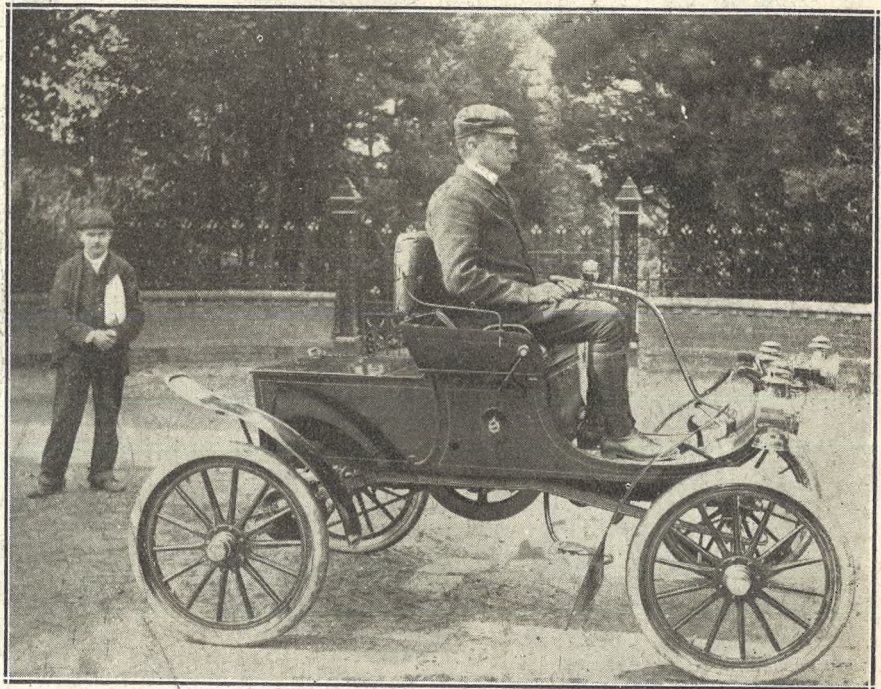
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RELICS OF THE PAST.

He has his bundle of "Echoes" under his arm, and was quite one of the best known residents in the South Ward, with his stentorian bass voice as he cried the "Echo" and "Chronicle and Graphic."

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ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



SEC-LIEUT. REG. LEWIS, Worcester Regiment, died of pneumonia in India, aged 24 years. Only son of Mr. W. G. Lewis, Midland-road, Gloucester. Prior to joining up in Sept., 1914, he was on the editorial staff of the "Gloucester Citizen."



EDWARD JOHN TAYLOR, Late of S. W. Borderers, who died on Oct. 16, the result of injuries sustained in the war, aged 31 years. Only son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Taylor, of Apple Tree Inn, Cheltenham. He came home from New Zealand to enlist at outbreak of war, and was wounded, gassed and buried, being eventually sent home with shell-shock.



L-CORPL. GEORGE W. STEVENS, 8th Gloucester R. wounded in right thigh. In March, 1918, returned to France, and while with 2/5th Gloucesters was awarded M.M. on April 24 for gallantry as stretcher-bearer. His home was 8 Townsend-street, Cheltenham, and he was captain of St. Paul's Football Team until war broke out.



PTE. WILFRED BULLOCK, M.G.C., severely wounded on Oct. 3 and died on Oct. 4 in a casualty clearing station. He joined up at 18 years of age, and had seen 8 months' service in France. Only surviving son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Bullock, 7 Marsh-lane, Cheltenham. He was an employee of Messrs. R. E. and C. Marshall.



GNR. ALBERT G. ROBINS, R.F.A., died of wounds on Oct. 12 at a casualty clearing station, aged 41 years. Third son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Robins, of Walton Hill, Deerhurst, Tewkesbury. His home was at Portfield, Chichester, where he leaves a widow and four children.



PTE. A. WINSTONE, Devon Regiment, killed in action on Oct. 12. He had been wounded twice previously, and had done four years' service. He leaves a widow and son, and was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Winstone, Brizon Cottage, Shurdington-road, Cheltenham.



EDWARD W. BARNETT, Late of 7th Gloucesters, died of pneumonia recently at his home. He joined Kitchener's Army in 1914, and was discharged unfit in 1917. Eldest son of Mr. W. H. Barnett, Bedford Cottage, Prestbury-road Cheltenham.



PTE. A. R. W. VENTRIS FIELD, Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, severely wounded in action on Oct. 3rd, aged 18 years. Third son of Mr. A. J. Ventris Field, of 6 Rodney-place, Cheltenham. One of his brothers has been killed in action.



SADDLER W. SLIM, R.F.A., died of bronchial pneumonia in Italy on Oct. 17, aged 21 years. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Slim, 11 Albert-st., Gloucester, who have another son (Reginald), twice wounded, now in hospital in Kent.



PTE. W. G. RUCK, Gloucester Regiment, killed in action on Sept. 30, aged 21 years. Second son of Mr. W. Ruck, 8 Keynsham-street, Cheltenham.

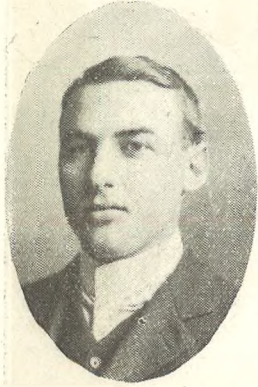


PTE. GILBERT S. GRIFFIN, Worcester Regiment, who died in hospital at Le Treport on Sept. 29 from wounds received in action. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. S. Griffin, 1 Clement street, Gloucester. His parents attended his funeral in France.



PTE. ALEX BASSETT, Grenadier Guards, wounded in action on Sept. 27, and now in hospital in France. Husband of Mrs. Bassett, 5 Marle Hill-road, Cheltenham. Previous to joining the Army in Dec., 1916, he was in business as a fruit merchant.

VICTIMS OF INFLUENZA.



MR. W. H. BATES, Checker at the Old Bank (Lechmere's), Tewkesbury, who died on Saturday, Oct. 26 after a week's illness, from complications following influenza, aged 32 years. He was formerly of High Wycombe, where he was interred on Oct. 30th.



MR. EDWARD HARRY SMITH, Of Cozgrig, St. George's-road, Cheltenham, who died of pneumonia on Oct. 21, aged 43 years. He had carried on the business of a pork butcher at 280 High-street since his father's death, and he leaves a widow and one daughter.



P.C. WM. F. BAYLIS, Of Tewkesbury, who died of pneumonia following influenza on Oct. 23, aged 31 years. He had been formerly stationed at Coombe Hill, Charlton Kings, and Cheltenham. His home was at Staunton, near Gloucester.



MR. SAMUEL HOPKINS, Of 9 Bloomsbury street, Cheltenham, who died of pneumonia on Oct. 11 after a short illness, aged 43 years. He was for nearly 19 years employed by the Cheltenham Gas Company



MR. ERNEST DAVIS Of 9 Ewlyn-terrace, Cheltenham, who died on Oct. 25 from pneumonia, aged 29 years. He was the youngest son of Mrs. E. M. Davis and the late Mr. Thomas Davis.



MR. TOM T. DENLEY, Of 305 High-street, Cheltenham, who died on Oct. 29, aged 62 years. He had kept a coffee-house for over 30 years, and was much respected by his customers and neighbours. He leaves a widow and one daughter.

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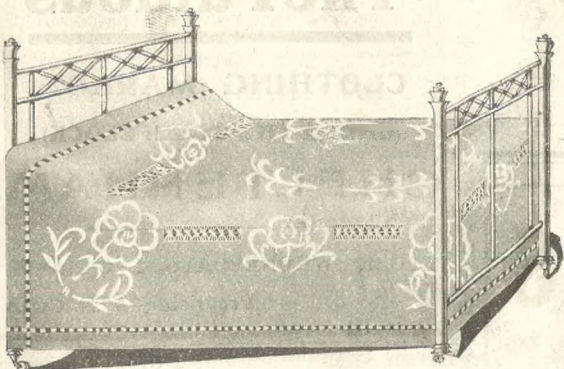

ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



CAPT. EBEN ARCHIBALD BOYLE, M.C., Canadian Battalion, died on Oct. 1st at a casualty clearing station from wounds received in action on Sept. 29, aged 33 years. He was the second son of the late Mr. E. B. Boyle, of 329 High-street, Cheltenham, and of Mrs. Boyle, 6 Clarence-square. He gained his commission on the field in Jan., 1917, and the M.C. at Vimy Ridge, April 19, 1917.



SEC.-LIEUT. PERCY SIMMONS, Wilts Regiment, killed in action in France recently. Son of Mrs. Simmons, Hazeldene, Lysons avenue, Gloucester. He was an old Sir T. Rich's boy. He had been wounded three times, and had only returned to France on Sept. 11 after gaining his commission.



SEC.-LIEUT. FRANK LUKER, R.A.F., who died at Buckingham from malarial fever. He was the youngest son of Mr. J. Luker, 3 Arthur-street, Gloucester. He had served since Sept., 1914, in the 9th Gloucesters and was in Greece with them. After gaining a commission in the 11th Somerset L.I. he became a pilot in the R.A.F.



LIEUT. PETER HOPCRAFT, Pilot, R.A.F., killed in action on Oct. 28, aged 19 years. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. G. P. Hopcraft, of Southam, near Cheltenham. He obtained his wings in Aug., 1917, and was specially selected for Handley-Page flying in Oct., 1917. He piloted many raids over German towns, and was killed in a raid.



PIONEER HUBERT BREWSTER, R.E., died of pneumonia abroad on Oct. 25, aged 43 years. Third son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Brewster, of 114 Fairview-road, Cheltenham. He leaves a widow and four children at 17 Marle Hill-parade. He was formerly head-boots at the Royal Hotel.



L. CORPL. C. S. TOWNSEND, R.E., died of pneumonia on Oct. 25 at a casualty clearing station in France, aged 26. He leaves a widow and daughter, and was the second son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Townsend, Hereford House, Suffolk-st., Leckhampton, to lose his life on the Western front.



PTE. F. L. PARKER, Grenadier Guards, killed in action on Oct. 20th. Eldest son of Mr. Frank Parker, Darke's Farm, Prestbury. He had been previously gassed twice. He joined up in March, 1917. Brother of Pte. E. E. Parker, killed in action on Oct. 5th, 1917. His father is chairman of the Prestbury Parish Council.



SERT. LESLIE SURMAN, M.M. and BAR, Killed in action on Oct. 14th. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Surman, of Woodmancote, Cleeve Hill. He was in the office of the Medical Officer of Health, Cheltenham, when he joined up at outbreak of war; and gained the M.M. at Cambrai on Dec. 4, 1917, later gaining bar to same.



PTE. JACK MUSTOE, Royal Warwick Regt., wounded in action on Oct. 20, and now in hospital at Birkenhead, aged 18 years. Third son of Mr and Mrs. W. Mustoe, 69 St. George's-place, Chelt.



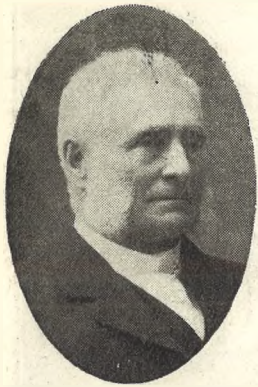
GUNNER ARTHUR SMITH, Late R.F.A., who died on Oct. 24, aged 24 years. Youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Smith, 36 Glenfall-street, All Saints', Cheltenham.



PTE. CHAS. FOXWELL, Lancs. Fusiliers, who died of severe wounds Sept. 25th at 3rd General Hospital, Le Treport, France. He was the second son of the late Mr. Sidney E. Foxwell, 2 Cudnall-street, Charlton Kings.



PTE. LIONEL KING, Devon Regiment, awarded the Military Medal for gallantry in the field. Son of Mr. and Mrs. C. King, of 15 Upper Norwood-street, Cheltenham.



DR. WILLIAM POWELL,
M.R.C.S.,
Of 1 Segrave-place, Cheltenham who died on Nov. 2, aged 84 years. He was the doyen of the medical profession in the town, having practised here for 48 years. He was the M.O. to the Police Force and to the Postmen's Federation, and was a zealous Freemason.



MR. ERNEST S. JOHNS,
Of Lennox House, The Spa, Gloucester, who died on Nov. 4th of pneumonia. He leaves a widow and four children. He was a member of the firm of Johns and Son, and was interested in various shipping concerns. He was an ardent Liberal, and was treasurer of Northgate Wesleyan Church.

(O.C.),
S. and T. Corps, who died at Sealkote, Punjab, on Nov. 3, of pneumonia, aged 48 years. He married Miss Noyes, of Thruxton, St. Stephen's-road, Cheltenham, and leaves her with two children—a son aged 10 and a daughter 3 years old.

Of St. Arvans, Chepstow, who died suddenly of heart failure while dining with a friend on Nov. 1, aged 41 years. He was an officer in the Royal Gloucestershire Hussars until 1911, since when he has been in the Territorial Reserve.

THE CROSS ERECTED IN MEMORY OF THE MEN OF CIRENCESTER WHO HAVE GIVEN THEIR LIVES TO THEIR KING AND COUNTRY WAS DEDICATED BY THE BISHOP OF GLOUCESTER IN A VERY IMPRESSIVE SERVICE ON THURSDAY, OCTOBER 31. IT IS THE GIFT OF MR. THOS. AND THE HON. MRS. KINGSCOTE, AND IS A MOST ARTISTIC CONCEPTION IN CLIPSHAM STONE, 23 FEET HIGH, DESIGNED BY MR. J. N. COMPER, OF LONDON.

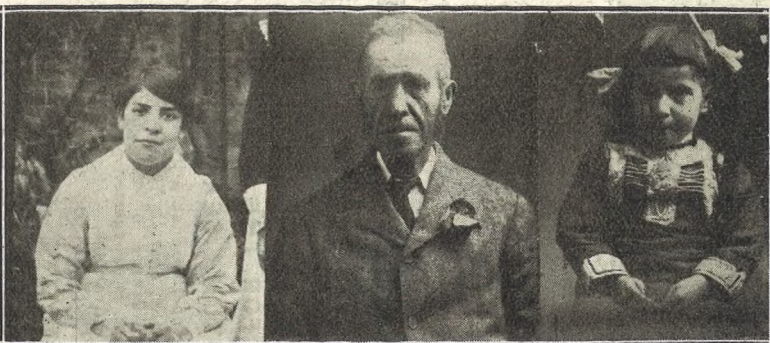
A Cheltonian in Malta.

INFLUENZA VICTIMS.

THREE DEAD IN ONE HOUSE IN THREE DAYS.

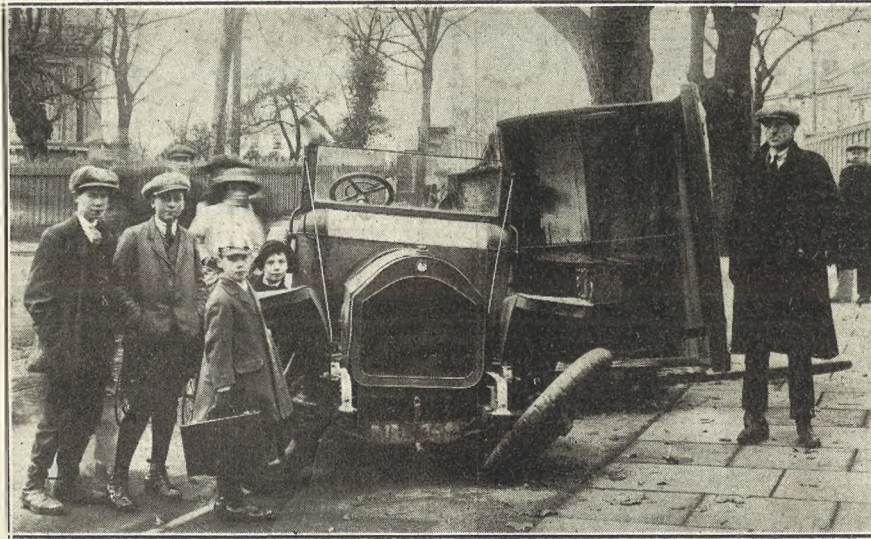

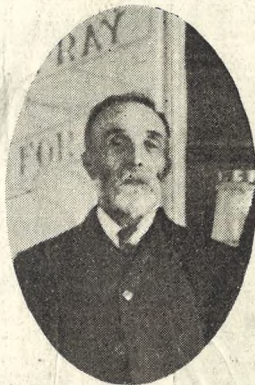
MAIL VAN ACCIDENT.

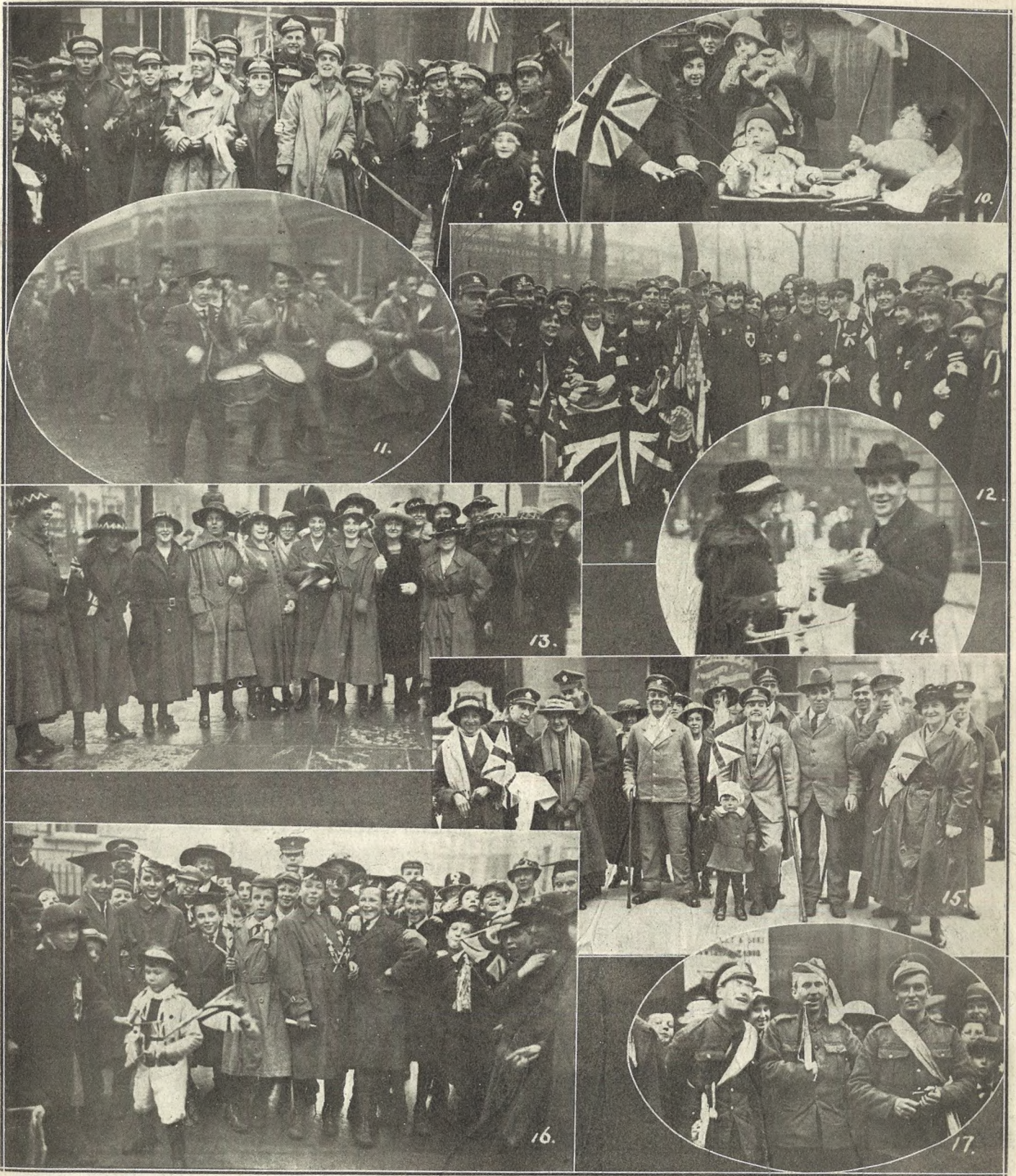

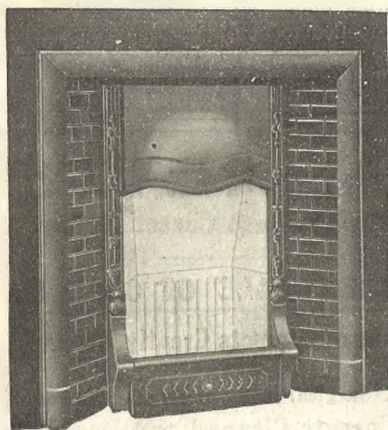

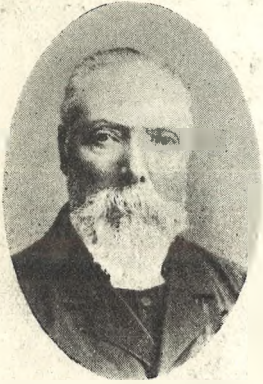

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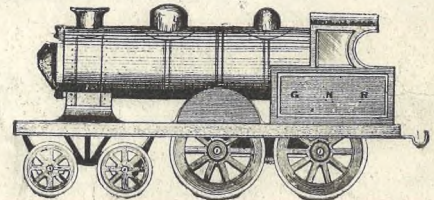
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THREE CHELTENHAM SOLDIERS PRISONERS OF WAR.

Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Finch, 13 Albert-place, Pittville, Cheltenham. He was called up at the outbreak of war with the local "Ferriers," and has been wounded three times. Directly after being wounded this time he volunteered and gave a pint of his blood to save the life of a badly wounded K.R. Rifleman.

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THREE CHELTENHAM BROTHERS SACRIFICED.

The three sons of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Skeen, 13 Waterloo-street, all of whom have given their lives to the service of their King and country. Two other sons are still serving, one in Salonika and one in France.

- 1.—Pte. Tom Skeen, Royal West Kent Regiment, killed in action Sept. 24, 1918, in France.
- 2.—Pte. James Skeen, 3rd Hampshire Regiment, att. 2/4th Hants, wounded and missing, July 25th, 1918. Nothing has been heard from him or of him by his mother since that date, and she would be very grateful for any information of him.
- 3.—Pte. John Skeen, Lancashire Fusiliers, died from exposure to heat in Egypt, May 24, 1916. He was found dead after being missing five days.
