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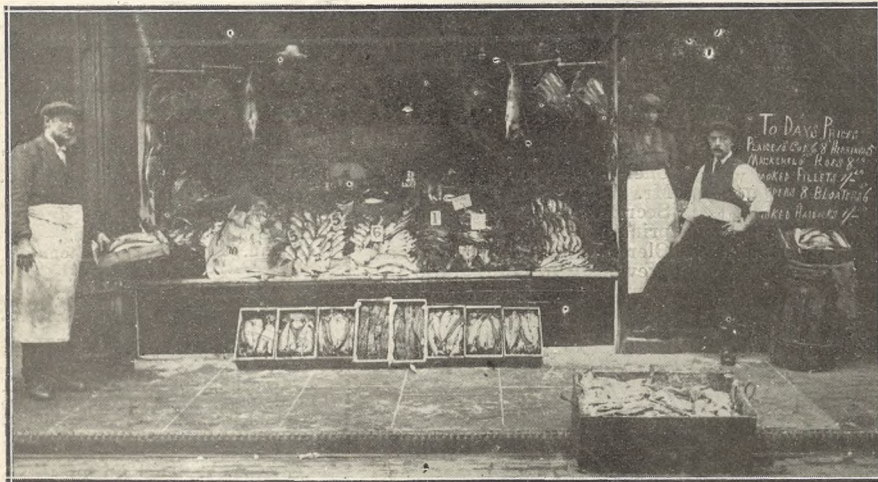
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A PRETTY CHELTENHAM WEDDING.

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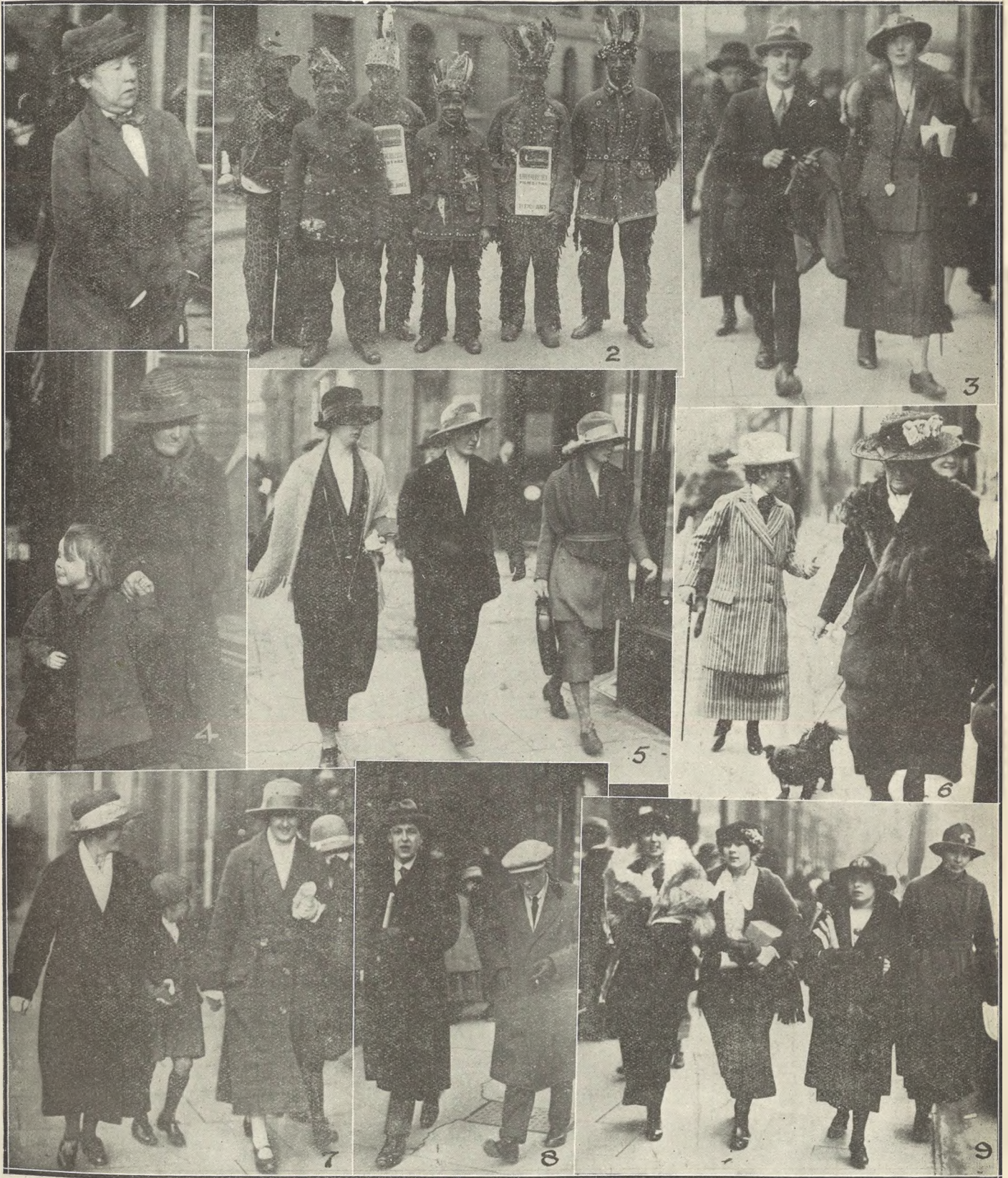

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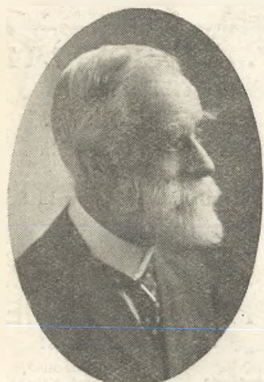
WALTZING COMPETITION AT MONTELLIER BATHS.

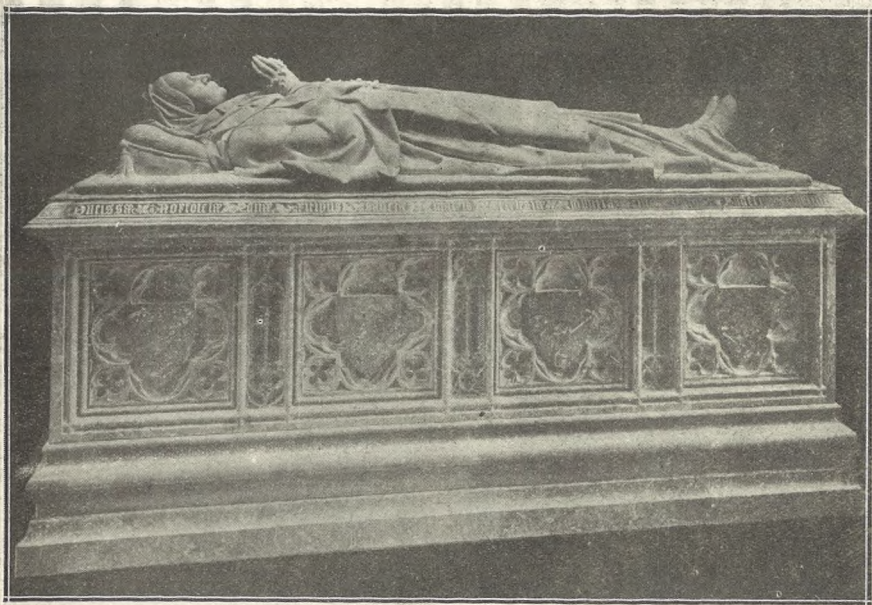

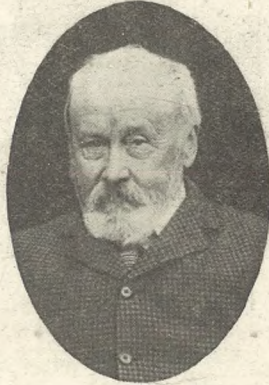
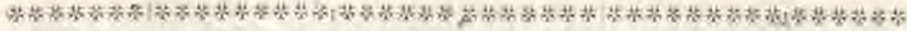

MEMORIAL TO THE LATE DUCHESS OF NORFOLK.

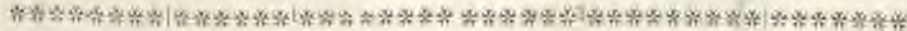

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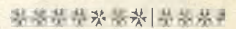

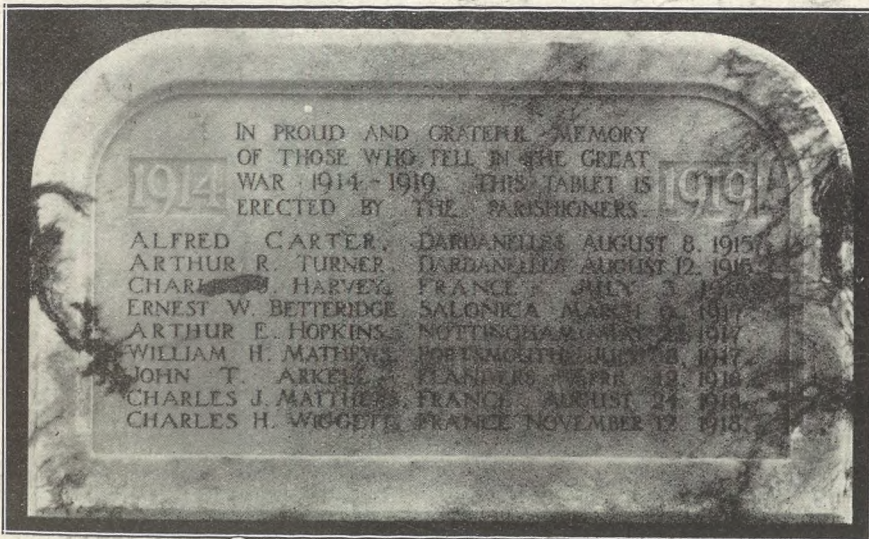
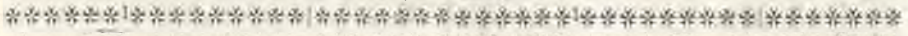

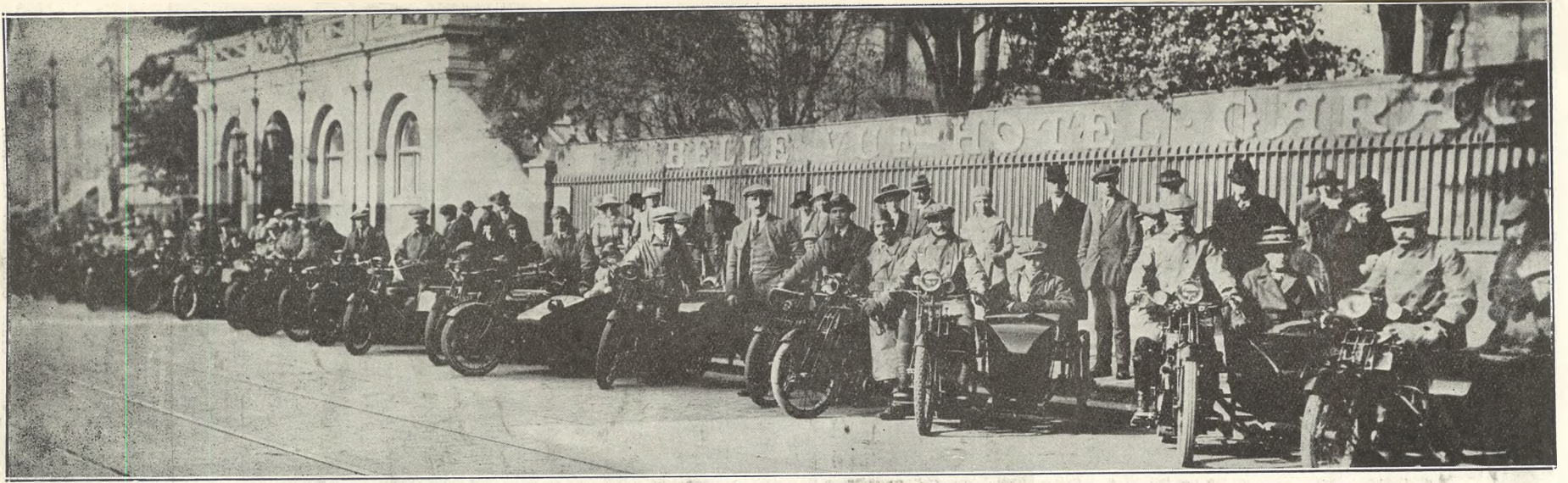


CHELTENHAM GRAMMAR SCHOOL CROSS-COUNTRY RUN.

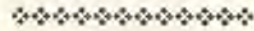
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
