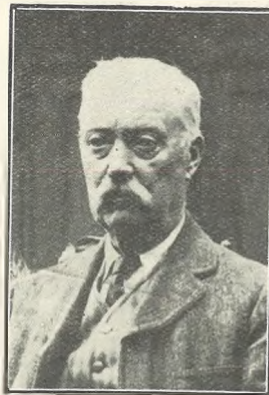

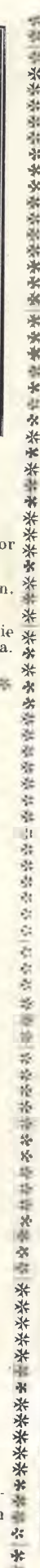
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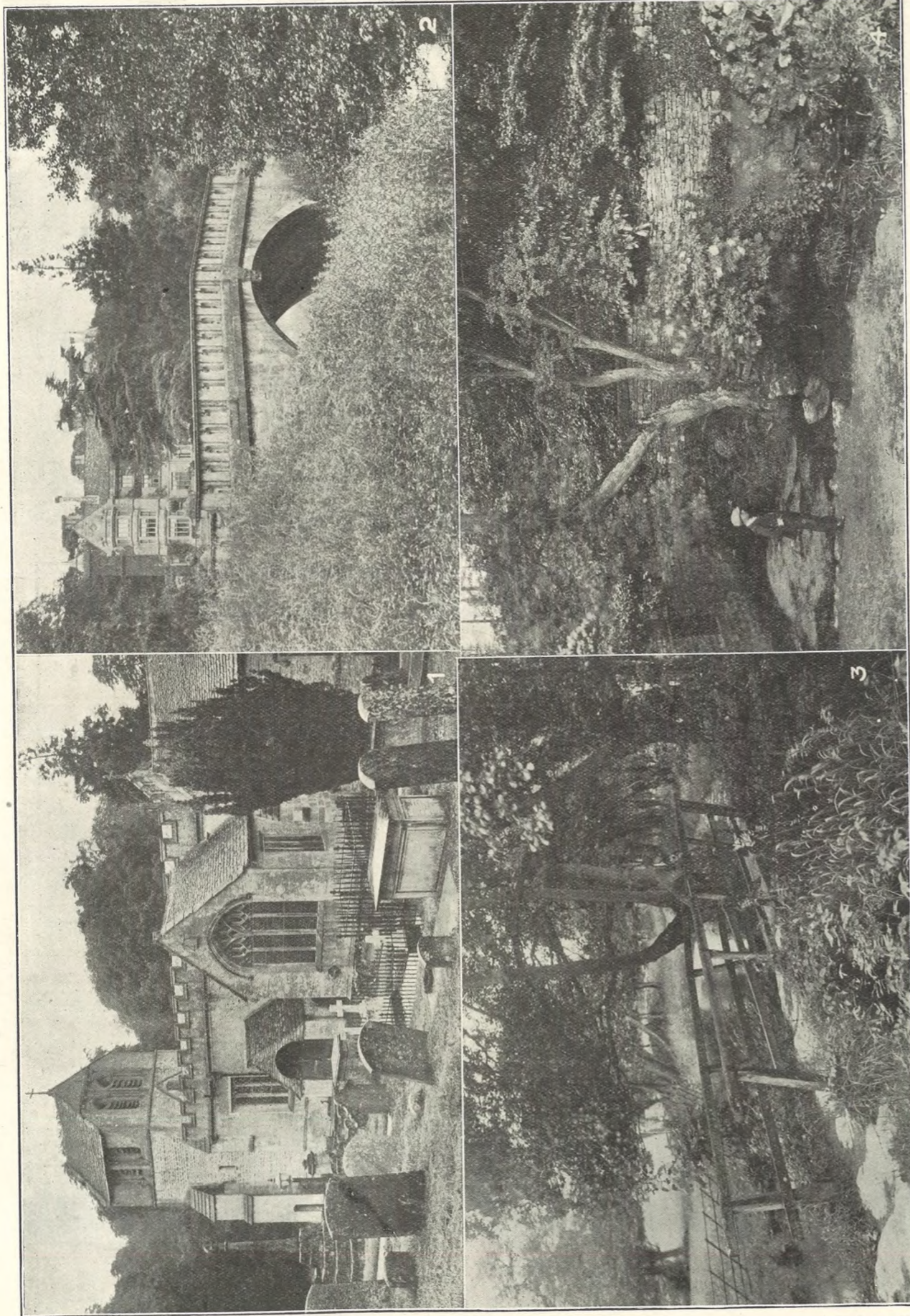

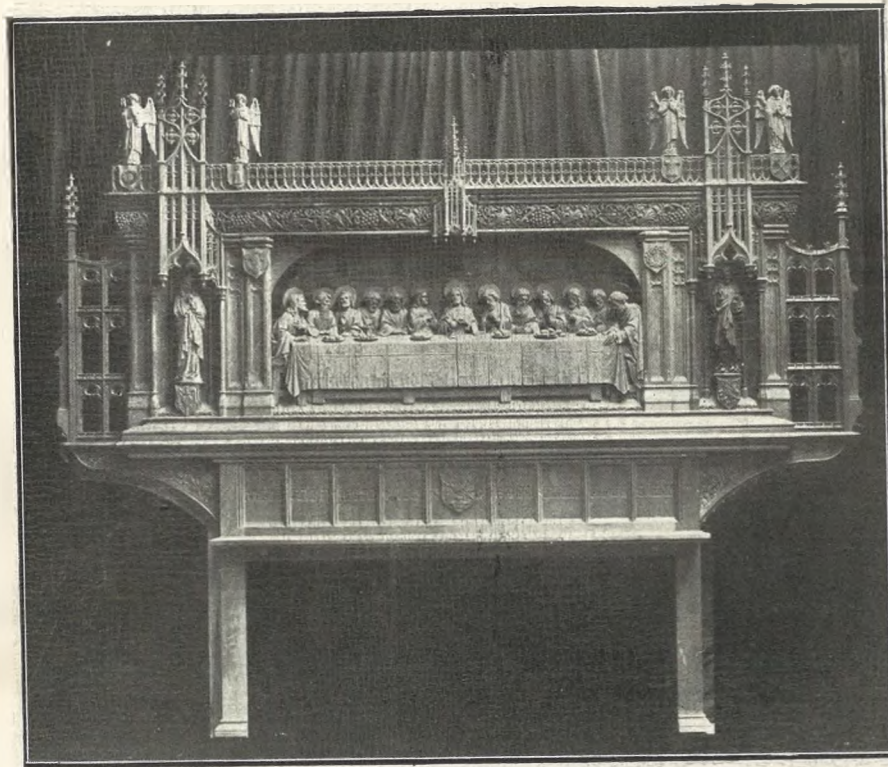


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A HANDSOME MEMORIAL.

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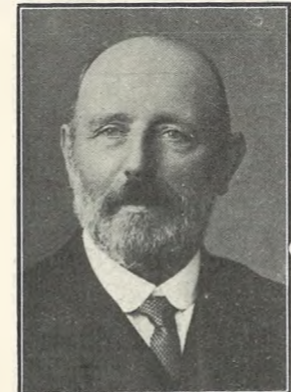
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Another Success for Messrs. Cypher and Son.

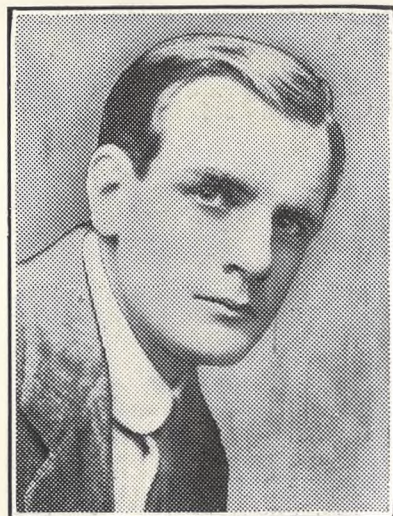

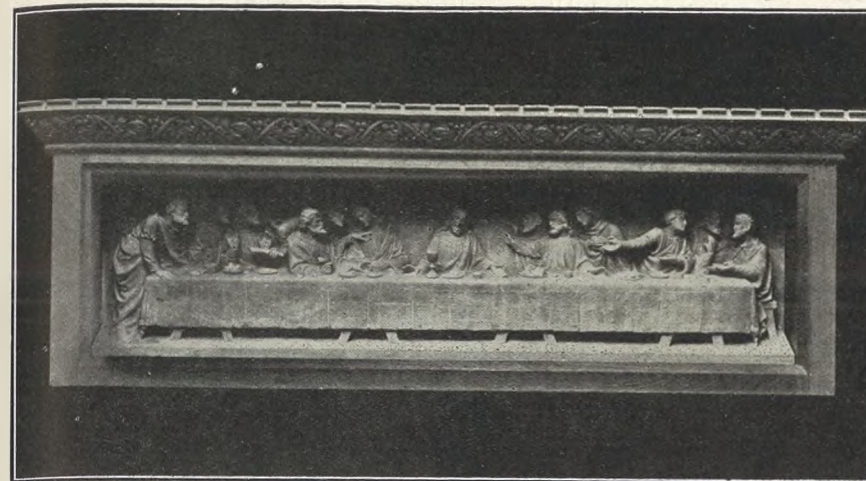

A FINE SCULPTURED PANEL.

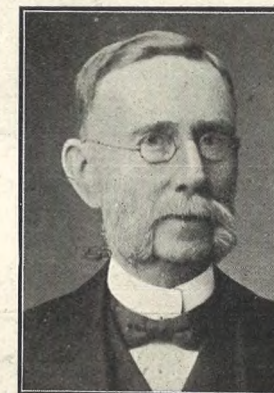

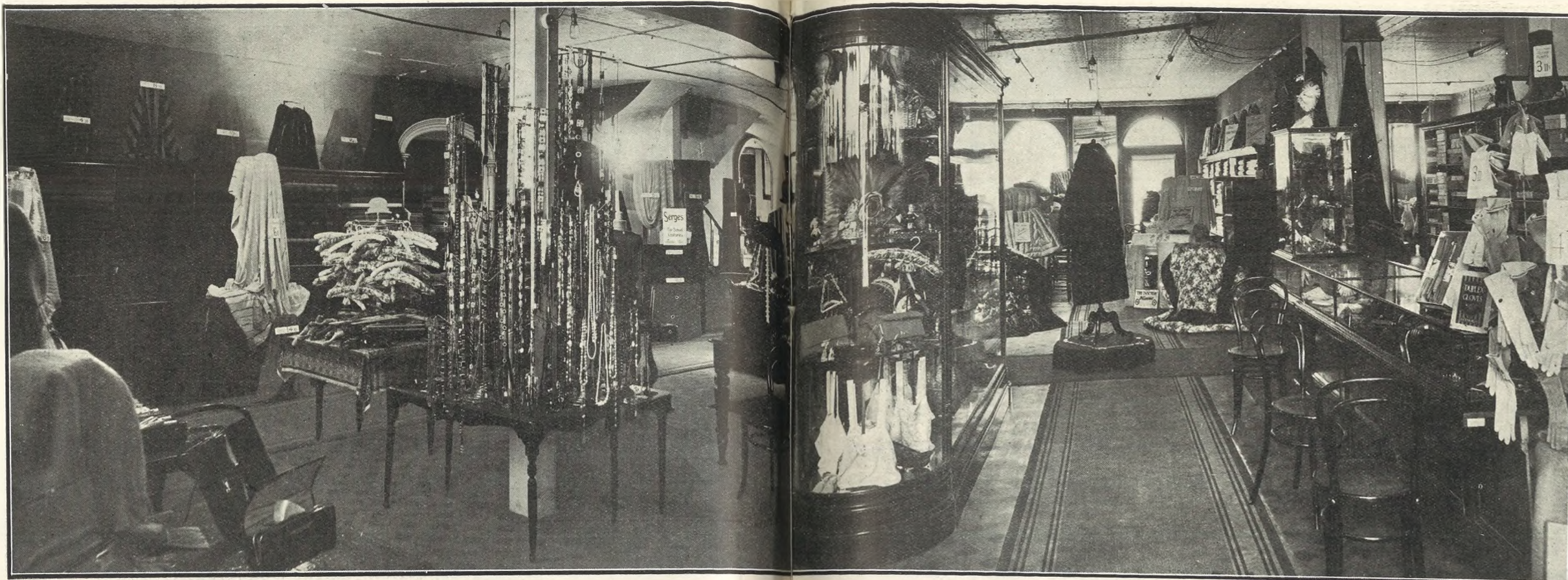

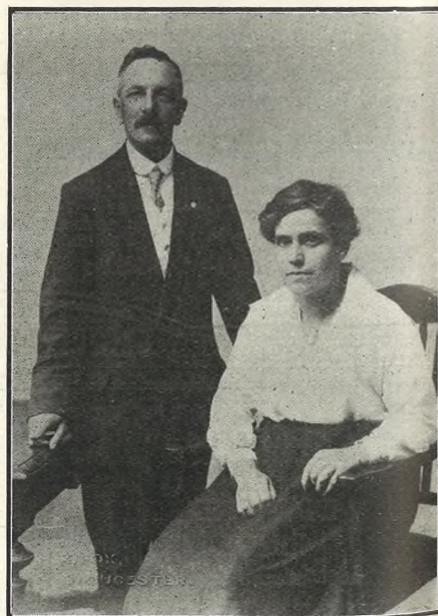

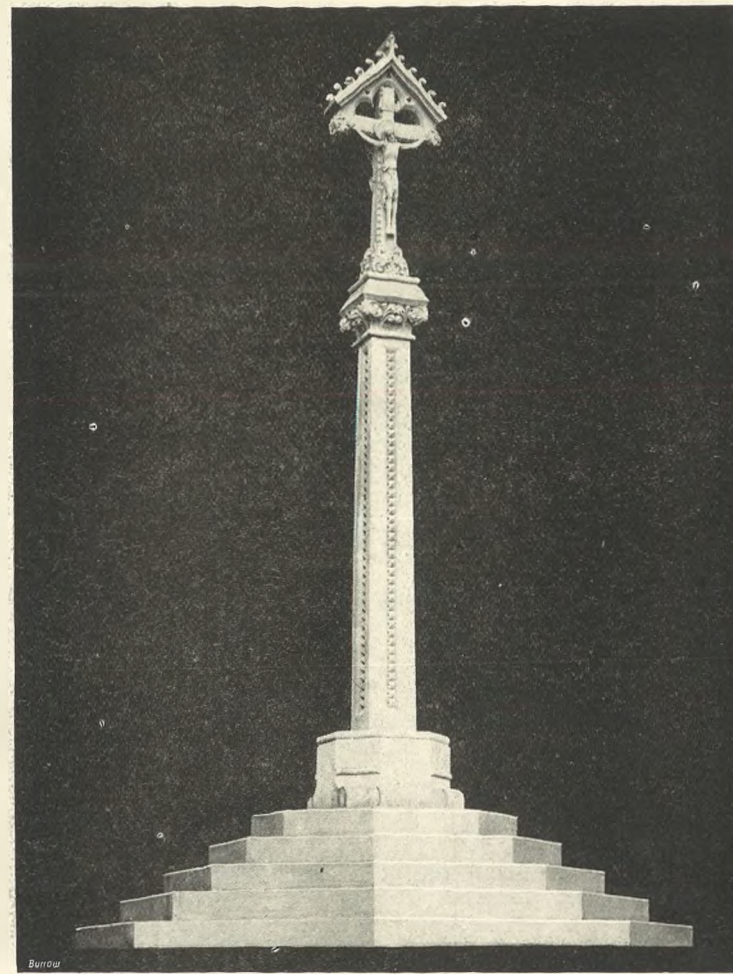
