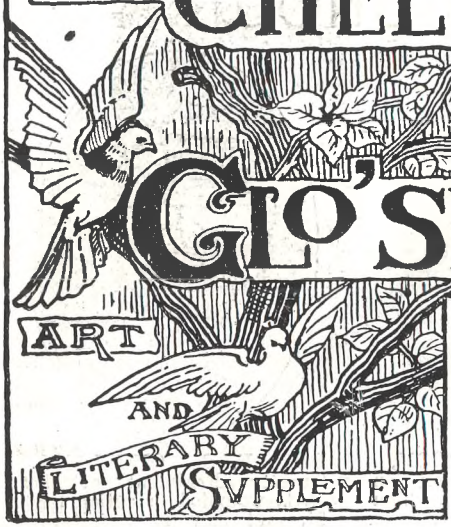

S. Wales Borderers, awarded Military Cross for conspicuous gallantry on Aug. 1, 1917, in organising and leading a party with ammunition and water to the front line through an intense enemy barrage. Son of Mrs. M. L. Whislay, of 3 Southville Park-road, Gloucester.



SEC.-LIEUT. C. W. E. RAWLINGS,
Gloucester Regiment, died of wounds on Friday, Sept. 28, abroad. He was formerly in the Original Brewery Co.'s office, and was an old St. Paul's Choir boy. Aged 22 years. Son of the late Mr. Wm. Rawlings, for many years in the employ of Cheltenham Opera House Co.



BDR. GEO. H. BROOM,
R.F.A., killed in action on Sept. 16, aged 30 years. Son of the late Mr. John Broom and Mrs. Broom, formerly of Monson-terrace, Cheltenham, and now of Bath, and only brother of Mr. J. W. F. Broom, solicitor, of Cheltenham. He married Miss Kittie Haines, of Cheltenham, some years ago.

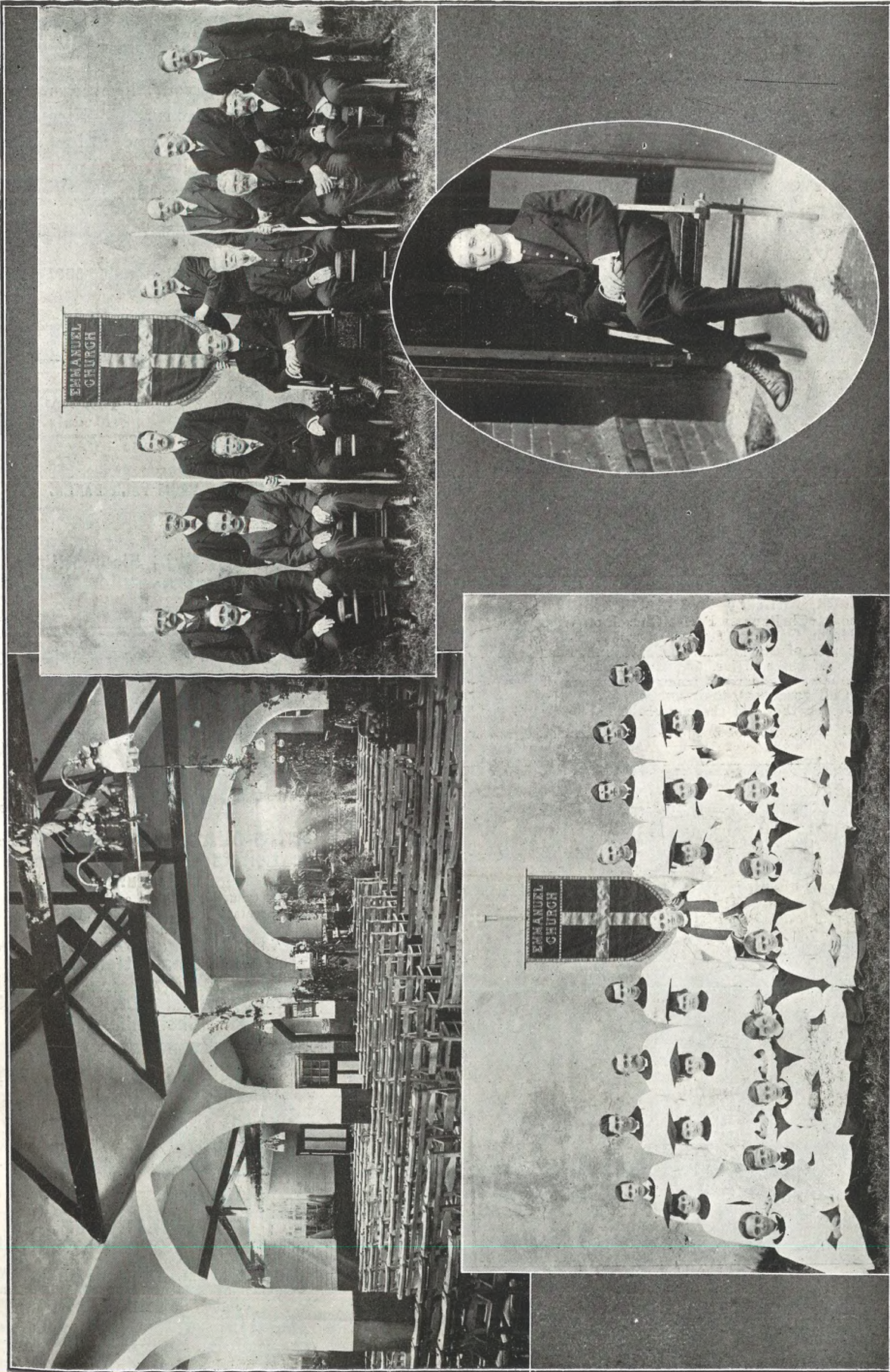

SEC. LIEUT. EDWARD A. BARNARD.
R.F.A., att. R.F.C., killed in action while flying on Sept. 29, aged 21 years. The only son of the late Edward Barnard and Mrs. Barnard, Brussels House, Promenade, Cheltenham. He served with the R.N. Division in Gallipoli, and obtained a commission in Nov., 1916.



SEC.-LT. J. H. (HARRY) FINCH.
R. Fusiliers, severely wounded in action Sept. 25th, and now in hospital abroad. He was formerly at Cavendish House. Second son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Finch, 13 Albert-place, Pittville, Cheltenham, whose other son, Sgt.-Major "Tim" Finch, has also been wounded.

A FAMOUS OLD GLOUCESTER FOOTBALL TEAM.

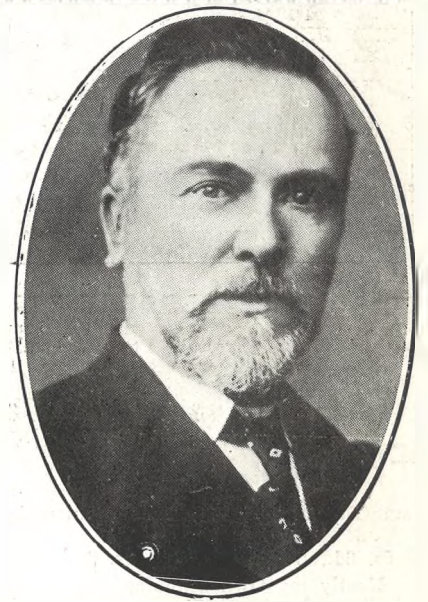
Above is a group photograph of the Gloucester Rugby football team which went through season 1882-3 with an unbroken record, among the teams defeated being Newport, Cardiff, Cheltenham College, Clifton, the R.A.C., Bath, Cheltenham Town, Swindon Rangers, and others. The team was under the captaincy of J. F. Brown, the famous "worry, worry" skipper and probably the finest captain the City Club ever had. Many members of the above team still reside in Gloucester, notably Mr. H. J. Berry (proprietor of the New Inn Hotel), Mr. P. Barrett Cooke, solicitor (clerk to the Education Committee), and Mr. J. W. Bayley (wine merchant), but it is a sad coincidence that since we had the above photograph lent to us for reproduction by Mr. Sidney S. 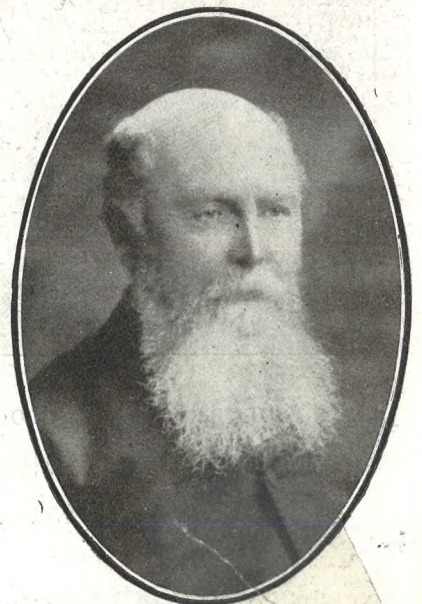
