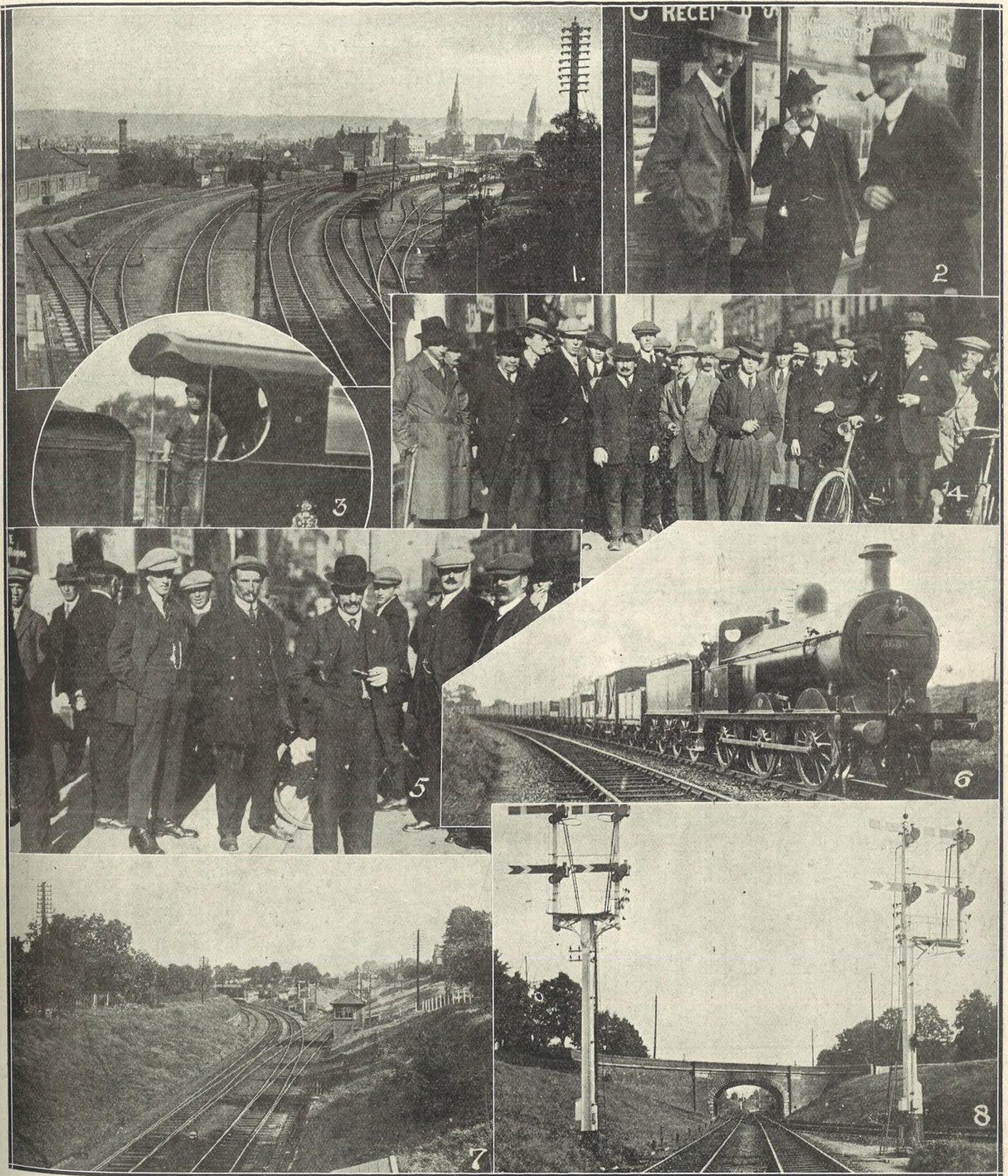

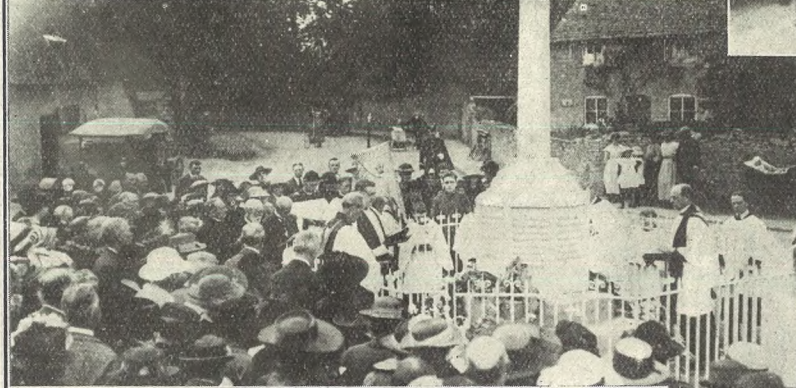
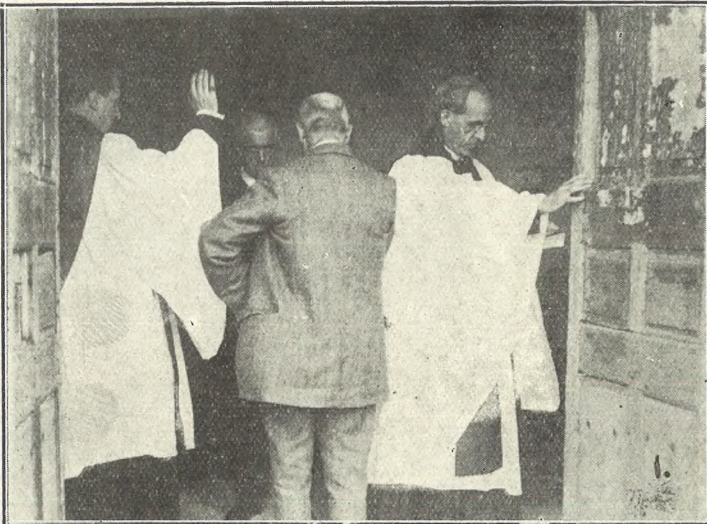

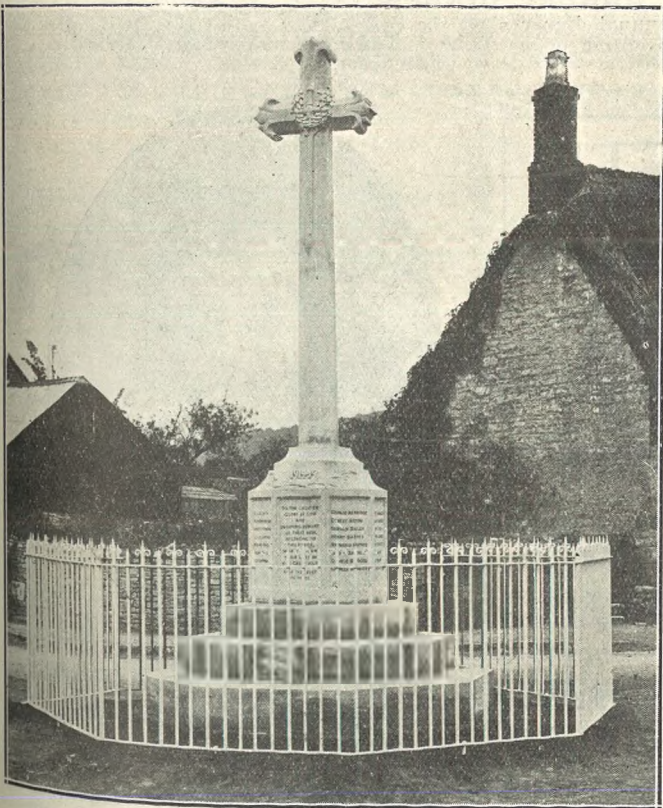

Of Frome House, Frome Park-road, Stroud, who died on Saturday, Sept. 27, at St. Peter's Hospital, London, after a serious operation on Sept. 17th, aged 59 years. He was for many years headmaster of the National School, Cainscross, and in 1894 was appointed chief secretary of the Stroud Conservative Working Men's Benefit Society, an appointment he held till his death. He had five sons and one daughter, but one son died in 1913, two (officers) were killed during the war, and one severely wounded and is still in hospital. His widow, one daughter, and two sons survive him.

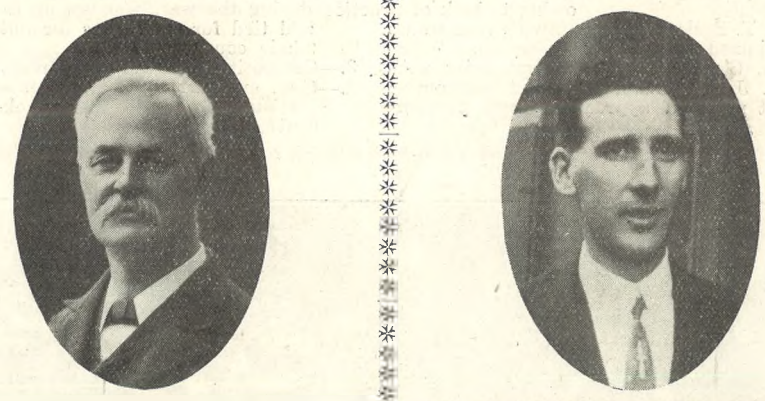

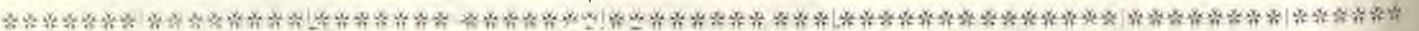

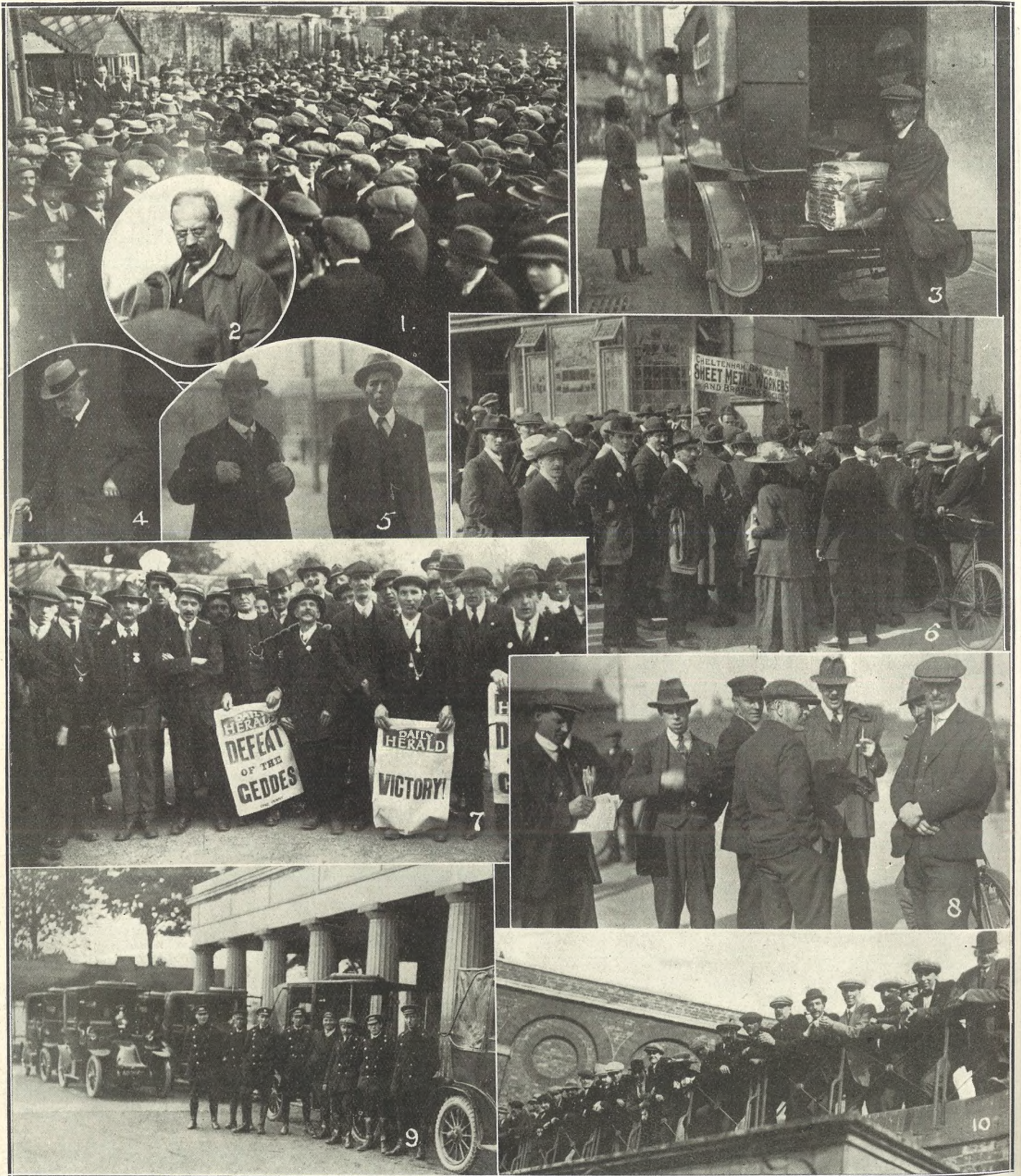

The great railway strike was happily settled on Sunday last, Oct. 5th, but in Cheltenham, owing to the fact that the Midland Railway authorities refused to reinstate Mr. A. E. Chandler, the stationmaster, the Midland, G.W.R., and M. and S.W.J.R. men refused to go back without him. He was reinstated later on, and all the men returned to work on Tuesday morning.

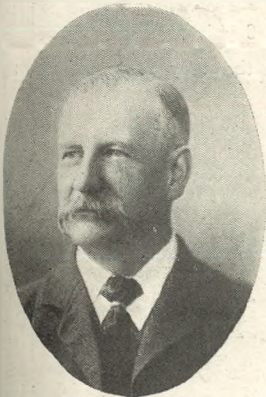

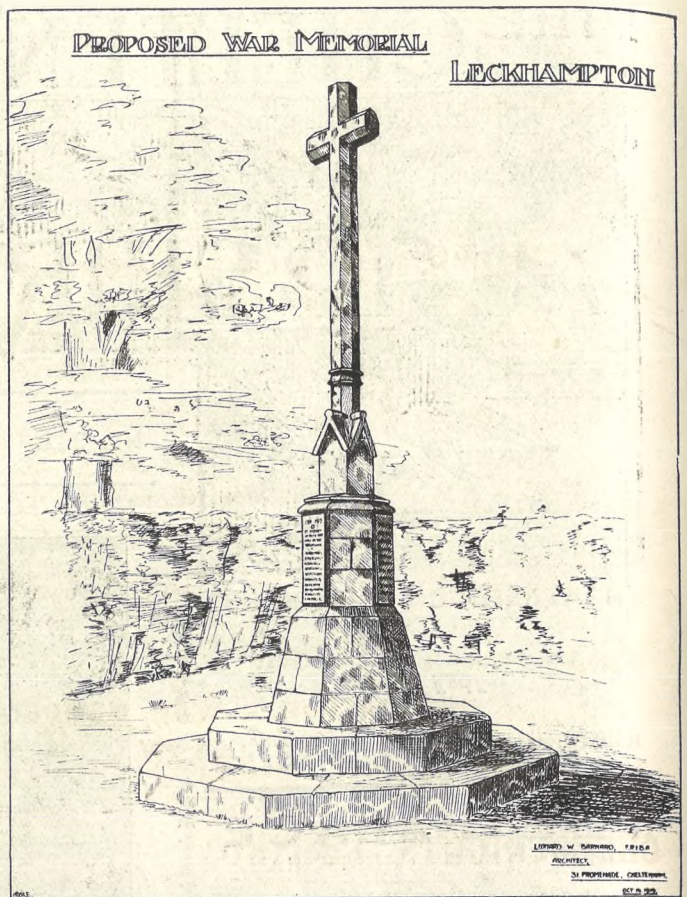

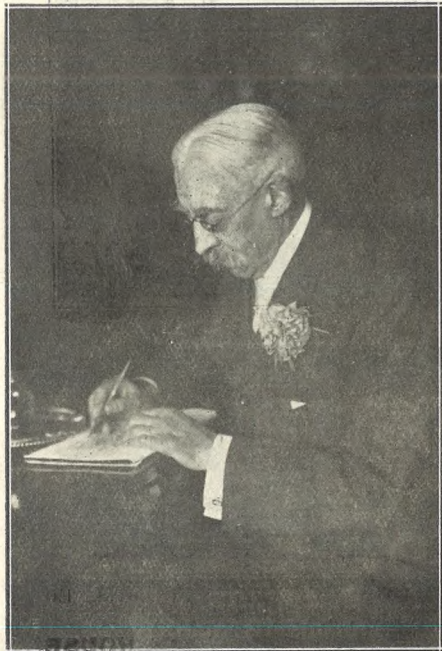

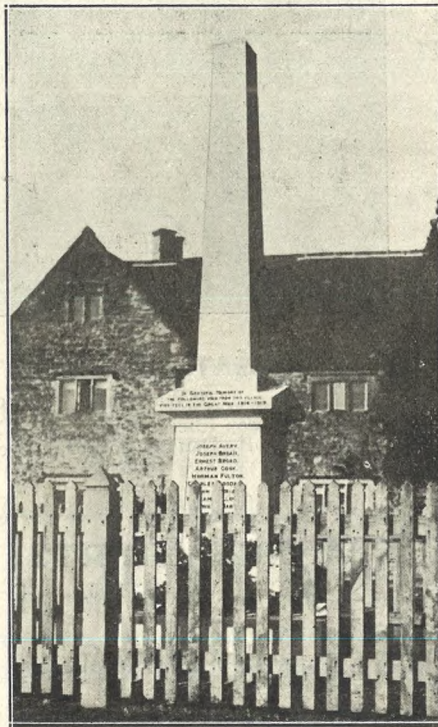

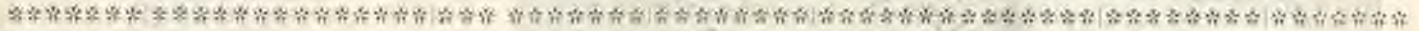
