COLMORE CUP RELIABILITY TRIAL THROUGH CHELTENHAM. This Reliability Trial for Motor Cycles and Cycle-Cars from Birmingham took place on Saturday, Feb. 24, about 235 competitors starting. After ascending most of the freak hills in the North Cotswolds, a halt for lunch was made at Cheltenham. The riders then ascending Gambles Lane, opposite the Rising Sun, Cleve Hill, descended Post Office Lane, and, taking a hair-pin bend half-way down, ascended Stockall Lane on to the Hill again; thence back through the North Cotswolds to Birmingham.

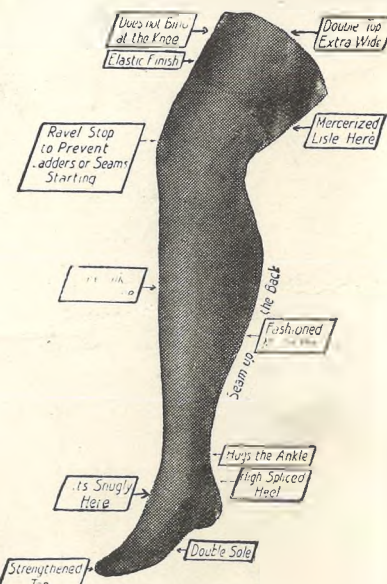

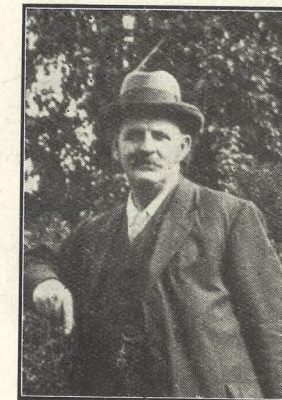

Cirencester, as all Gloucestershireans know, is an ancient Roman Town, but its main streets have quite a modern appearance. There are, however, many delightful old "bits"; in fact, the town is very rich in 16th Century Architecture. Wandering about some of its narrow streets gives one the impression of being in an old French town, except that the "smells" are absent, the town being particularly clean.

- 4.—Quaint old stone houses in Coxwell Street.

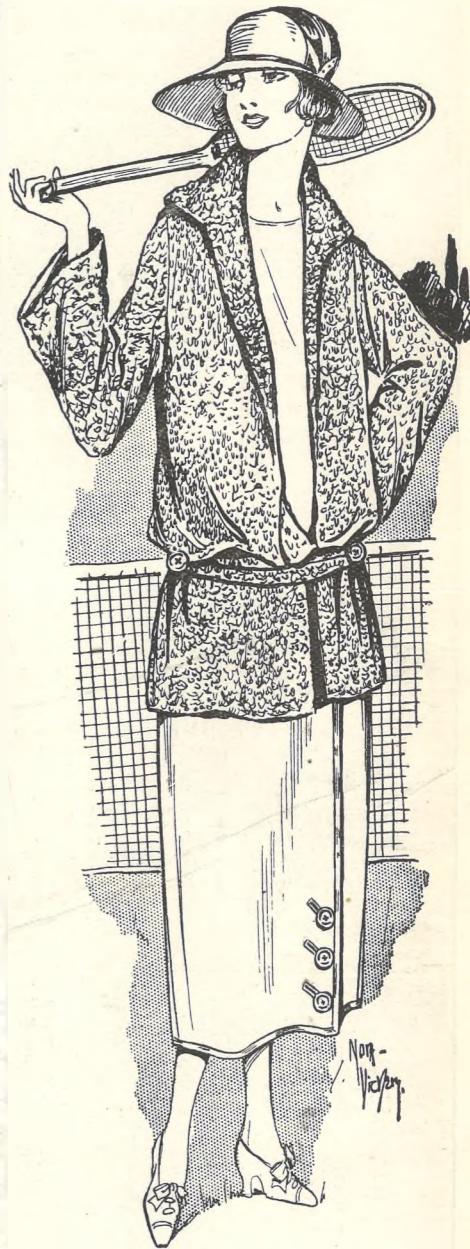

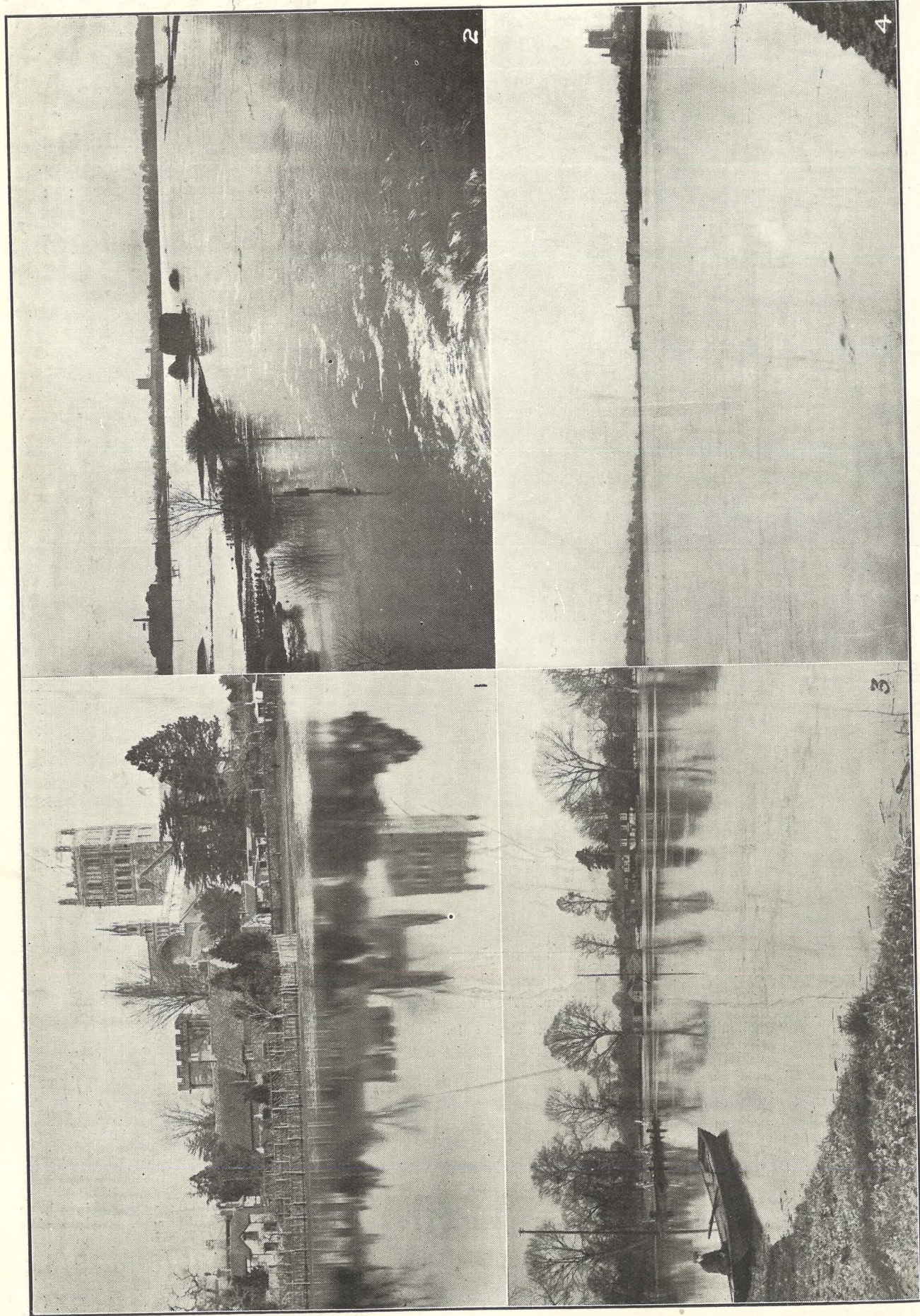

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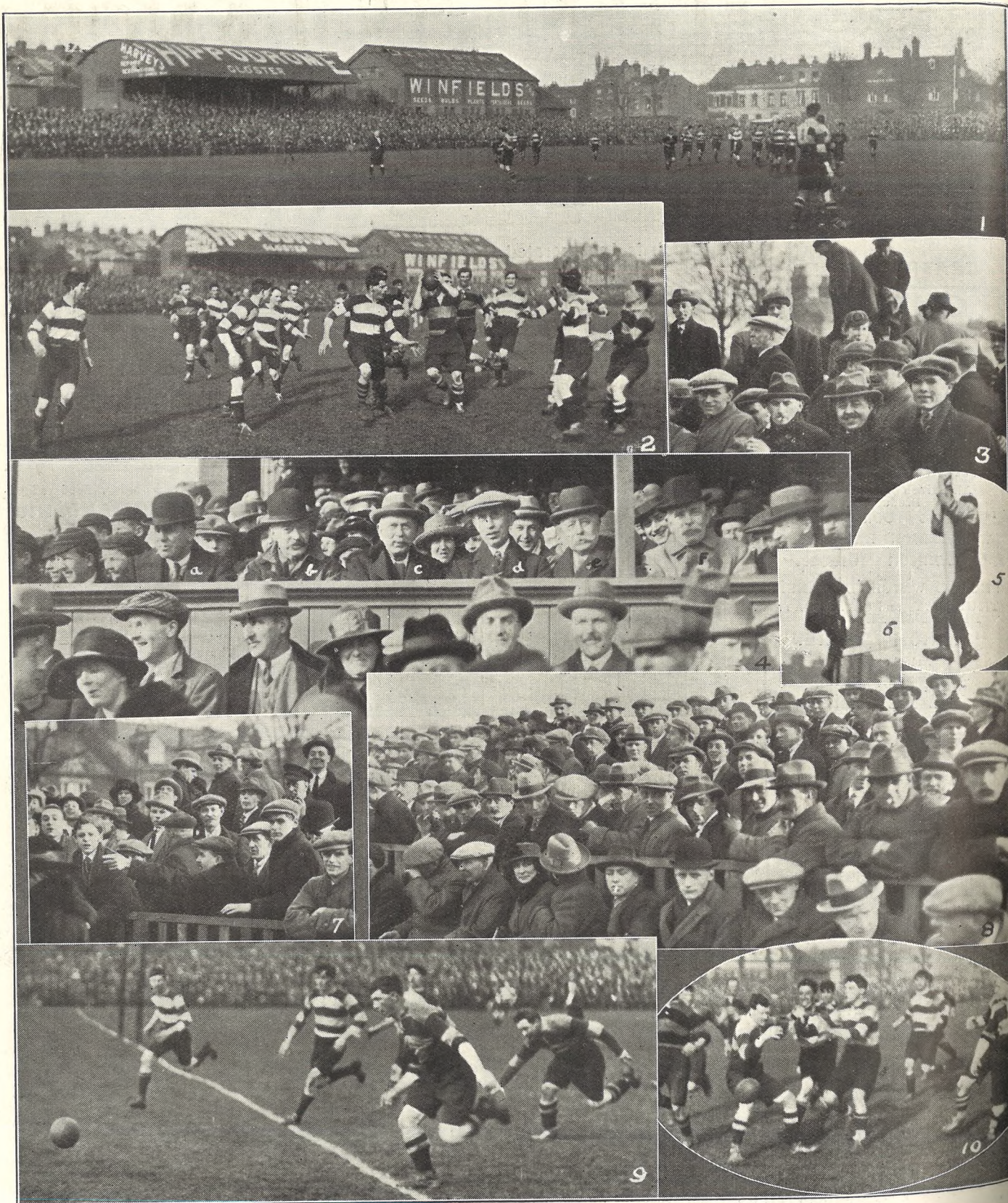

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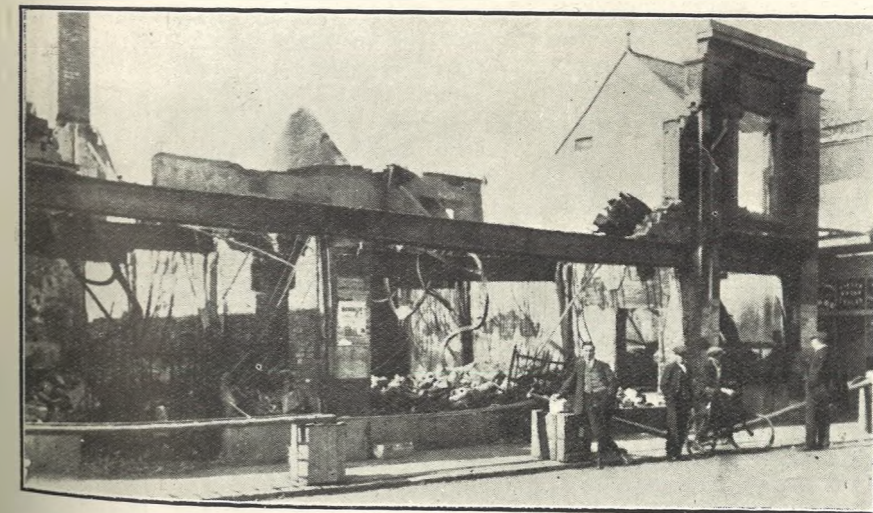

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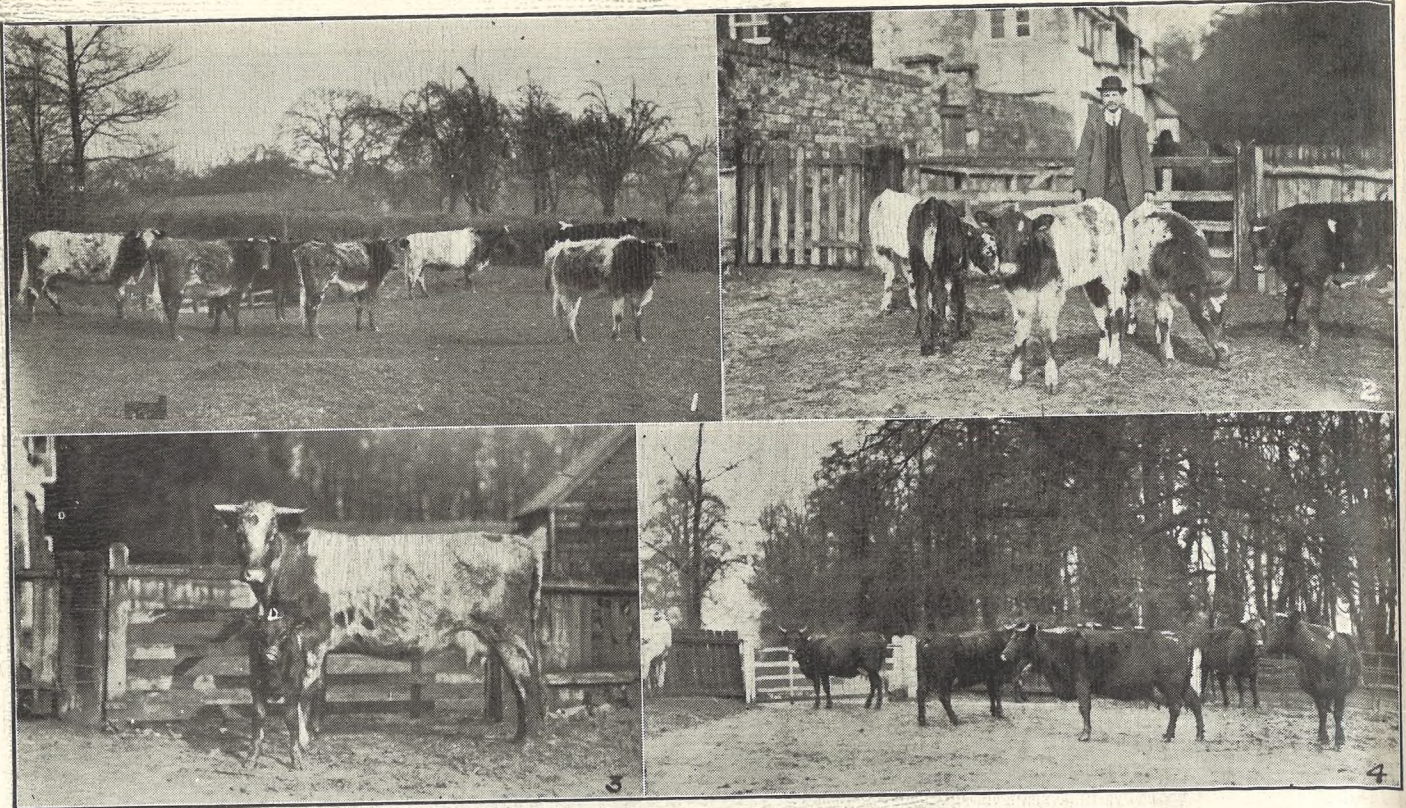
