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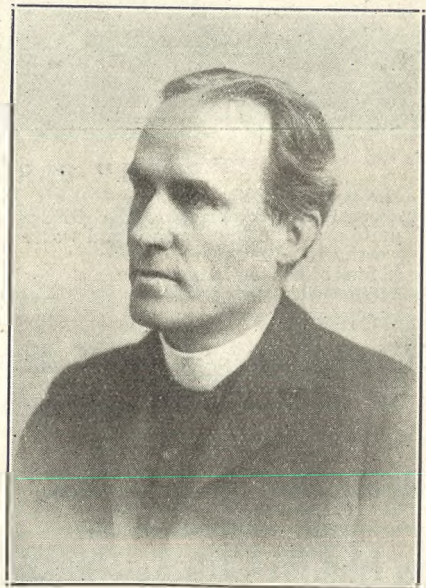

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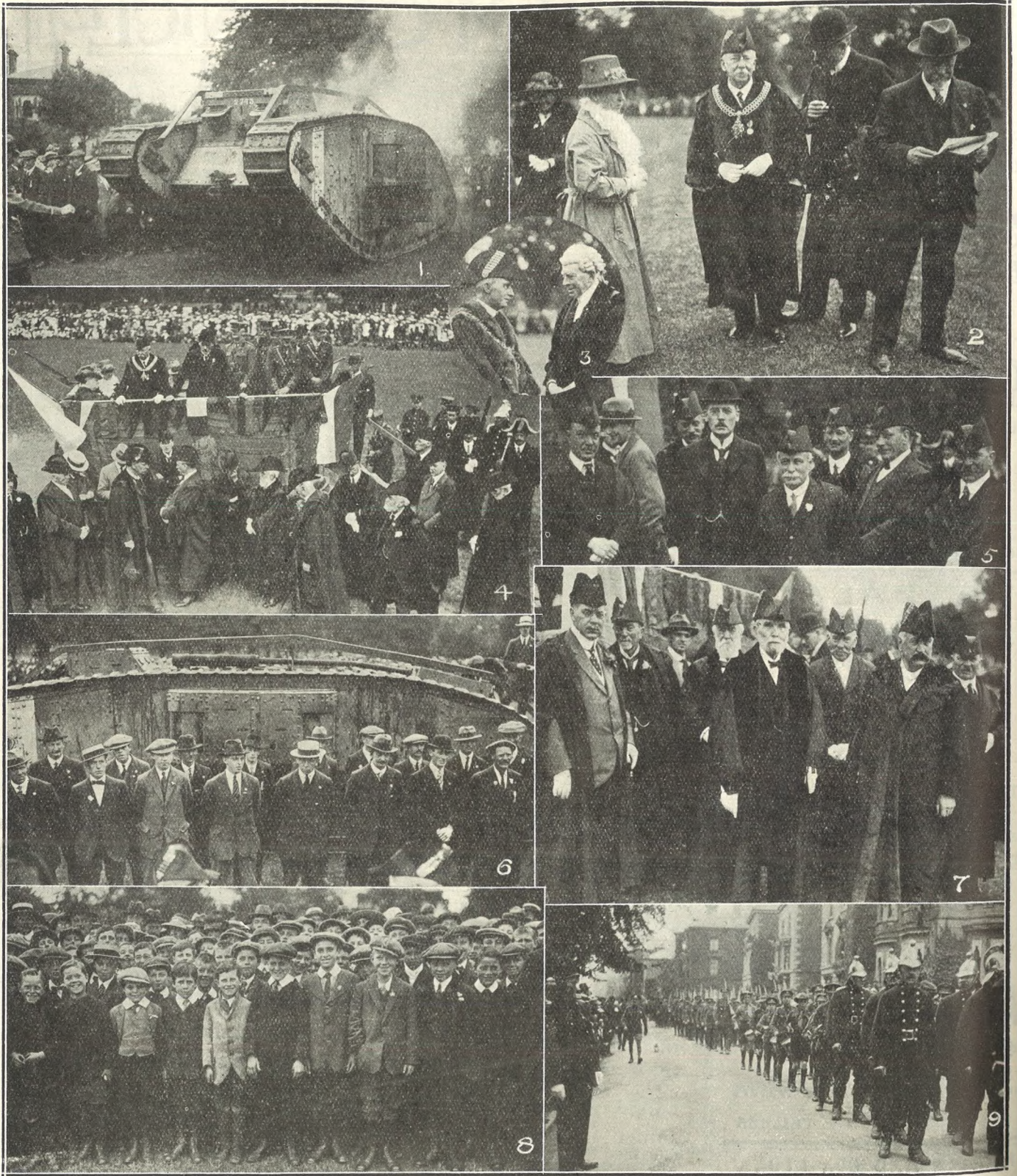
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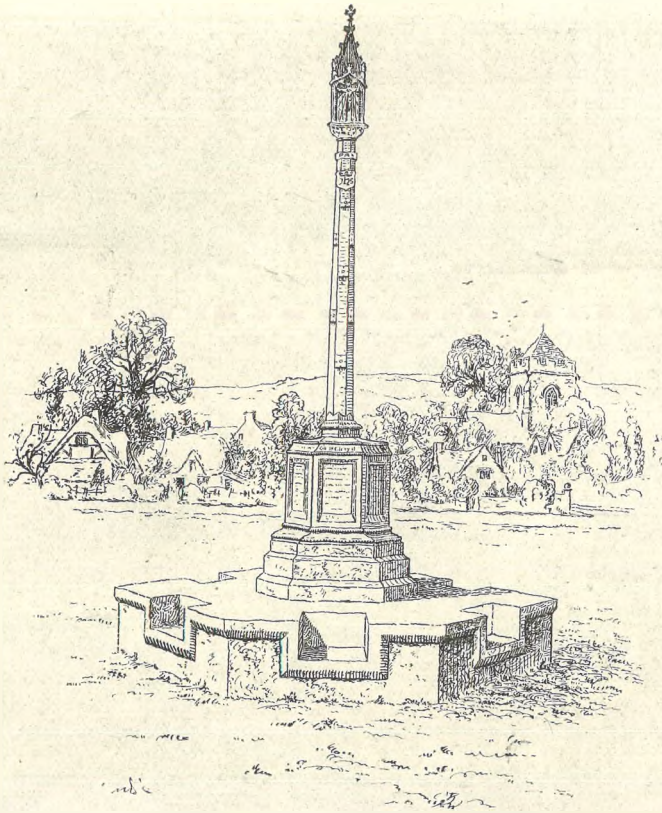


RECEPTION OF GLOUCESTER'S TANK.

 a widow, four sons, and two daughters.

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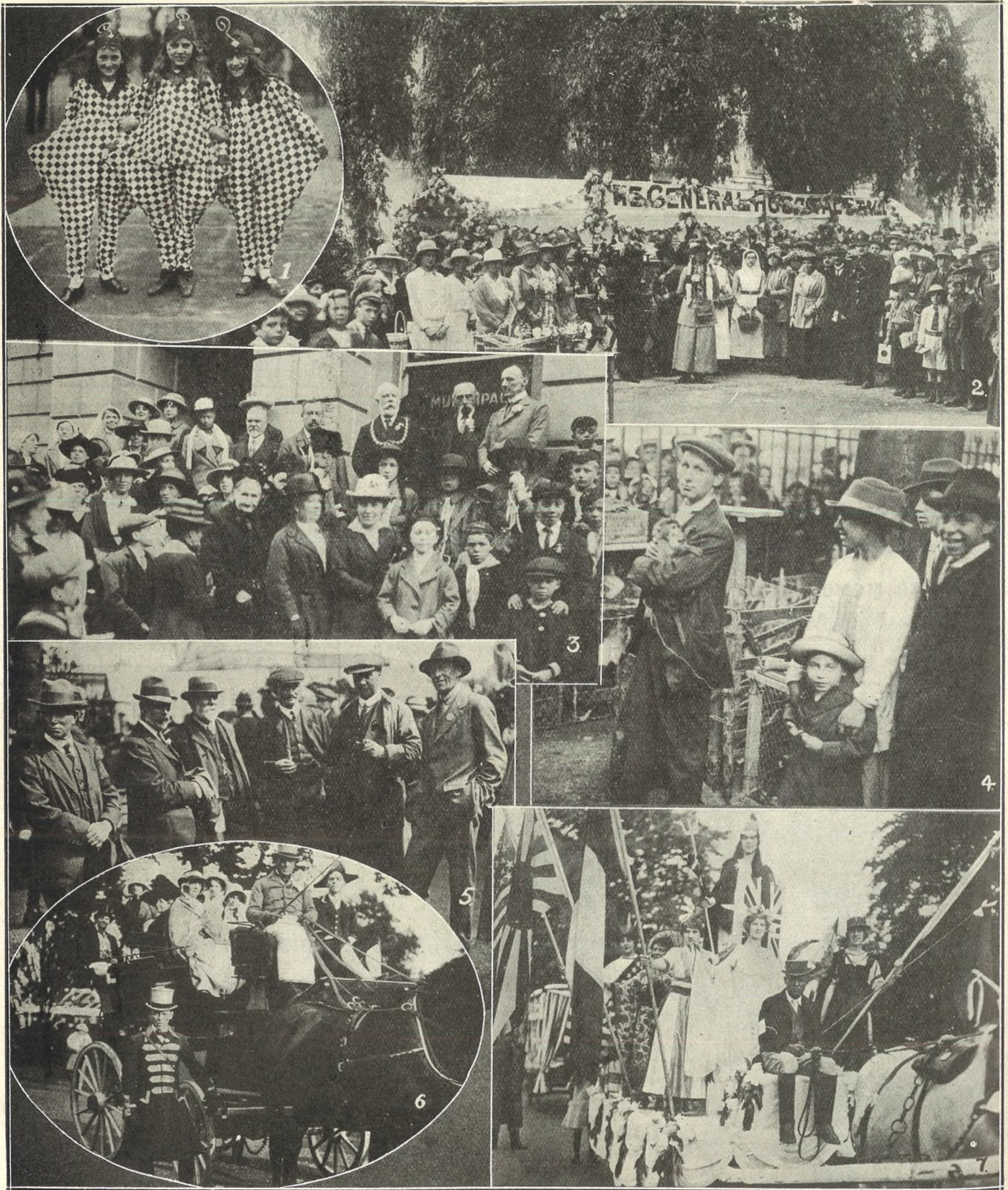
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HOSPITALS' DAY IN CHELTENHAM.

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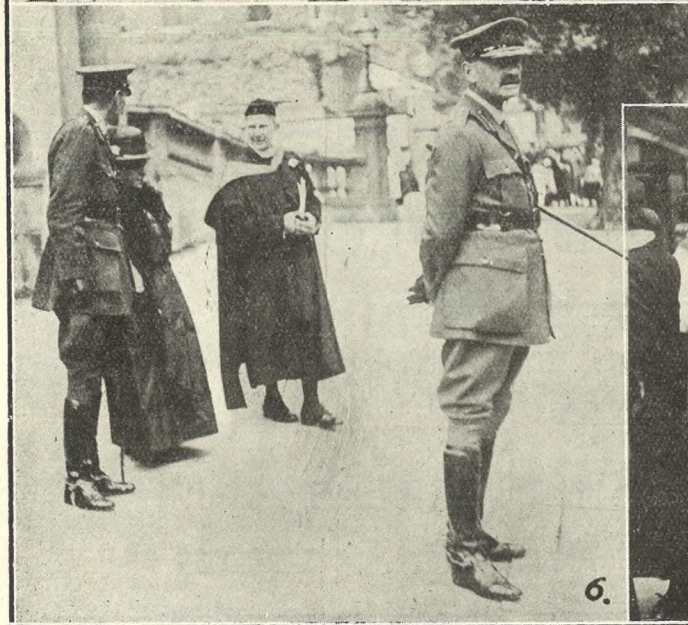
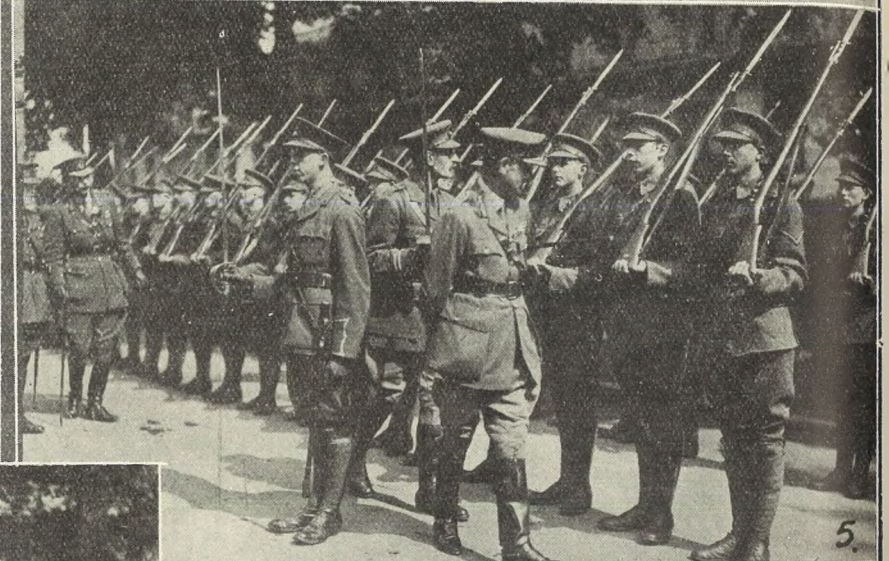
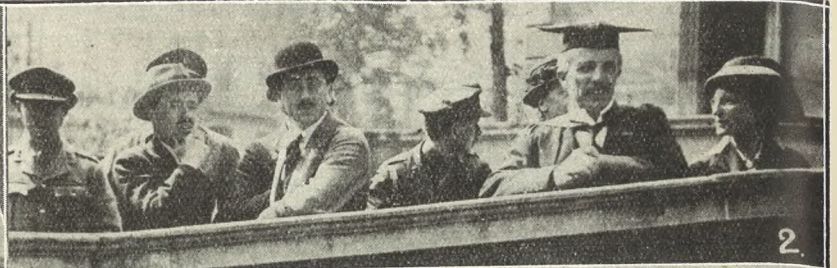
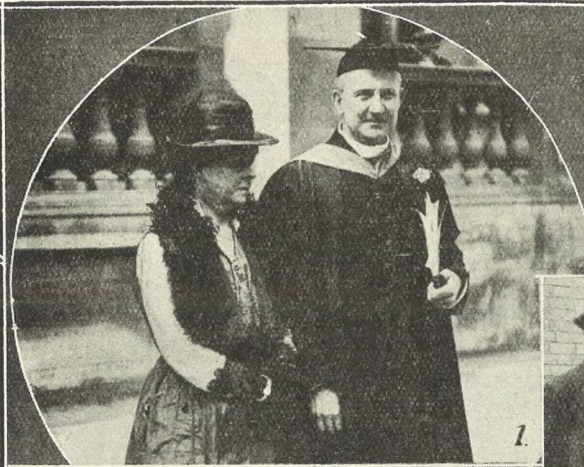
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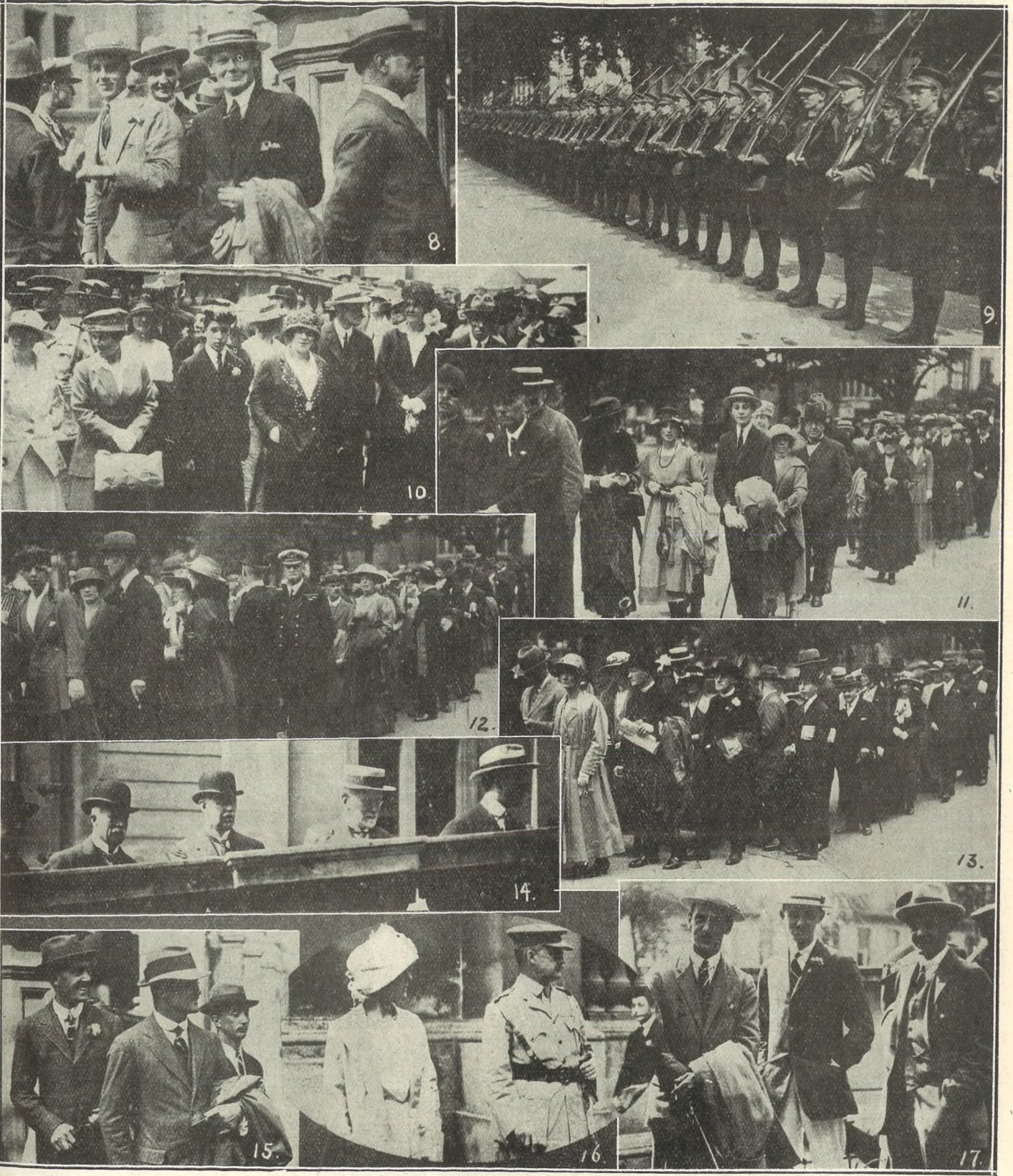
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CHELTENHAM COLLEGE SPEECH DAY.

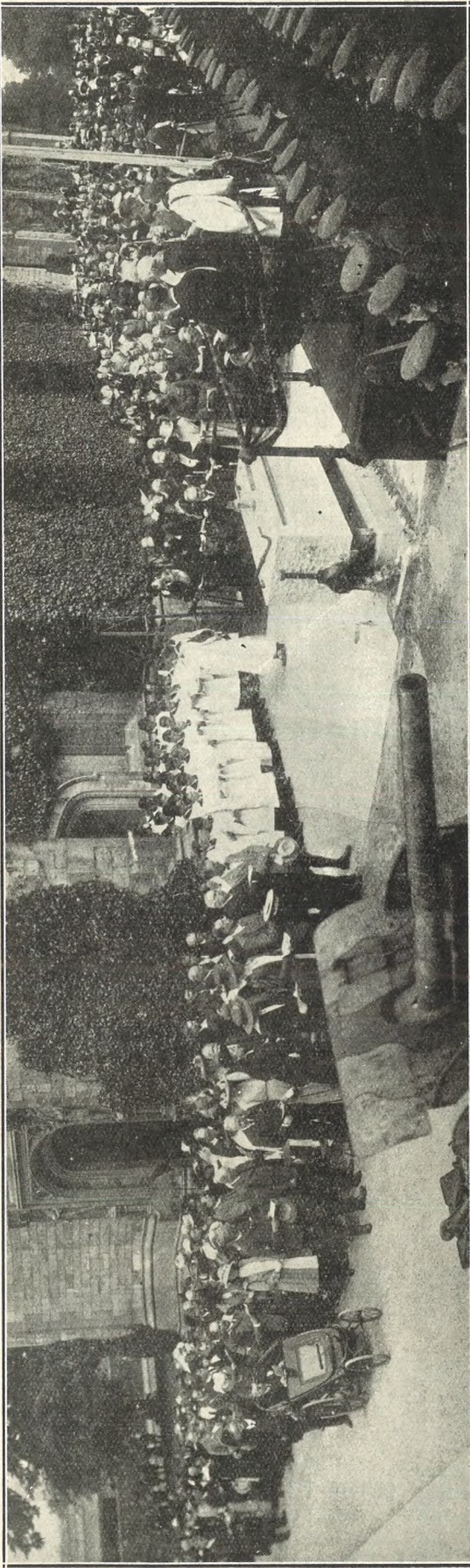

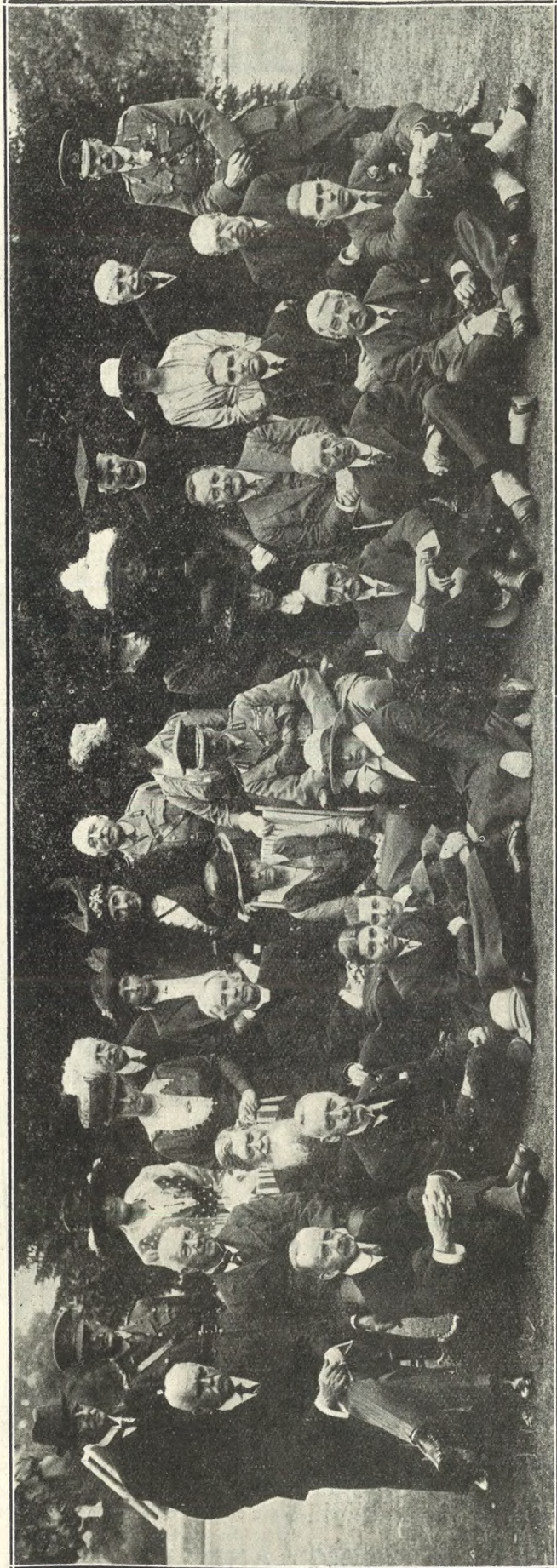

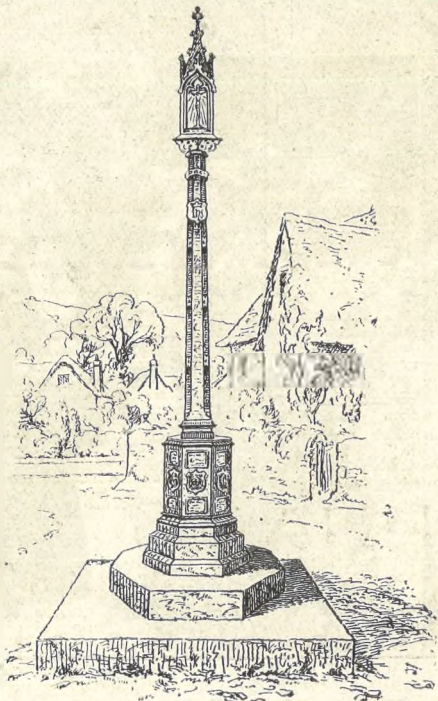

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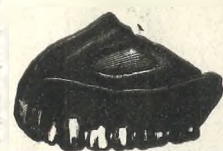

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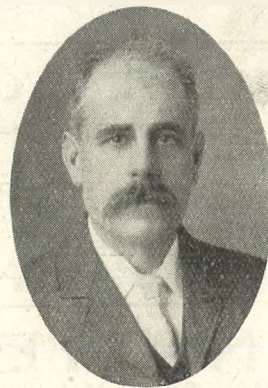

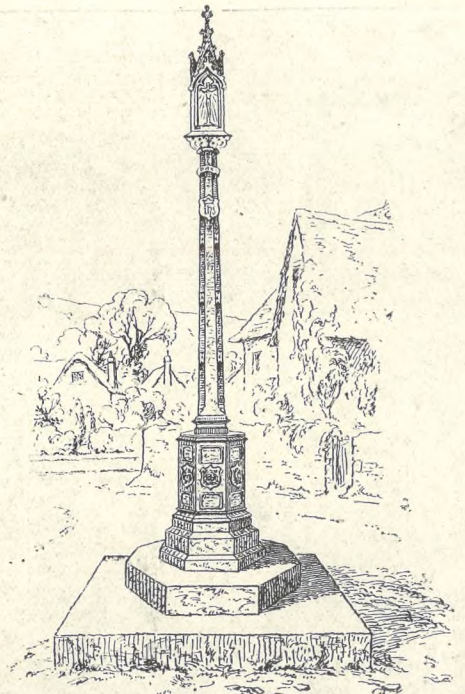
