SEC. LIEUT. F. E. HALE, King's Royal Rifles, killed instantaneously in action on Aug. 25 by a machine-gun bullet in the head. Third, and only surviving son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Hale, of Cotteswold-place, Tewkesbury.



PTE. T. H. SHURMER, Royal Marines, reported missing on March 27, now a prisoner of war in Germany and in good health. Husband of Mrs. Shurmer, 12 Croft-street, Cheltenham.



PTE. W. ASHCROFT, Loyal North Lancs., killed in action on July 30, 1918, after two years' service abroad. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Ashcroft, of 213 High-street, Cheltenham, and nephew of the late Mr. Ashcroft, pork butcher.



PTE. THOMAS DAVIS, Machine Gun Corps, killed in action on Aug. 23, aged 19 years. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Davis, confectioner, of 300 High-street, Cheltenham.

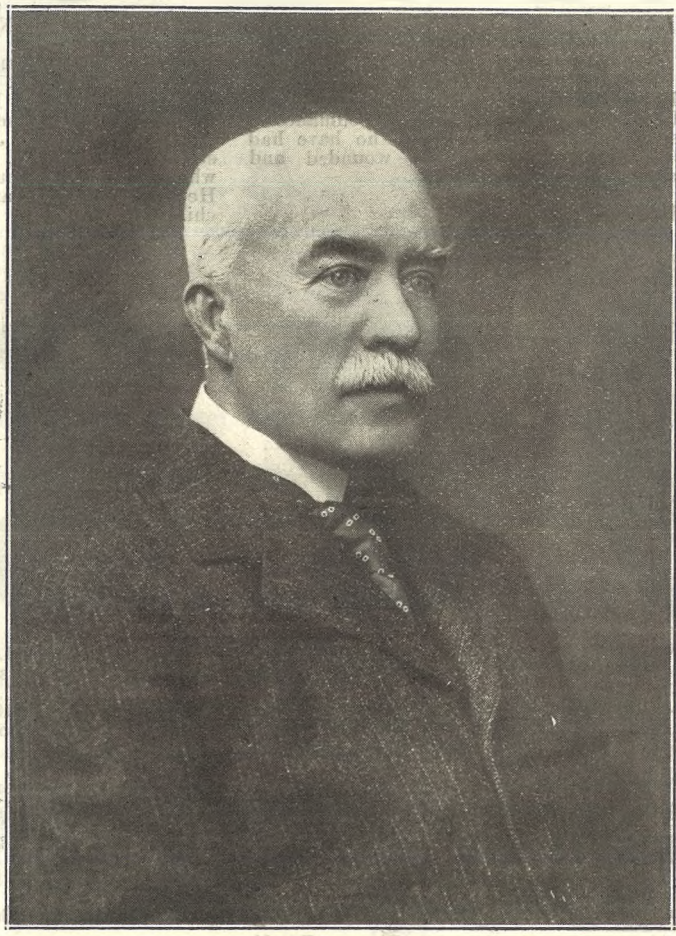

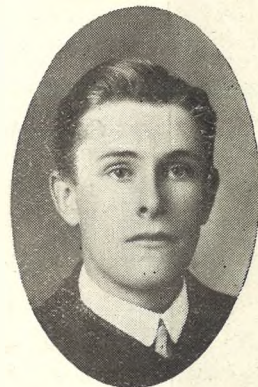

ELECTRIFIED WHEAT.

BETTER CROPS.

The results of the first two threshings of electrified corn are announced by Mr. H. H. Dunn, seed specialist, of Salisbury.

The electrification consists of soaking the seed in a weak solution of common salt or calcium chloride, passing a comparatively small electric current through the grain in soak for a few hours, and then slowly drying it in a kiln.

Wheat grown at Ford St. Cleer, Liskeard, Cornwall, says Mr. Dunn, showed 28 per cent. increase on grain and 40 per cent. on straw. Oats grown at Moreton, near Dorchester, showed a gain of 61 per cent. on grain.

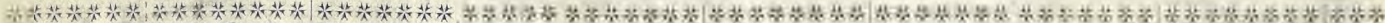

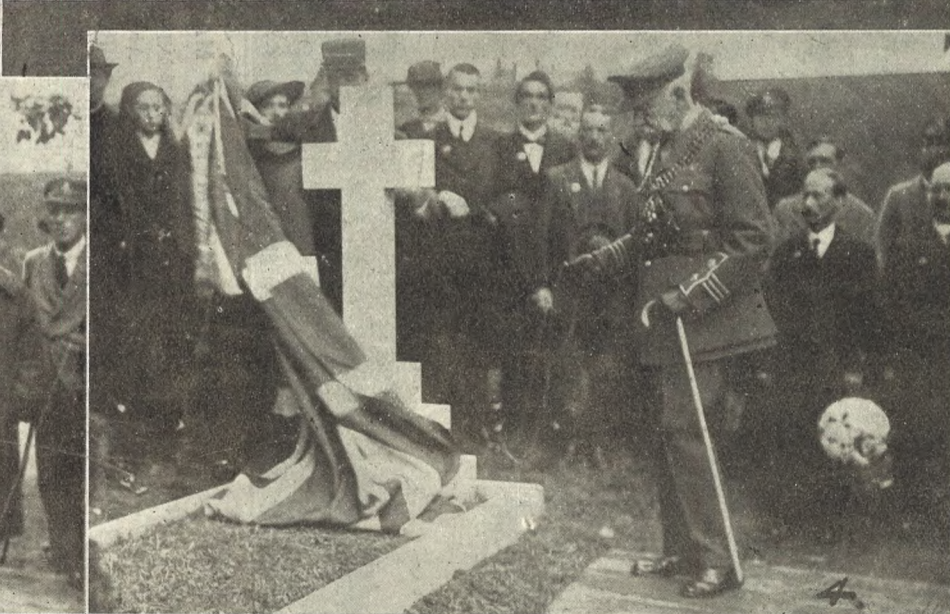

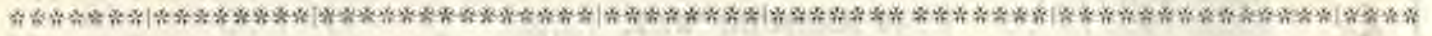
