PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—WINCHCOMBE.

Winchcombe is one of the oldest towns in England, and was the capital of Mercia before the arrival of William the Conqueror. At later times it was a place of considerable importance. It contains many beautiful old houses, and its sylvan surroundings add greatly to its quaint, old-world appearance, as it nestles in its hollow of the Cotswolds.

1.—Part of the Quadrangle of Sudeley Castle—a glorious and historic home, now the residence of Mr. H. Dent Brocklehurst.

2.—The ruins of the Banqueting Chamber at Sudeley. The Castle was built in the time of King Stephen, and partly destroyed by Cromwell.

3.—The widow of Henry VIII., lived and died there and is buried in the little Church. Queen Elizabeth also visited Sudeley.

4.—A fine old, "hostelry"—"The Olde Corner Cupboard," hostelry—Queen Gloucester Street.

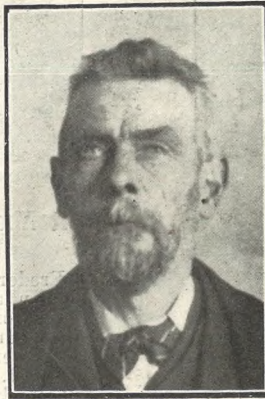

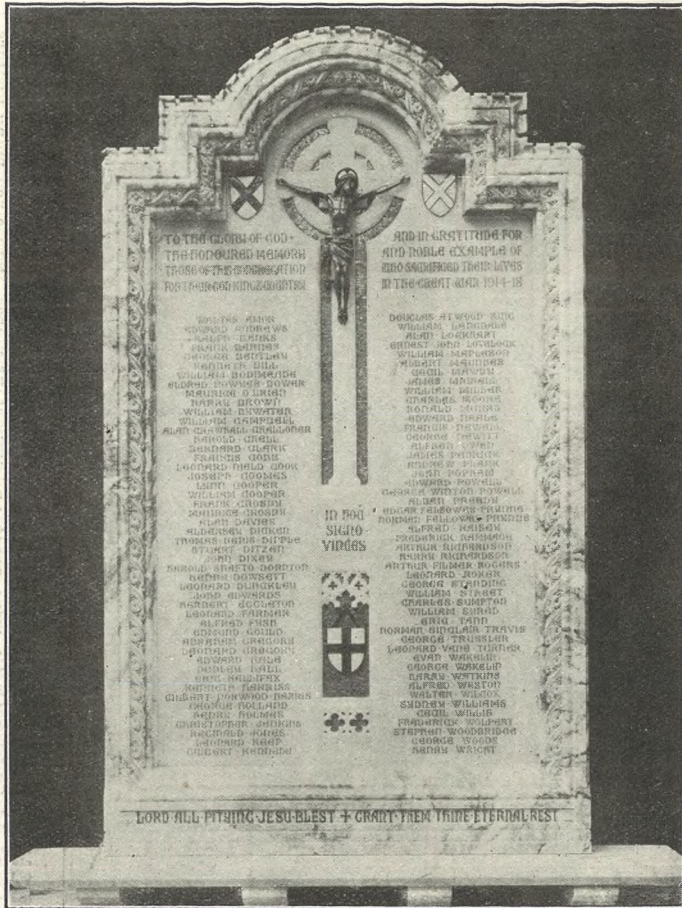

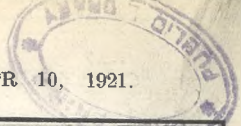

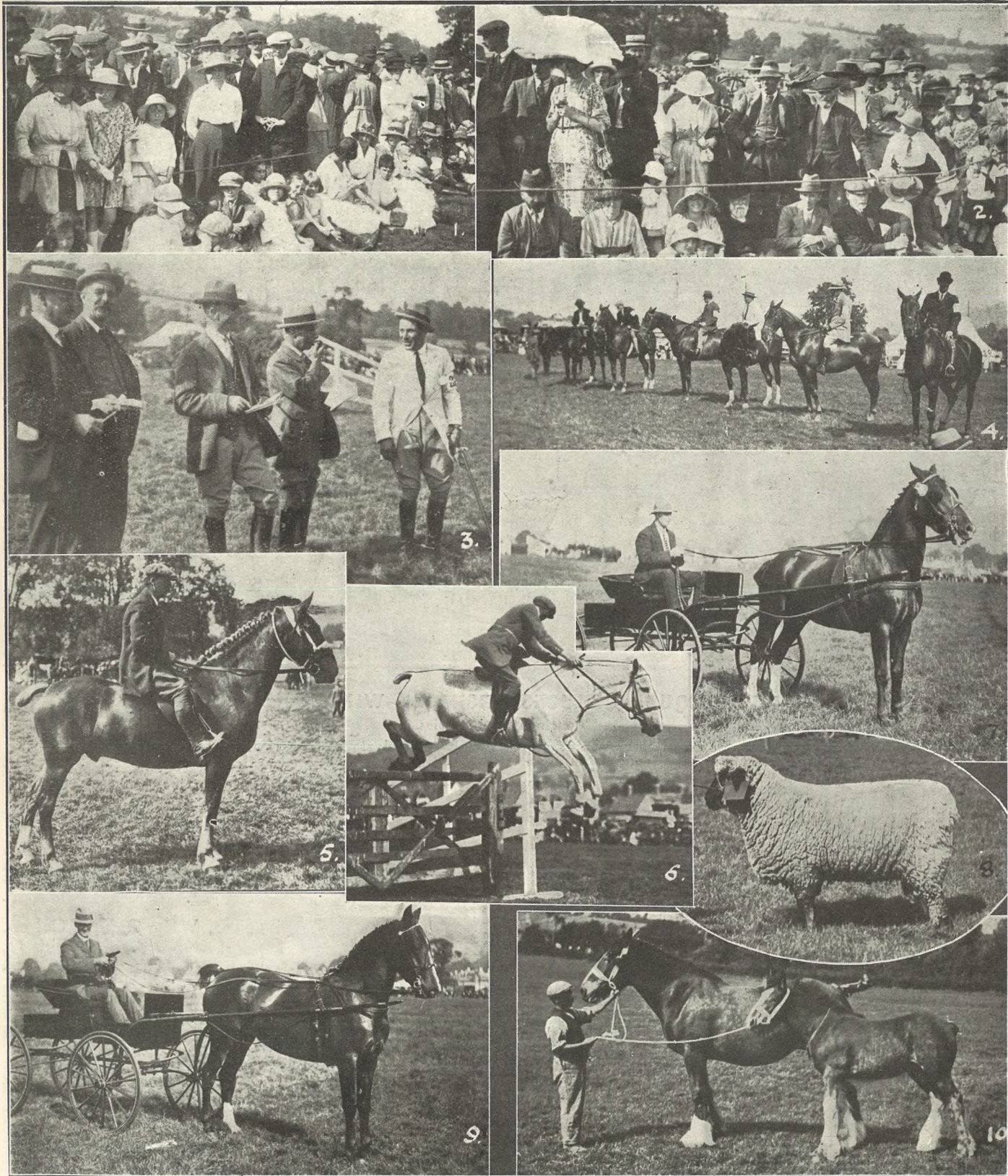

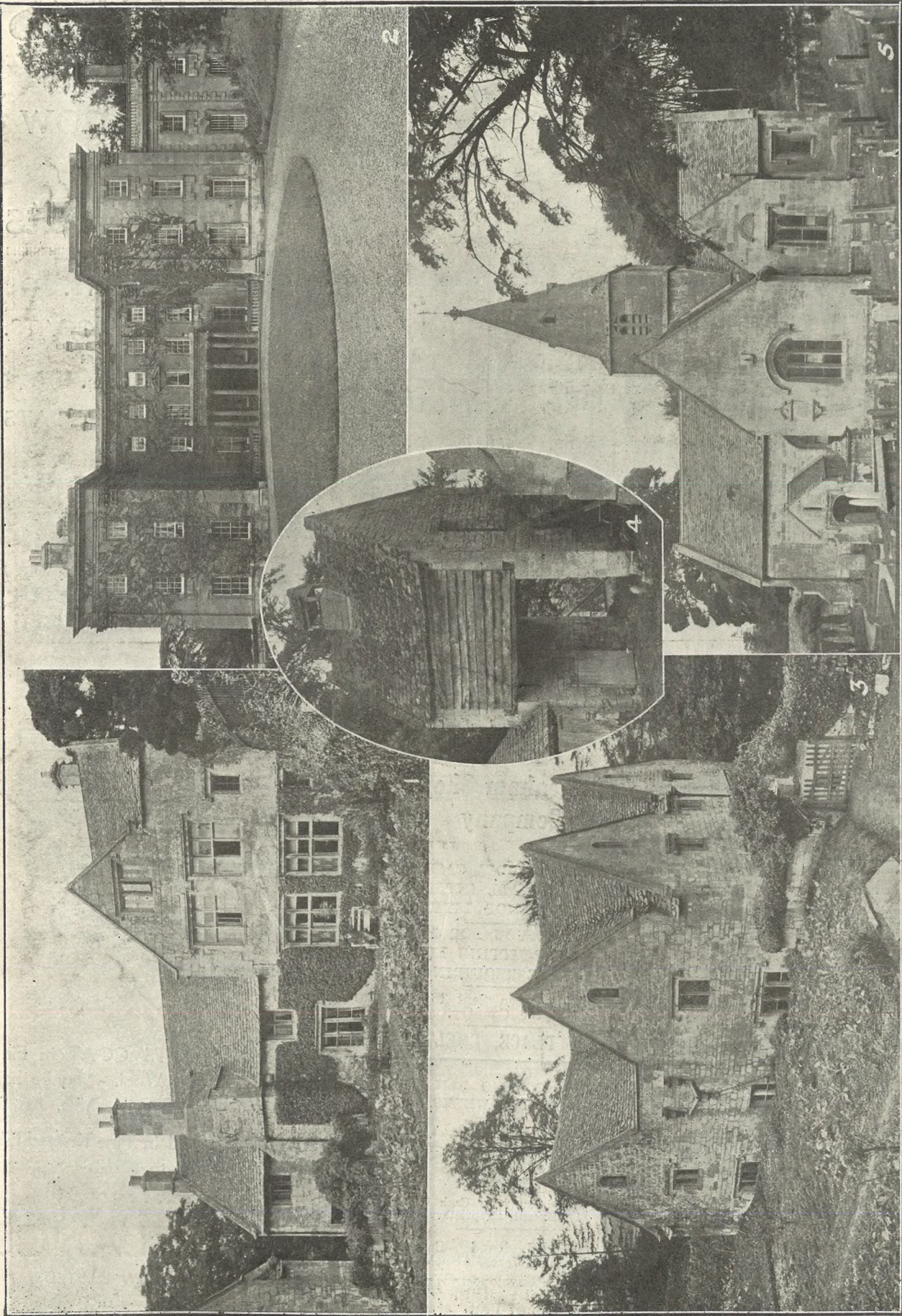

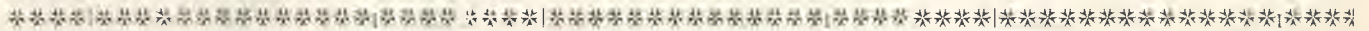

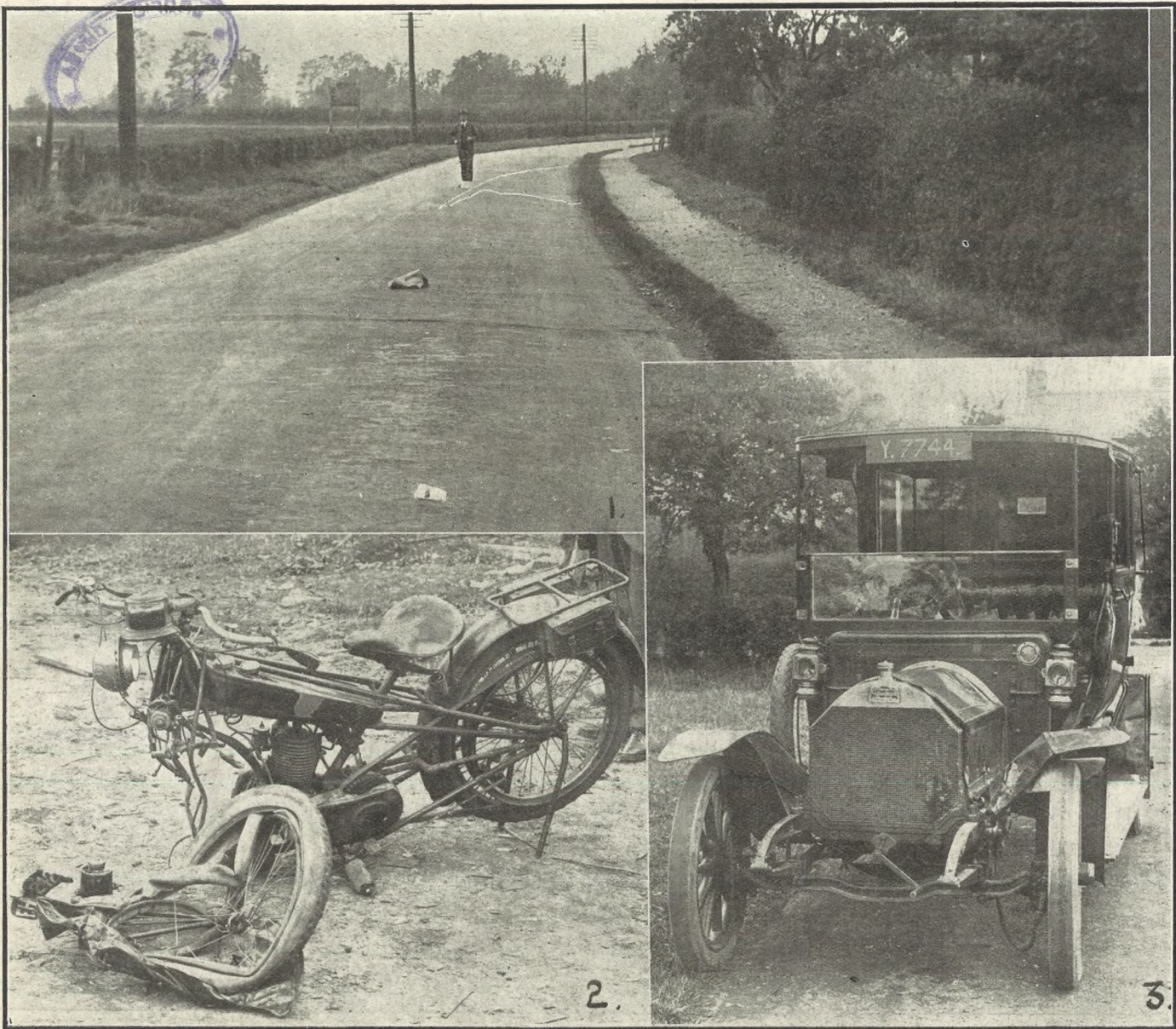
