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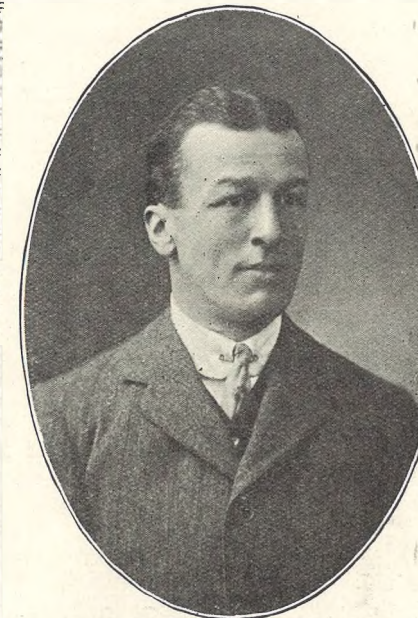

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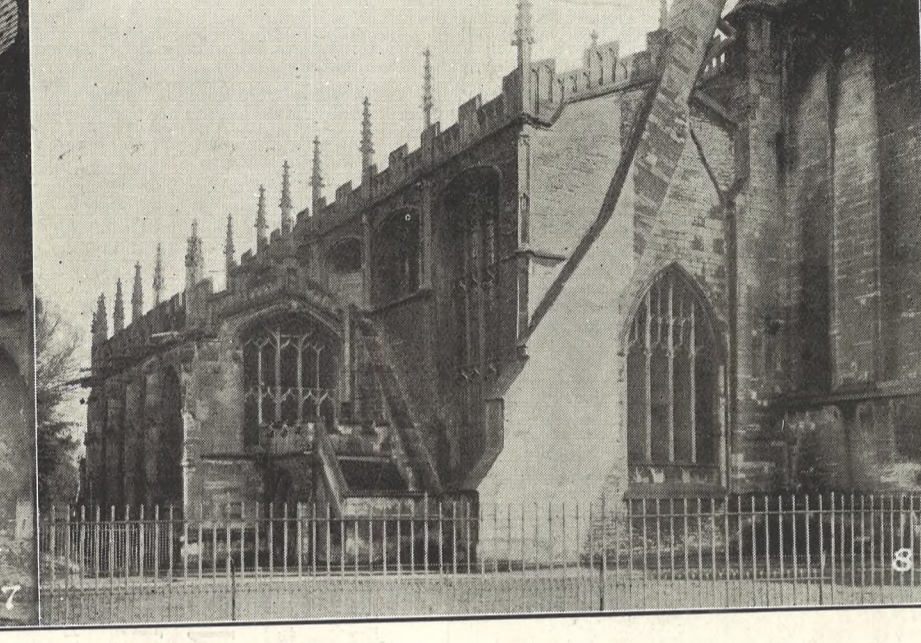
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PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—CIRENCESTER.

Cirencester has some wonderful "bits" of Ancient Architecture left, besides some very fine specimens of Roman tessellated pavements. Perhaps one of the most interesting architectural subjects is the remains of St. John's Hospital shown above.

5.—Remains of the Hospital and Chantry of St. John the Evangelist, founded and endowed by King Henry II.—1154-1189. Alms houses have been maintained here for nearly 800 years.

6.—The so-called Saxon Arch in Grove. It is really the Spital gate of Transitional or Early English date, the sole remaining vestige of the St. Augustine Abbey, which was pulled down and removed at the Reformation.

7.—Quaint overhanging houses in Gloucester-street.

8.—The exterior of North Aisle and Trinity Chapel of the Parish Church. Showing one of the flying buttresses of the Perpendicular tower. The chapel, a Perpendicular work, was erected about 1440.

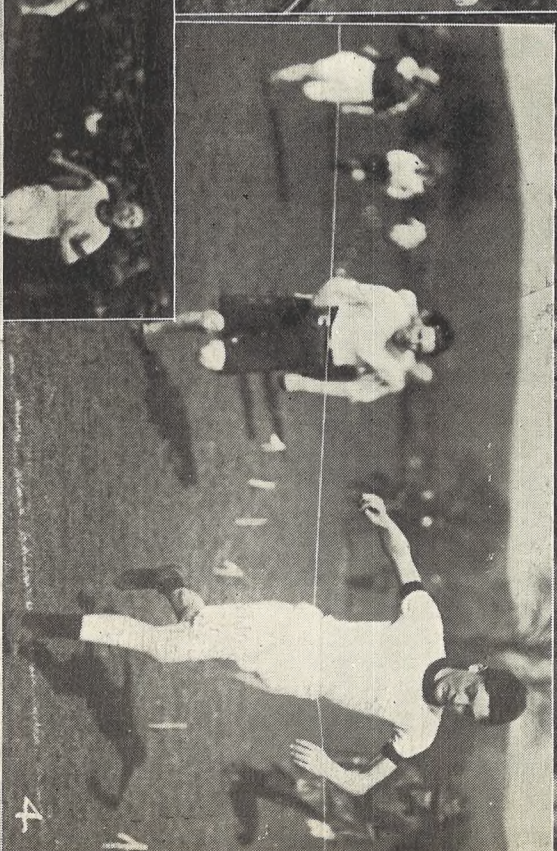
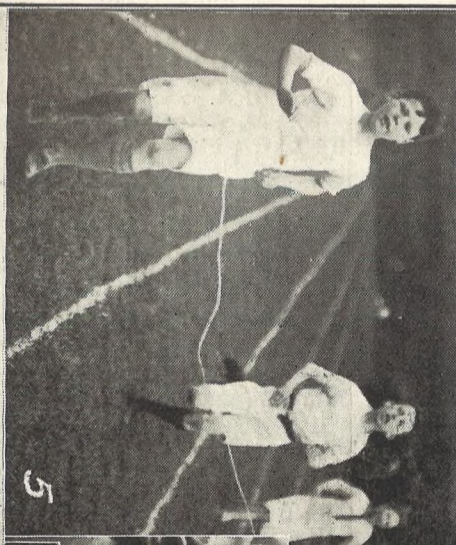

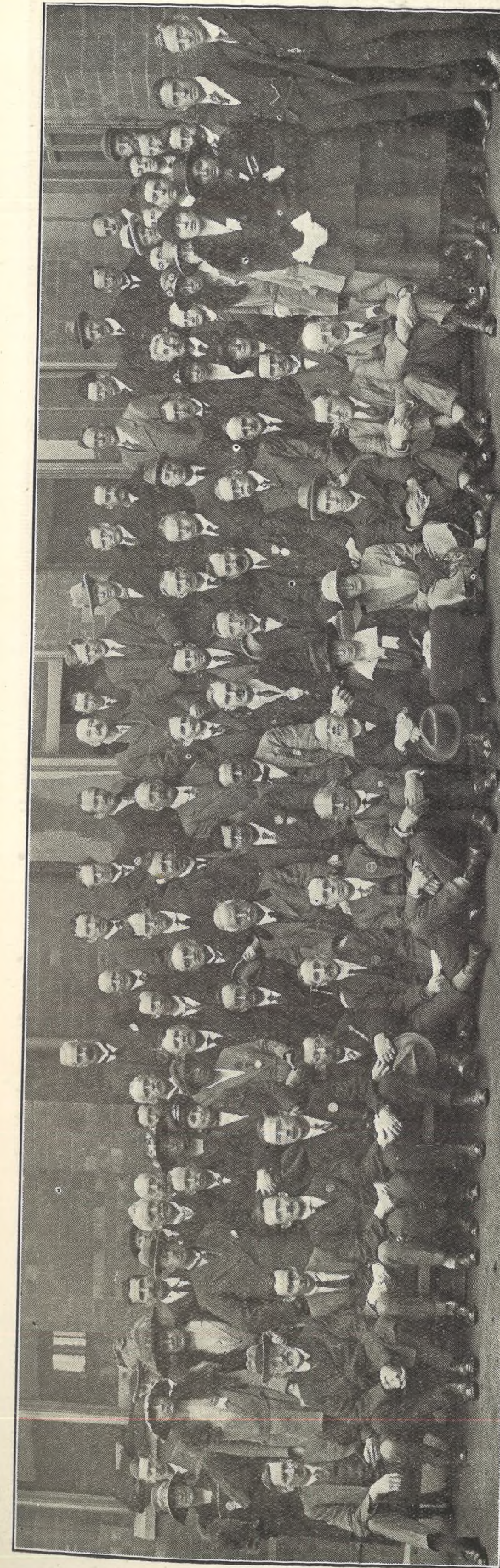

CONFERENCE OF MANUAL TRAINING TEACHERS IN CHELTENHAM.

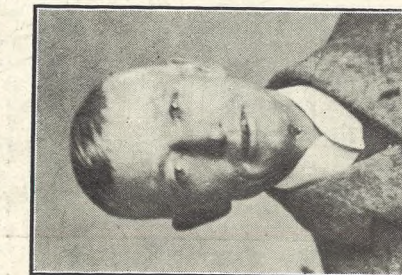

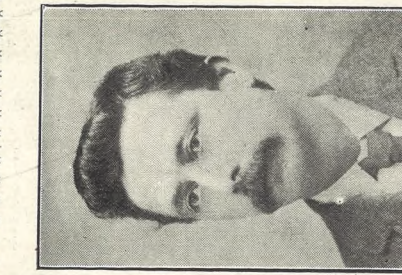
MR. HERBERT DADGE,

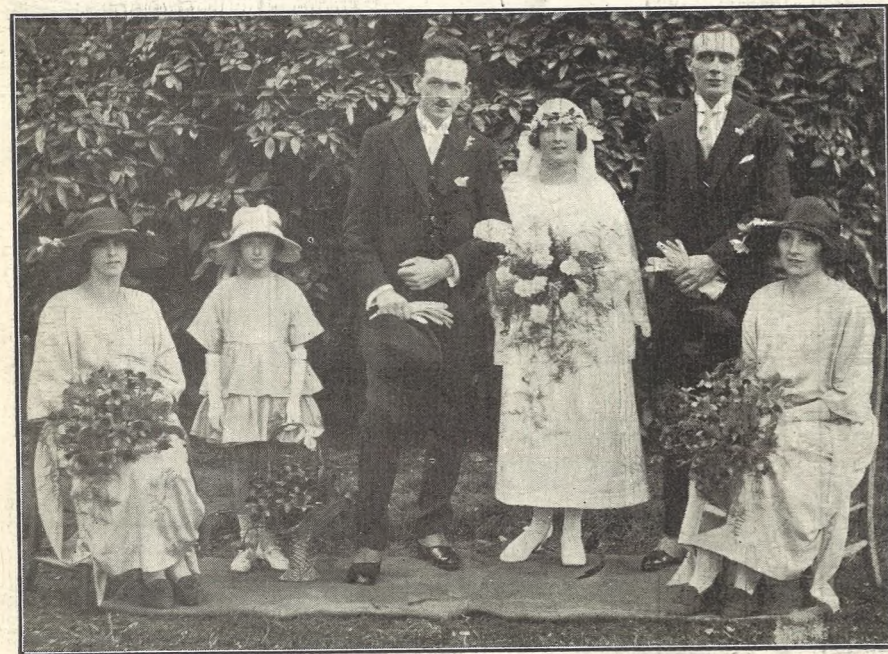


MR. HENRY WILLIAM COOKE,

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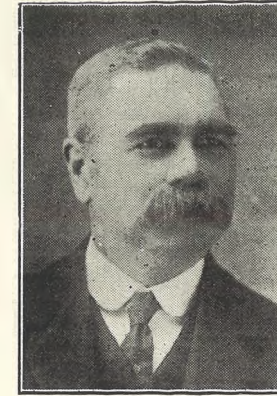
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An Artistic Memorial.

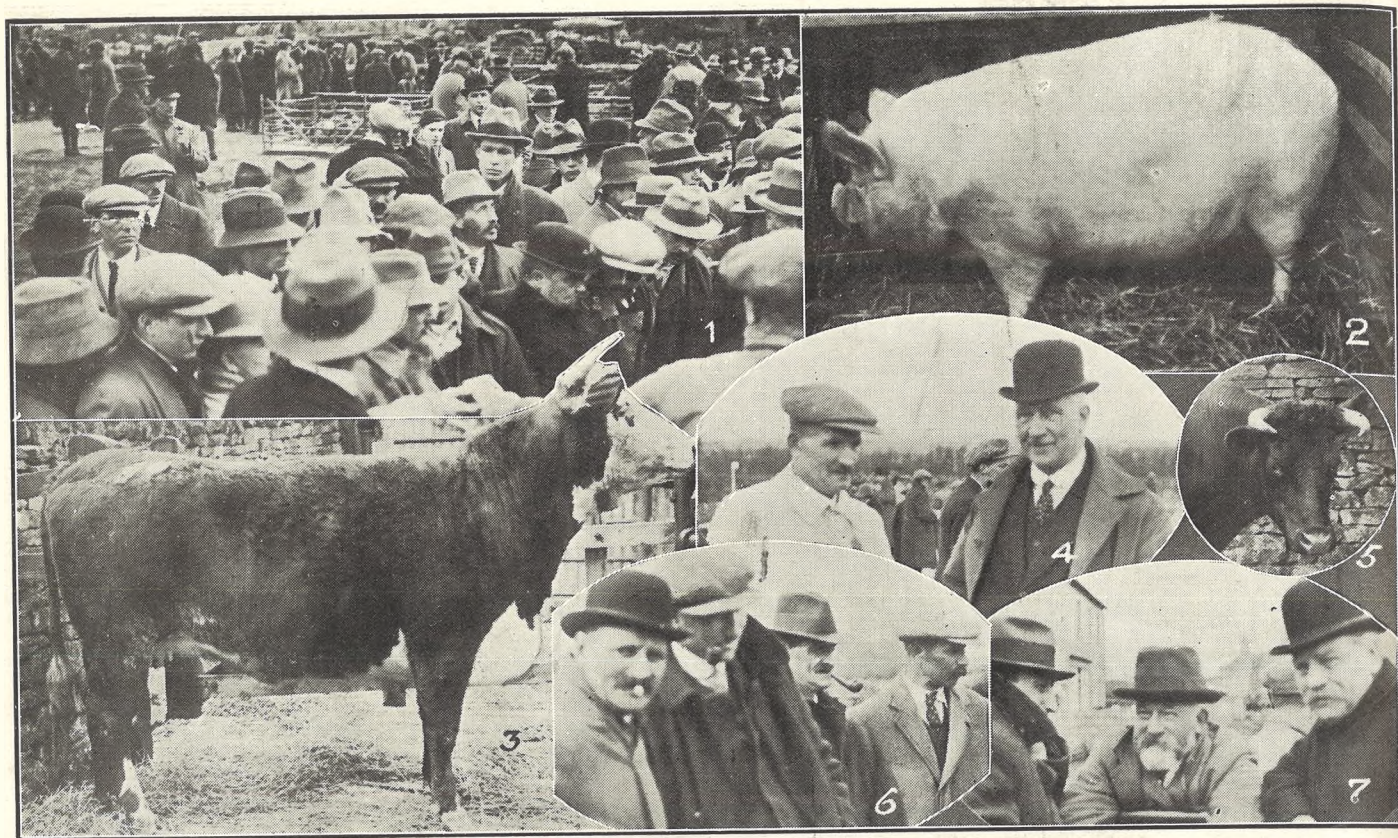

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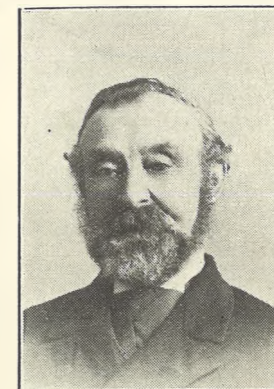


A Cheltenham Golden Wedding.

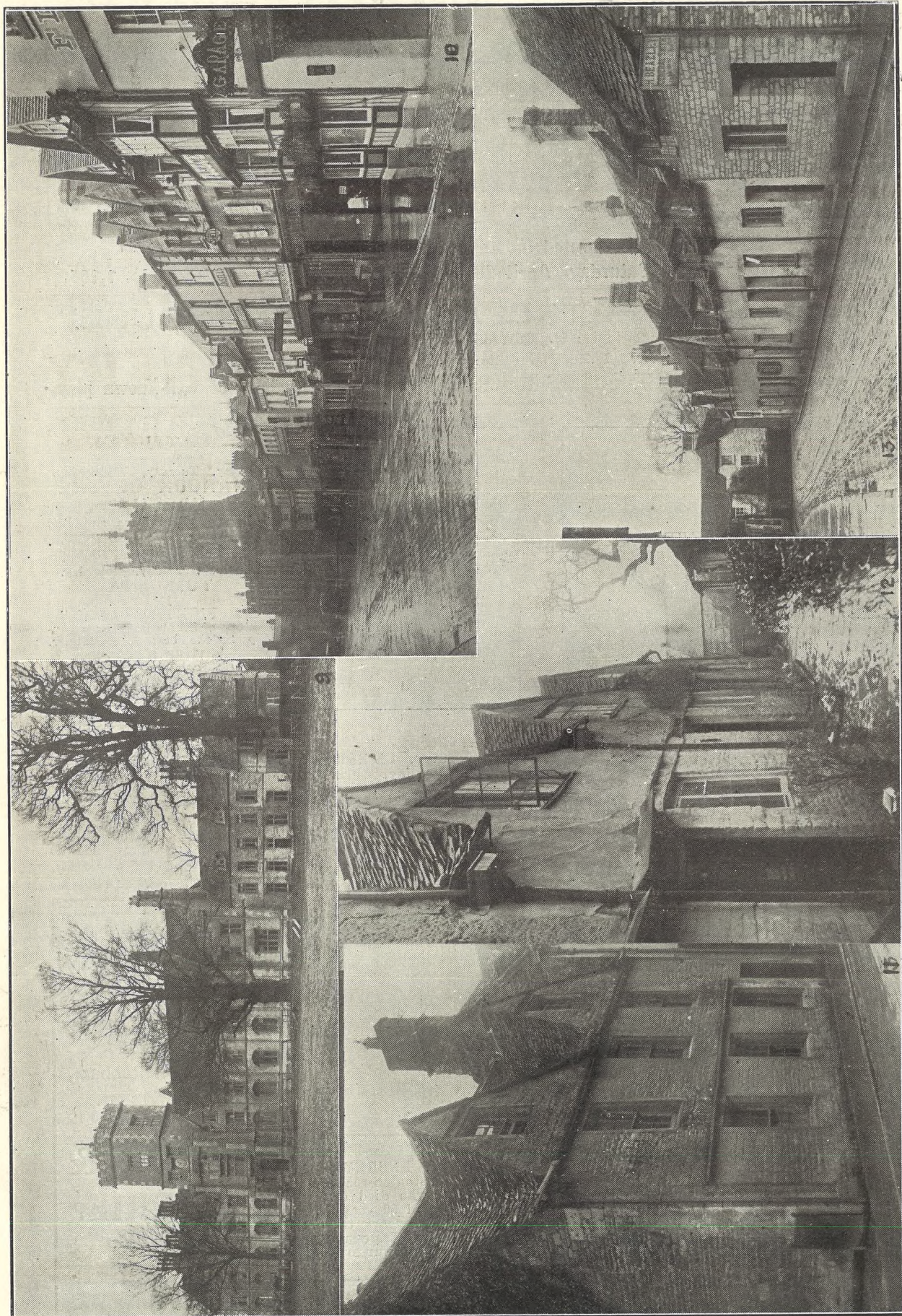

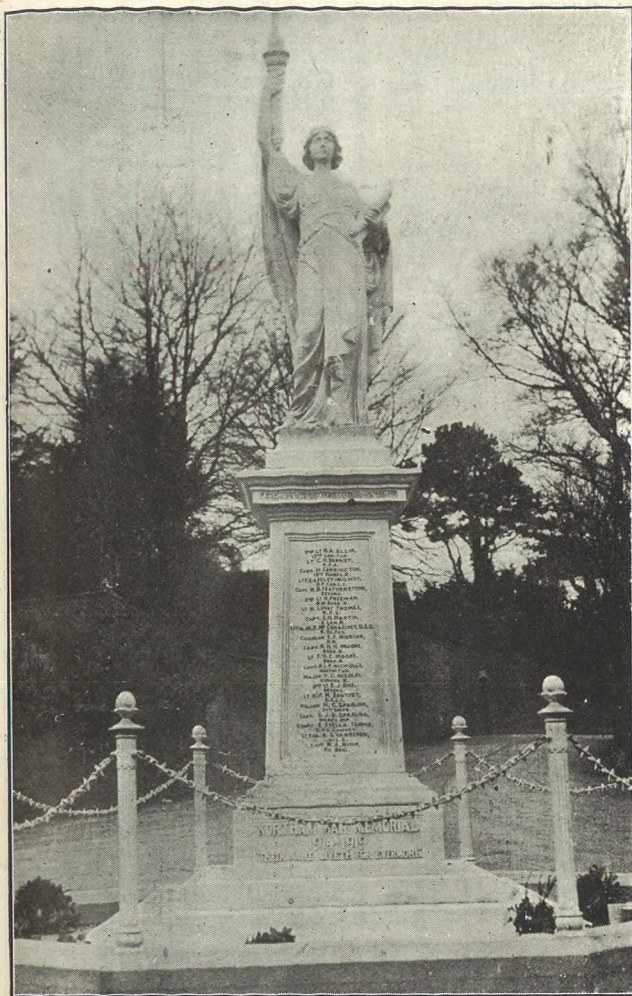

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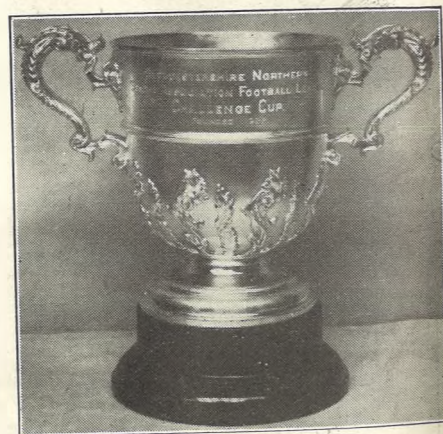
