ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



PTE. T. C. CHERRINGTON, 63 R.N. Div., M.G.C., died from accidental gunshot wounds at 39 Stationary Hospital, in the field, Nov. 23, aged 19 years. He was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. T. Cherrington, 2 Flaxley Hill-cottages, Charlton Kings, Cheltenham. He had seen two years and eight months' service, ten months in France, and had been wounded once.



GUNNER R. E. TIMMS, Household Siege Battery (transferred from R.H.G.), died of shell gas wounds at 39 Stationary Hospital, France, on June 29. Husband of Mrs. Maud Timms, Earlswood, Old Bath-road, Cheltenham, and eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. F. Timms, Home Farm, Broadwell.



TROOPER WALTER C. TIMMS, Q.O. Oxfordshire Hussars, killed in action on Aug. 10th after nearly four years' service. Husband of Mrs. E. Timms, Broadwell Manor, Moreton-in-Marsh, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Timms, of Home Farm, Broadwell, and brother of Gunner R. E. Timms.



PTE. LEWIS WILLIAMS, 8th Gloucester Regiment, died suddenly in France on Nov. 11th, after serving over three years on active service without being touched, aged 27 years. Youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Williams, 1 Mansfield-place, Charlton Kings, who had already lost two sons and a son-in-law in the war.



PTE. H. P. BIRD, 1st R.M.L.I., killed in action on Sept. 30 by the bursting of a shell in the attack on Cambrai. He was for six years at Woodchester M.R. Station until he was released by the company to join up; and was the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. S. Bird, Forest Green, Woodchester.



CORPL. A. V. DYER, 1/5th Gloucester Regt., killed in action on Oct. 10, in France. He fought in France, then in Italy, and as late as September came back to France. His home is at Great Washbourne, Beckford, near Tewkesbury, where he leaves a widow and one son.



PTE. CYRIL G. LLOYD, Hampshire Regiment, died of pneumonia on Nov. 27th, in No. 4 Canadian Hospital, Rouen, aged 28 years. He was the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. R. Lloyd, 46 Courtenay-street, Cheltenham. He had seen nearly two years' active service in France.



L. CORPL. W. R. COSIER, 8th Gloucester Regiment, died of pneumonia, following influenza, on Nov. 17, at 5th General Hospital, Rouen, aged 37 years. Only son of the late Thomas R. Cosier, 35 Queen-street, Cheltenham, an Indian Mutiny veteran, and of Mrs. Cosier.



CORPL. F. DENNETT, A.S.C., died of influenza on Nov. 9th at a casualty clearing station in France. Husband of Mrs. Dennett, 12 St. Philip's-terrace, Cheltenham, and only son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Dennett, East Tytherley, Hants. He had served four years in France.



PTE. H. T. BARNES, 8th Gloucester Regt., died of wounds on Nov. 2, at General Hospital, Boulogne, aged 34 years. Second son of Mr. and Mrs. Barnes, Longfurlong, Gotherington, near Cheltenham. He was an old G.W.R. employee.



PTE. A. E. ROBINSON, M.M., Awarded the Military Medal for gallantry on the field. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. T. Robinson, Station-rd., Swindon. He joined Kitchener's Army soon after outbreak of war, before which he was at the Gloucester Wagon Works.



PTE. CHARLES ELLIOTT, Royal Fusiliers (3rd London Regiment), killed in action or died of wounds on Sept. 1, aged 25 years. Brother of Mrs. Heeks, Belmont House, Winchcombe-street, Cheltenham.

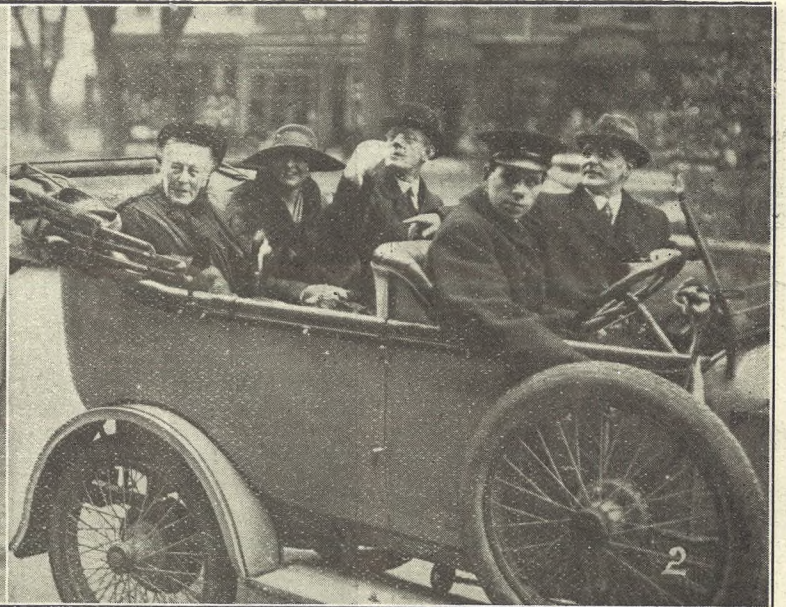

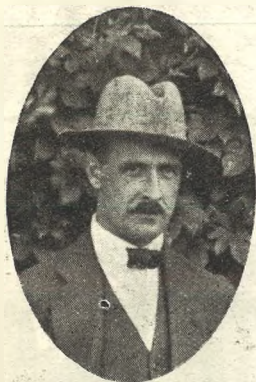

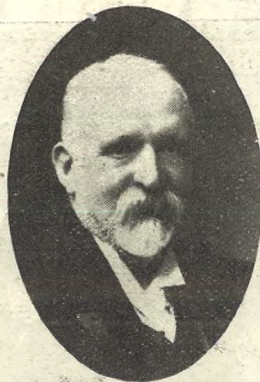

ENGLAND'S ROLL OF HONOUR.



CAPT. W. H. BOWSHER, Manchester Regiment, killed in action in France on Oct. 25, 1918 aged 38 years. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Bowsher, 8 Beaufort-buildings, Pittville, Cheltenham. A brother is in Salonika, and another brother was discharged after three years' service.



PTE. H. A. MARSHALL, 2/5th Gloucesters, died Oct. 23rd a prisoner of war in Germany, from privations suffered during captivity, aged 23 years. He was captured on March 23rd, and worked behind the lines until too ill to stand it. Second son of Mrs. S. Marshall, Vine Cottage, Alstone-lane, Cheltenham. He served since August, 1914.



PTE. FRANK MARSHALL, 2nd Devon Regt., recently returned from Germany, after being a prisoner of war since March 25, 1918. Youngest son of Mrs. S. Marshall, Vine Cottage, Alstone-lane, Cheltenham, and brother of Pte. H. A. Marshall, who was in the same camp in Germany.



LCE.-CPL. S. A. BEE, Gloucester Yeomanry, wounded on Sept. 30th, and now in hospital at Alexandria. He went out early in 1915 to Gallipoli, and has been through all the engagements with the R.G.H. Yeomanry. Second son of Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Bee, Park View, Bourton-on-the-Water.



GNR. HARRY WILLIAMS, 44th Battery, R.F.A., died of influenza on November 17 in Mesopotamia. He was a messenger on the "Echo" staff until January, 1915, when he enlisted, and has served three years' abroad. He leaves a widow at 13 Swindon-place, Cheltenham, also a child whom he had never seen.



PTE. HAROLD WOODWARD, Died from wounds in France, Nov. 16th, aged 19 years. Youngest son of Mrs. Woodward, 2 Priory-buildings. He was formerly at Messrs. H. E. Steel and Co.'s garage, Cheltenham.



PTE. ERNEST GRIFFIN, Killed in action Oct. 27th on the Piave, aged 20 years. Eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. F. Griffin, 5 Granley-cottages, St. Mark's. Before joining up he was with Mr. Walter Smith, Queensland Bakery, St. Mark's, for four years.



PTE. FREDERICK HICKS, 3rd Northants Regiment, died from pneumonia on Nov. 27 at Broadway Hospital, Sheerness, after 3 years' service, aged 19 years. He was wounded in March, 1918. Only son of the late Raymond Hicks and Mrs. Sheen, 1 Brunswick-square, Gloucester.



PTE. E. MORTEN, 2/5th Gloucester Regt., killed in action on Nov. 1st, after 3½ years in France. He was expected home on leave. Aged 32 years. He leaves a wife and two children at 18 Cleveland-street, Cheltenham.



PTE. W. E. DODWELL, 1/5th Gloucesters, who has been a prisoner in Germany for 2 years and 5 months. Husband of Mrs. Dodwell, 7 Fairfield-road, Leckhampton-road, Cheltenham.



PTE. A. E. HARDING, 1st Gloucestershire Regt., transferred from 3/5th, killed in action on Nov. 3rd. Only son of Mr. A. D. Harding, 286 High-street, Cheltenham. He joined up in March, 1916, going to France in August



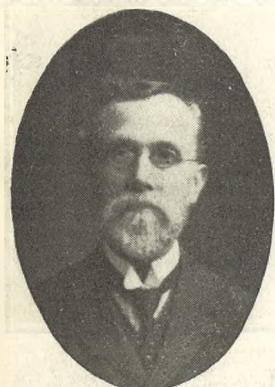
PTE. WALLACE MILES, 9th Gloucesters, died Oct. 27th of wounds received at Le Cateau, France. He enlisted in 1915 in the 9th Gloucesters, and served over two years in Salonika.

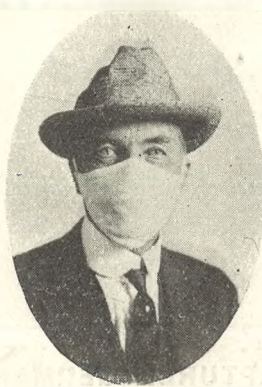
- 1.—Pte. John Shellam, Welsh Fusiliers, killed at Loos on Sept. 25, 1915, aged 39 years.

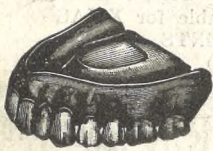

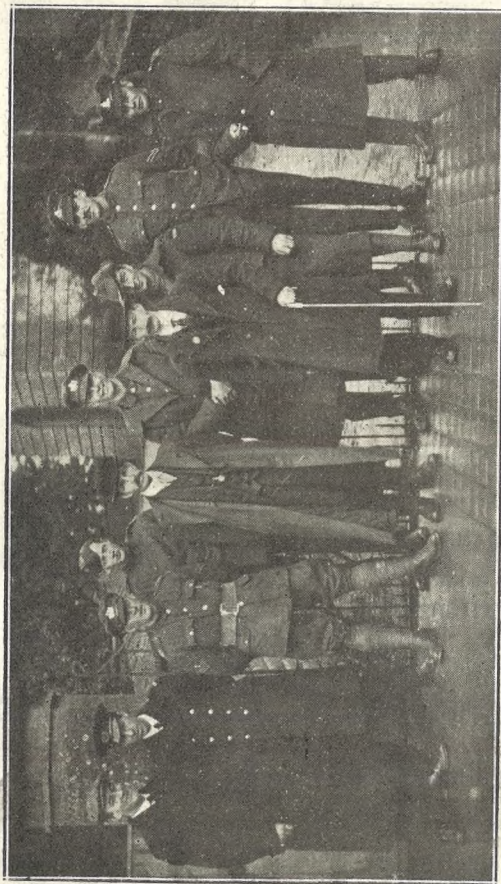

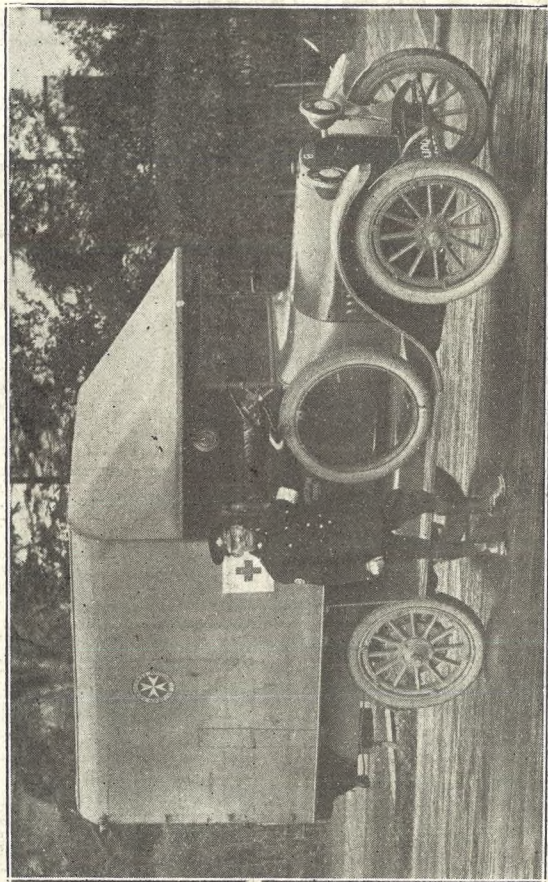

LAUNCH OF A FERRO-CONCRETE SHIP AT GLOUCESTER.

A second concrete ship (the Creteroad) was most successfully launched at Gloucester into the Canal, opposite the Gas Works at Hempstead, on Saturday morning, Dec. 14th. It will be remembered that the first vessel, the Creterock, was launched by the builders, Messrs. Nicholls and Hobrough, for the Admiralty, about three weeks ago. These vessels have necessarily to be launched broadside (owing to being built on the banks of the canal) and are the only two vessels of such a size (over 1,000 tons each) to be successfully launched in this manner. These three pictures were taken within three minutes of each other. The first shows the ship on the stocks just awaiting the signal to slide down the greased "ways." No. 2 shows her entering the water and the terrific wave which damaged the banks, swept over the tow-path and hedge and stranded a quantity of fish in the adjoining field. No. 3 shows her triumphantly afloat five seconds later, before the swell in the water has subsided.

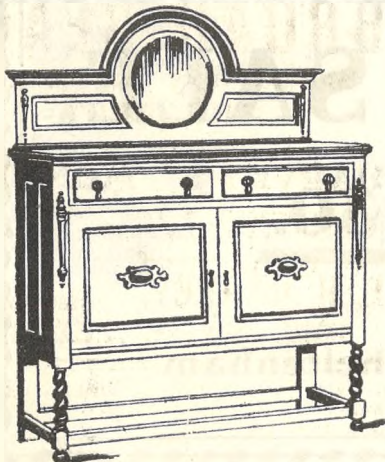
