SEC. LIEUT. J. A. V. CANT, East Surrey Regiment, missing since April 9. He enlisted in the Oxford and Bucks at the outbreak of war, transferred to Gloucesters and trained in Cheltenham. Son-in-law of Mr. S. Cowley, Knapp-road, Cheltenham, where his wife is living. Latest news is that Lieut. Cant is a prisoner of war.



SEC.-LIEUT. R. W. NORRIS, Gloucester Regiment, missing since going into action on April 10. Son of Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Norris, of St. George's-street, Cheltenham. He was a linotype apprentice at the "Echo" and "Chronicle" Office. He went to Salonika where he was slightly wounded. Now reported prisoner of war.



SERT. A. W. ("PETE") PASCOE, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action on March 21st, aged 27 years. He was an "Echo" linotypist, and joined up in the early days of the war, saw fighting in Gallipoli, being wounded, and in hospital in Cardiff for some time. Son of Mrs. F. Pascoe, of Truro, Cornwall.



PTE. SYDNEY VALLENDER, Royal Irish Rifles, killed in action abroad in the recent great battles, aged 29 years. Son of the late Mrs. Vallender, of Hartpury, and husband of Mrs. Vallender, 49 Maule Hill-parade, Cheltenham. He was a valued employee on the "Echo" staff for 14 or 15 years until called up for service.



PTE A. GIBBONS, Gloucester Regiment, officially reported missing since March 21. Any news of him would be gratefully received by his wife and parents at 6 Suffolk-road, Cheltenham.



PTE. ALBERT E. MAYO, Gloucester Regt., killed in action Jan 13, 1917, aged 29 years. Youngest son of Mrs. Mayo, 10 School-road, Charlton Kngs.

PTE. THOMAS RUSSELL, R.M.L.I., reported missing since March 24, and now known to be a wounded prisoner of war in Germany. Son of Mrs. T. Russell, Coates, Winchcombe, Glos.



PTE HUGH L. BROWNING, Essex Regt., wounded in action in the recent heavy fighting, and now in hospital at Nottingham. He was 19 on April 28, and sailed for the front on April 5. Only surviving son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Browning, St. Margaret's, Cheltenham.



PTE. H. BURFORD, Lancashire Fusiliers, died of wounds on April 20 in a Canadian Stationary Hospital, Doullens, France. Only and dearly-loved son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Burford, Eastwood Cottage, Leckhampton, Cheltenham.



PTE. A. MERRITT, Welsh Regt., died of wounds April 9. Dearly loved husband of Mrs. Merritt, Llandaff, Cardiff, and second son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Merritt, of Emlyn Lodge, Albion-street, Cheltenham, who have six other sons serving in France.



ABLE-SEAMAN A. J. WELCH, R.N. Division, died of wounds March 25, aged 31 years. Husband of Mrs. A. Welch, 56 Painswick-road, Gloucester, and third son of Mr. W. Welch, 4 Waterloo-place, Cheltenham, who has three other sons serving.

SERGT. FRANK STEEL, Killed in action April 11th, 1918, aged 23 years. Third son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Steel, Claydon House Farm, Ashchurch, and brother of Mrs. F. J. Allen, The White Horse, Swindon-road, Cheltenham.



PTE. J. W. PRICE, Shropshire L.I., died of wounds at a clearing station abroad, aged 25 years. Only son of Trooper and Mrs. Price, of Britannia-square, Fairview-street, Cheltenham. He joined the old Territorials in 1914, and was wounded once before.



PTE. STANLEY GRENOW, Somerset L.I., first reported missing, now reported killed in action on March 29th in the great German offensive. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Grenow, Hungerford Villa, St. Paul's, Cheltenham. He formerly worked for the Oriental Cafe.



PTE. W. H. LEGG, Gloucester Regt., awarded Military Medal for Distinguished Service, March 21st. He is one of the five sons of Mrs. F. Hayward, Durgrove, Fairford, all of whom have been serving their country.



PTE. CECIL E. HOWES, Grenadier Guards, prisoner of war in Germany since battle of Mons; now at Filial Lager, 1625, No. 5614E, Limburg-on-Lahn, Germany. He is the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Howes, of Cranham.



PTE. J. A. STIBBS, Oxford and Bucks L.I., killed in action Aug. 22, 1917. Son of Mr. Stibbs, hairdresser, North-street, Cheltenham, who has two other sons serving.

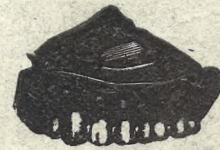

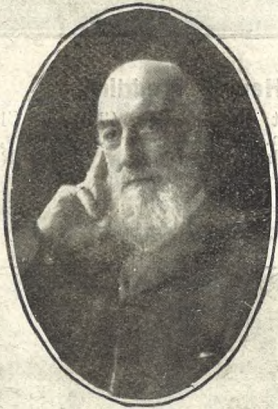

ex-Royal Gloucestershire Hussars, who died of consumption at his father's residence on April 20, aged 41 years. He served in the South African War, afterwards joining the Yeomanry, becoming musketry instructor during the present war.



Dr. E. T. Wilson, F.R.C.P.,
of Westal, Cheltenham, who died on Friday, April 19, aged 85 years. No man has done so much as he to stimulate and promote the intellectual life of the town of Cheltenham in which he has lived since 1859. He was a great science pioneer, taking extreme interest in natural science, was an enthusiastic antiquarian, a patron and constant benefactor of the Free Library and Museum, a governor of the Ladies' College, and founder of the Delancey Hospital and Victoria Home. His widow and six out of ten children survive him. He was the father of Dr. E. A. Wilson, who perished with Captain Scott on the return journey from the South Pole.

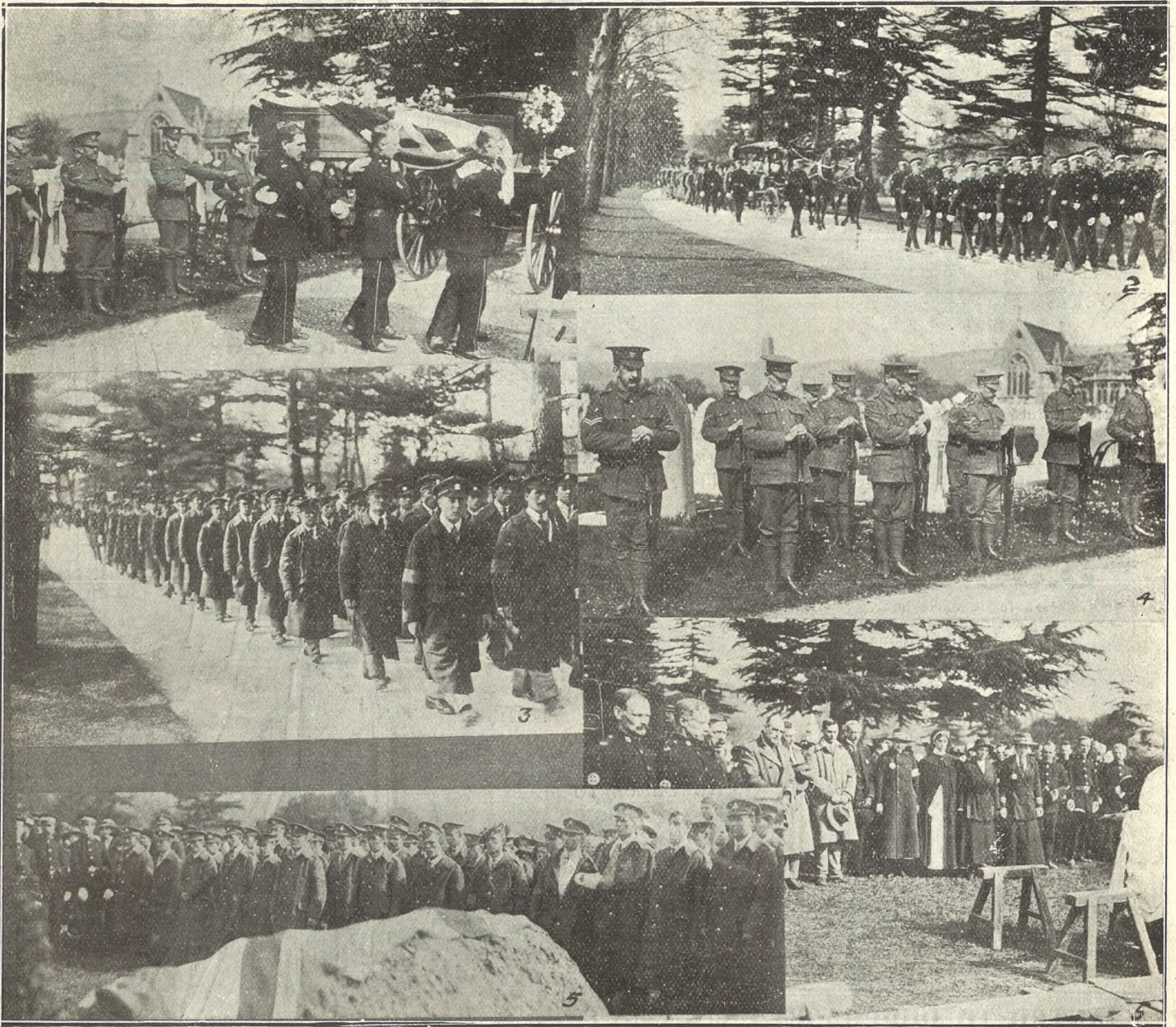

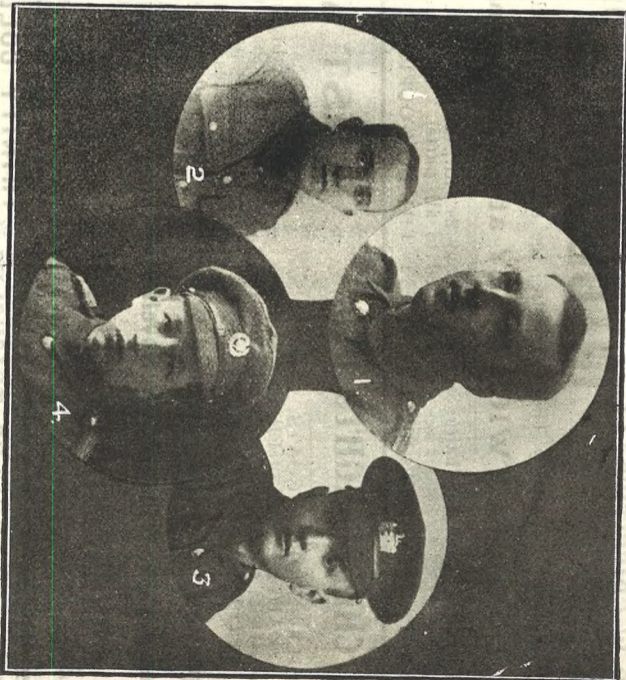

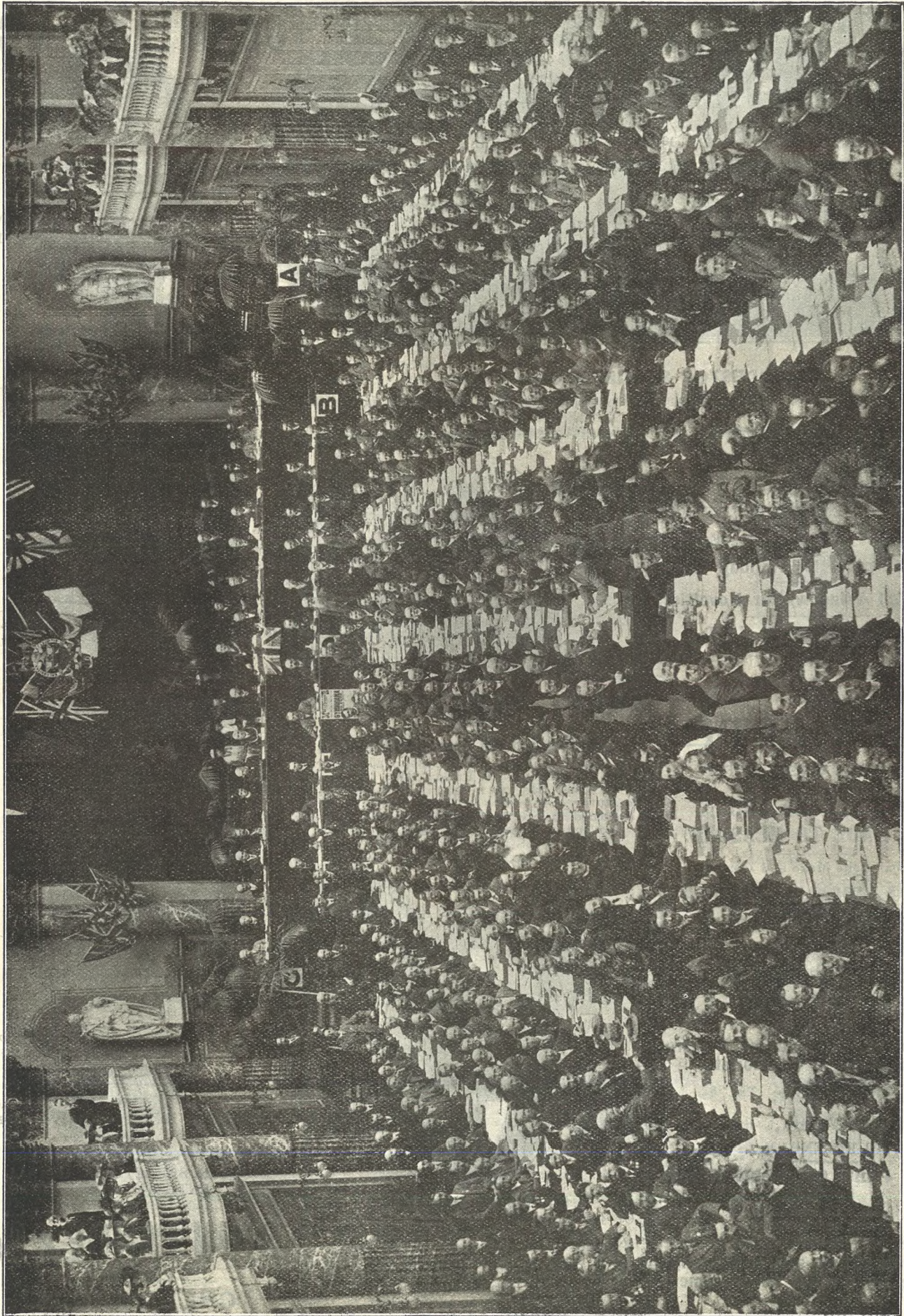
