTOR ACCIDENT NEAR HORSHAM.

The central group represents the Ascension of Our Lord Jesus Christ. To the north of this are the Blessed Virgin Mary, the patron saint of this ancient parish church and St. Paul. To the south of the central panel are the patron saint of St. Matthew's Church and St. John, next to whom is St. Joseph of Arimathæa. On the opposite side is St. Katherine. The remaining figures represent eminent men in the history of the Church: Oswald and Wycliffe on the south; Wulstan and Tyndale on the north. Carved in relief on the north side of the reredos is the following inscription: "To the Glory of God and in Loving Memory of William Nash Skillicorne, J.P., C.C., Mayor of Cheltenham, 1905-1907, also 1913-1915; Churchwarden of this Parish Church, died 23rd October, 1915, Aged 54. The Reredos Altar Rail and Panelling were erected by his sisters." The coats of arms, reading from the north, are the following: Cheltenham College, Pate's Grammar School, Cheltenham Town, Gloucester City, Charlton Kings, Skillicorne, Gloucester Diocese, Arle Chantry, Worcester Diocese, Cirencester Abbey.

Designed by Messrs. Healing and Overbury, and executed by Messrs. R. L. Boulton and Sons, Cheltenham. The Credence Table, a similar design to the reredos, was given in memory of Major G. D. P. Swinley, who died from wounds received in action in Gallipoli, May 13, 1915.

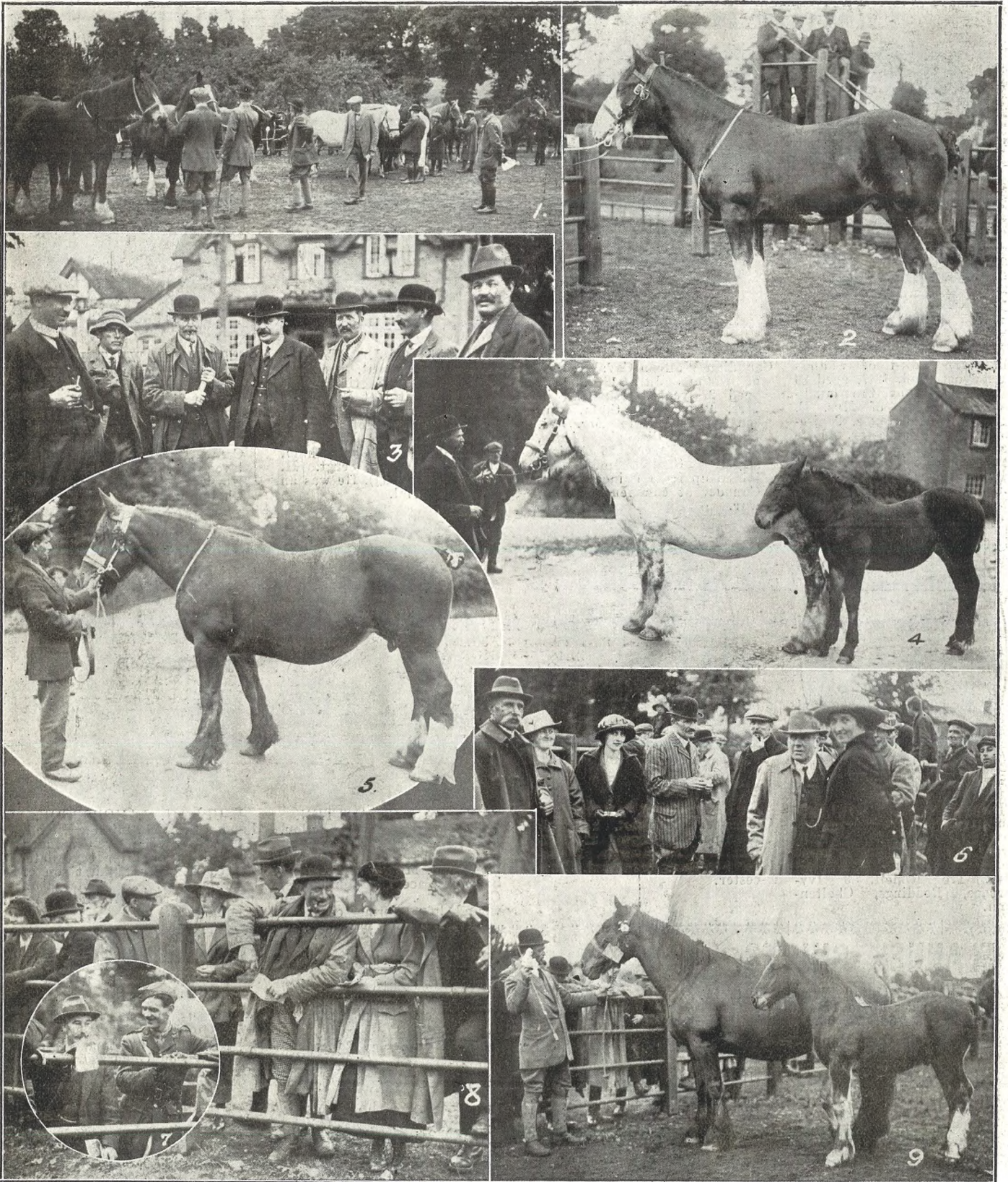

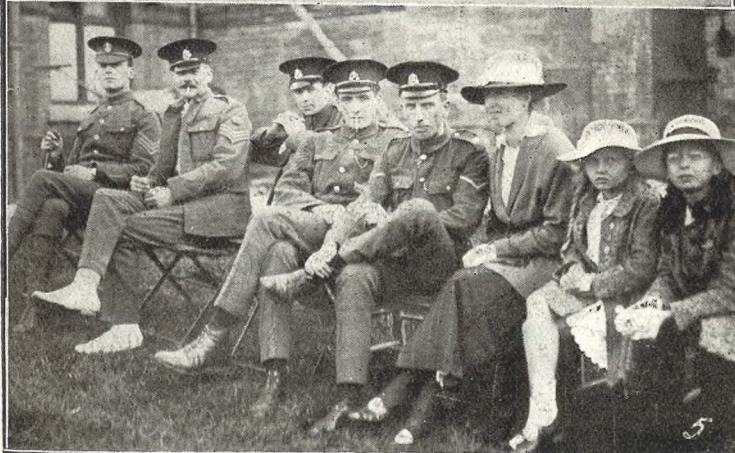
