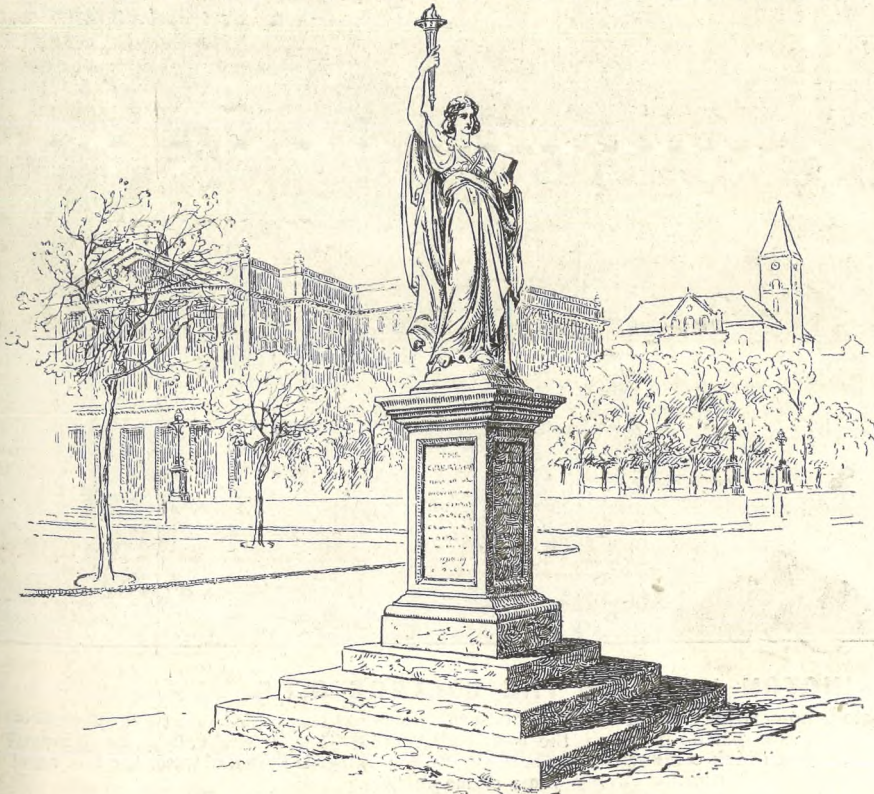

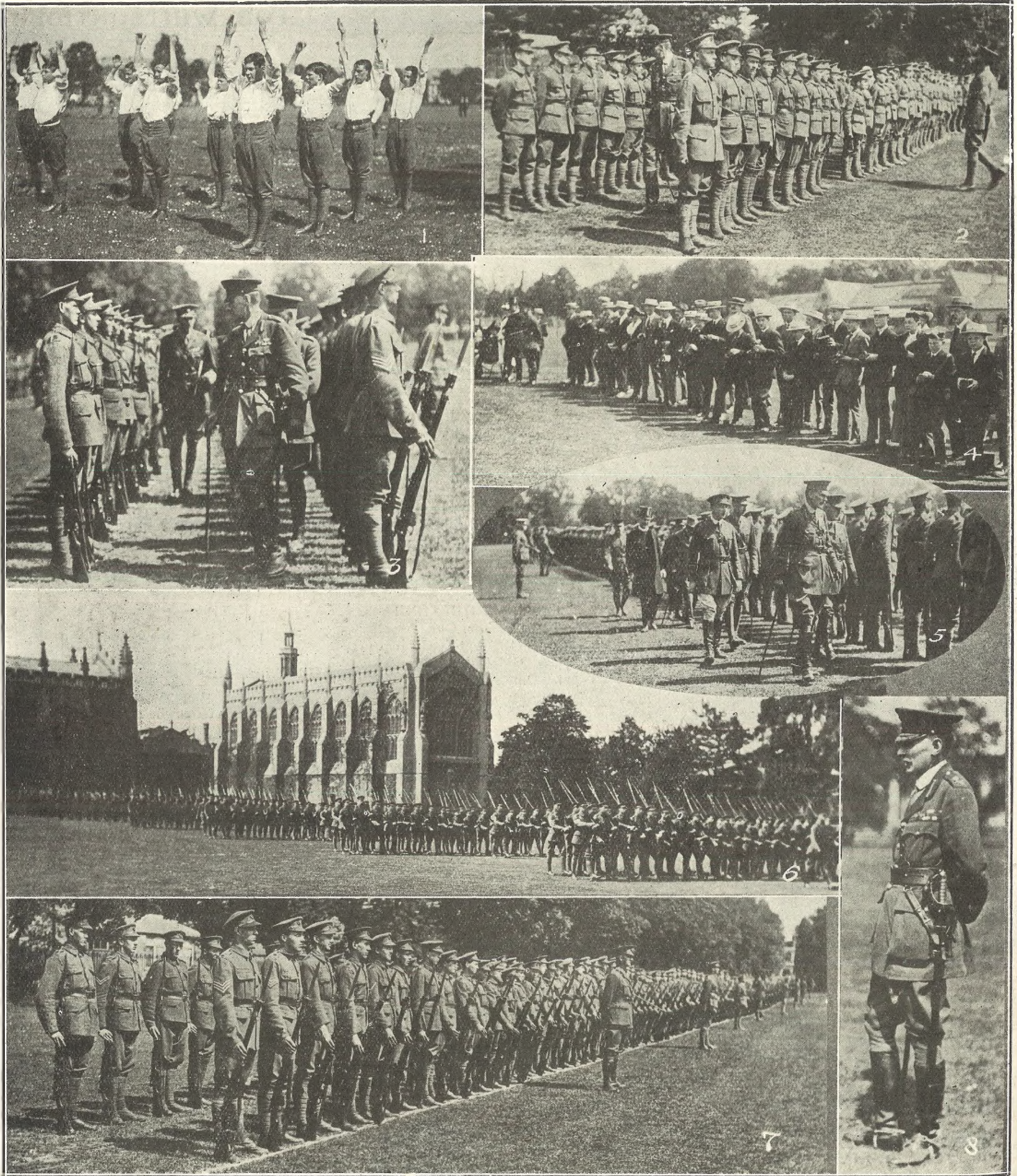

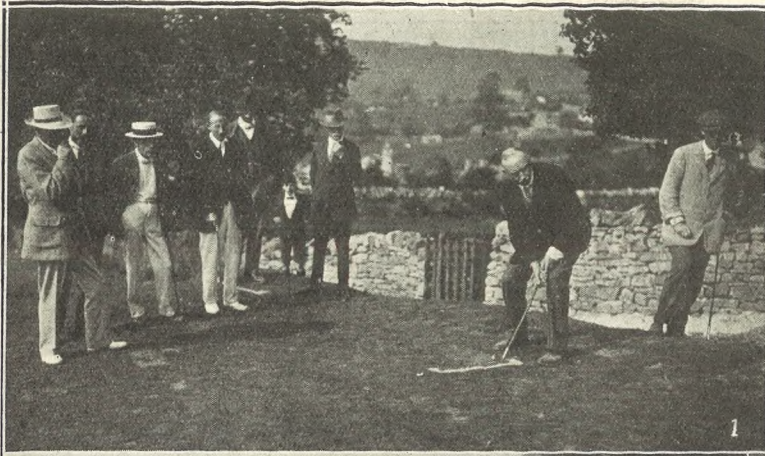


GEN. C. H. HARINGTON INSPECTS THE COLLEGE O.T.C.

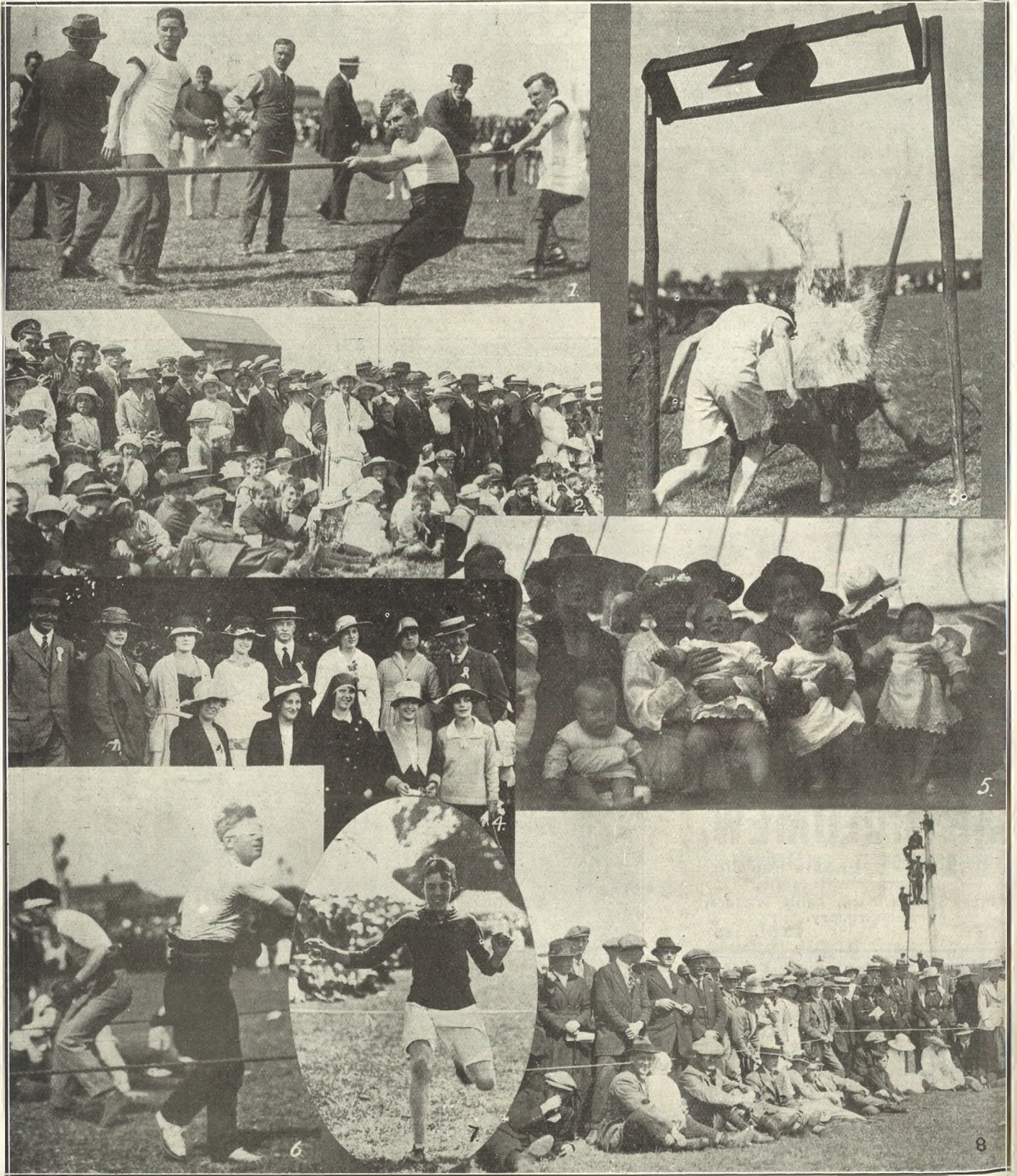

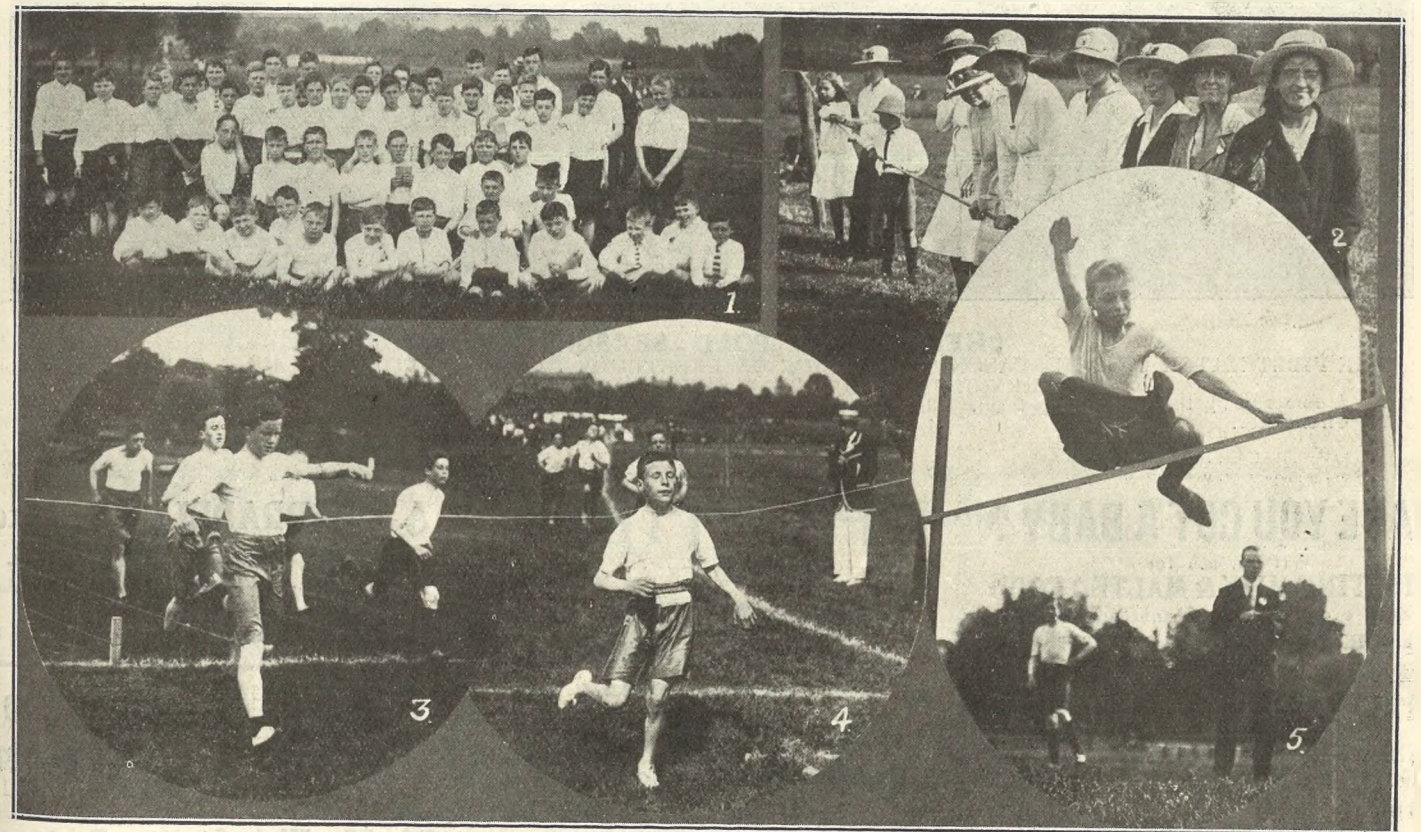

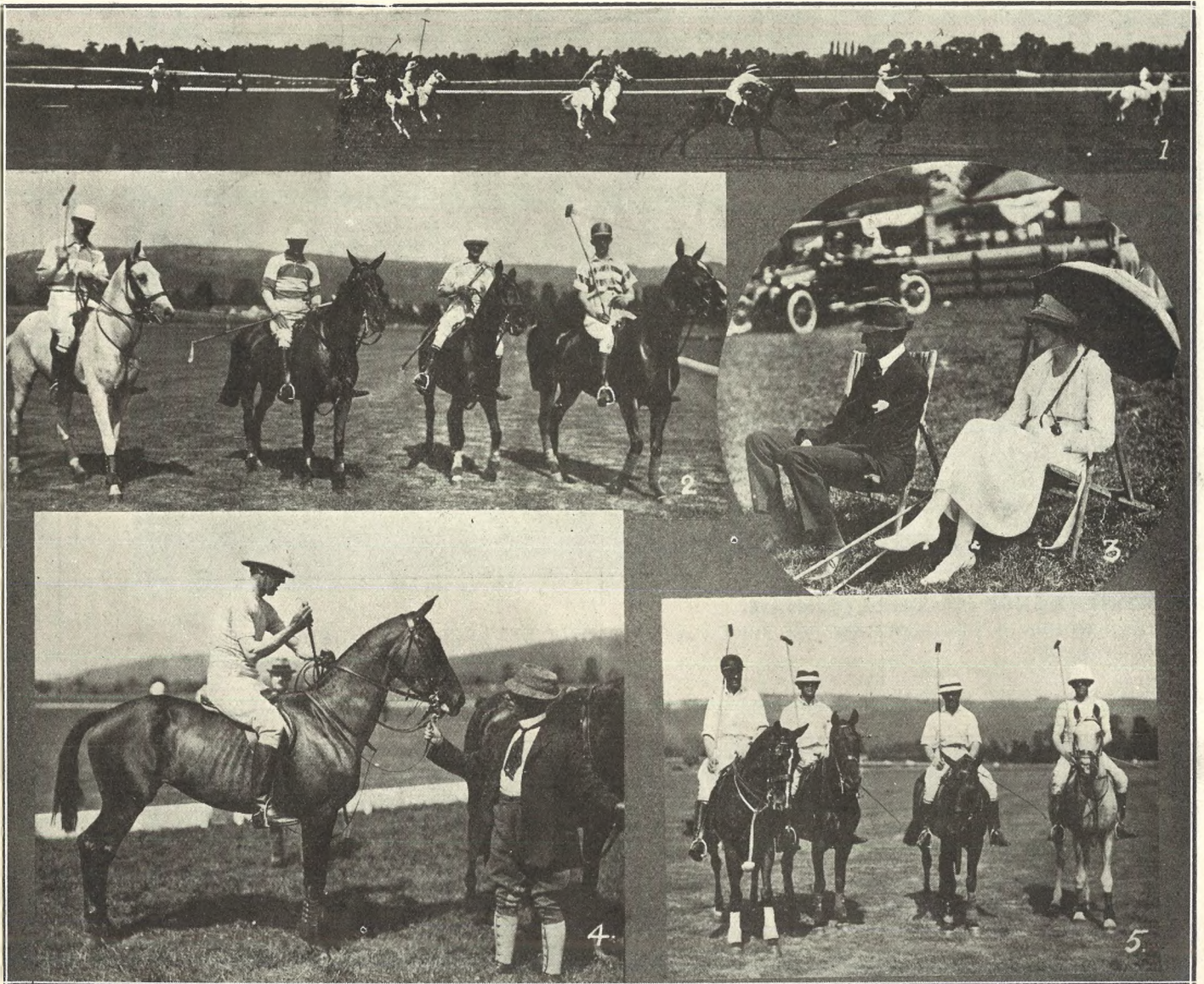

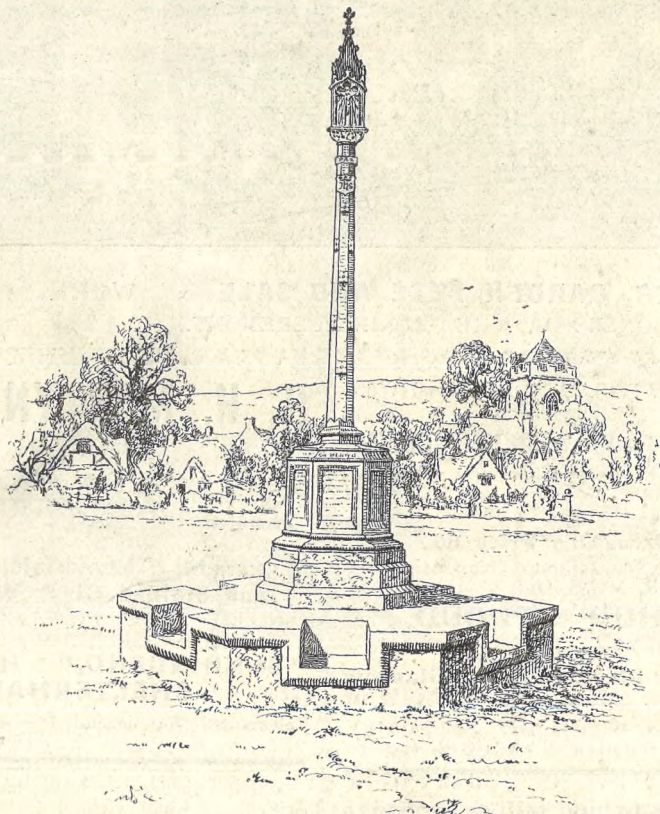
