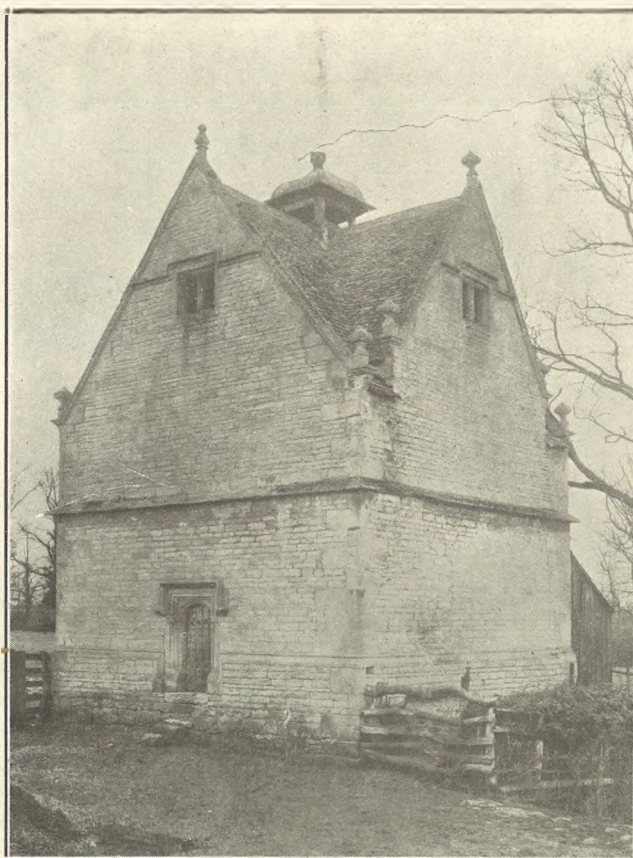

Picturesque Gloucestershire.—Fiddington.

This ancient dove-cot is said to be in the finest state of preservation of any in the country, and is a perfect example of the old Cotswold style of architecture. It is on Mr. Clark's farm at Fiddington, near Ashchurch. The inscription cut on its south face is "I. I. K. 1637." This farm, originally a half-timbered edifice, was the home of William Ferrers, a London merchant, who attained considerable wealth and was a large benefactor of the Parish. A fine bust of him, with a quaint inscription recording his beneficence, is on the walls of Ashchurch Church. The house contains a fine oak-panelled room. Mr. and Mrs. Clark, the present occupants, have lived there 42 years.

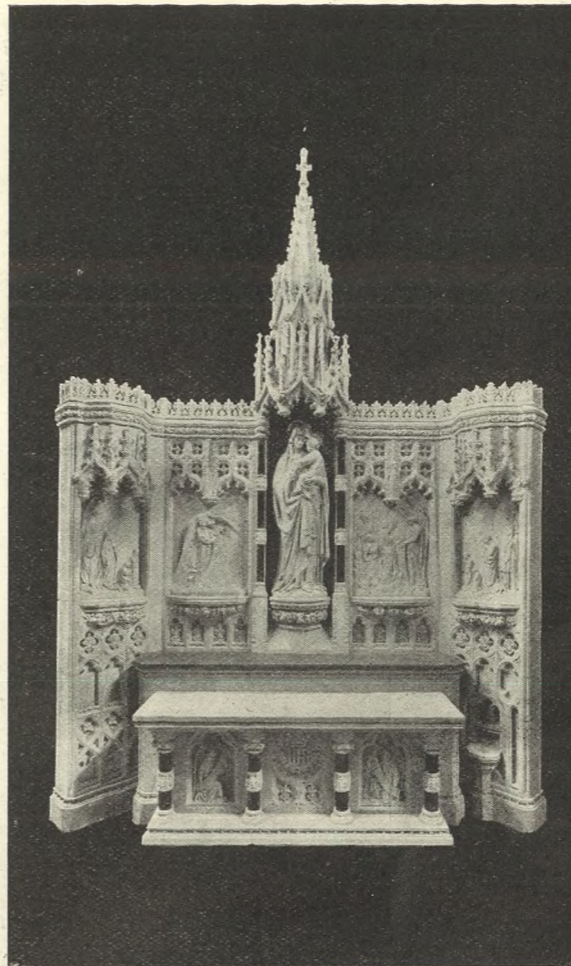

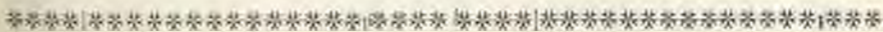

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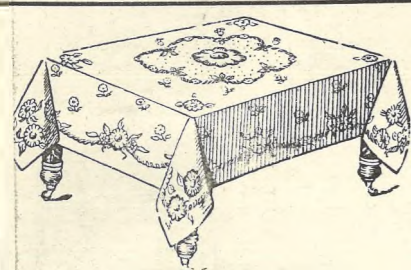
CHELTENHAM AND COUNTY HARRIERS' PRESIDENT'S CUP RACE.

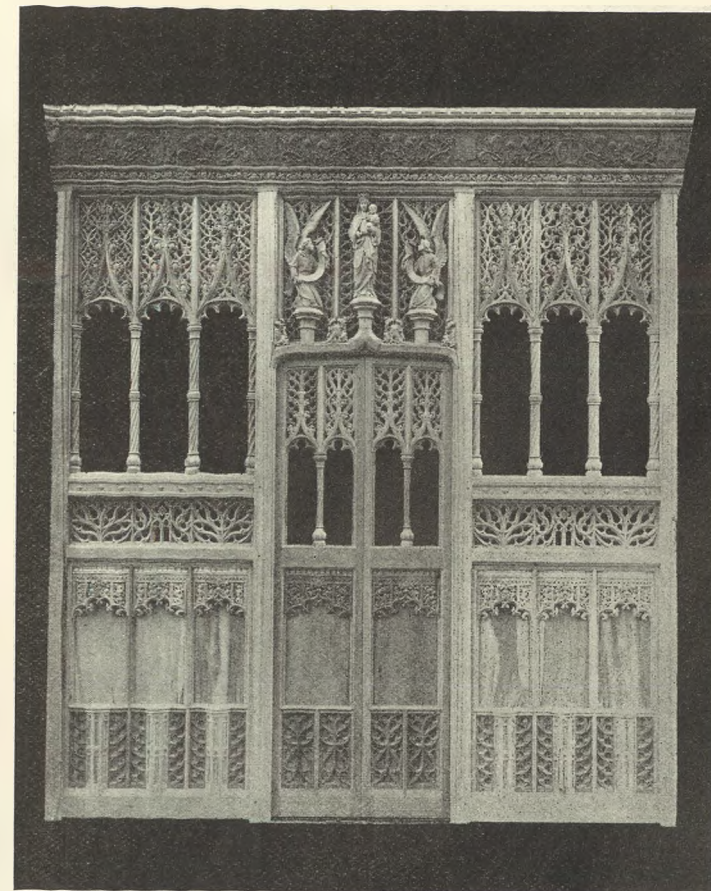

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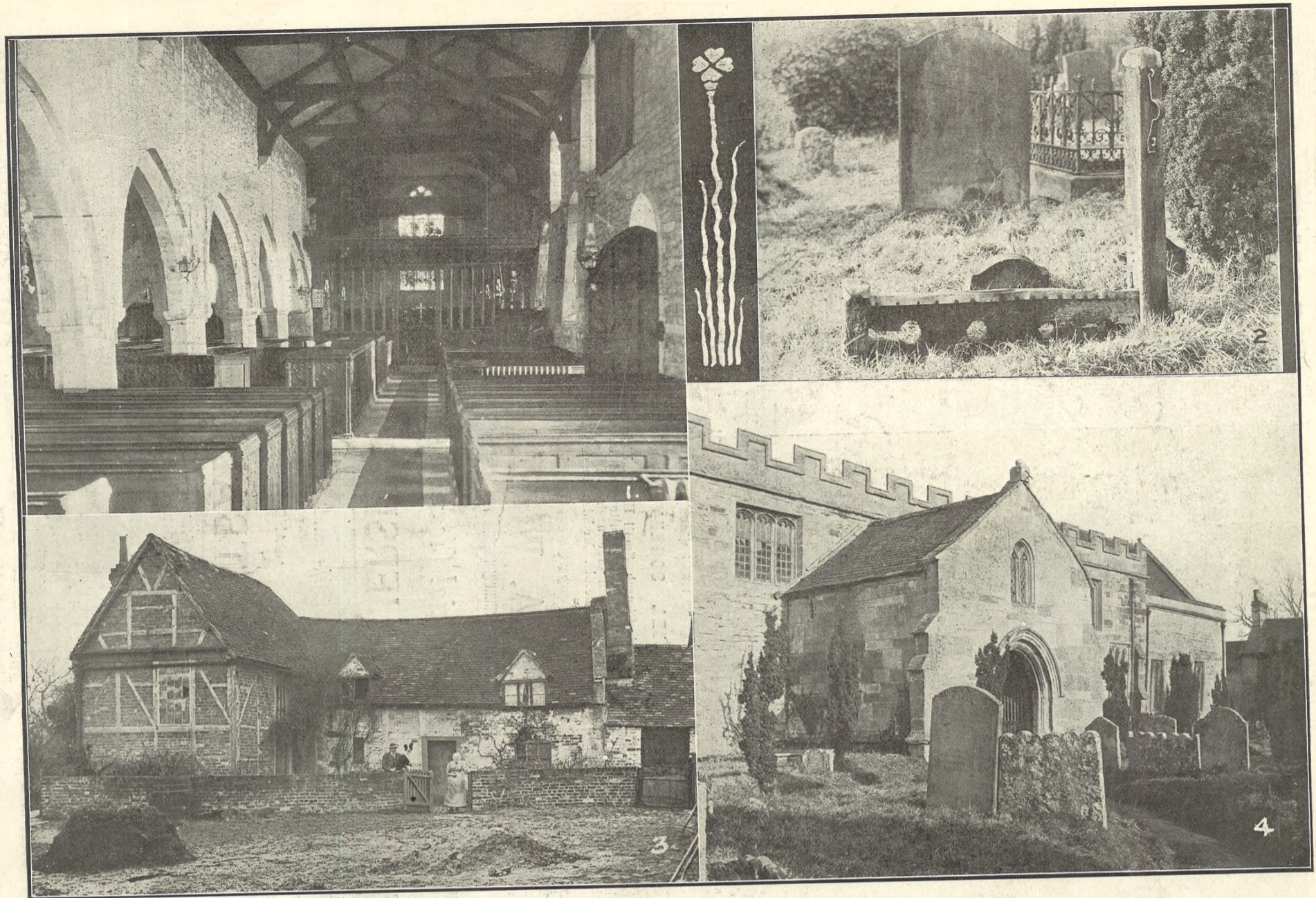

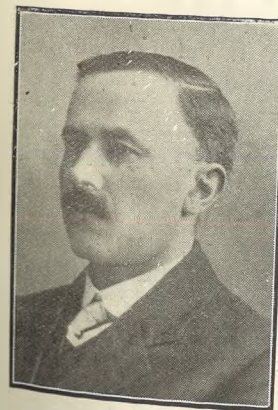

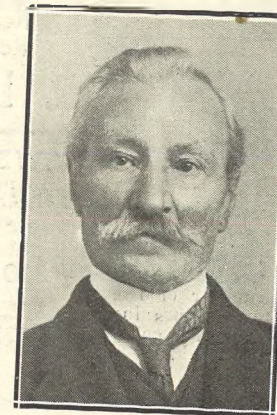

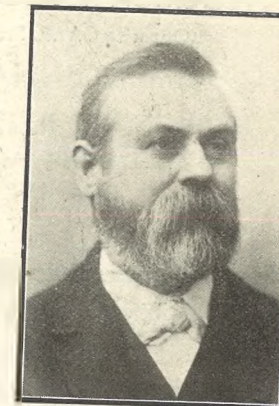

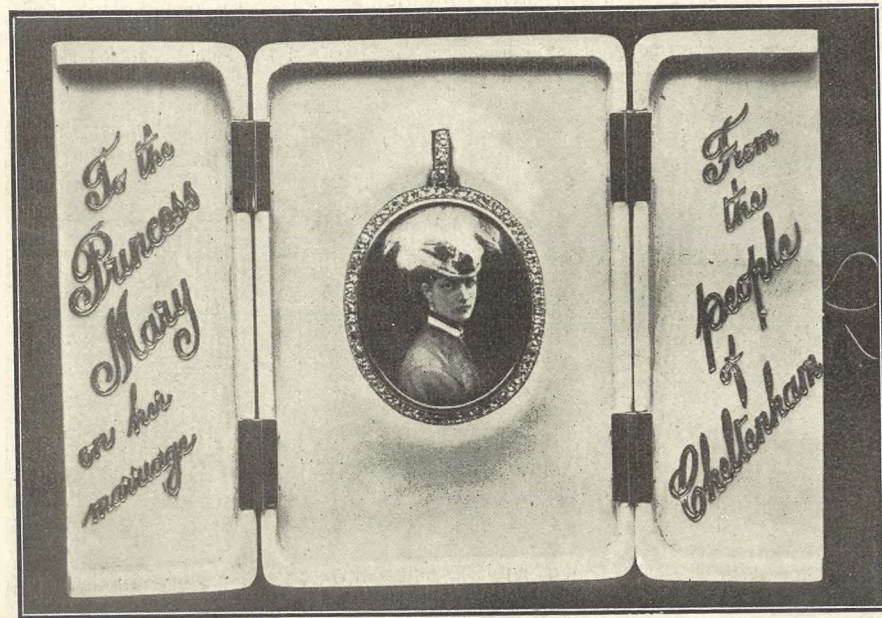

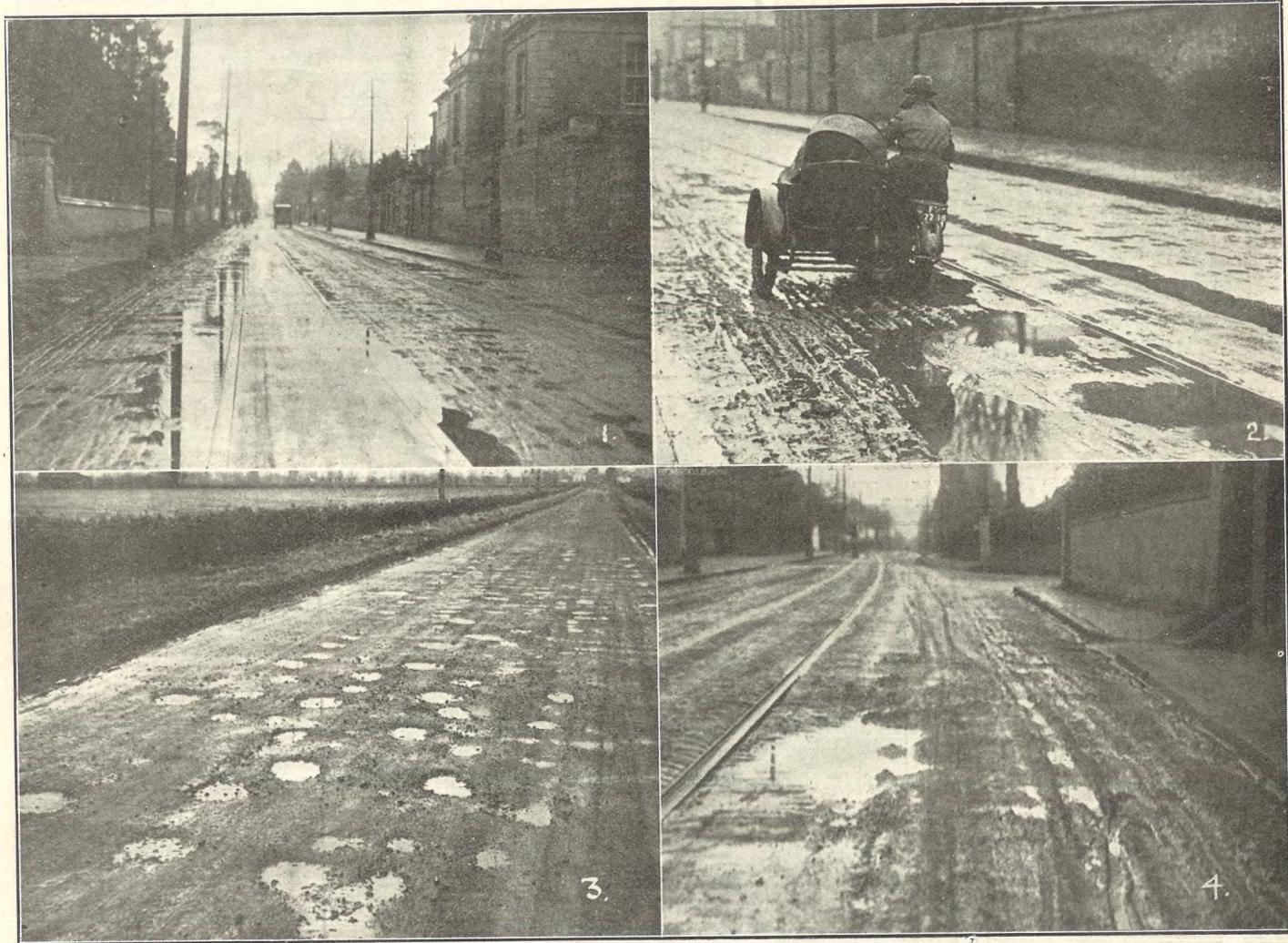

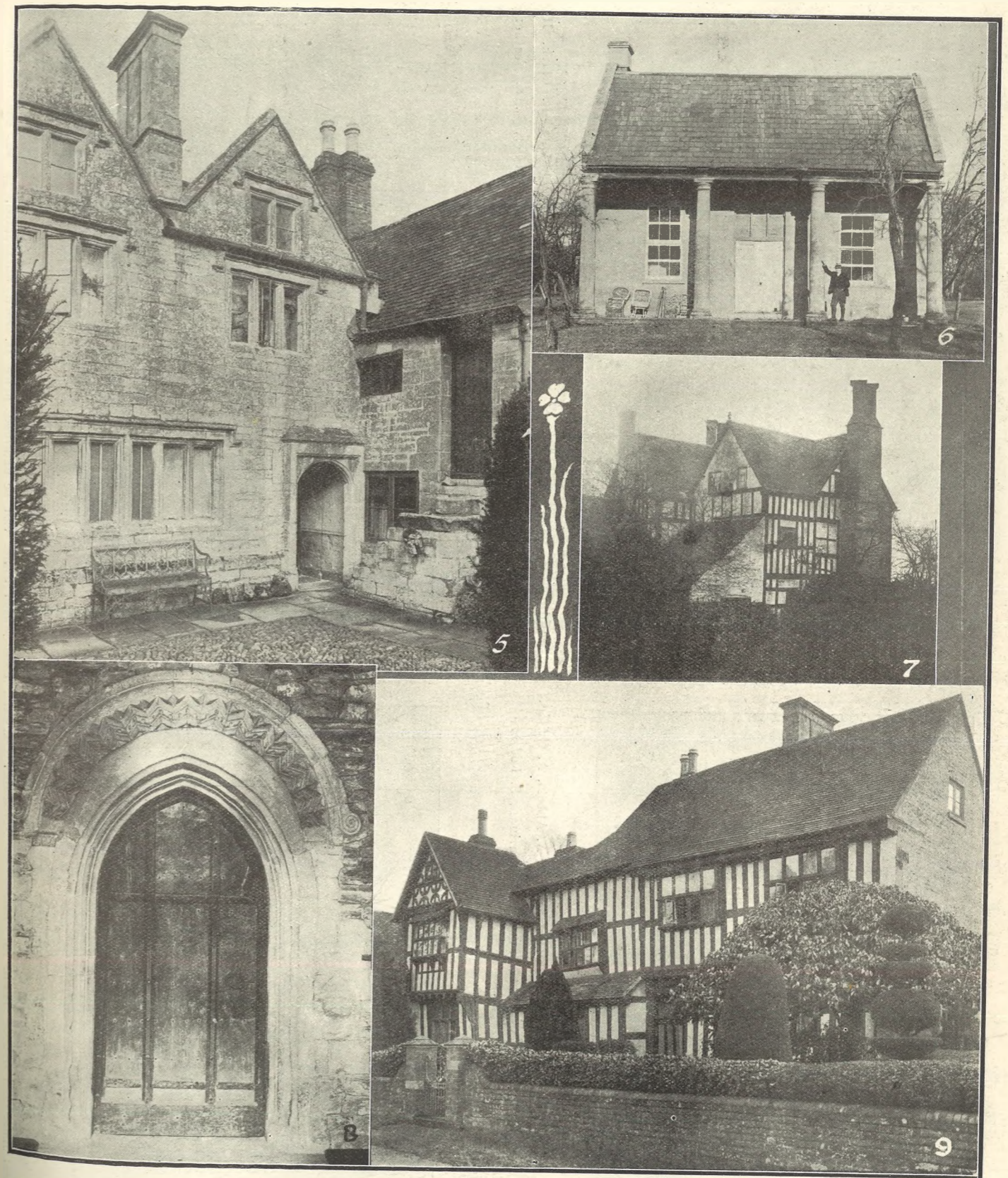

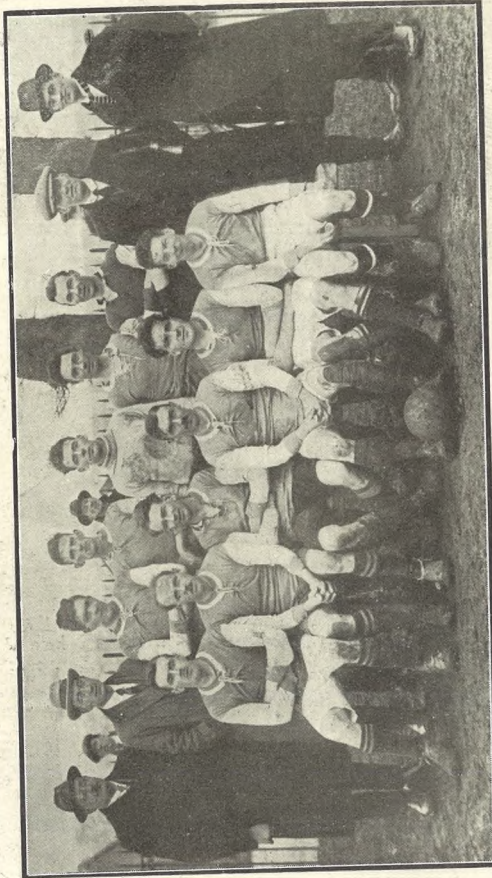
PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE: ASHCURCH AND ITS HAMLETS.

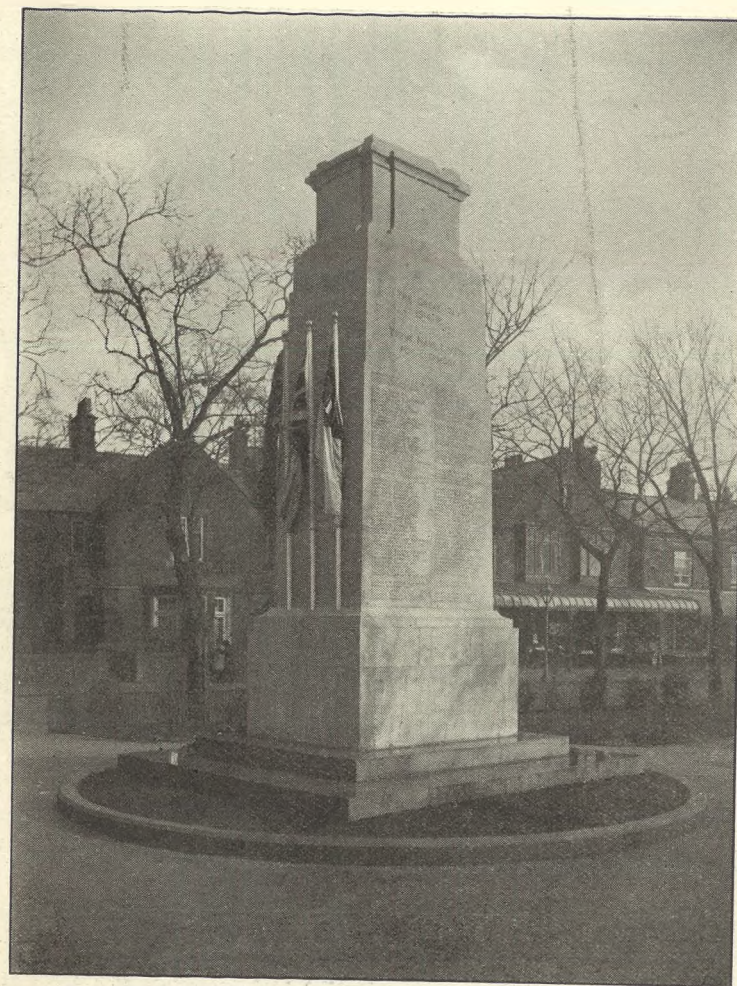

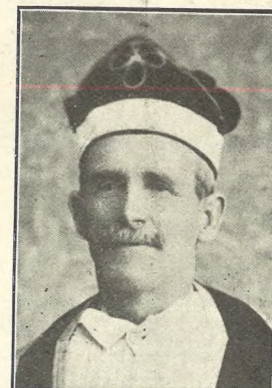

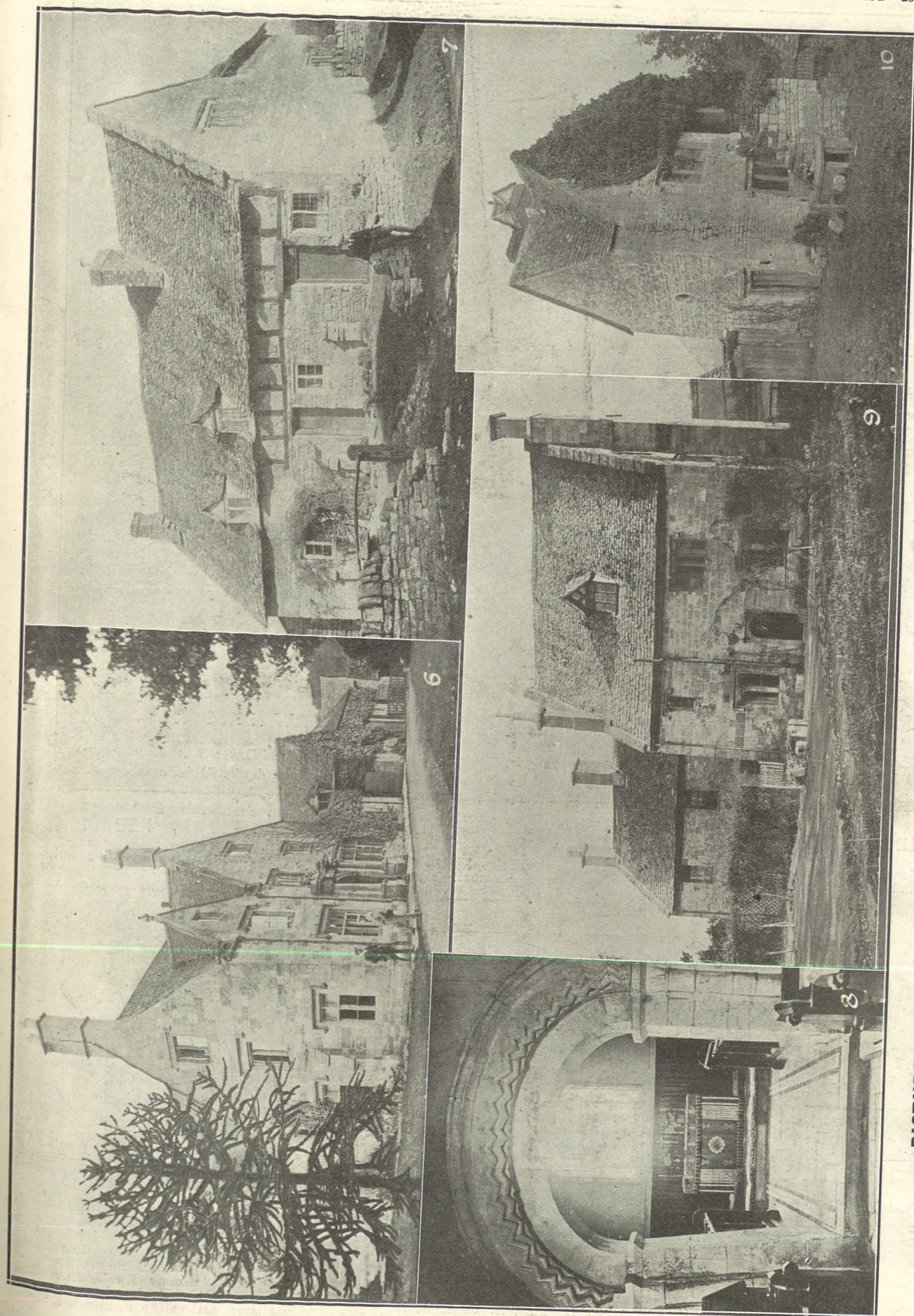

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—GREET, GRETTON, AND STANLEY PONTLARGE.

Situate on the western slopes of the Cotswolds, not far from Winchcombe, there is much that is interesting and picturesque in these out-of-the-way villages, and some beautiful old Tudor houses can be found round about.

- 1.—The Manor Farm, Gretton, a beautiful old Tudor House. The date with initials over the door is as follows:—"W. H. 1656." It is owned and occupied now by Mr. Jackson.
- 2.—A beautiful Norman arch to the north door of the quaint old Stanley Pontlarge Church.
- 3.—Stanley Pontlarge Church. It is very tiny, but very interesting. The roof is very bad and is falling in, but service is still held there once a month.
- 4.—Gretton new Church and Churchyard, from Gretton Halt platform.
- 5.—The tower of old Gretton Church. This is fast crumbling away, all the nave has gone, and the immediate neighbourhood is a picture of decay.



PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—GREET, GRETTON, AND STANLEY PONTLARGE.
 In the far-off days when Hailes Abbey was a place of great riches and power, these districts were dependencies of the Abbey, and it is stated that Stanley Pontlarge was a chapel of ease for the monks, who lived at a rest house adjoining the Norman Chancel Arch in Stanley Pontlarge Church. It will be noticed that the left support is sadly out of upright; it evidently collapsed soon after being built.

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It forms part of what was a House of Rest for Hailes or Winchcombe Abbeys, and is more picturesque inside than out.

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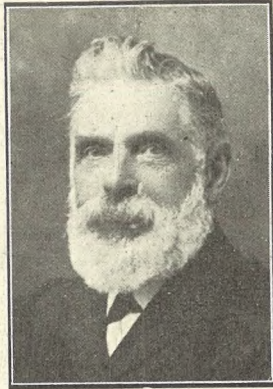

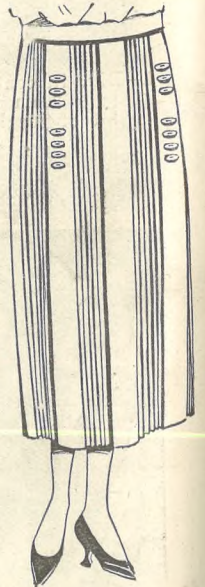
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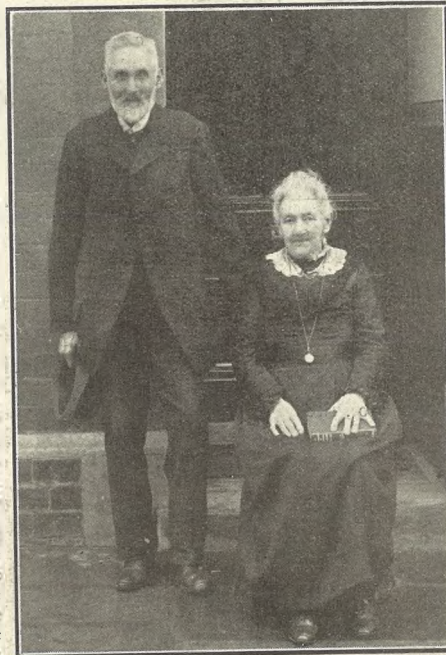
