

Above is a group photograph of the Gloucester Rugby football team which went through season 1882-3 with an unbroken second, among the teams defeated being Newport, Cardiff, Cheltenham College, Clifton, the R.A.C., Bath, Cheltenham Town, Swindon Rangers, and others. The team was under the captaincy of J. F. Brown, the famous "worry, worry" skipper and probably the finest captain the City Club ever had. Many members of the above team still reside in Gloucester, notably Mr. H. J. Berry (proprietor of the New Inn Hotel), Mr. P. Barrett Cooke, solicitor (clerk to the Education Committee), and Mr. J. W. Bayley (wine merchant), but it is a sad coincidence that since we had the above photograph lent to us for reproduction by Mr. Sidney S. Starr, the old City Club's ex-treasurer, one of the members (Mr. George J. Dewey) should have died. He passed away on Sunday morning last, highly respected by all who knew him. 
