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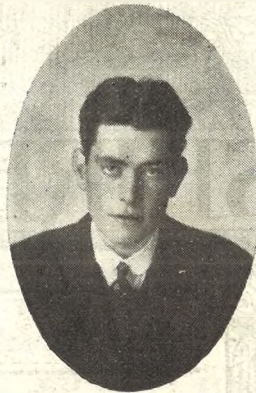
# ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



LIEUT. NEWTON VIZARD, M.G.C., awarded Military Cross and the Italian Silver Cross for gallantry in action during the big Austrian offensive on June 15th while in command of machine guns. Only son of Mr. Lewis Vizard, of Clarence-parade and St. Mark's, Cheltenham.



1st AIR MECHANIC F. G. STRANGE, R.A.F., who died on Wednesday, July 24, of pneumonia at Ipswich Military Hospital, aged 26 years. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Strange, of 5 Trinity-terrace, Cheltenham. He joined in the first few weeks of war,



PTE. SYDNEY KIDD, M.G.C. (Transport Section), died of wounds on July 20, aged 29 years. Beloved husband of Mrs. Winifred Kidd, 8 Fairfield-walk, Leekhampton, and fourth son of Mr. J. Kidd, Hanover Inn, St. Paul's, Cheltenham.



PTE. C. COLES, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action abroad, aged 24 years. He joined the local Territorials at outbreak of war. He leaves a widow and one child at 16 Duke-street, Cheltenham. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Coles, of 26 Granville street, Cheltenham.

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**Memorial to Gloucestershire Officers and Men.**  
 This memorial was erected by the 1/5th Gloucester Battalion over a trench taken on Aug. 27, 1916, in the Somme Battle, to commemorate three officers and six men who fell in taking it from the Prussian Guard. A water-colour sketch was made of the spot recently and sent to Mrs. Winterbotham, of Cranley Lodge, Cheltenham, who would be pleased to supply the next-of-kin of each man with a photograph of it on application to her. The names on the cross are: Lieut. Cyril W. Winterbotham (Cheltenham), Lieut. L. W. Mocer (Tewkesbury), Sec.-Lieut. A. Apperly (Stroud), Ptes. C. H. Bird, C. Stephenson, L. T. Aylesbury, D. Walters, G. Haydon, and S. Smith. The Germans are now in possession of the ground.

**PRISONERS OF WAR DAY IN CHELTENHAM.—GREAT SUCCESS. OVER £3,000 TAKEN.**

THE FANCY FAIR, PROCESSION, AND FETE ARRANGED IN CHELTENHAM ON BANK HOLIDAY WAS ONE OF THE GREATEST SUCCESSES EVER ACHIEVED IN THE TOWN, ESPECIALLY IN A FINANCIAL WAY. OVER 40 STALLS LINED THE BEAUTIFUL PROMENADE IN ITS ENTIRE LENGTH, ALL CROWDED WITH GOOD THINGS GIVEN BY GENEROUS FRIENDS. SOMETHING BETWEEN 8,000 AND 10,000 PEOPLE VISITED MONTELLIER GARDENS, AND THE STREETS WERE THROGGED WITH PEOPLE THE WHOLE DAY.

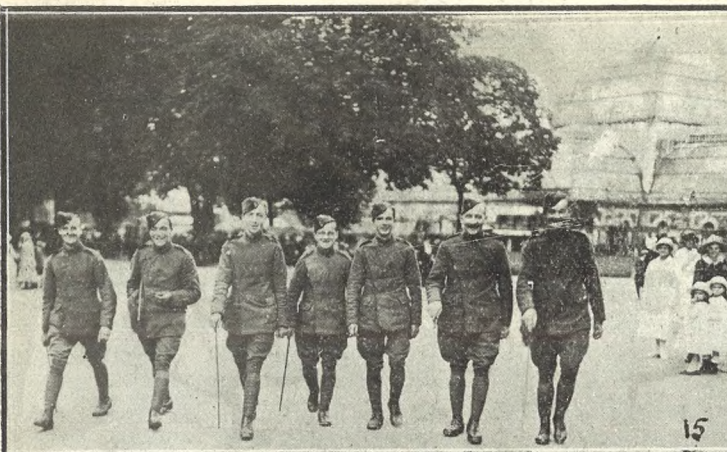


**PRISONERS OF WAR DAY IN CHELTENHAM.**

ALTHOUGH THE EARLY MORNING WEATHER WAS VERY OMINOUS, RAIN FALLING IN TORRENTS UP TO EIGHT O'CLOCK, THE FATES WERE PROPITIOUS AND THE DAY WAS FINE, ALTHOUGH GENERALLY DULL. EVERYONE WAS IN GENEROUS MOOD AND GAVE LIBERALLY, AND THE CASHIERS HAD A HARD DAY'S WORK IN COUNTING THE MONEY AND BANKING IT AS IT ROLLED IN CONTINUOUSLY. A HORTICULTURAL SHOW FOR ALLOTMENT HOLDERS, INCLUDING ALSO A SHOW OF PIGEONS, POULTRY AND RABBITS, WAS THE FEATURE AT MONTEPELLIER GARDENS.

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**PRISONERS OF WAR DAY IN CHELTHENHAM.**

A FURTHER SERIES OF SNAPS OF A MEMORABLE DAY, WHEN CHELTHENHAM, ALWAYS TO THE FORE IN GIVING TO WORTHY OBJECTS, OUTDID HER OWN GENEROSITY. THE TOTAL IS NOT EXACTLY KNOWN YET, BUT OVER £3,000 HAS BEEN ALREADY BANKED AND OTHER SUMS HAVE YET TO COME IN—ALL TAKEN ON THE DAY ALONE, AND OVER AND ABOVE THE SUBSCRIPTIONS TO THE "ECHO" FUND, WHICH NOW STANDS AT OVER £2,500. THE PARCELS COST OVER £400 PER MONTH TO SEND TO LOCAL PRISONERS. SO THAT THE DOUBLE TOTAL WILL KEEP THEM GOING ANOTHER YEAR AT LEAST.

**PRISONERS OF WAR DAY IN CHELTENHAM.**

A BIG FEATURE OF THE DAY WAS A PROCESSION OF DECORATED CARS, CARTS, BICYCLES, WHEELCHAIRS AND PEDESTRIANS IN FANCY DRESS, ORGANISED BY MISS PLATT. THEY ASSEMBLED IN WELLINGTON SQUARE AND TRAVERSED THE ROUTE THENCE TO MONTYELLIER GARDENS. THE WHOLE COURSE WAS THROGGED WITH SPECTATORS, AND THE PROCESSION WAS WELL WORTH SEEING. PRIZES WERE NOT GIVEN, ONLY BANNERS BEING THE TROPHIES, WHICH WERE, HOWEVER, QUITE AS KEENLY COMPETED FOR.

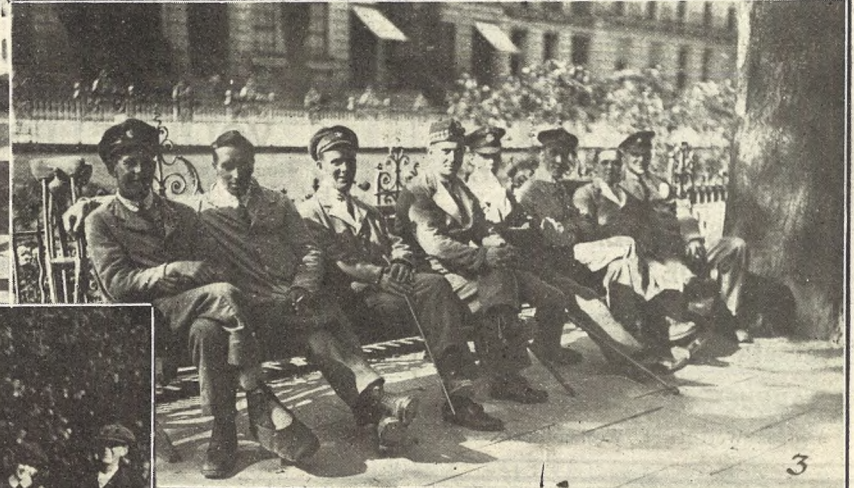
