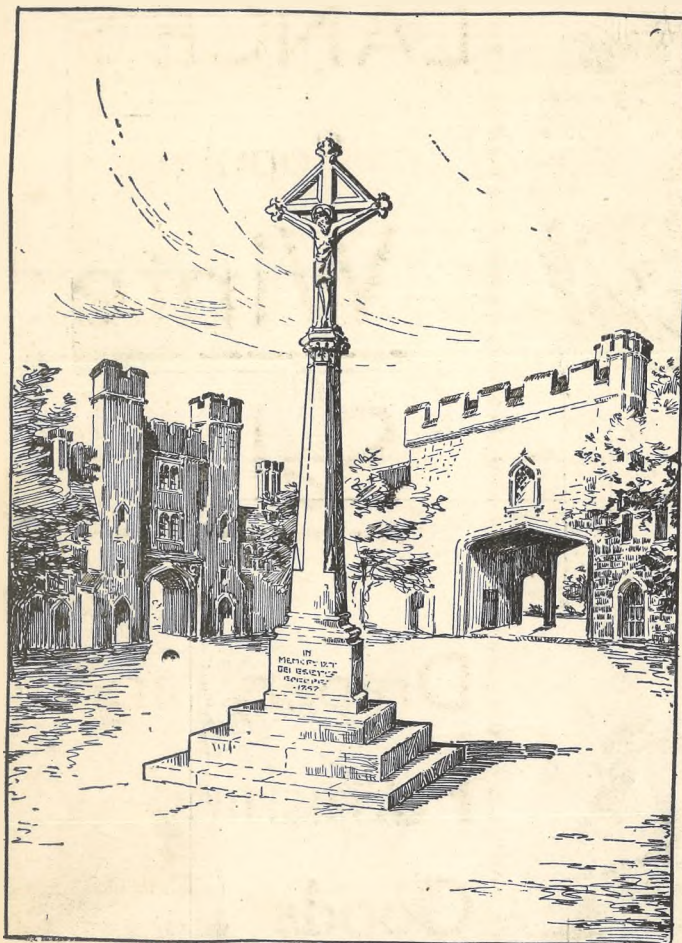

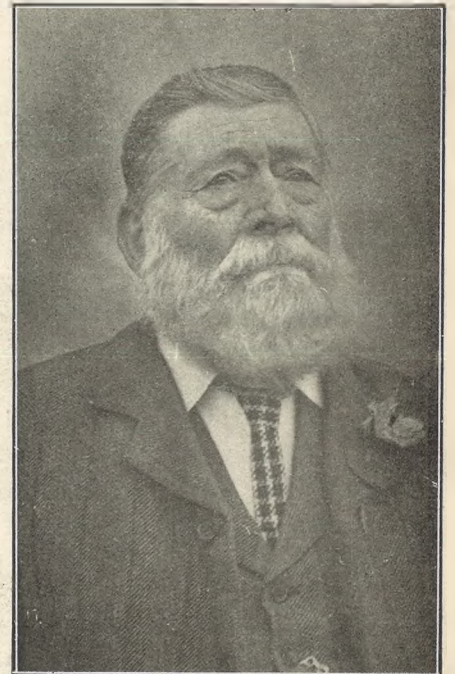

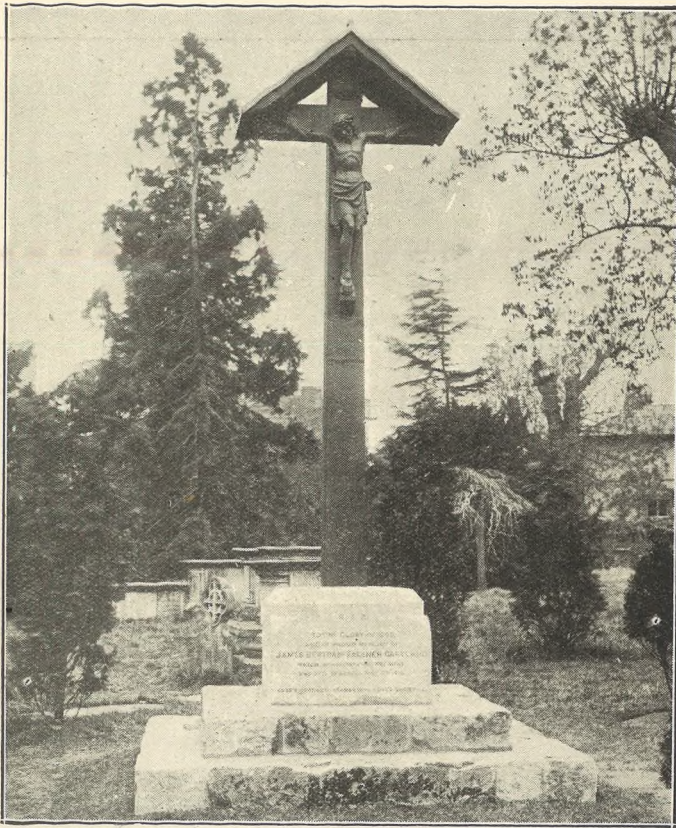

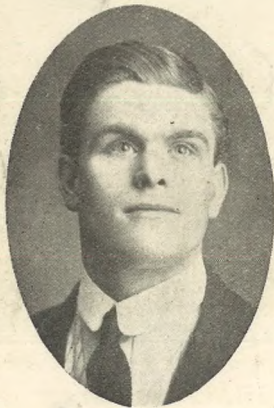


ENGLISH AMATEUR CUP TIE IN CHELTENHAM.

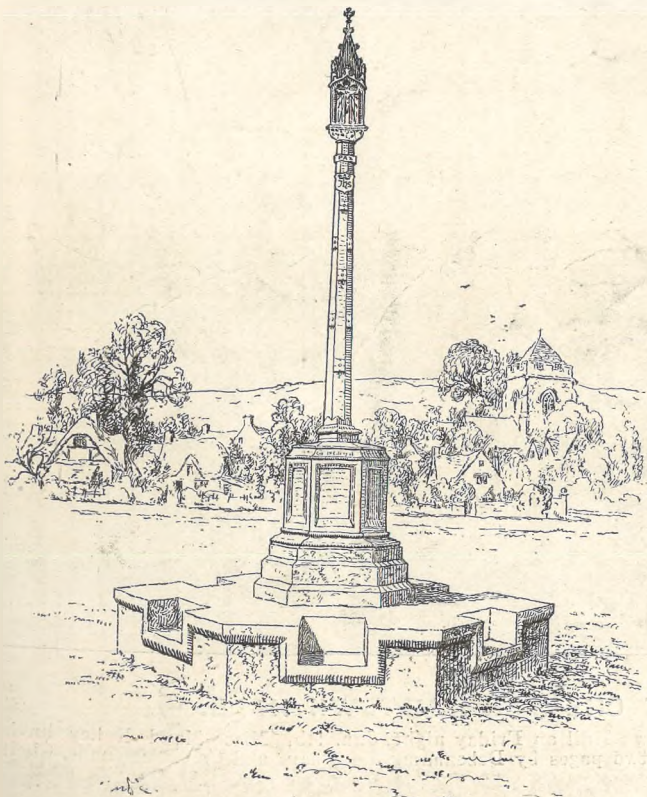

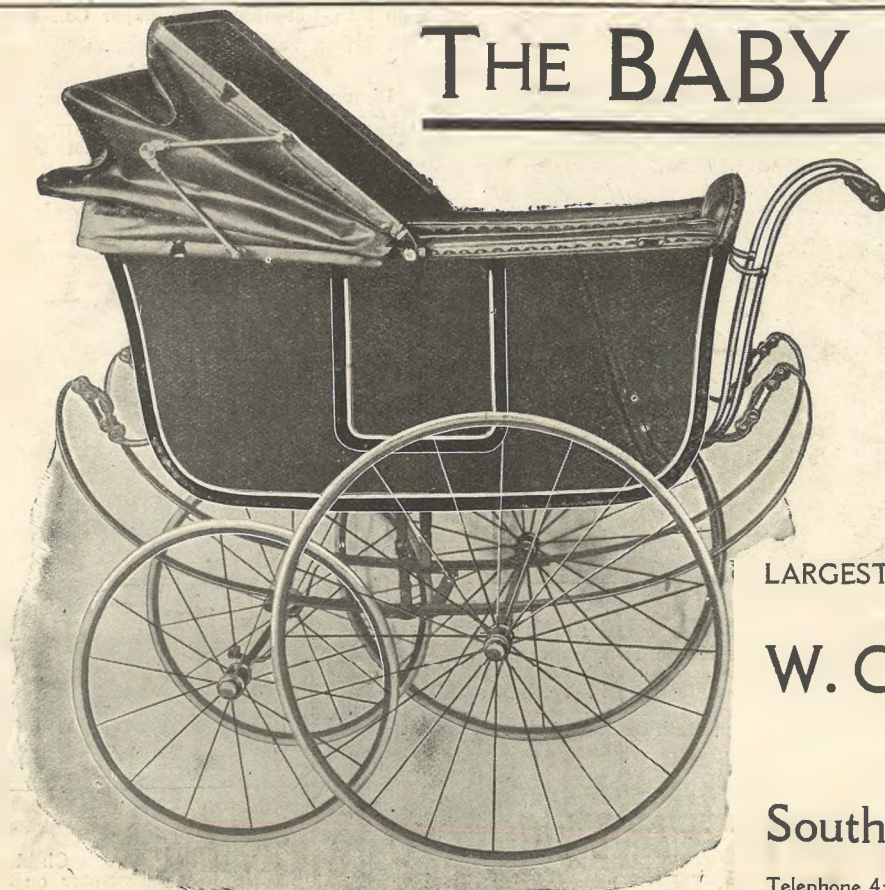

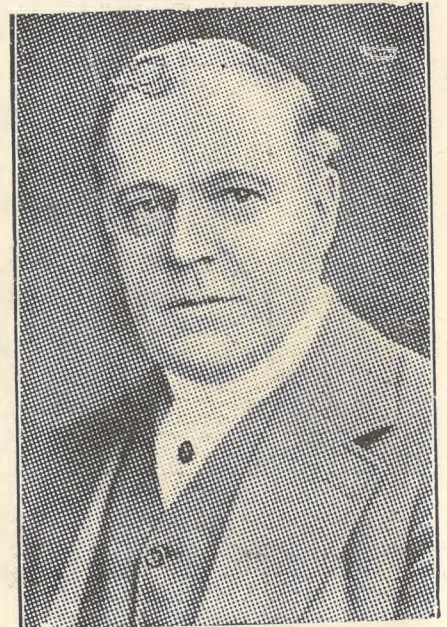

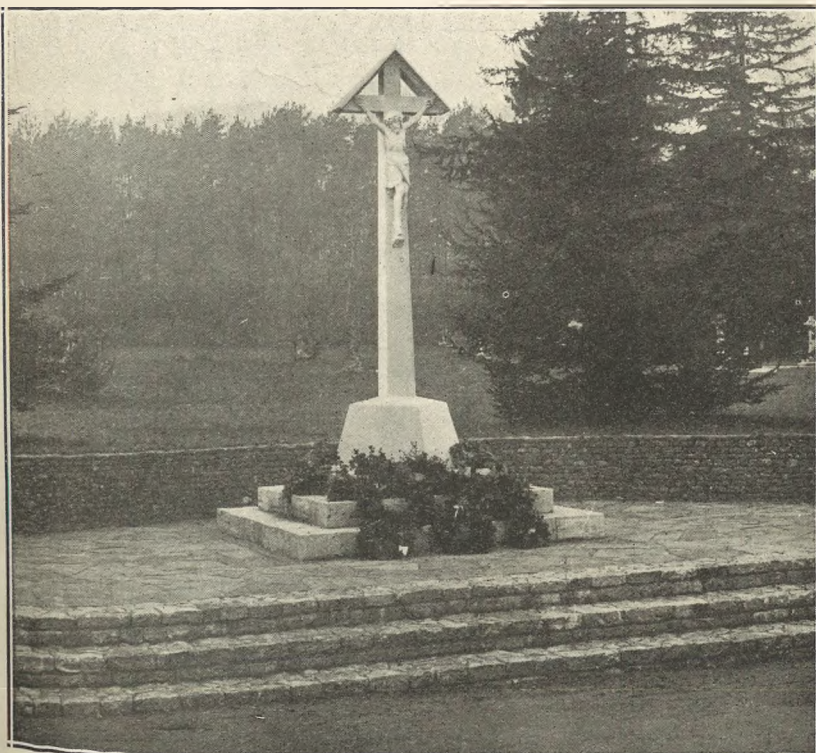
