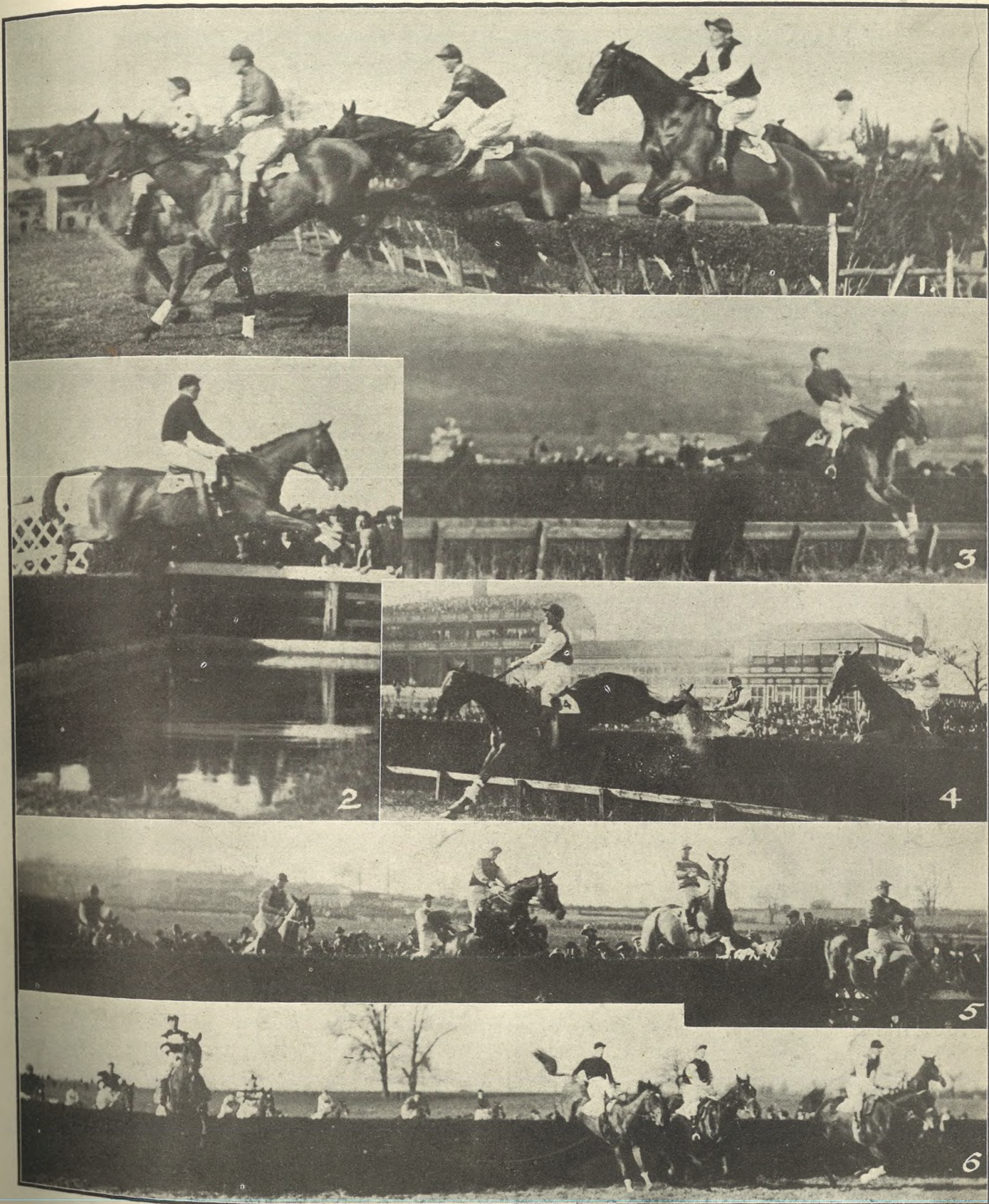

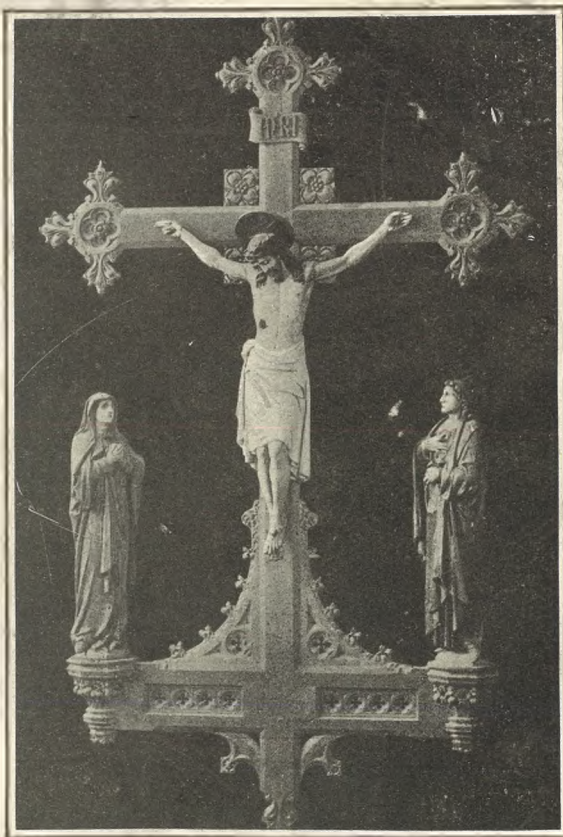

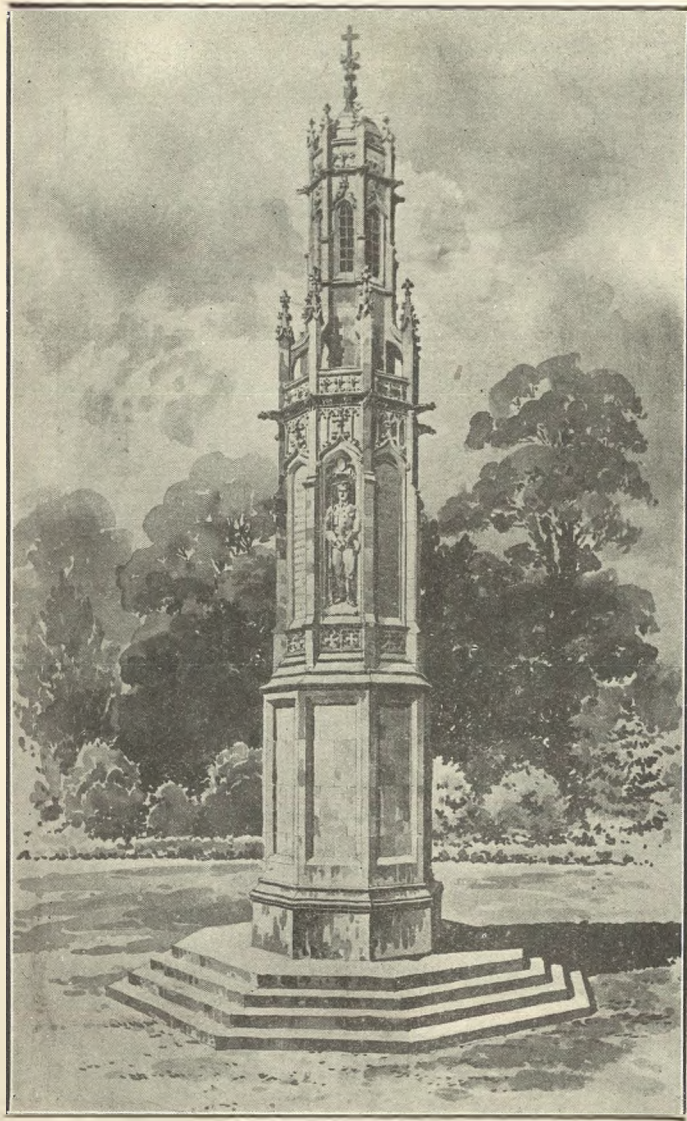


"TWELFTH NIGHT" BY THE CHELTHENHAM SHAKESPEARE SOCIETY.

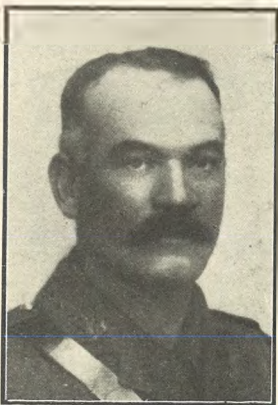
PRESTATYN WAR MEMORIAL.

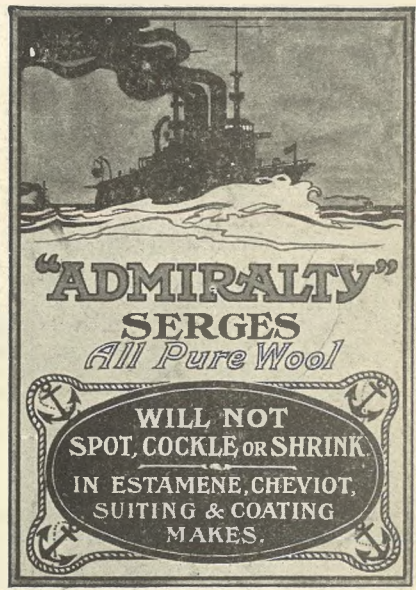

4.—Home Farm, Little Herberts, now the property of Mrs. F. G. Adams, a picturesque old building.

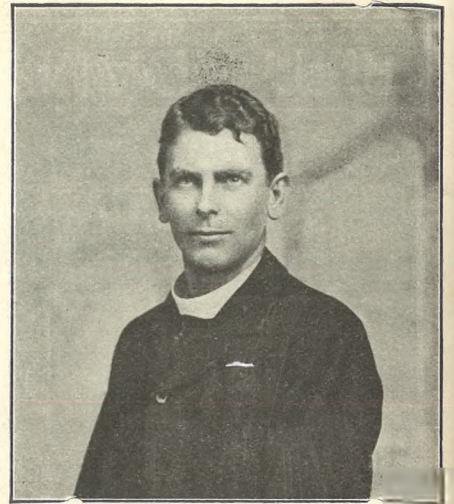

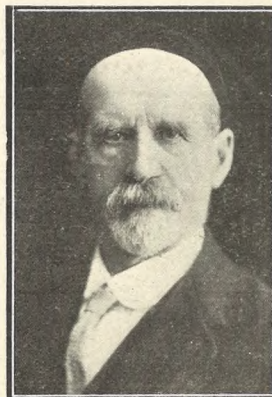


EX-P.C. OWEN NEALE,

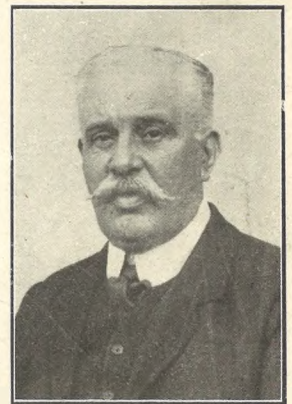
LIEUT. W. E. F. JONES,

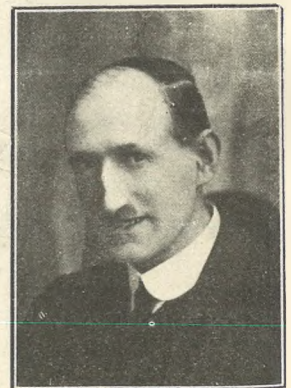
MR W. G. BROWNE,

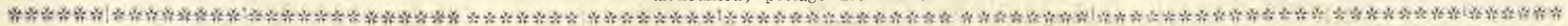

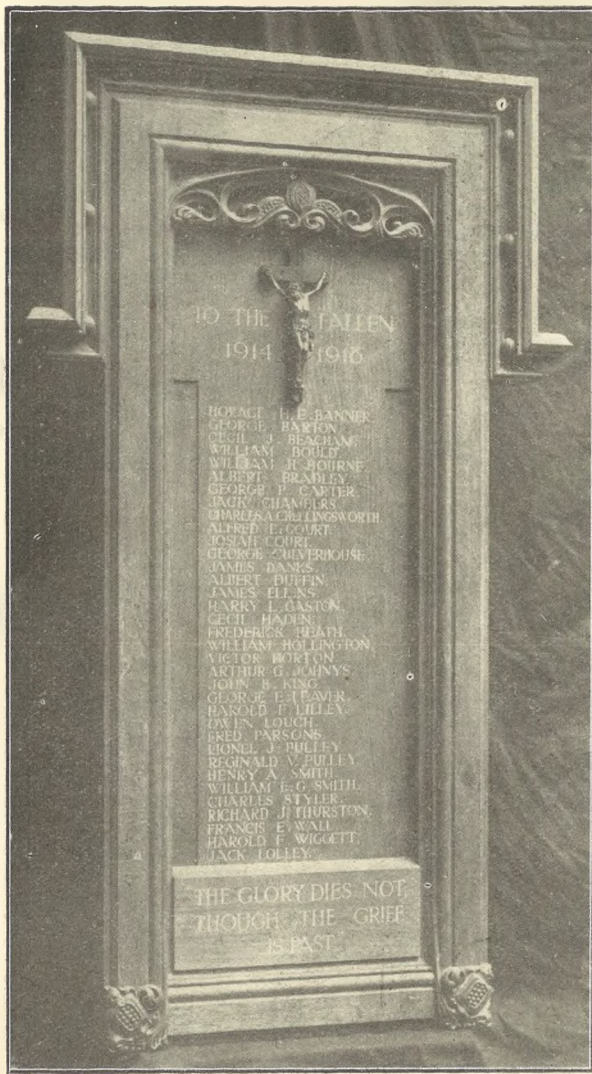
- 1.—The older part of the main front of Southam De-la-Bere

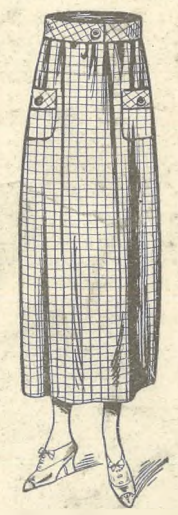

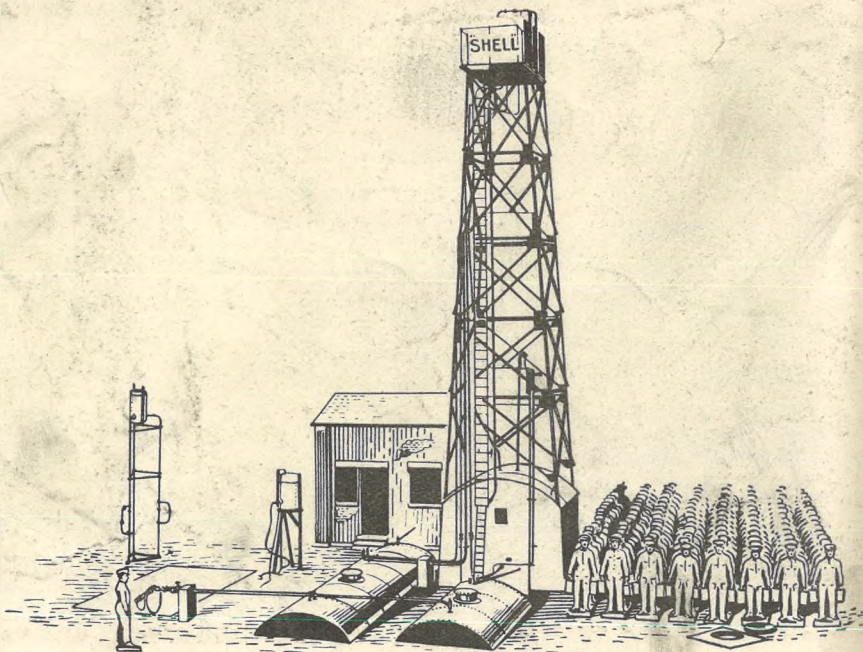

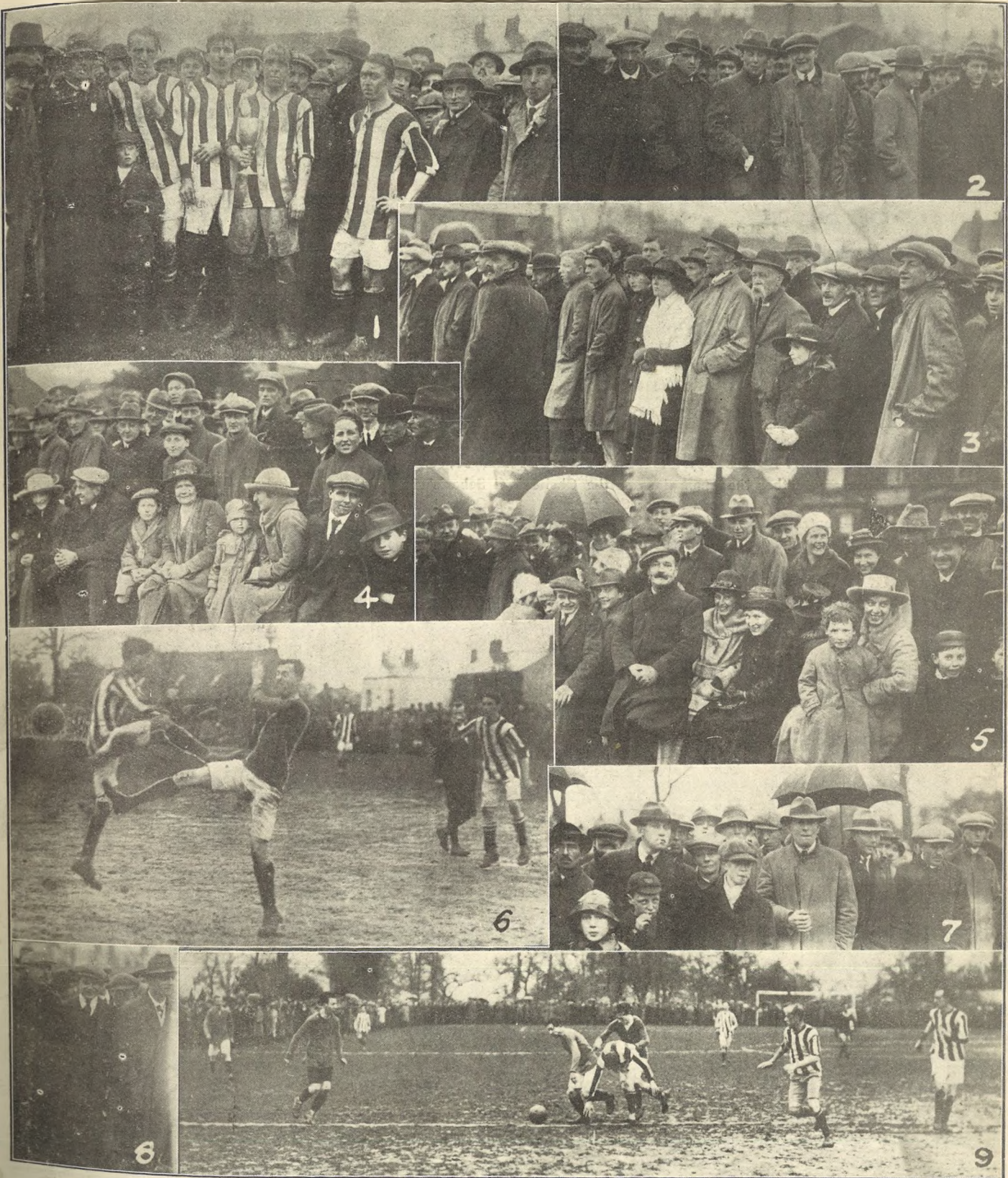


The HISTORIC STORY of "SHELL" OIL.

The above photograph shows part of a remarkable exhibition now taking place at the Bath-road establishment of Messrs H. G. Norton and Co., Ltd. It is the result of the enterprise of Shell Mex Ltd., by arrangement with Messrs Norton, who are agents for "Shell" specialities. The models shown are exactly as displayed at the recent "Daily Mail" Efficiency Exhibition, at which the "Shell" exhibit was one of the greatest attractions. One of the models represents the five million petrol cans made during the war at the Shell Factory, Fulham. Stacked one upon another these cans would form a pile as broad as the base of Nelson's Monument and tower far above the world's highest building (the Woolworth Building, New York). Another wonderful model is that of the Aeroplane Filling Plant introduced during the war by the "Shell" engineers to supersede the laborious task of filling aeroplane tanks by hand, one man being able to do the work of 160 by its means. We illustrate this particular model in detail. There is also an actual scale model of the Vickers-Vimy aeroplane on which Captain Sir Ross Smith made his famous flight from England to Australia, for which "Shell" Aviation Spirit was used. Special interest will be taken in the various specimens and grades of petroleum oil in its crude condition—a really good educational exhibit. Few people imagine, however, that there are no fewer than 800 derivatives from the various crude oils, from ether and medicinal oils, to petrol, paraffin, and eventually the heavy motor oils. Another interesting feature of this display is a miniature copy of the great "Shell" Poster to be seen in Kingsway. Those who are unable to visit the exhibitor in the daytime should inspect it in the evening, when the model buildings are most attractively illuminated.
