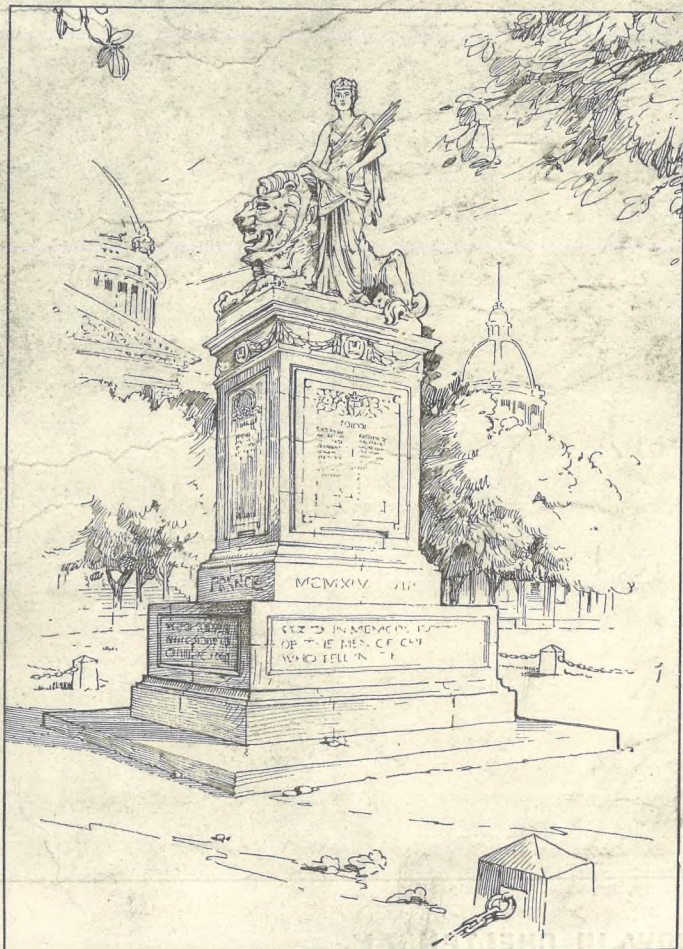

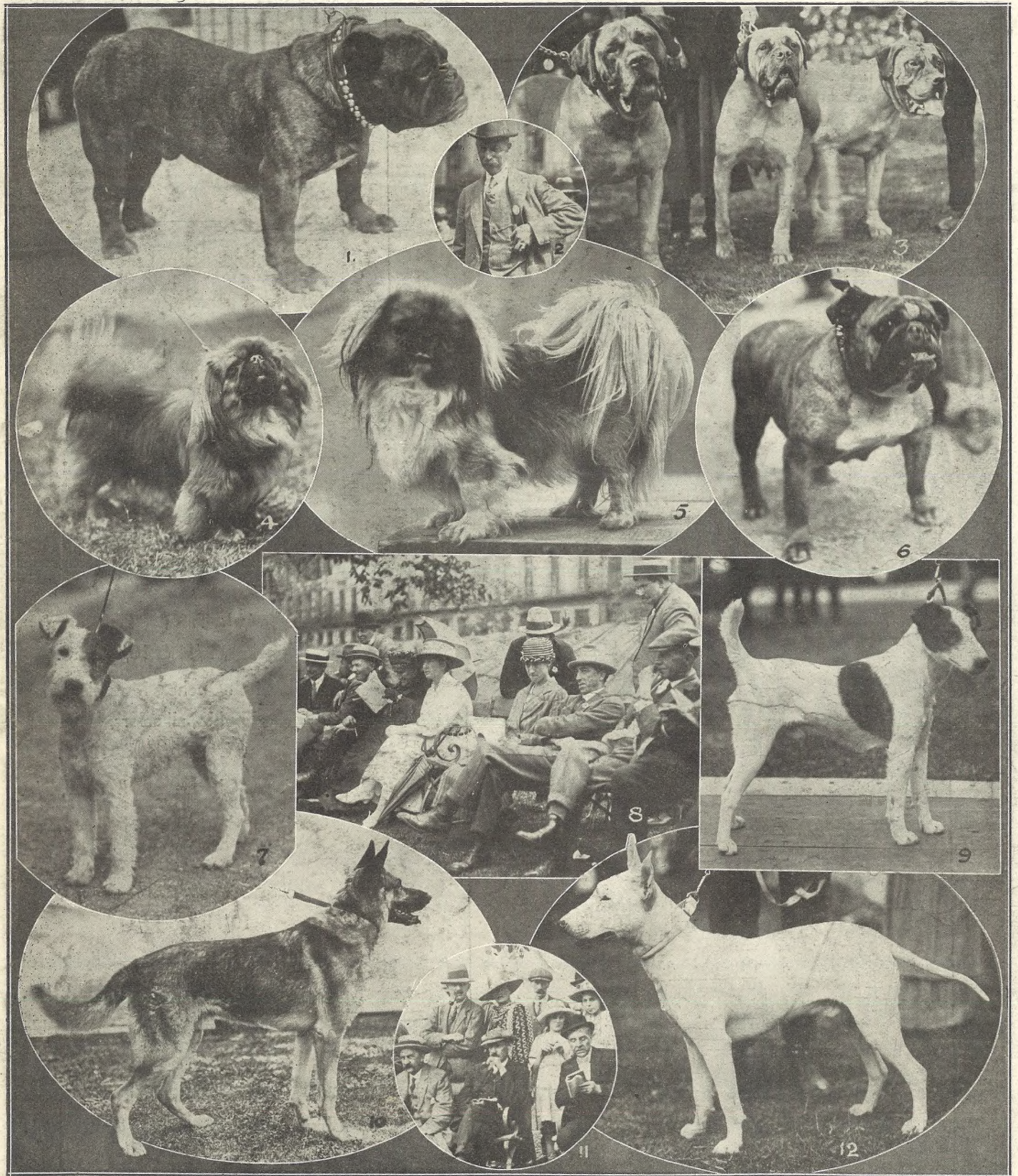

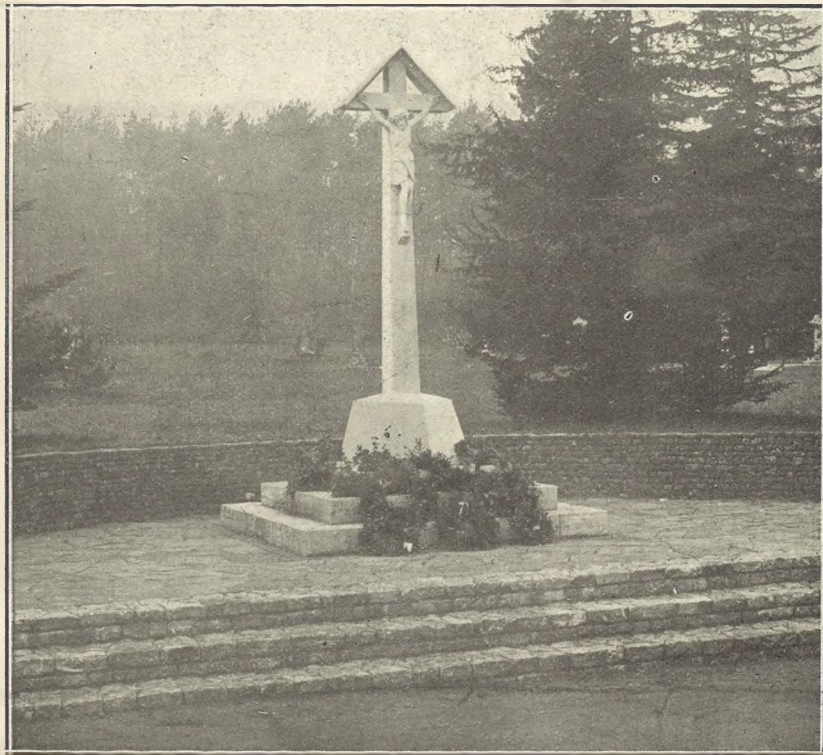

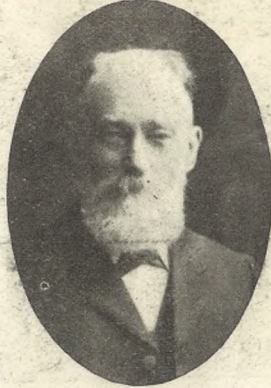


CHELTENHAM CONSERVATIVE NORTH WARD WOMEN'S OUTING.

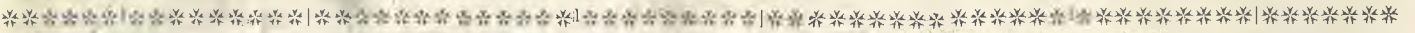

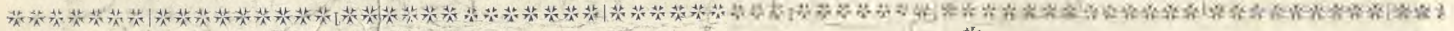
