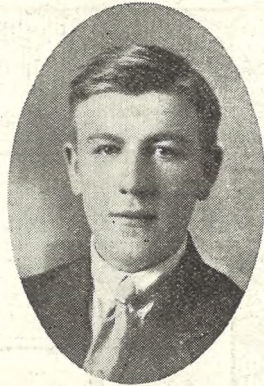
ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.

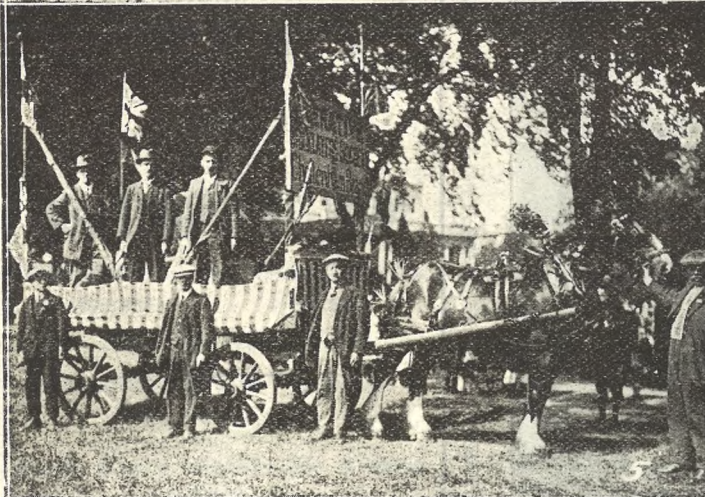

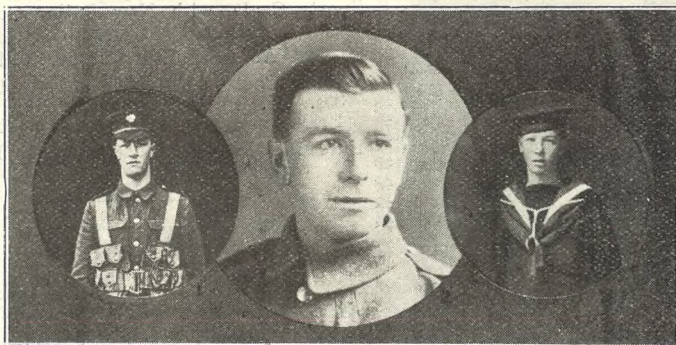

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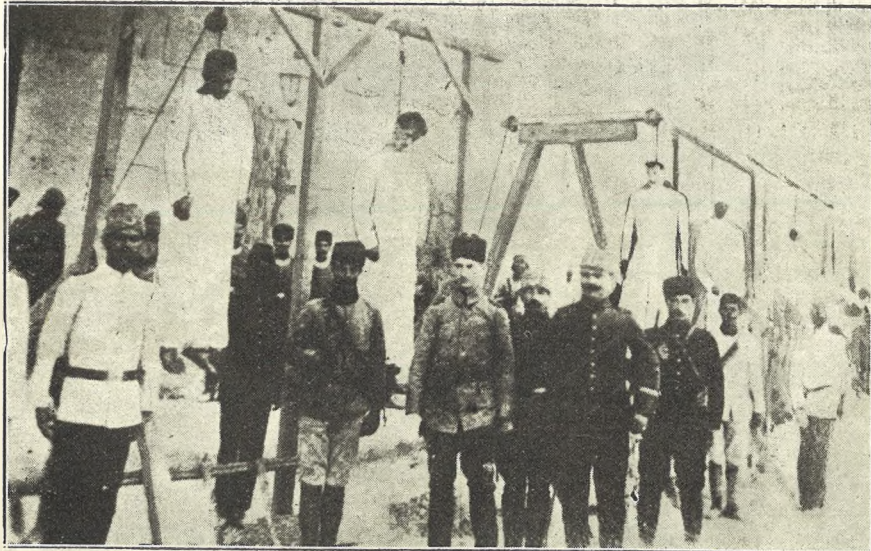


Mr. Charles Hale Jessop,

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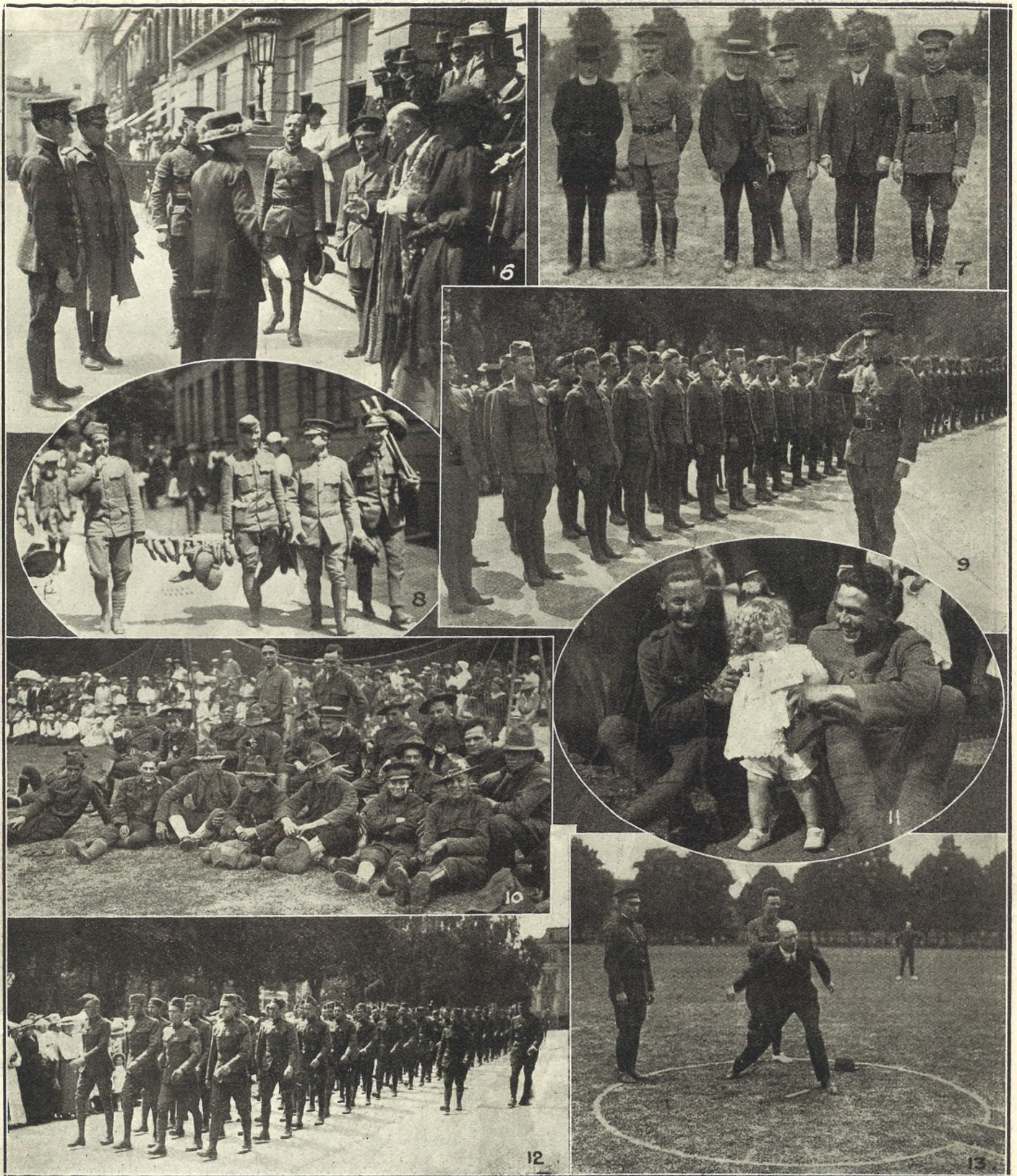
AMERICAN INDEPENDENCE DAY IN CHELTENHAM.

To prove to the Americans that we are now whole-heartedly united in one concentrated aim, practically all England celebrated on July 4th the anniversary of American Independence. The Committee to arrange hospitality to Americans in Cheltenham, under Miss Wethered, invited about 300 American soldiers to Cheltenham from a Cotswold and a Wiltshire aerodrome. Funds were obtained by the Rector, and after a service at the Parish Church all were entertained to lunch at the Town Hall, and later to tea at the College Gymnasium. 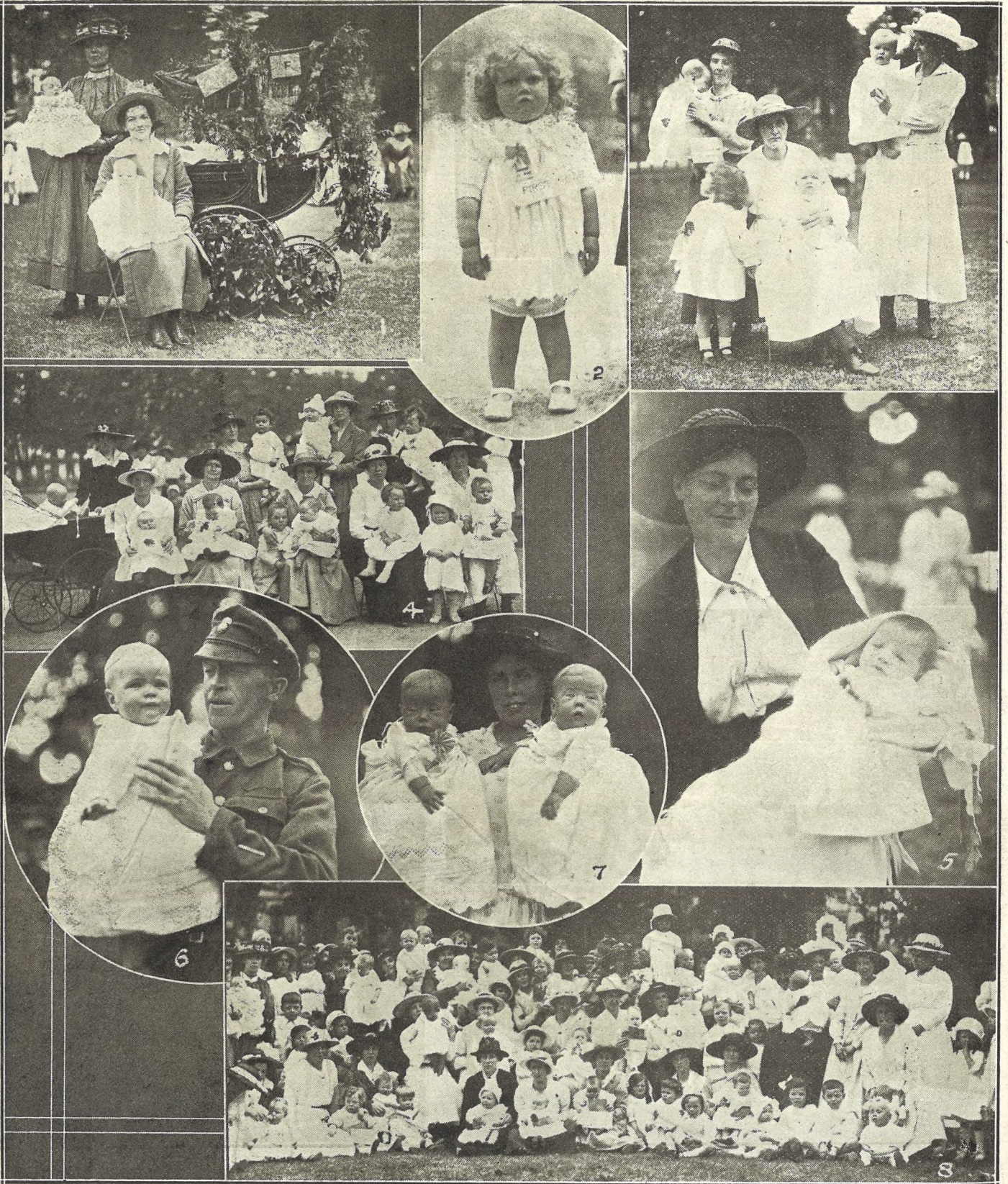

He had had much experience of flying over the Western front, having been transferred to the R.F.C. in August, 1916.



SEC. LIEUT. GEO. FREDK. DELMAR WILLIAMSON (O.C.),
Black Watch (att. R.A.F.), killed while flying over Wiltshire owing to collapse of machine, aged 19 years. Only son of Mr. and Mrs. Fredk. Delmar-Williamson, of 8 Lansdown-place, Cheltenham. He was commissioned in the Black Watch in October, 1916, transferring to the R.F.C. in April, 1917.



SEC. LIEUT. E. E. HARRIS,
Gloucester Regiment, awarded the Military Cross for bravery in action. He took charge of a bombing block during continuous fighting for over 14 hours, and prevented capture of portion of our line. He was for 15 years with Messrs. Turner, Nott and Co., the Docks, Gloucester, and was a member of the Gloucester Yeomanry when they were mobilised.

FUNERAL OF A CHELTENHAM FLYING OFFICER.

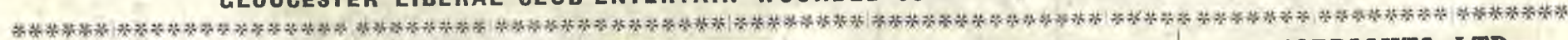

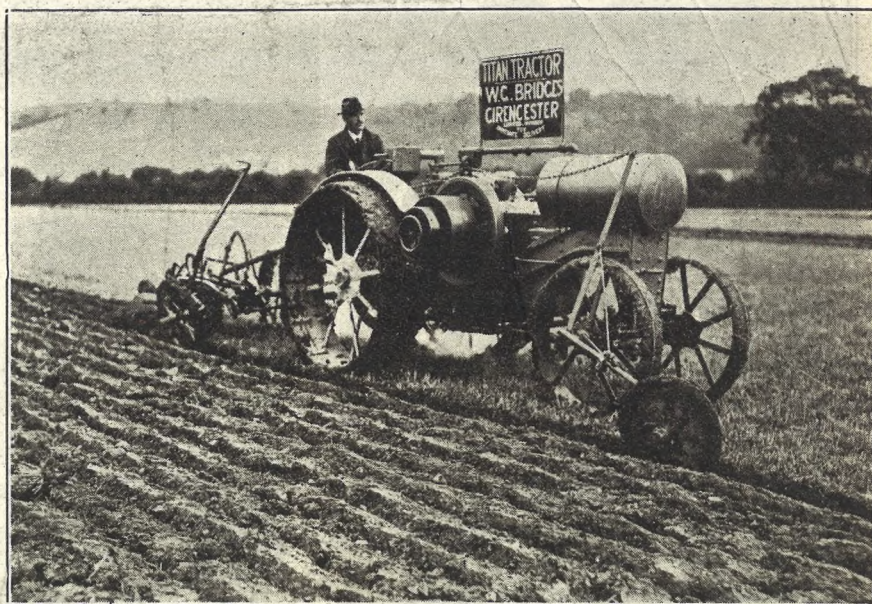

FARM TRACTOR DEMONSTRATION AT ANDOVERSFORD.

Although the use of Petrol or Paraffin engines for Ploughing can no longer be said to be a novelty, it is sufficiently new to attract a representative gathering of agriculturists, as was proved at Andoversford on Friday, the 19th instant. Mr. W. H. Bridges, of Cirencester, acting in conjunction with the International Harvester Co., of London, and Milwaukee, U.S.A., had arranged for three of the new well-known "Titan Tractors" to be on view while actually ploughing a field of two years lay on the farm of J. Clifford, Esq.

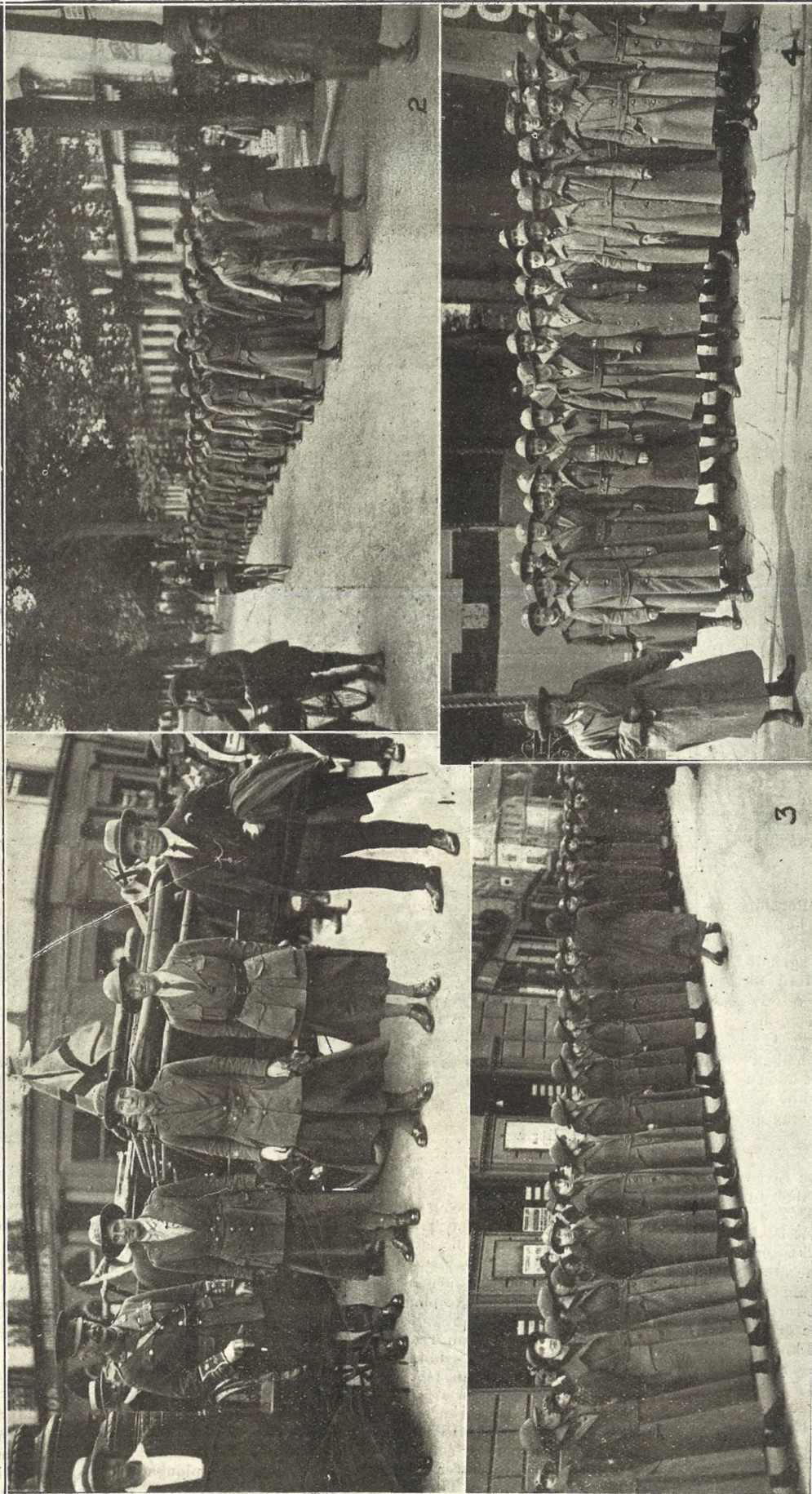


Mr. Clifford's hospitality was, we need hardly say, extended to and appreciated by many of the spectators present. The accompanying pictures were taken on the field, and show respectively the three Tractors and Ploughs in one picture and in the other a "Titan Tractor" with self-steering attachment and self-lifting three-furrow "Hamilton Plough." A representative group of spectators, in which some well-known figures will be recognised, is on the front page. Two other makes of ploughs were used behind the tractors—one "Three-Furrow Cockshutt" and a "Three-Furrow Roberts." The ease of manipulation of the Hamilton outfit was commented on by many. All the ploughs turned out excellent work, making a thoroughly sound job, leaving no

green showing, and the land in fine form for cultivating. We may say that stoppages through trouble with the "Titan Tractors" were nil in the case of two, and momentary in the third (the Hamilton combination, in which the tractor does not get a man's undivided attention). In addition to ploughing, cultivating, drilling, mowing, reaping and binding and the like, the "Titan Tractors" are fitted with a pulley for thrashing, chaff cutting, pulping, sawing, and in fact every sort of work to be met with on a farm. A recent test was made in the Cirencester district with very satisfactory results in driving a Silo plant, work requiring considerable power, and a proof of the power available was given by running the "Titan" and "Three-Furrow Cockshutt Plough" in the

high gear continuously, which means a speed of about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles an hour. At the present time prompt delivery can be given, but the need of autumn ploughing is sure to cause a shortage and those interested are advised to put their orders through without delay if they wish their tractors to be released by the Government in time to be available this fall.

The "Titan Tractors" were the winners of the Gordon Selfridge Prizes, first and second, open to the whole of England, Scotland and Wales for three months' work under the Government ploughing scheme. The acreage ploughed was respectively 354½ and 265½. The drivers and plough-operators in both cases were soldiers.

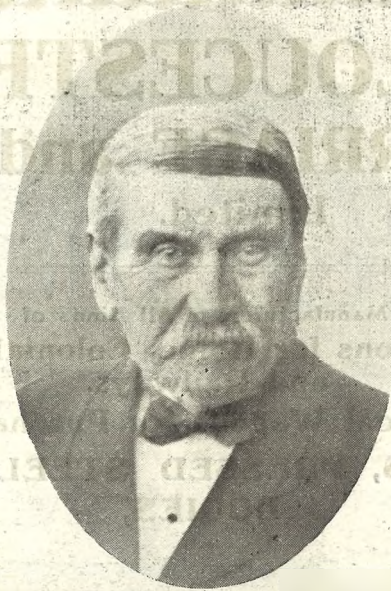

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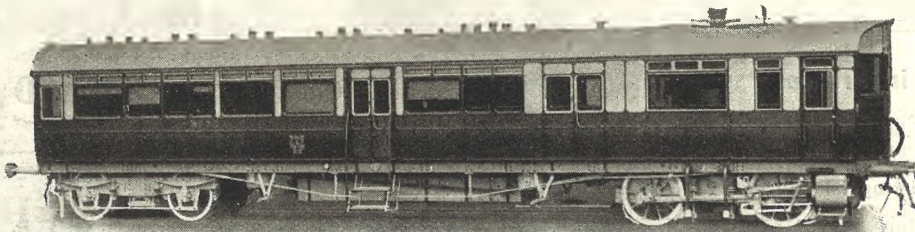
