Gloucester Regiment, reported missing August 27, 1917, and now officially reported killed. Second son of Mr. R. J. Purnell, Donnerville, King's-road, Cheltenham.

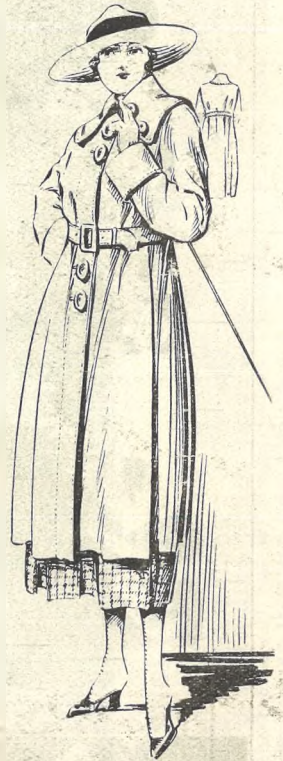

IN LONDON, WHERE MEAT RATIONS STARTED THIS WEEK, THE MEAT QUEUES HAVE ALSO DISAPPEARED. 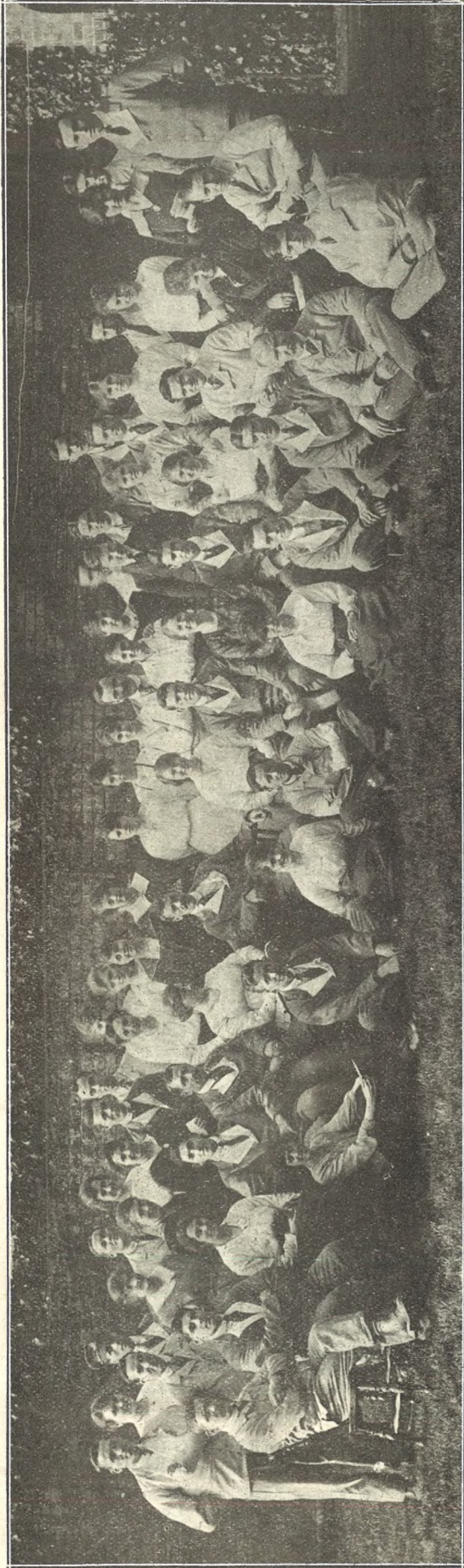

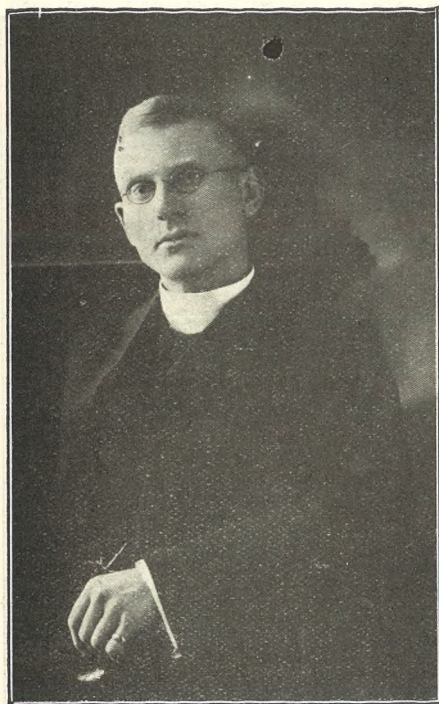

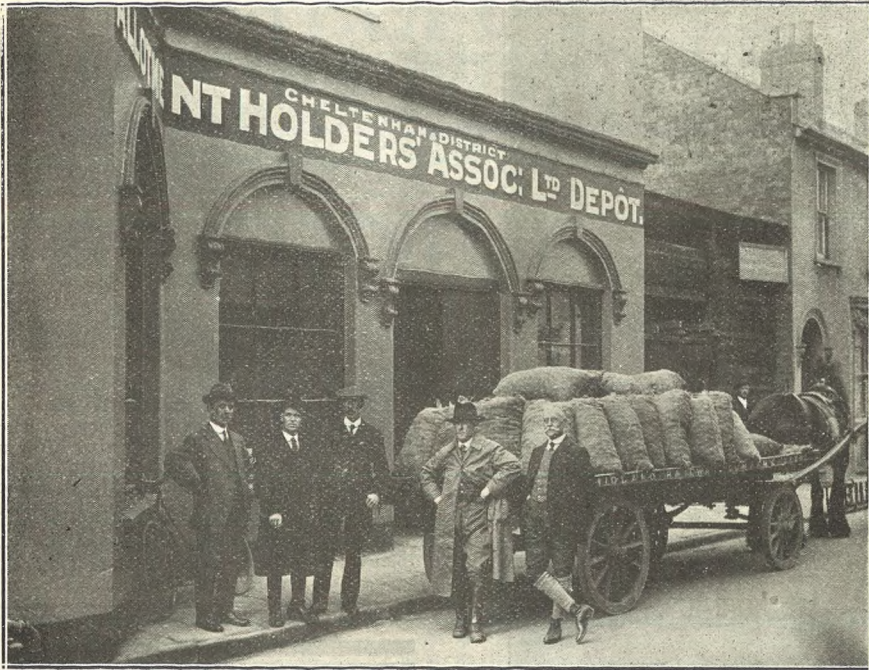

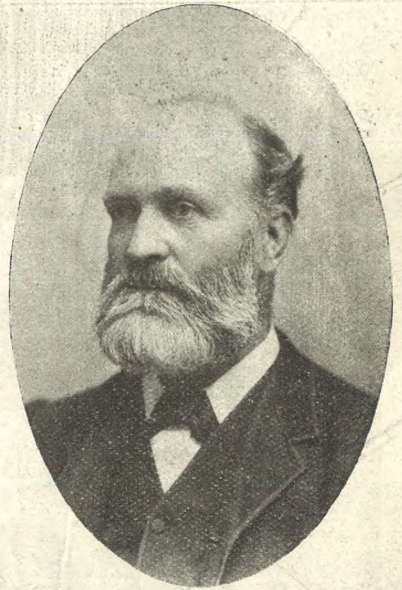
