




BAZAAR AT ST. PETER'S, CHELTENHAM.





THE CREAT SILENCE. On Tuesday, Nov. 11, at 11 o'clock a.m., the first anniversary of the 11th hour of the eleventh day of the 11th month (at which the Armistice was signed a year ago), at the expressed wish of the King the whole of the Empire ceased all work and noise for two minutes in remembrance of the glorious dead who perished in the Great War. A crowd assembled just before 11 o'clock at the corner of the Promenade, and as the hooter signalled the hour the silence that fell was almost uncanny. 
