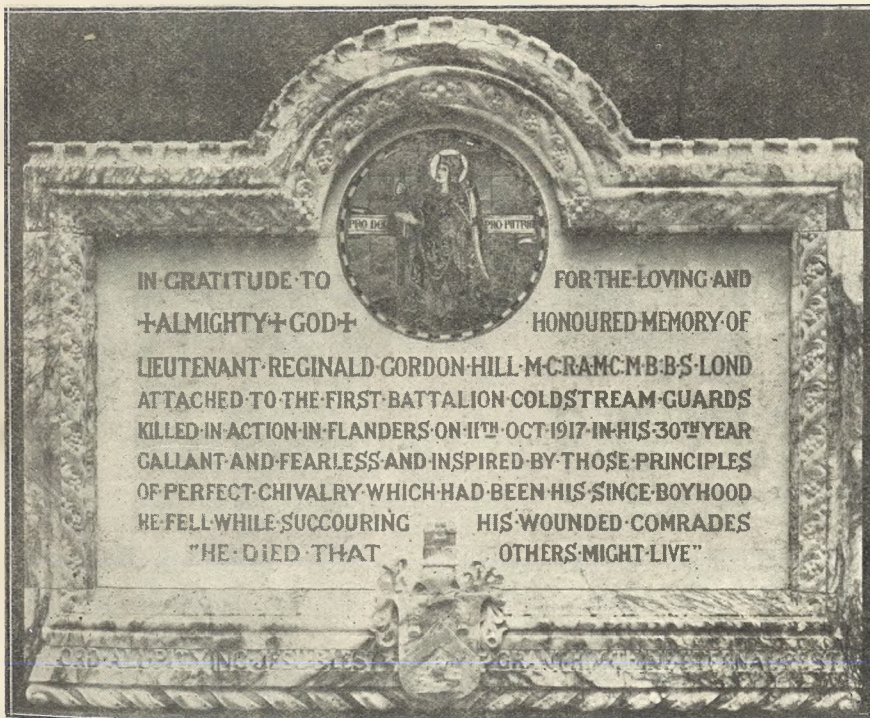

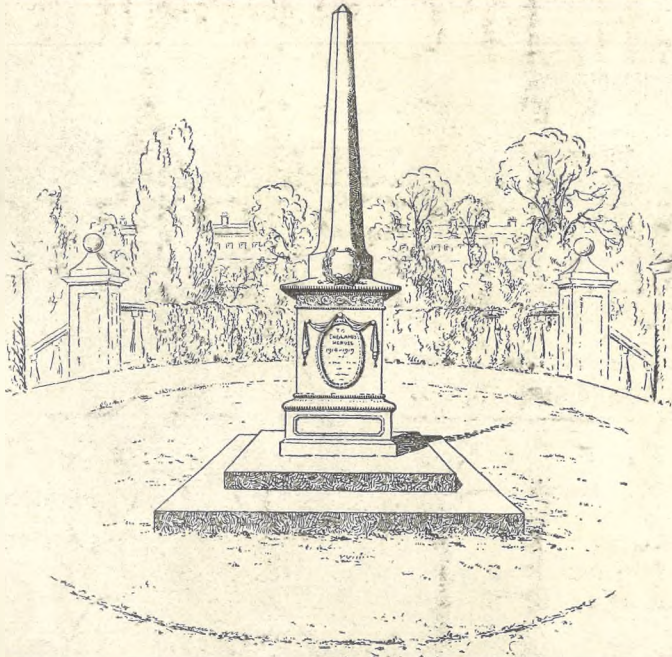


OPENING OF PARISH HALL AND FETE AT UPPER SLAUGHTER.

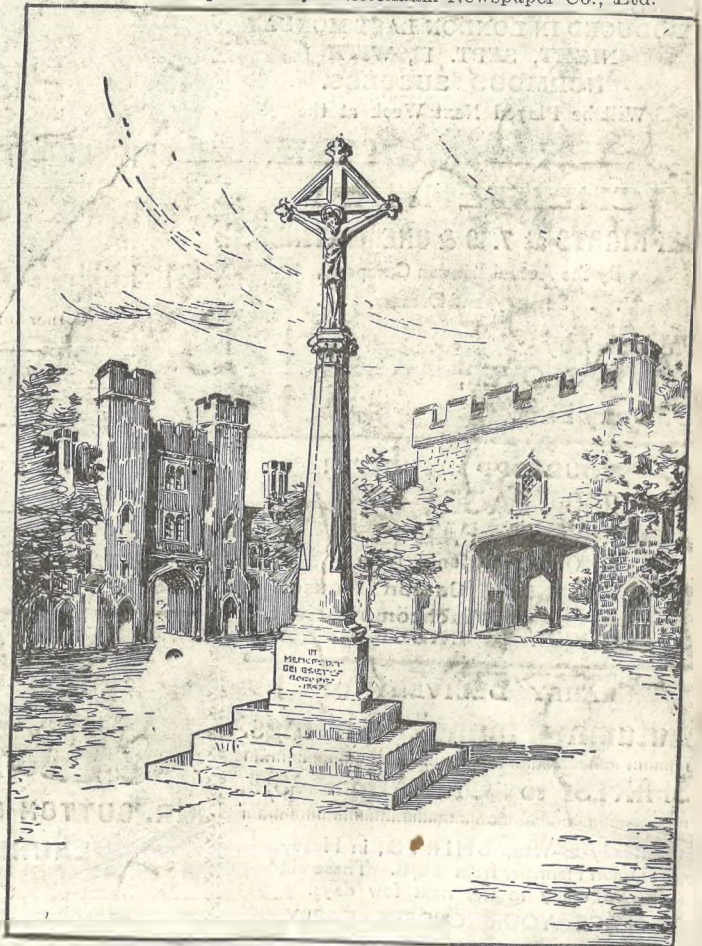

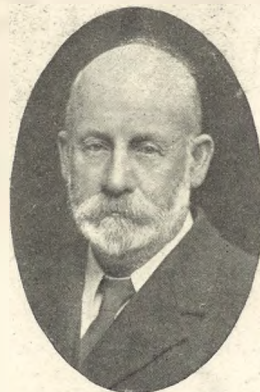

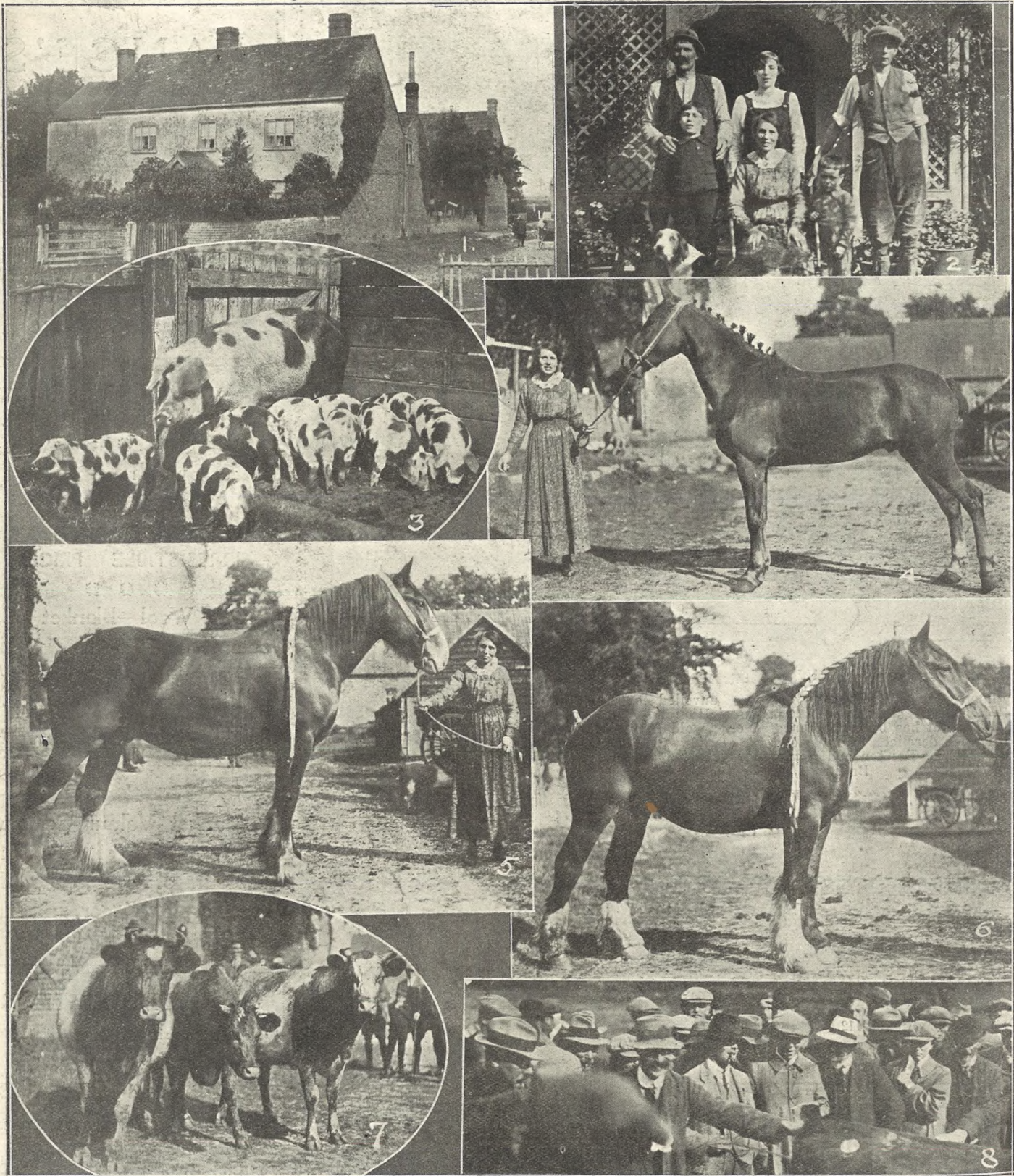

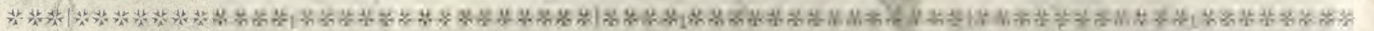
