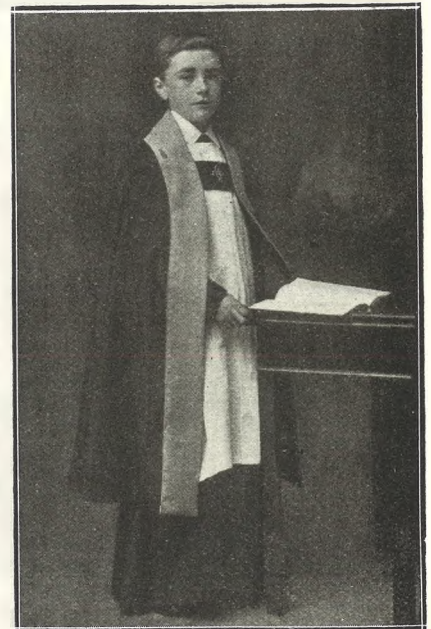

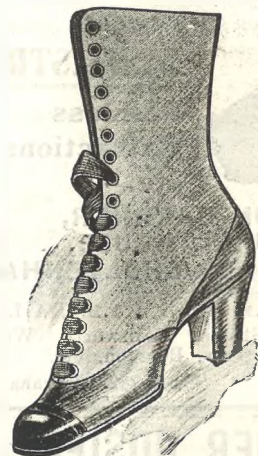



SEC.-LIEUT. R. J. SMITH, R.F.A., died of wounds received in action on April 1, 1918. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. John Smith, of Uckington, near Cheltenham. He joined the R.F.A. in August, 1914; was gazetted in Sept., 1917.



PTE. JAMES OLIVER, Machine Gun Corps (transferred from Yeomanry), reported missing March 21st, now known to be a prisoner of war. Aged 24 years. Youngest son of Mrs. Oliver, 2 Knapp-road, Cheltenham.



PTE. STANLEY OLIVER, Machine Gun Corps (transferred from Yeomanry), gassed in action, and now in Huddersfield War Hospital. Third son of Mrs. Oliver, 2 Knapp-road, Cheltenham, and brother of Pte. James Oliver (adjoining).



RFMn. J. HOWSE, Reported missing since April 15, with the Balkan Expeditionary Force. Son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Howse, Clapton-road, Bourton-on-the-Water, who would be grateful for any information of him.



PTE. EDGAR H. GROVES, Worcester Regiment, officially reported missing since April 10, after nearly three years' service abroad. Second son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Groves, Ivy House Farm, Norton, near Gloucester. His parents have since heard from him in Germany.

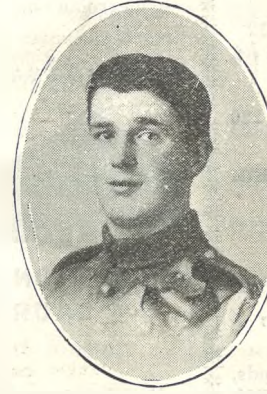

PTE. S. TURK, R.A.M.C., reported prisoner-of-war in Germany on April 9, 1918. The son of Mr. and Mrs. S. Turk, 52 New-street, Gloucester. Before enlistment he was employed by the Gloucester Wagon Company, and also belonged to St. John Ambulance from which he joined the R.A.M.C.



PTE. G. H. RACHAEL, Awarded the Military Medal for gallantry in the field. He was wounded in action on Oct. 3, 1917. Fourth son of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Rachael, Eyford, Lower Slaughter, who have three other sons serving, and had one killed on the Somme in 1916.



GNR. PERCY BARNES, Anti-Aircraft Section, killed by aeroplane bomb recently abroad, aged 21 years. Second son of Mr. and Mrs. Lambert Barnes of The Odessa, Tewkesbury-road, and formerly of The Grapes, Gloucester-place, Cheltenham. He joined up in August, 1914.

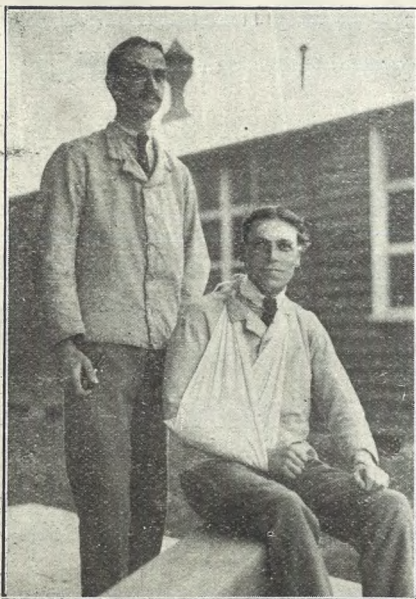
**THE "ODDS AND ENDS" V.A.D. PIERROT PARTY.**

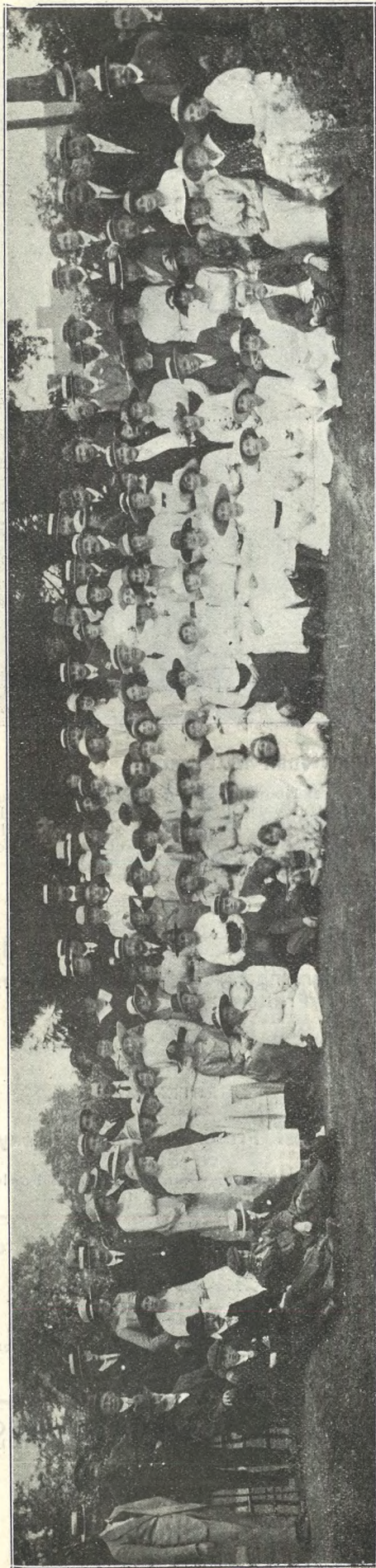

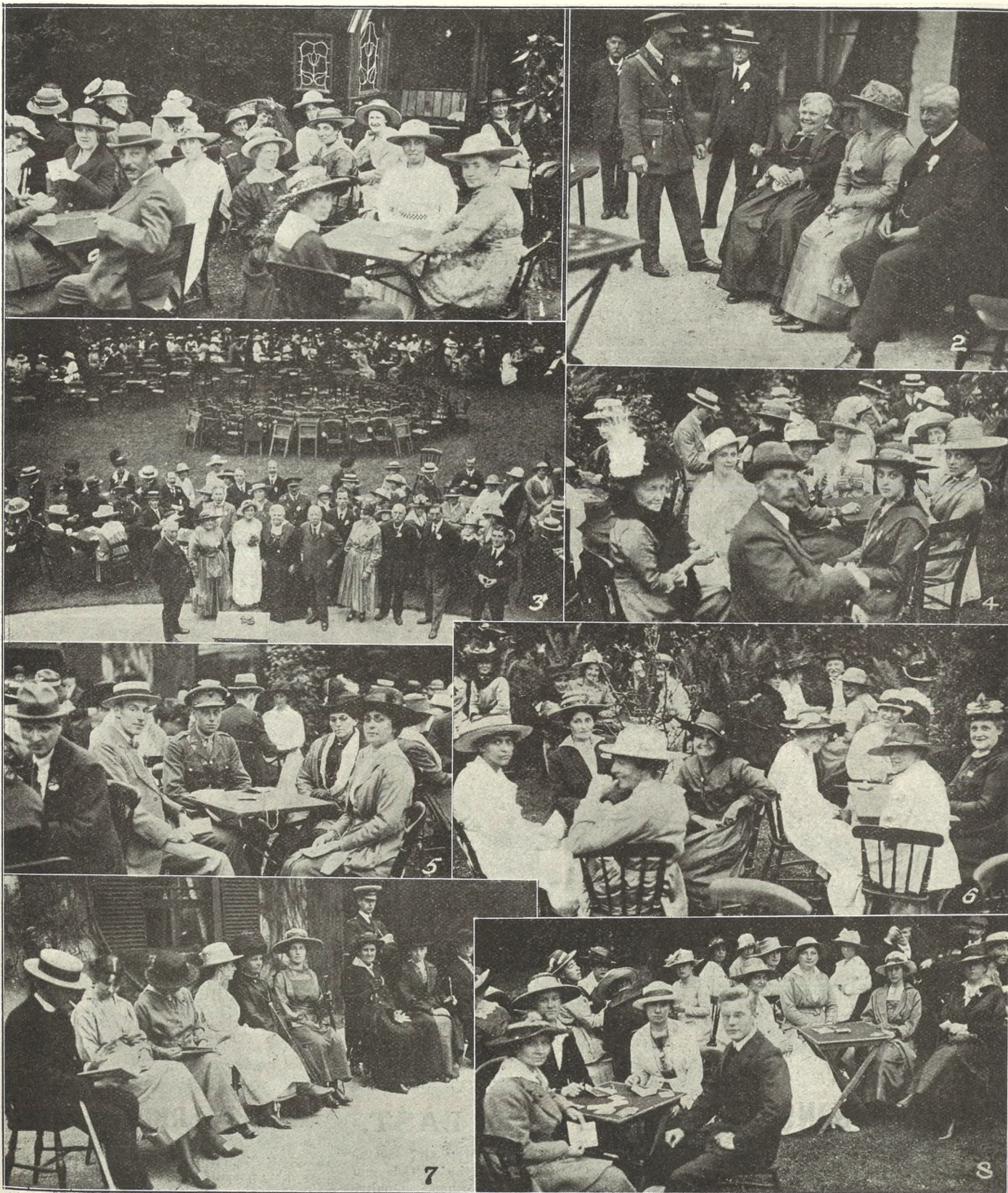

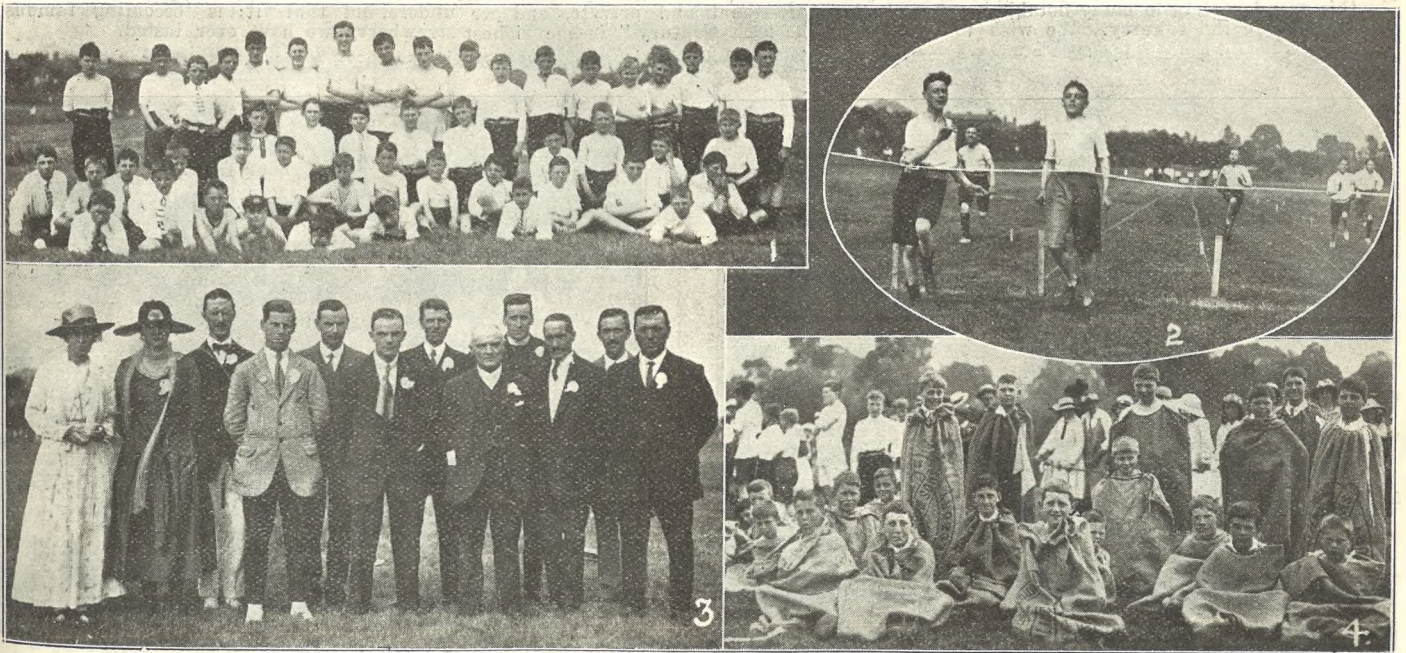

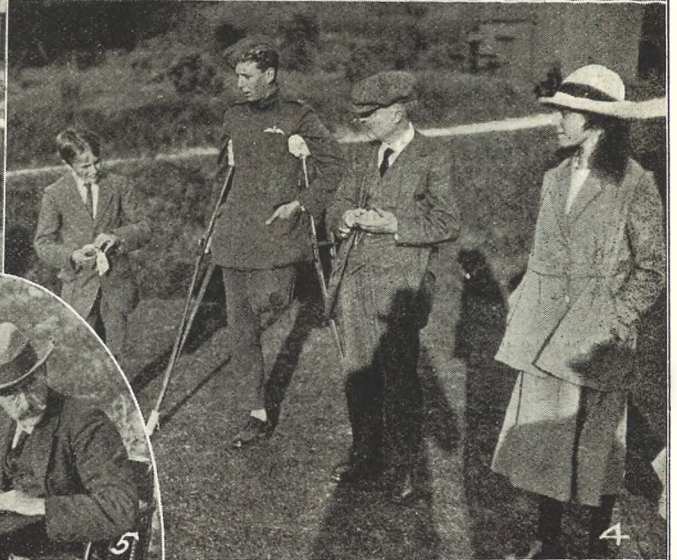

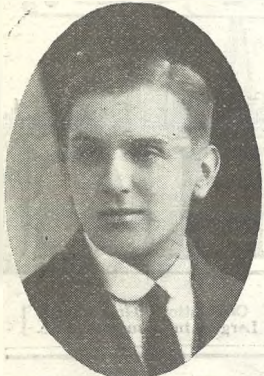
