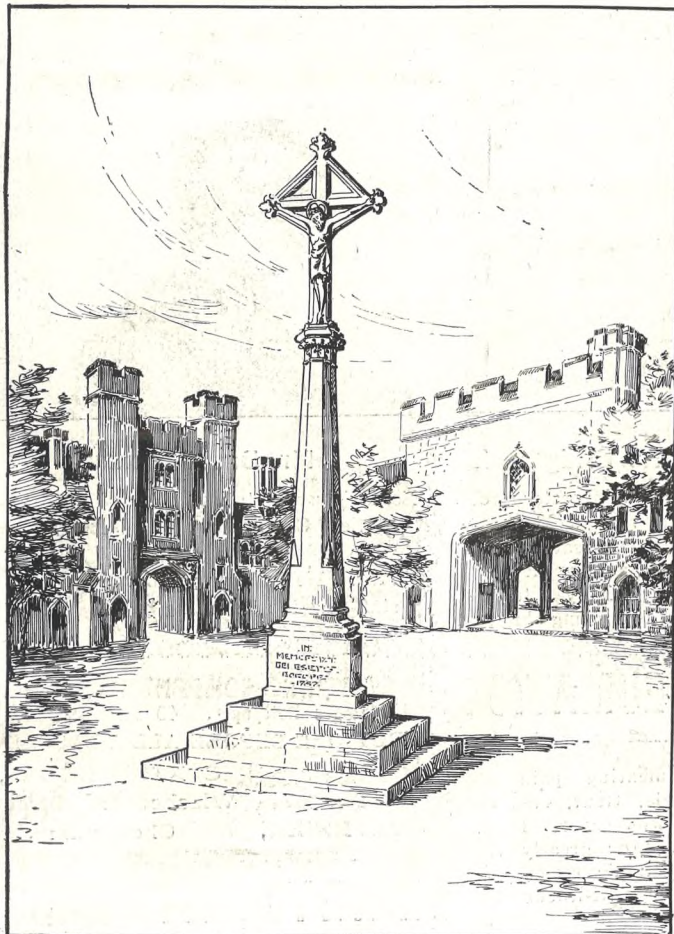
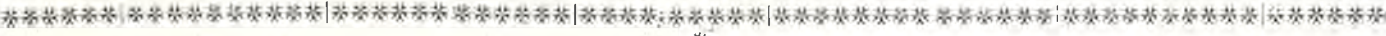
L. CORPL. A. J. YEATES,

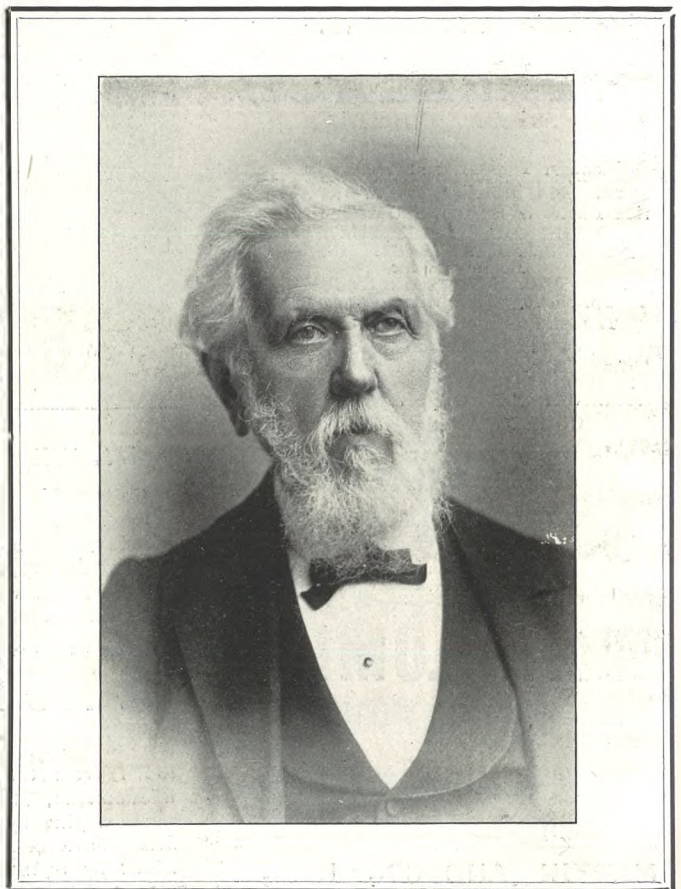


MR. STANLEY W. TUBBS,

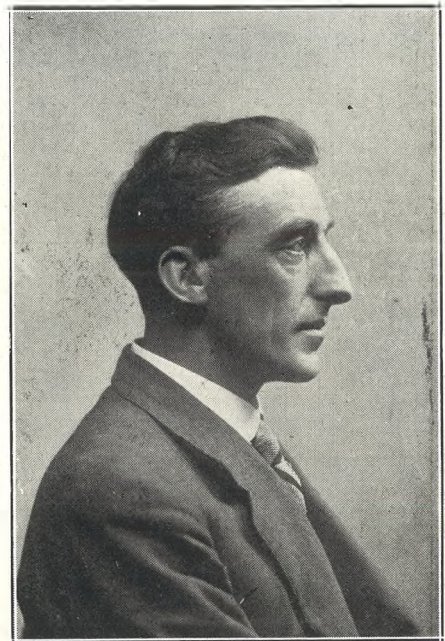

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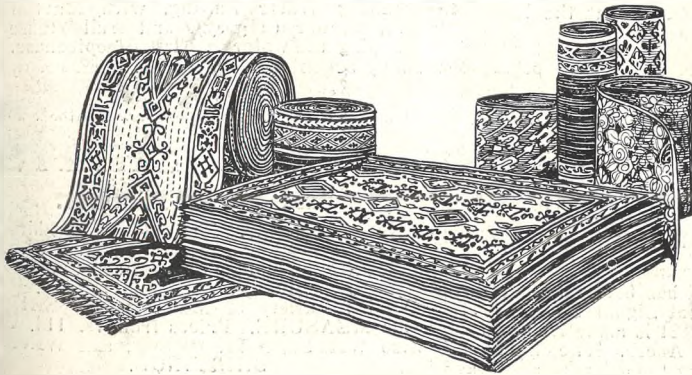

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REMARKABLE SHIELD MADE BY WELSH R.E.

A remarkable shield has been made by the 38th (Welsh) Divisional Signal Company of the Royal Engineers. It is made from wood used in bridging the Ancre, Selle, Sambre, and Canal du Nord by the Divisional Royal Engineers. On it are mounted 52 German shoulder-straps, each representing a regiment defeated by this division between August 22 and November 11, 1918.

The places where the principal battles were fought are marked on the scroll; there are 28 "honours," the list including River Ancre, Lesbœufs, Ginchy, Delville Wood, High Wood, Mametz Wood, Pozieras, Morval, Manancourt, and Malincourt.

In the centre of the shield, which is dedicated to the Prince of Wales, "on the termination of the war," are the Prince of Wales' feathers and the motto, "Ich Dien."

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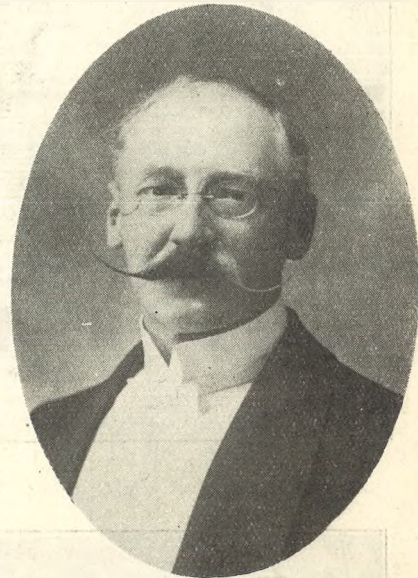

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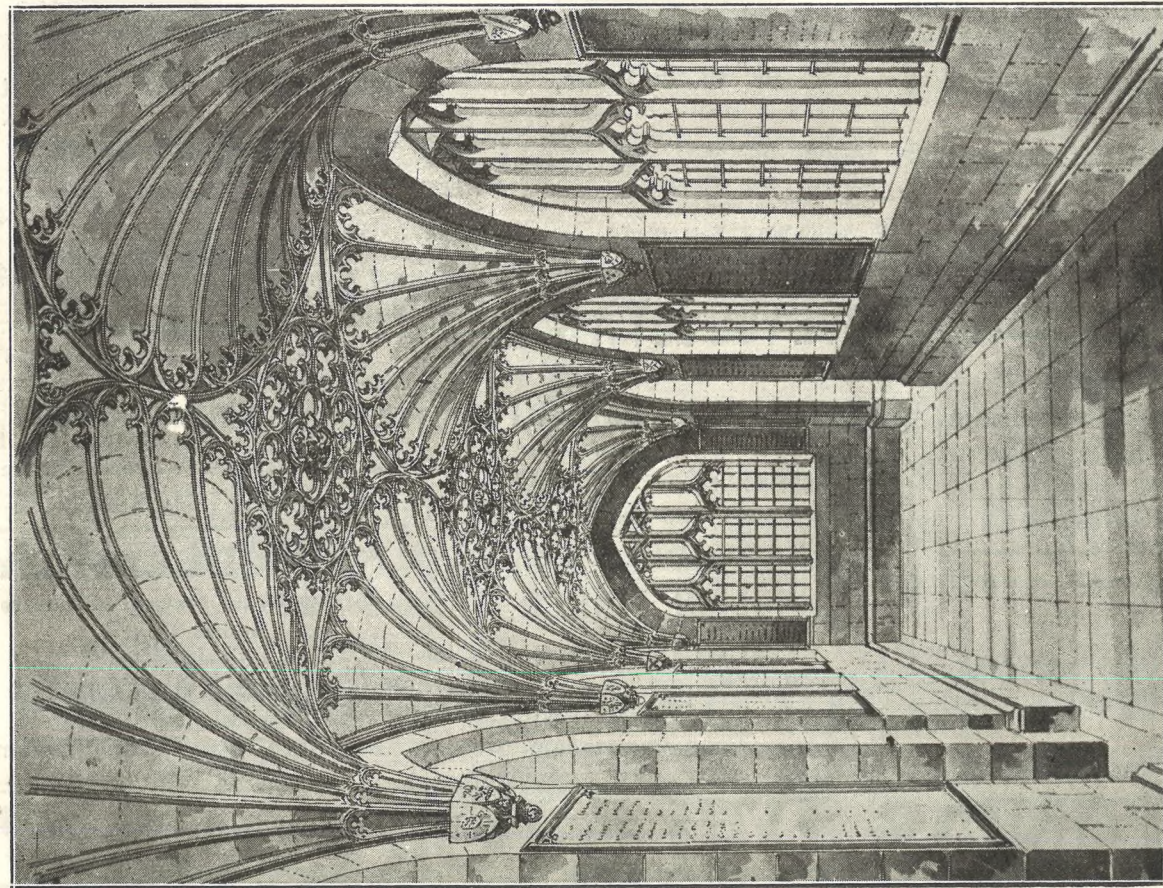
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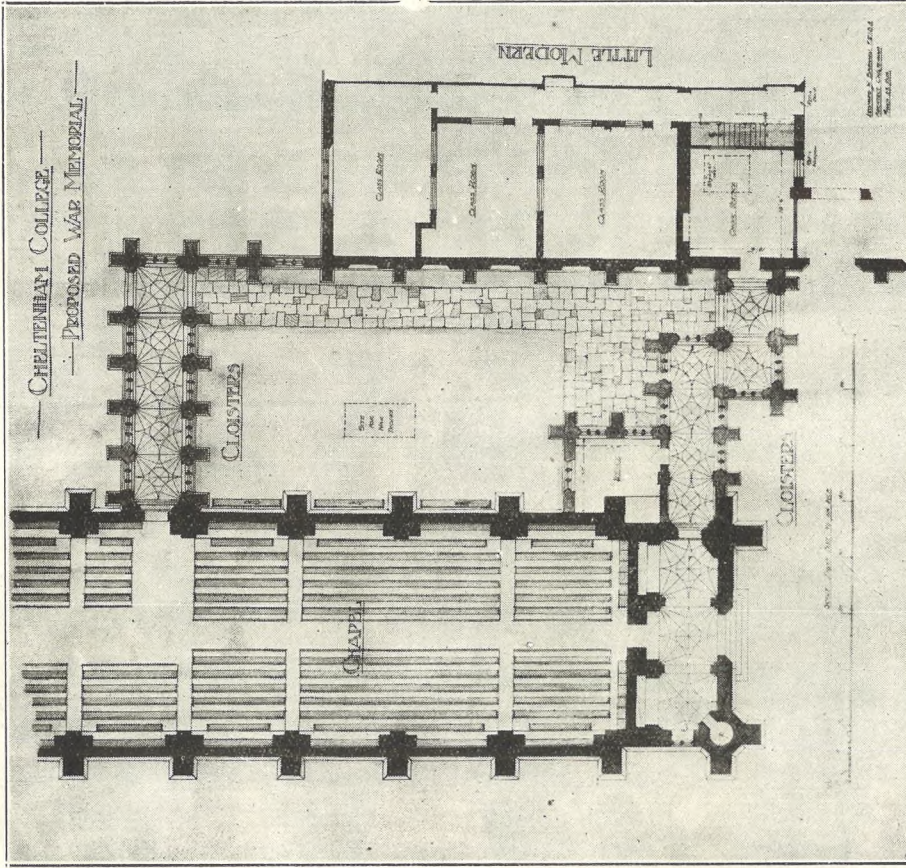
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CHELTENHAM COLLEGE WAR MEMORIAL.

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CHELTENHAM COLLEGE WAR MEMORIAL.

Plan of the new cloisters and open walk to be erected to connect the chapel with the present buildings. The chapel is on the left, and open cloisters, with no doors or glass in windows, will be erected, connecting it on the west with the choir vestry, now the O.T.C. orderly room, and also on the east side leading to the old chapel. Between the two cloisters will extend an open walk with an enclosed lawn, in the centre of the latter will stand a war trophy. The cloisters will be canopied with beautiful fan tracery in stone. The whole is designed by Mr. L. W. Barnard, architect, Cheltenham.

THE SUGGESTED IDEA OF COL. J. C. GRIFFITH IS TO REPRODUCE IN LOCAL STONE A REPLICA OF THE TEMPLE OF VESTA IN ROME IN THE PROMENADE GARDEN. WE HAVE MADE A COMPOSITE PHOTOGRAPH FROM A MODEL OF THE TEMPLE, SHOWING ROUGHLY HOW THE TEMPLE WOULD LOOK, AND GIVE COLONEL GRIFFITH'S OWN DESCRIPTION, AS FOLLOWS:—

This little temple, with columns of rich creamy golden stone, with its russet red-tiled roof, a work of exquisite grace of the purest period of classical art, in harmony with the architecture of the surrounding buildings, would under the shadow of the trees be an object of rare beauty in our Promenade. There incised on tablets of bronze in the cella within the columns would fittingly be enshrined the names of those connected with the town who made the great sacrifice for us and for their country.—J. 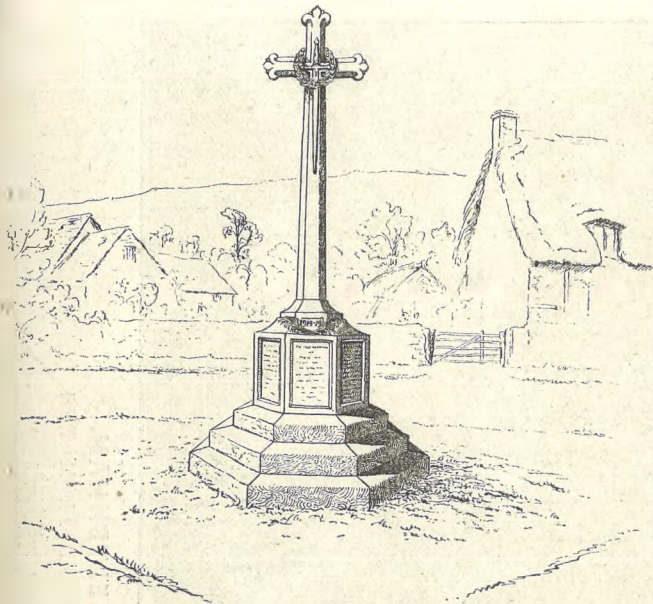

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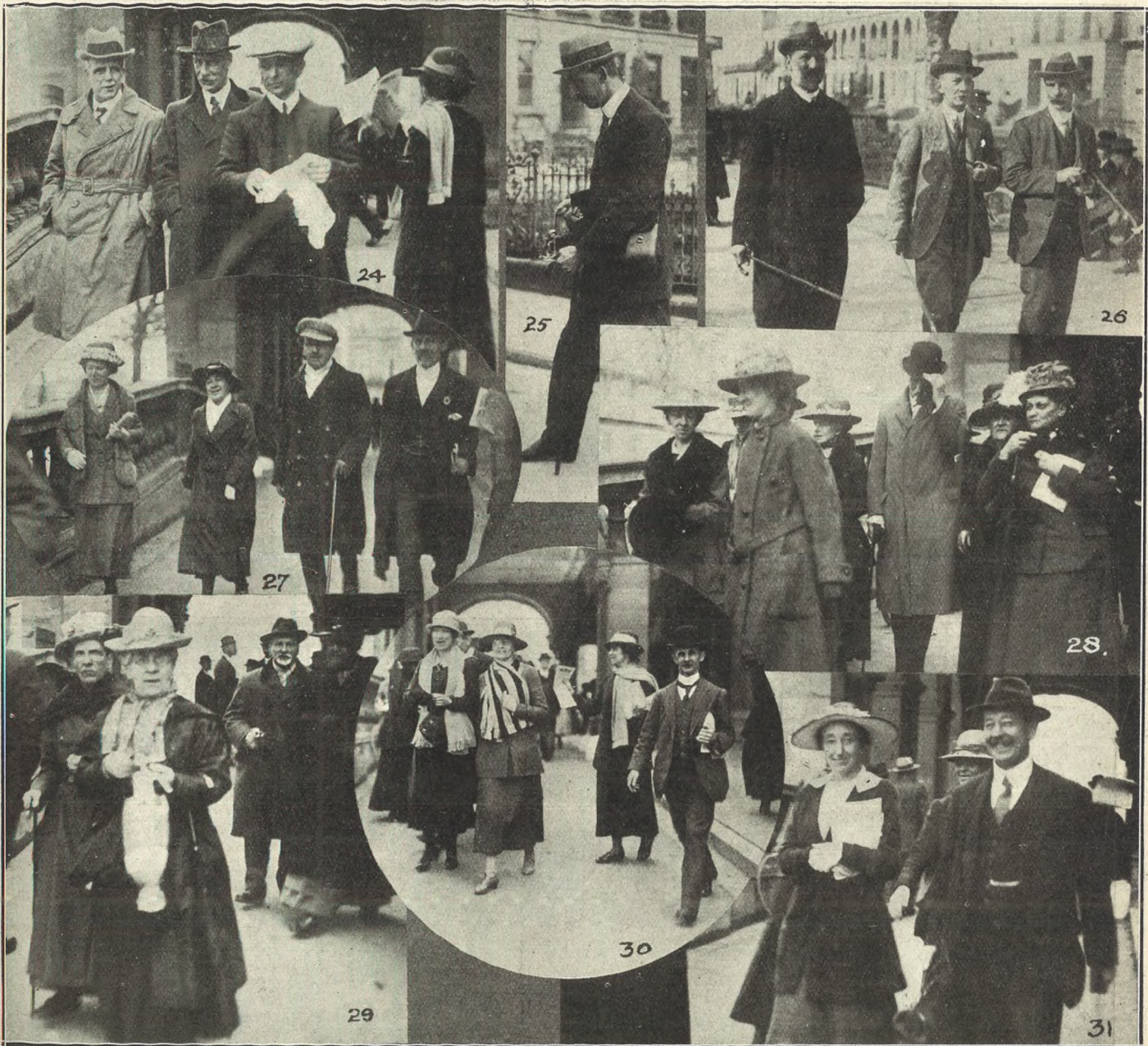
