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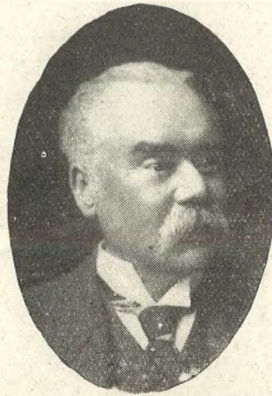
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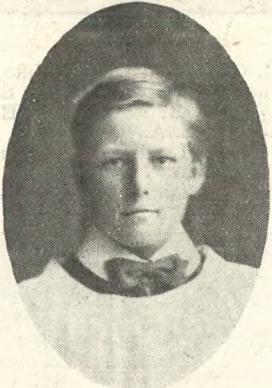
Rev. J. W. Crake,

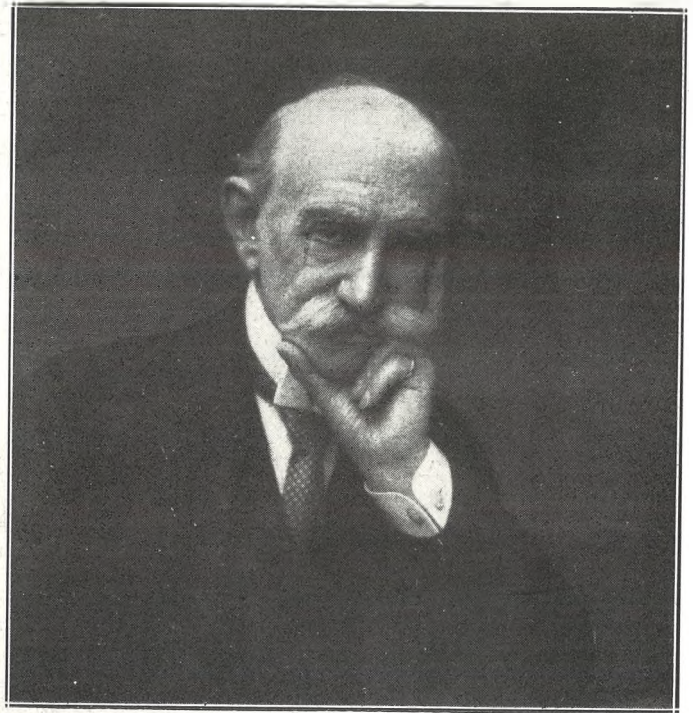

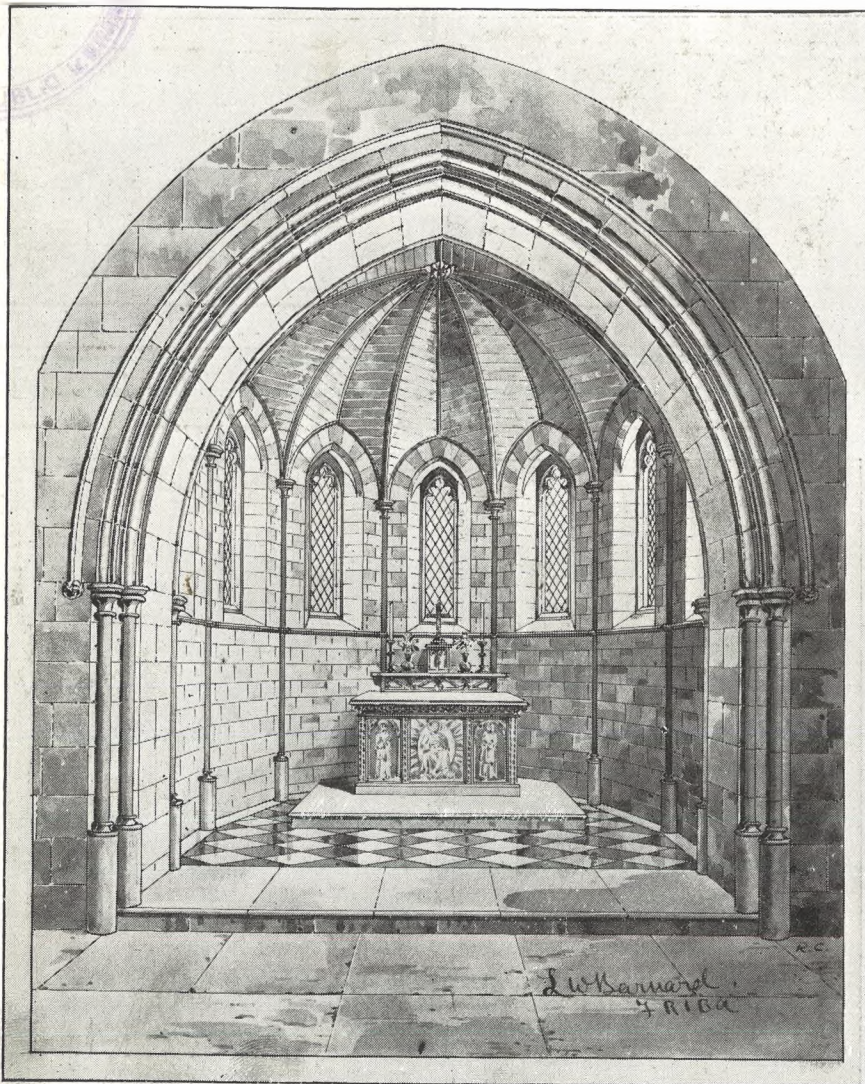
FAREWELL PARTY OF WOMEN'S VOLUNTEER RESERVE.

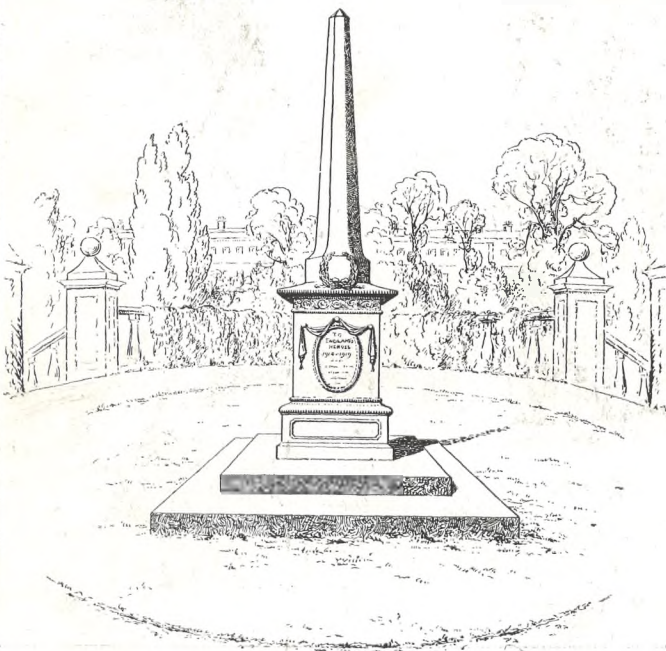

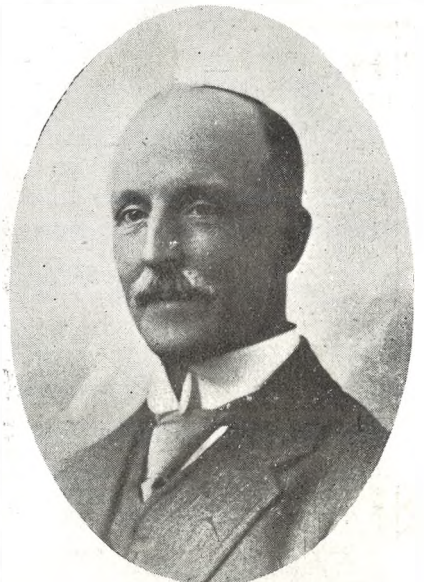

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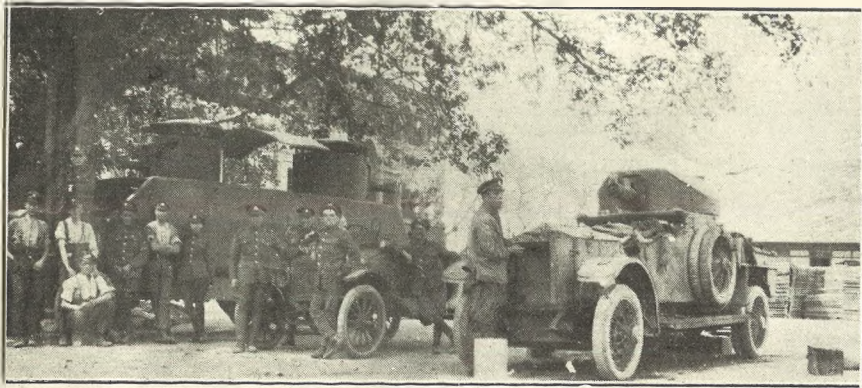

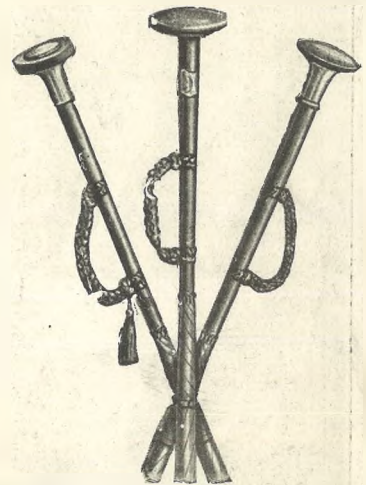

PRESENTATION OF A TANK TO CHELTENHAM.

- The tank which has been presented to the town of Cheltenham was officially handed over to the Mayor and Corporation on Wednesday afternoon, May 31, with becoming ceremony. Escorted by a section of the O.T.C. from Dean Close School, with their band, it proceeded under its own power from the G.W.R. station to Westal Green, Lansdown-road, where it will permanently remain on a concrete platform. It jibbed two or three times en route, and arrived one hour late.

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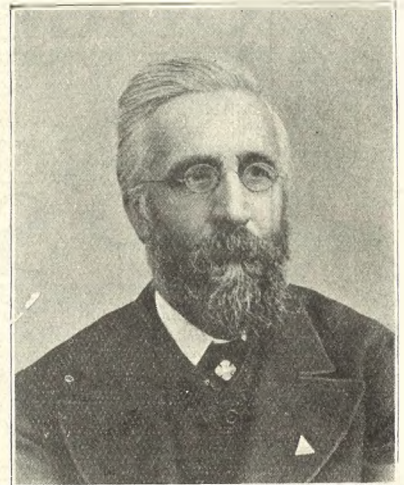

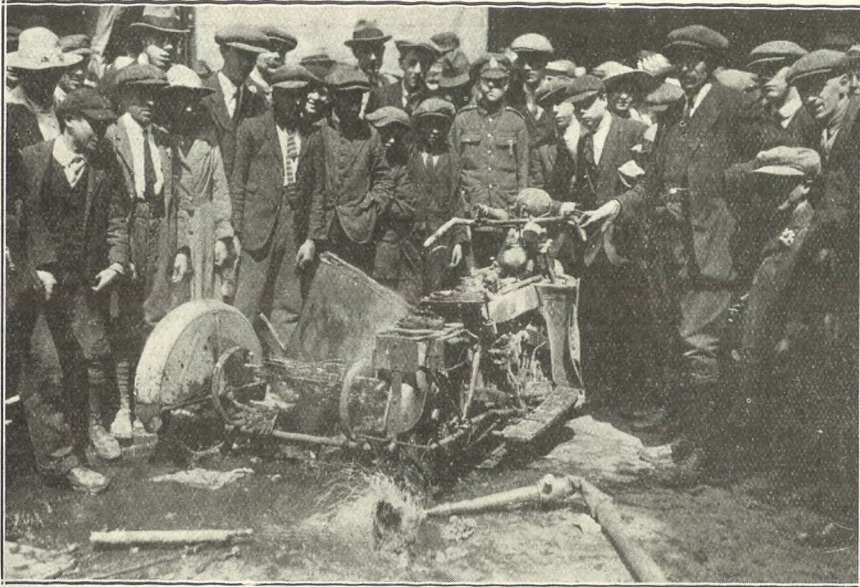

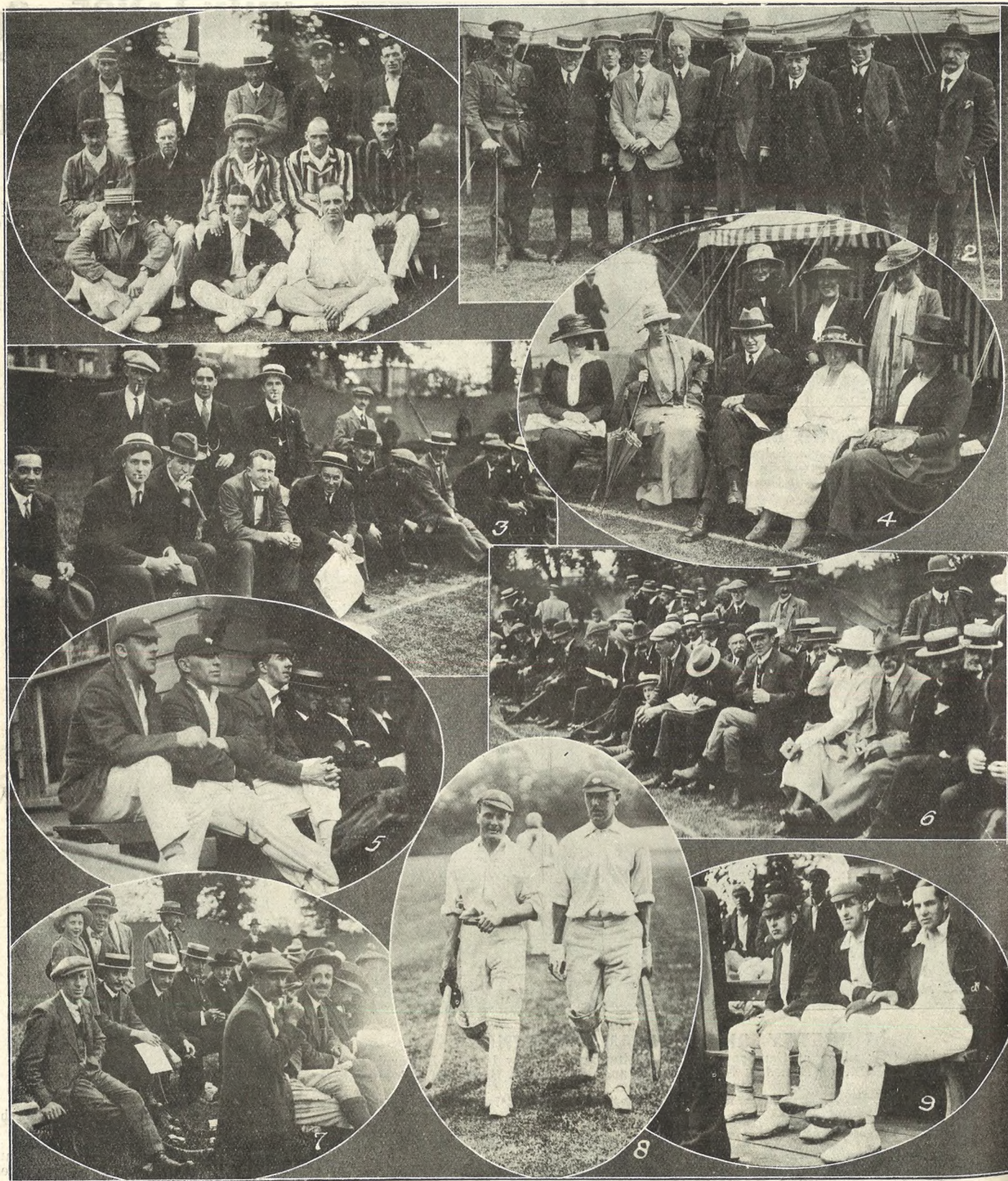

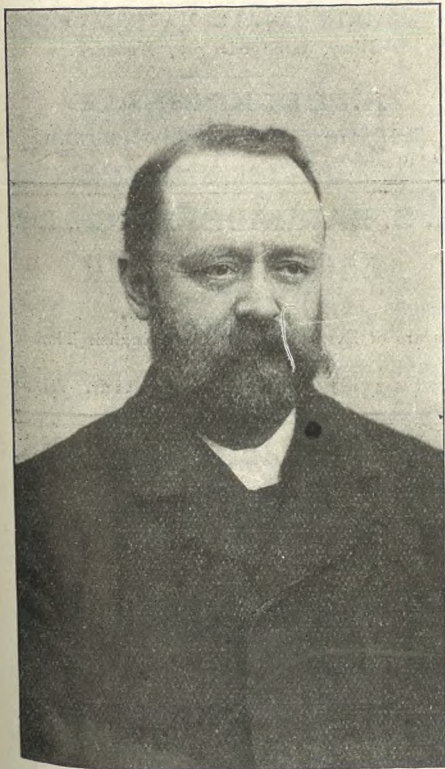
