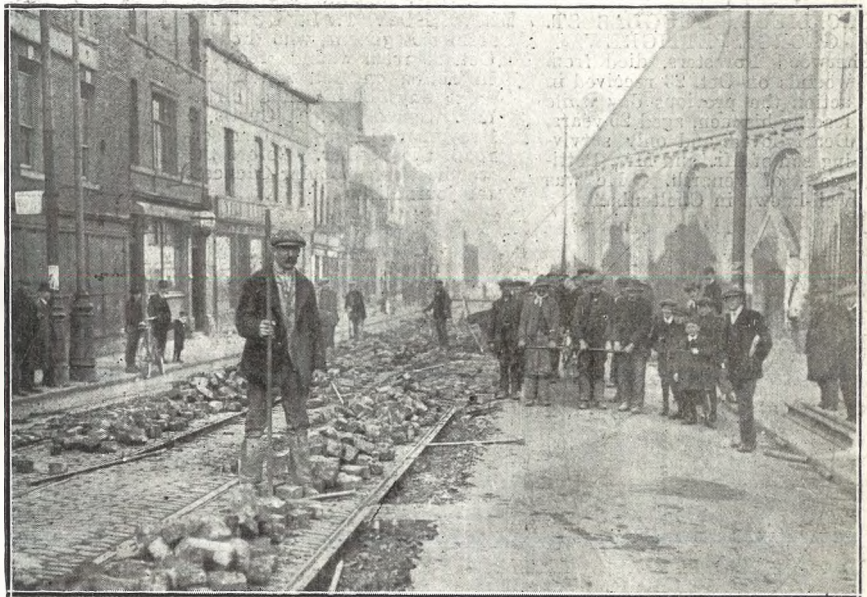

SEC. LIEUT. DOUGLAS ST. GEORGE PETTIGREW, Sherwood Foresters, died from wounds on Oct. 23 received in action the previous day while leading his men, aged 25 years. Dearly-loved and only surviving son of Mr. and Mrs. Pettigrew, of Penarth. He was well-known in Cheltenham.



SEC. LIEUT. T. B. CURTIS, Cheshire Regiment, who died on Oct. 25 from wounds received in action on Oct. 23, within three days of his 22nd birthday. Son of Mr. T. Curtis, 5 Grosvenor-villas, Watermoor-road, Cirencester. Before the war he was a popular Gloucester journalist.



SERG. ERNEST DREW, M.G.C. (formerly in Gloucester Regiment), killed in action on Oct. 12, aged 28 years. Husband of Mrs. Drew, 25 Victoria-street, St. Paul's, Cheltenham. He was formerly manager at Mr. Goodman's provision stores, High-street, Cheltenham

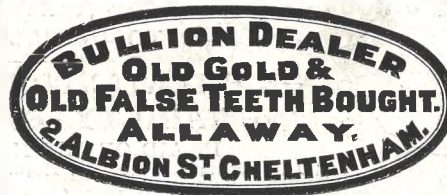

SALE OF WORK AT CHELTENHAM FEMALE REFUGE.

A SUCCESSFUL SALE OF WORK IN AID OF THE REFUGE WAS HELD AT THE NORTH-PARADE HOME, WINCHCOMBE-STREET, CHELTENHAM, ON WEDNESDAY AND THURSDAY, OCT. 24 AND 25, WHEN A NICE SUM OF MONEY WAS TAKEN. THE HOME, WITH ITS FOUR WORKING MATRONS, DOES A SPLENDID AND LITTLE-KNOWN WORK IN RESCUING GIRLS AND KEEPING AND TRAINING THEM FOR A PERIOD OF TWO YEARS. THE HOME CAN TAKE 24 GIRLS—THEY HAVE 22 AT PRESENT. IT IS A MODEL OF CLEANLINESS, ORDER AND LABOUR.

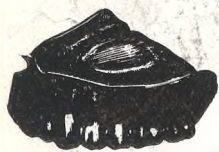

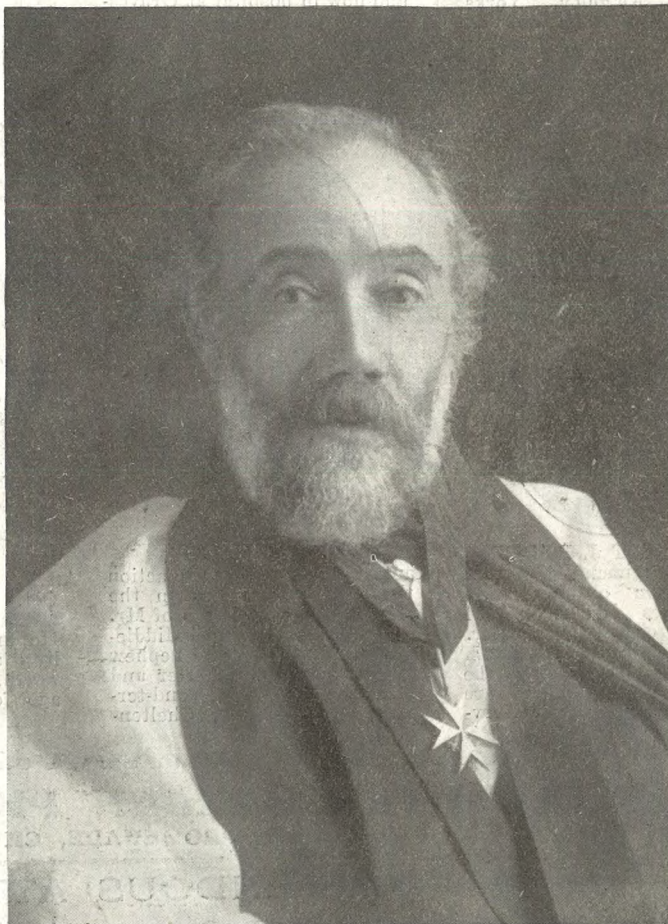

PTE. R. W. EGGLETON, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action on Oct. 9, 1917, aged 32 years. Eldest son of Mr. W. Eggleton, Marle Hill Gardens, Folly-lane, Cheltenham, who has three other sons serving.



PTE. WALTER V. ELLIOTT, formerly A.S.C. now Cheshire Regiment, wounded in chest on Oct. 20 after three years' service in France, and now in Freeford Hospital, Lichfield. Only son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Elliott, 1 Moored-street, Leckhampton, Cheltenham. He was chauffeur for Mr. Player.

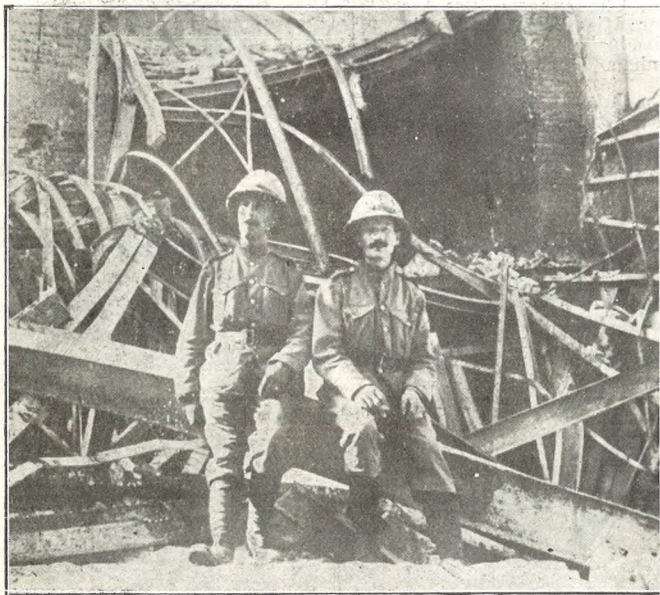

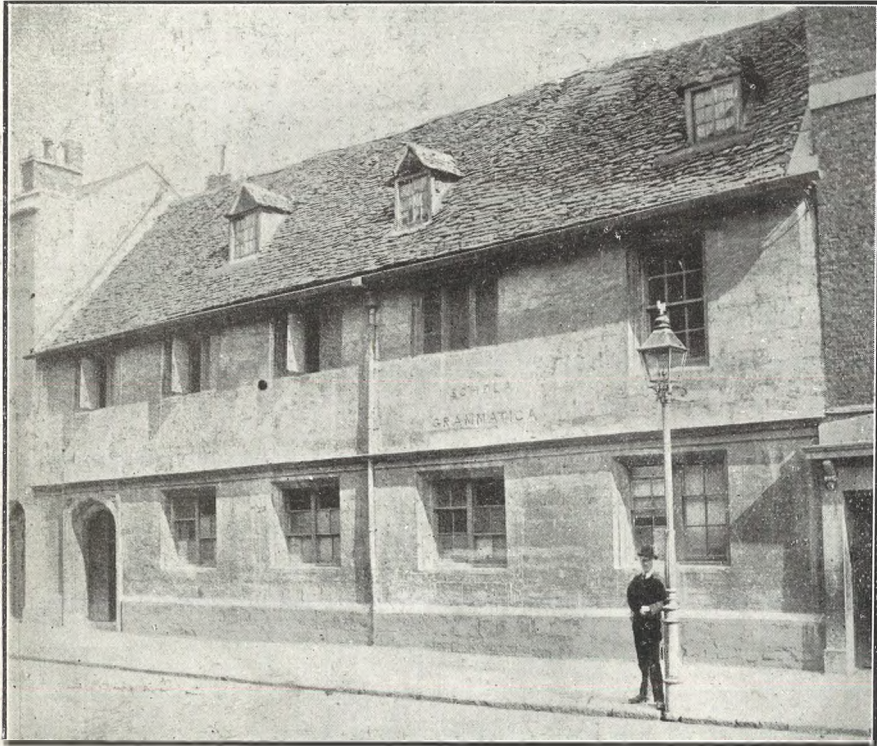


FUNERAL OF THE DEAN OF GLOUCESTER.

THE FUNERAL OF THE VERY REV. DEAN SPENCE-JONES, OF GLOUCESTER, TOOK PLACE ON WEDNESDAY, NOV. 7TH. THE FIRST PART OF THE SERVICE, A MOST IMPRESSIVE ONE, WAS HELD IN THE CATHEDRAL. THE BODY WAS AFTERWARDS TAKEN TO MATSON CHURCHYARD FOR INTERMENT.

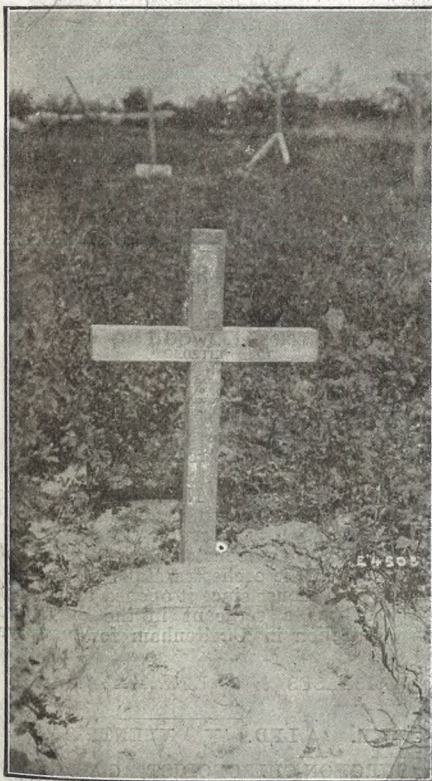

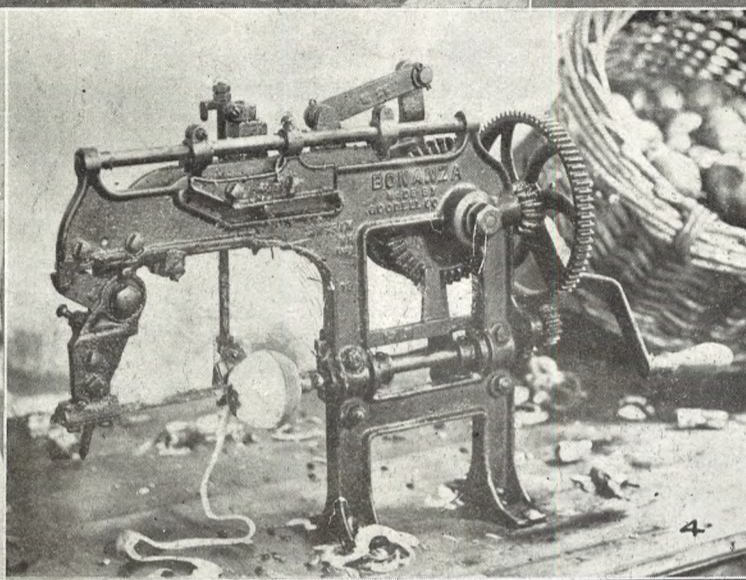
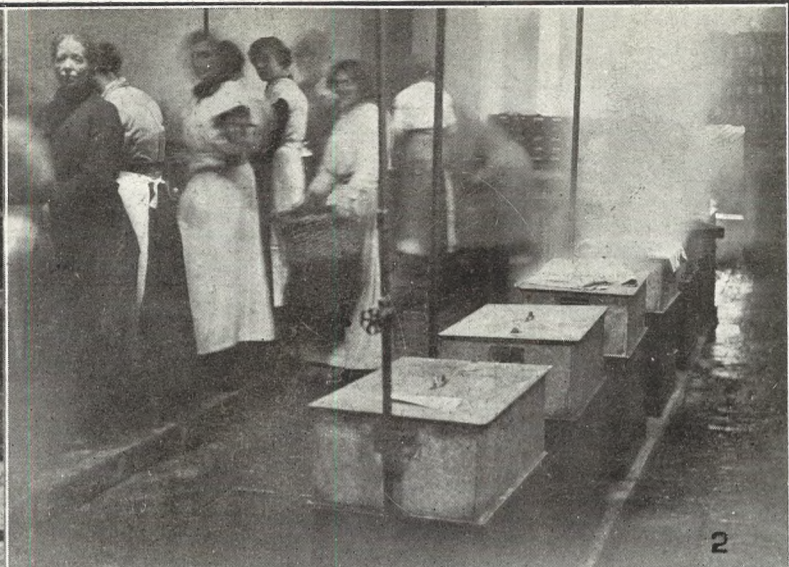

APPLE CANNING AND PULPING INDUSTRY IN CHELTENHAM.

FOLLOWING ON TO THE IMMENSE QUANTITY OF PLUMS PULPED IN CHELTENHAM DURING THE PAST SEASON FOR THE GOVERNMENT, THE STAFF ARE NOW BUSILY ENGAGED IN CANNING AND PULPING APPLES, WHICH ARE PEELED AND CORED, CUT INTO QUARTERS, PUT INTO 3LB. TINS, COOKED, AND PACKED. ALL SMALL APPLES AND RINDS AND CORES ARE PULPED, STRAINED, AND RUN INTO BARRELS FOR JAM MAKING. MANY THOUSANDS OF BARRELS ARE FULL WITH PLUMS AND APPLES AND STACKED IN THE ATHLETIC GROUND ADJOINING, AS SHOWN IN ANOTHER PHOTO IN THIS ISSUE.

- 1.—The staff.
- 2.—The apples in tins (soldered down) are inside the square boilers seen in centre.
- 3.—Putting the apples into the tins.
- 4.—A marvellous little machine used for peeling and coring the apples. Two turns of the handle finish the apple. The machine is an American one.
- 5.—Soldering the tins down. The girls are very expert at soldering.
