

### Picturesque Cloucestershire.—Fiddington.

This ancient dove-cot is said to be in the finest state of preservation of any in the country, and is a perfect example of the old Cotswold style of architecture. It is on Mr. Clark's farm at Fiddington, near Ashchurch. The inscription cut on its south face is "I.I.K. 1637." This farm, originally a half-timbered edifice, was the home of William Ferrers, a London merchant, who attained considerable wealth and was a large benefactor of the Parish. A fine bust of him, with a quaint inscription recording his beneficence, is on the walls of Ashchurch Church. The house contains a fine oak-panelled room. Mr. and Mrs. Clark, the present occupants, have lived there 42 years.




