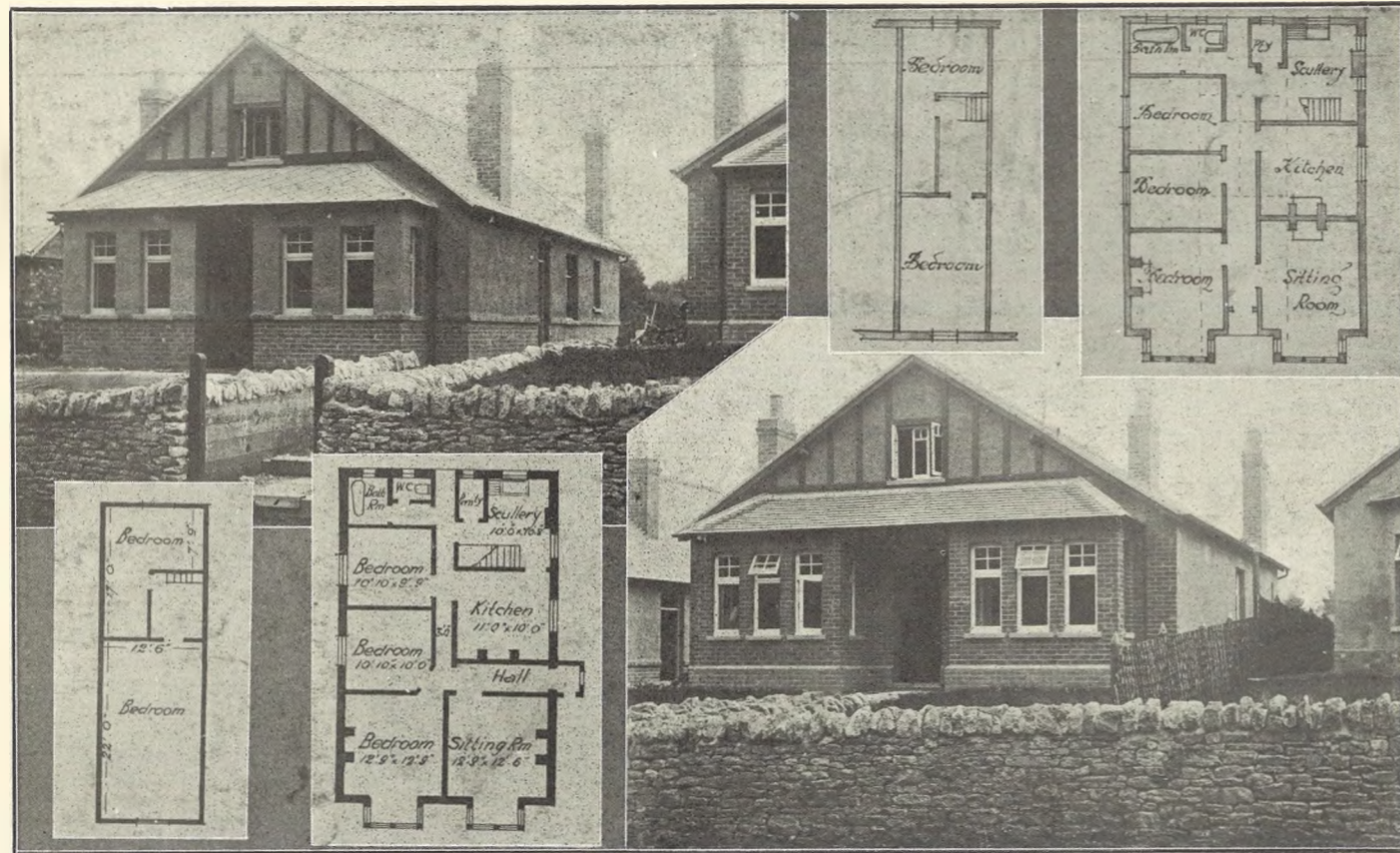


**LECKHAMPTON SHOW.**

**MODERN BUNGALOWS FOR SALE AT CHARLTON KINGS.**

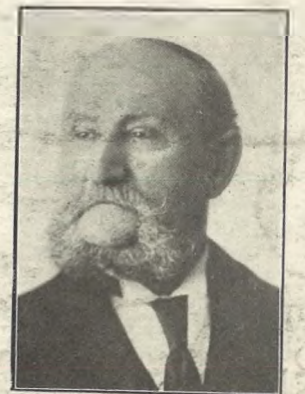

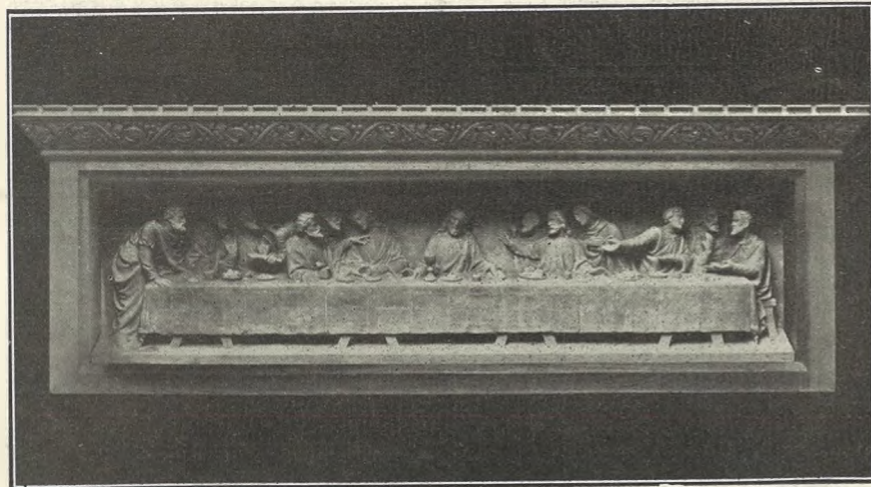

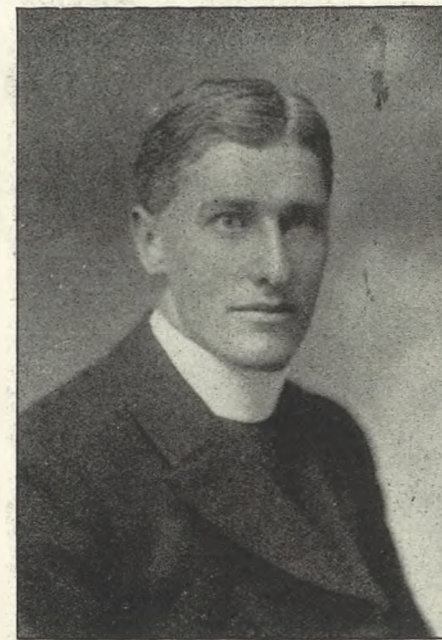

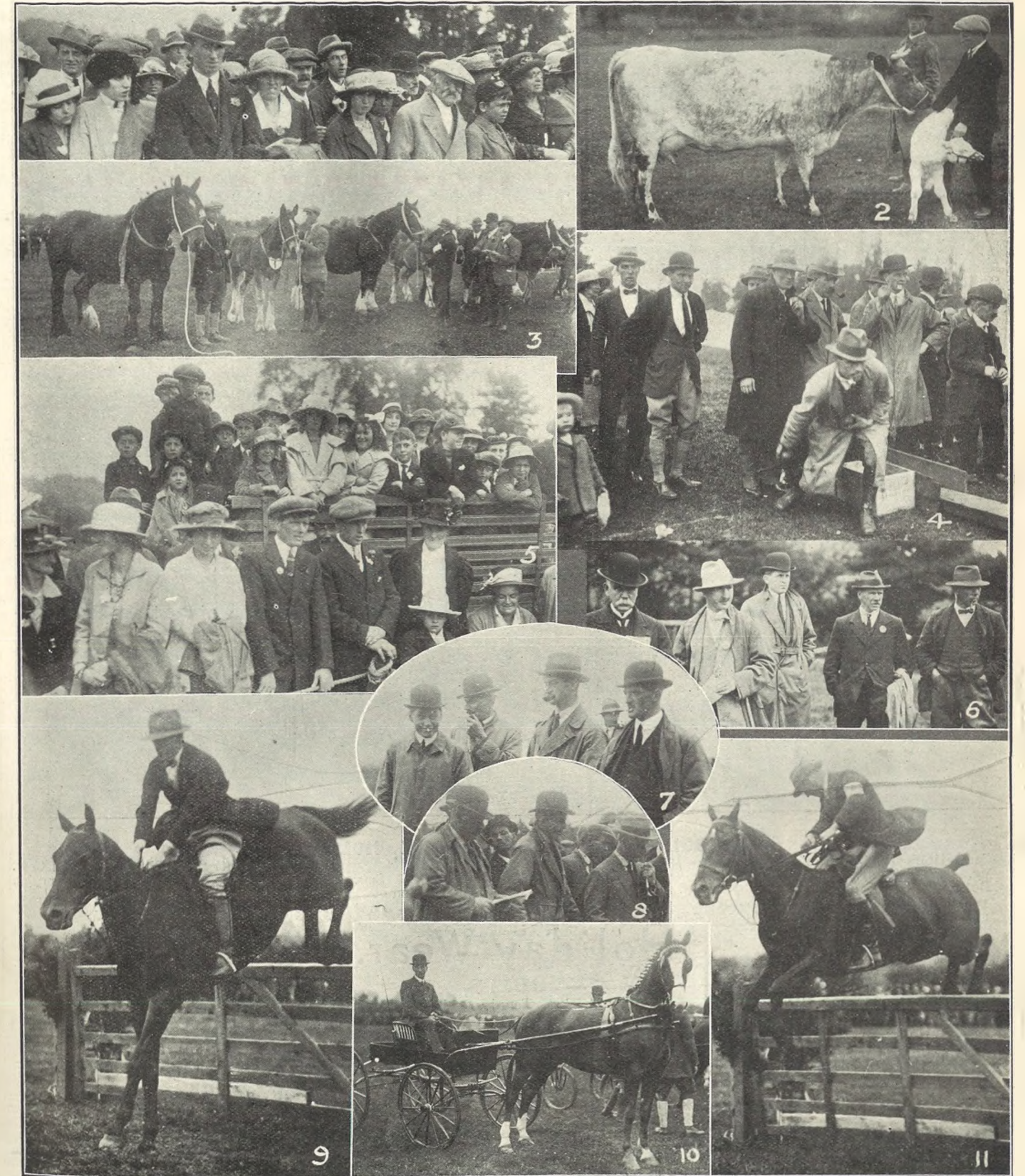

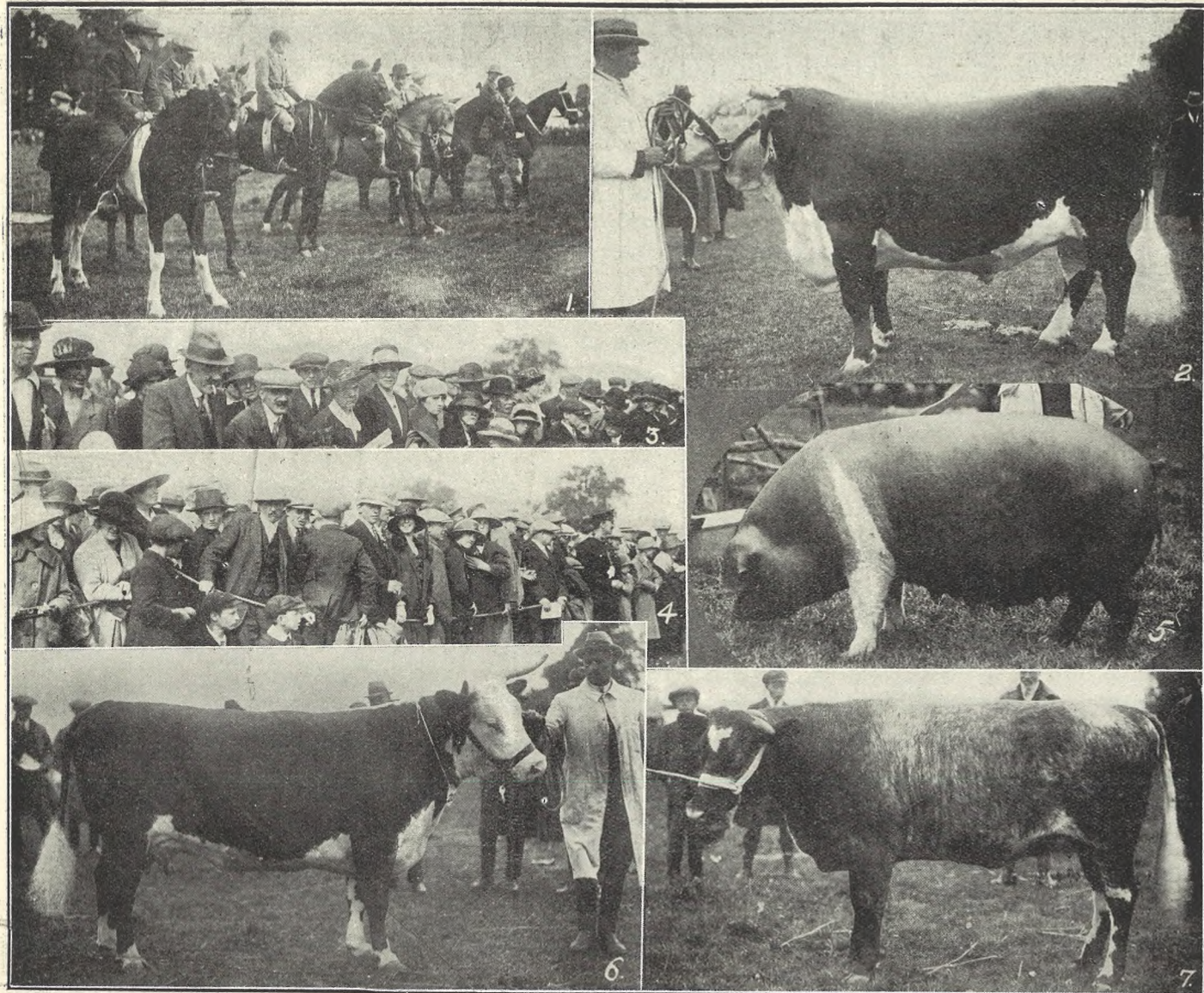

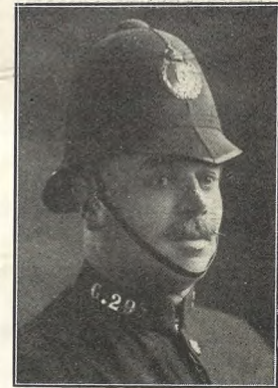

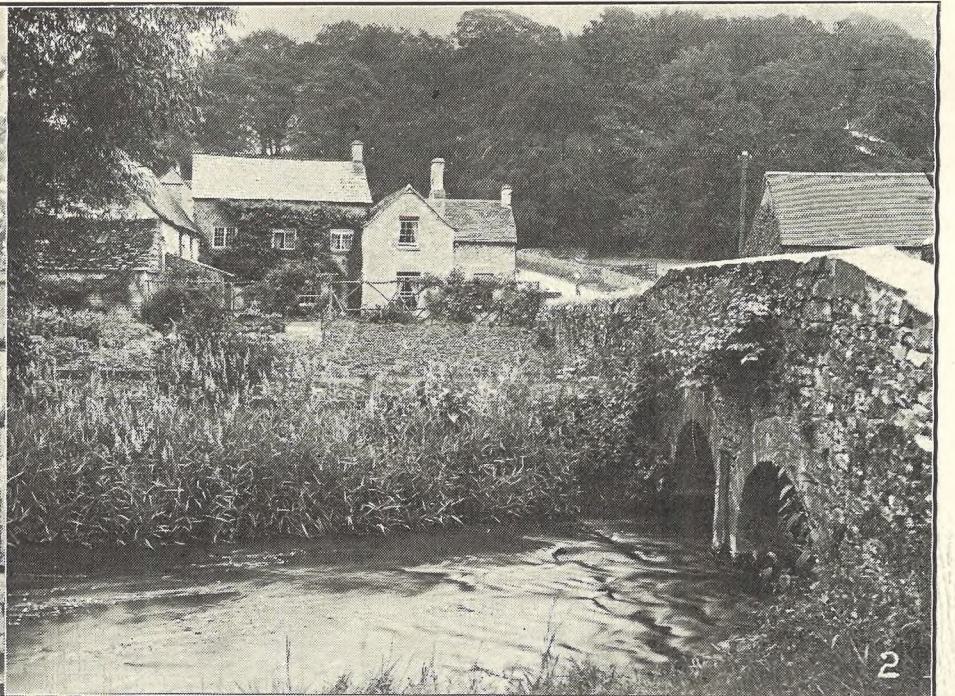
