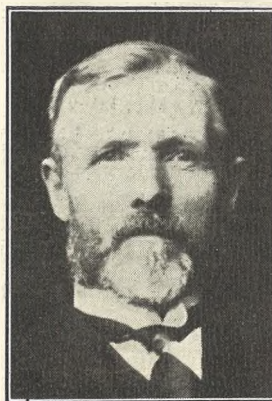

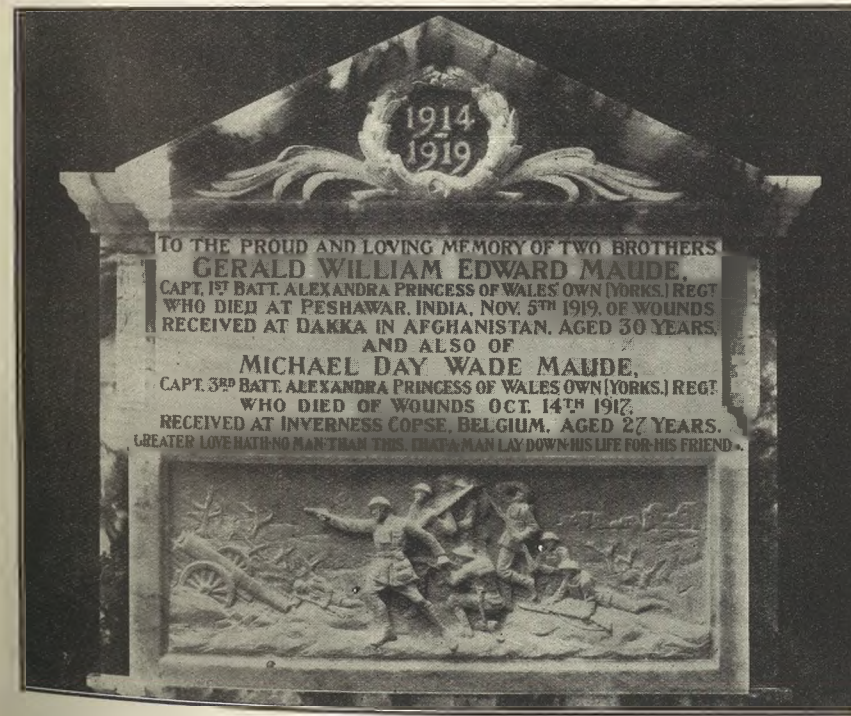

COLLEGE "RAG" IN CHELTENHAM.

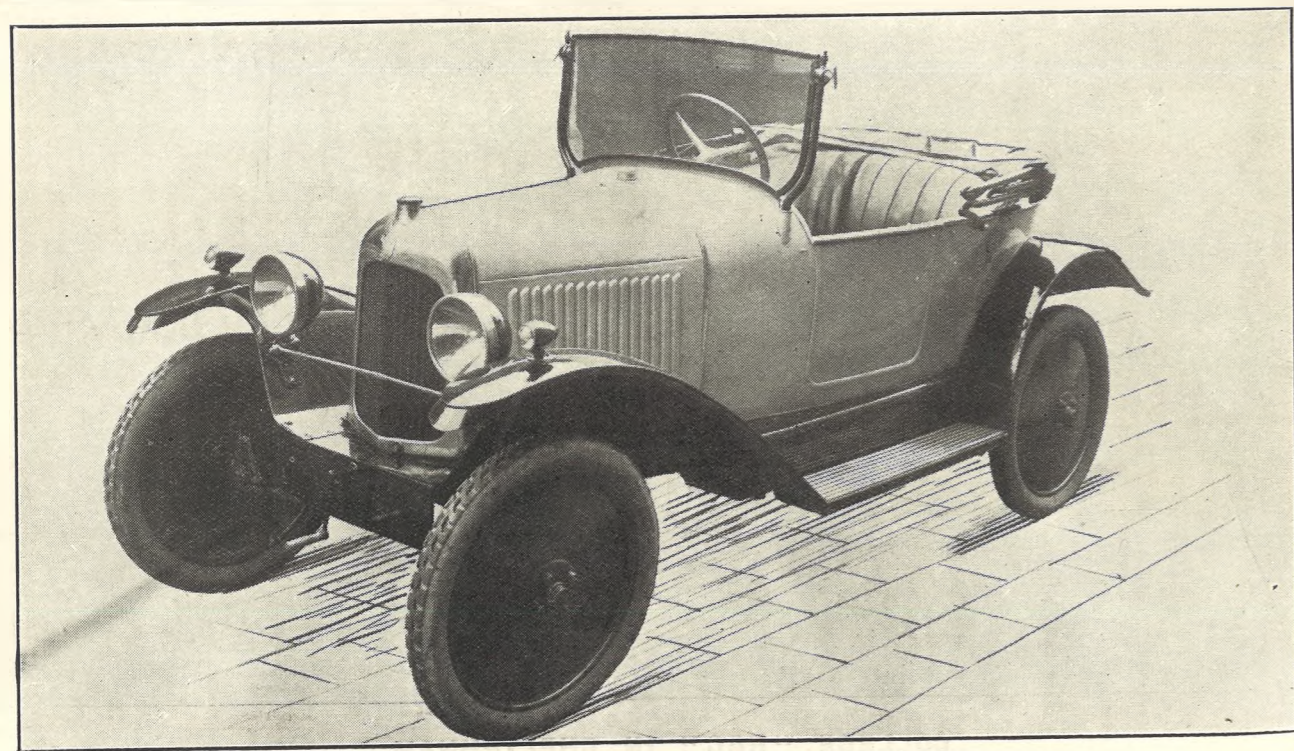

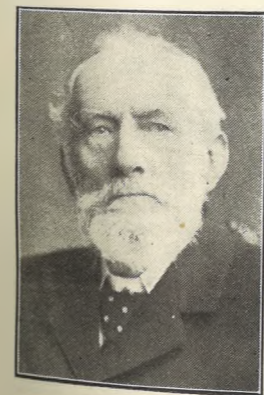

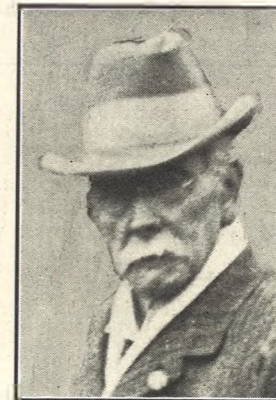

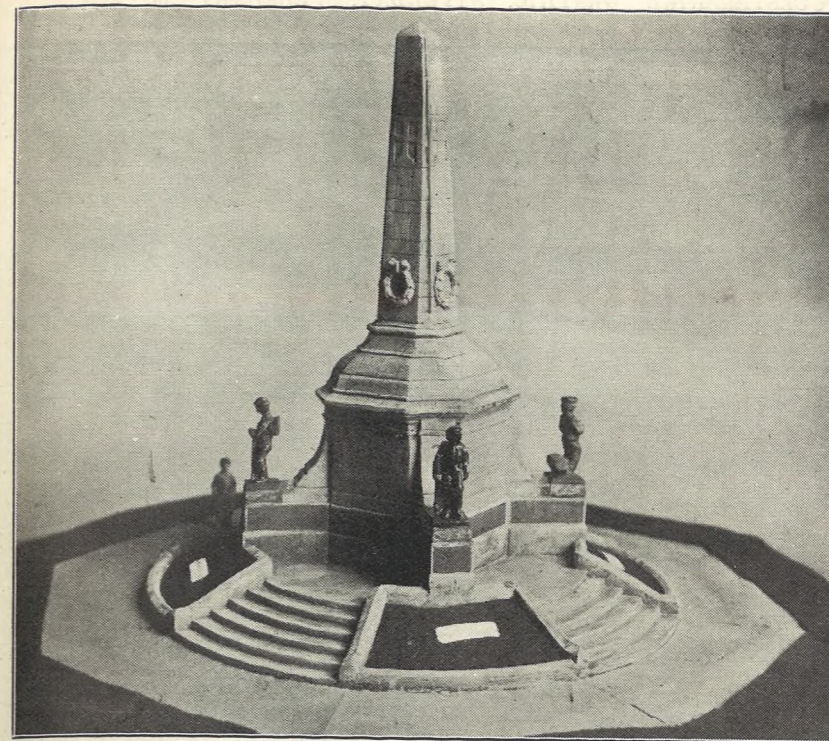

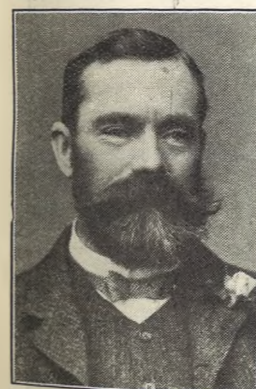
PRETTY CHELTENHAM WEDDING.

PROPOSED WAR MEMORIAL FOR GLOUCESTER.

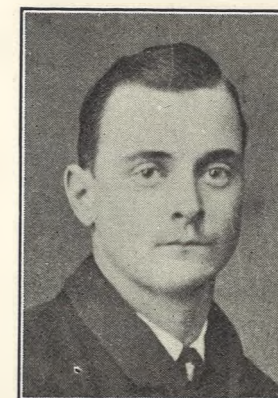

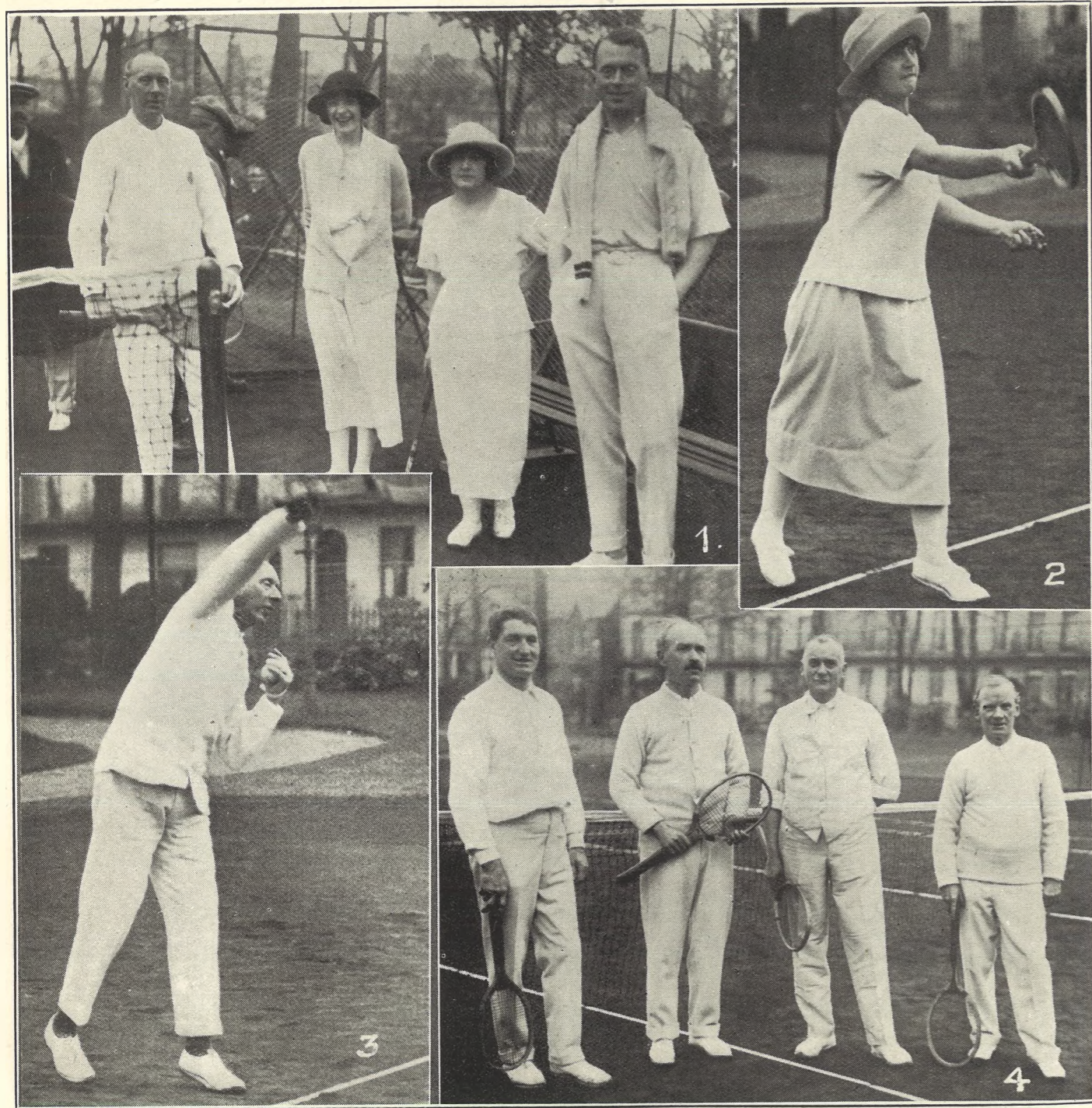

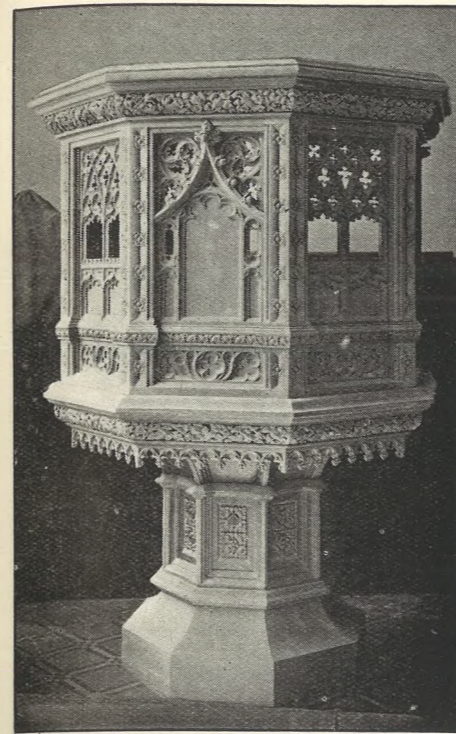


PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—CHIPPING CAMPDEN.

Chipping Campden is a small market town about 20 miles north-east from Cheltenham, and for its antiquity, quaint beauty, and historical associations is no doubt the gem of the Cotswolds. It was a flourishing place in the 14th Century, when its beautiful church was built, but saw many vicissitudes later, and suffered severely in the Carolean Wars.

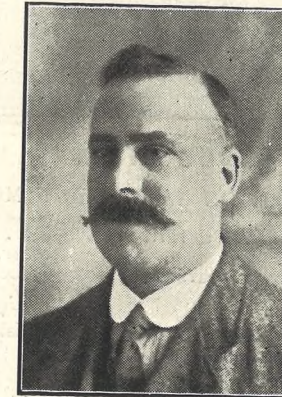

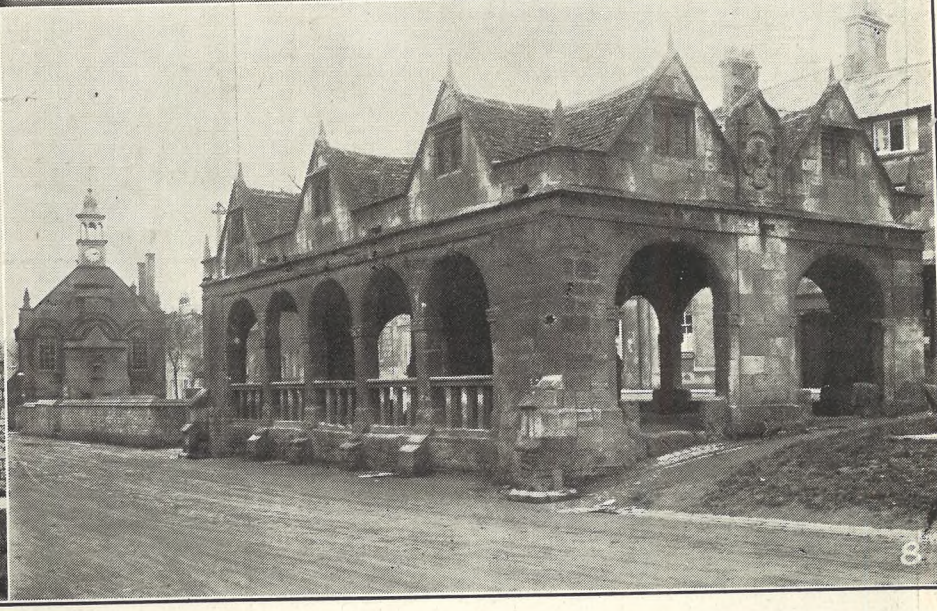

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—CHIPPING CAMPDEN.

Chipping Campden is a delightful old-world town, and a charming resort for artists. Its old stone houses stand in their 15th and 16th Century simplicity and elegance, and for the archaeologist, the place is a veritable Tutankhamen's tomb.

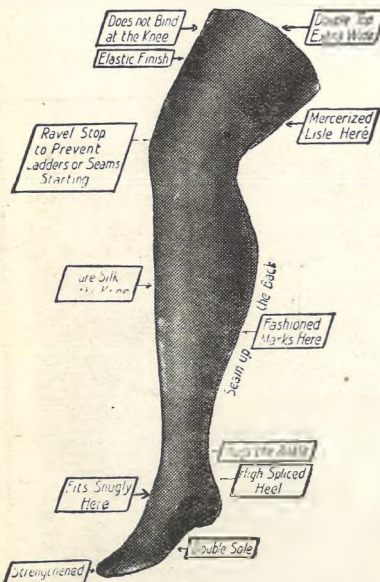
