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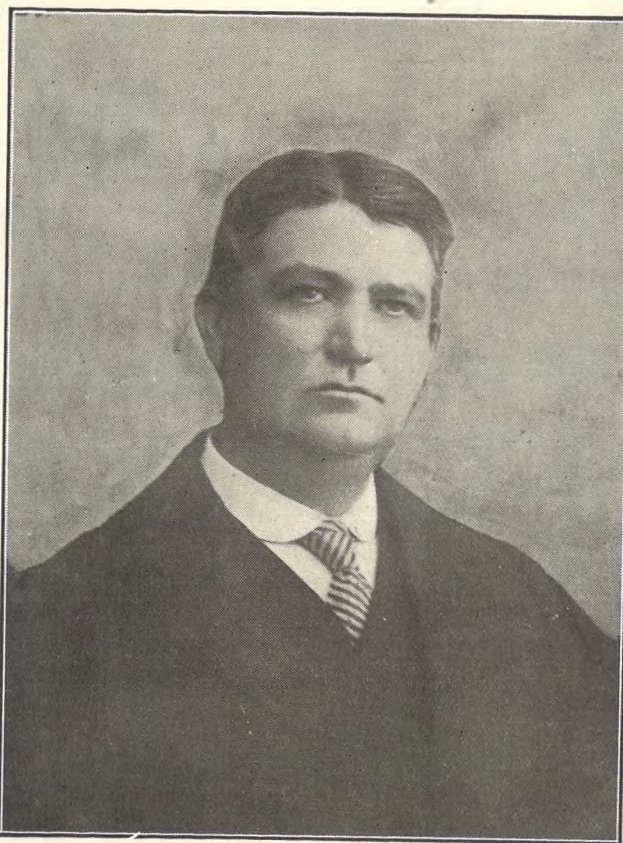

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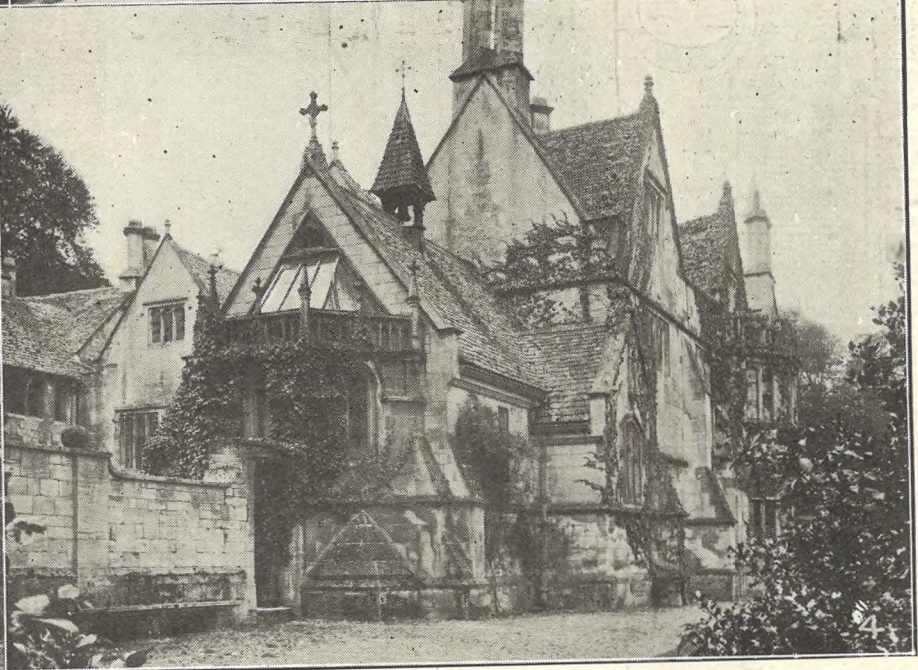
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PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—PRINKNASH PARK, CRANHAM.

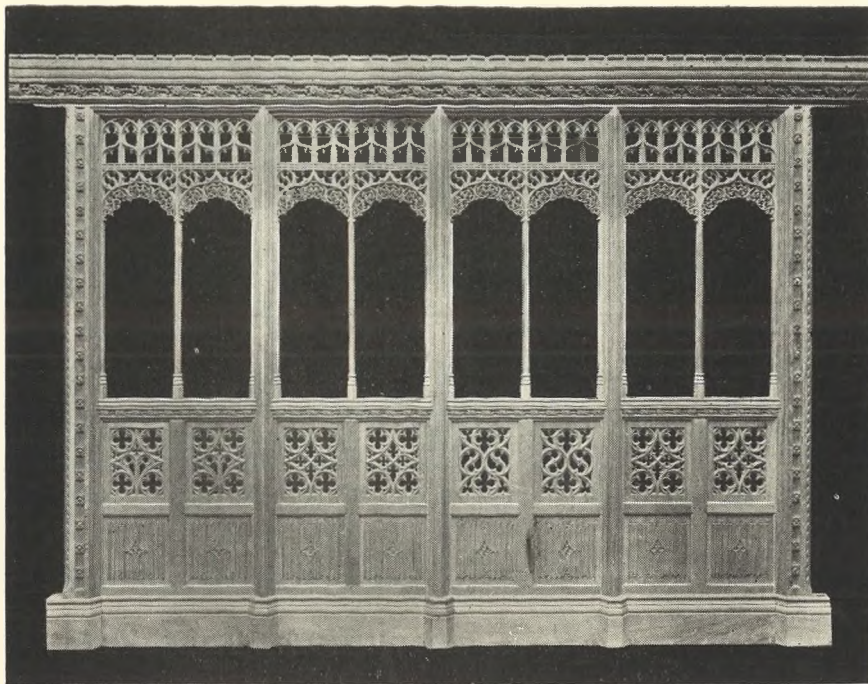

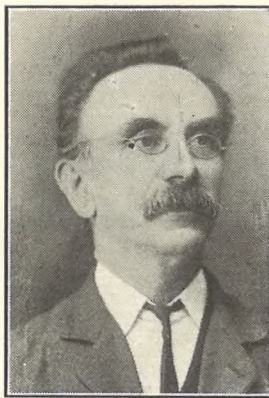

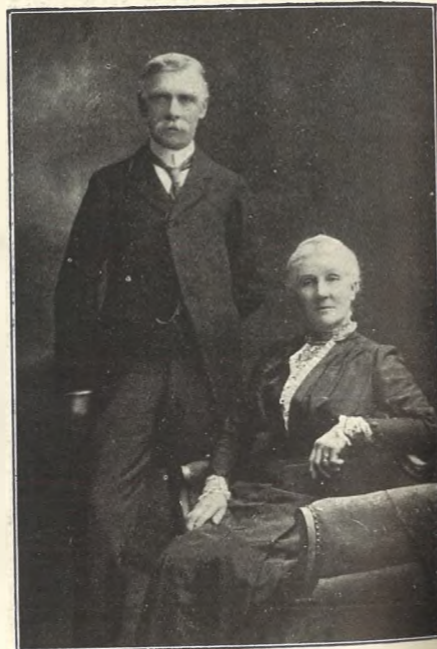
ANOTHER CLOUCESTER IMPROVEMENT.

Mr. William Frederick Hicks-Beach, J.P.,
 Of Witcombe Park, Glos., who died on Sept. 7th after several months' illness, aged 82 years. He was the younger brother of the late Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, afterwards Lord St. Aldwyn, and was heir presumptive to the baronetcy. He had lived the life of a country gentleman, was Master of the Gotswood Hounds from 1885 to 1892, entered Parliament as a Conservative Member for the Tewkesbury Division on the death of his nephew in 1916, was Chairman of the Cheltenham Board of Guardians for 39 years, and was an Alderman for the County Council.

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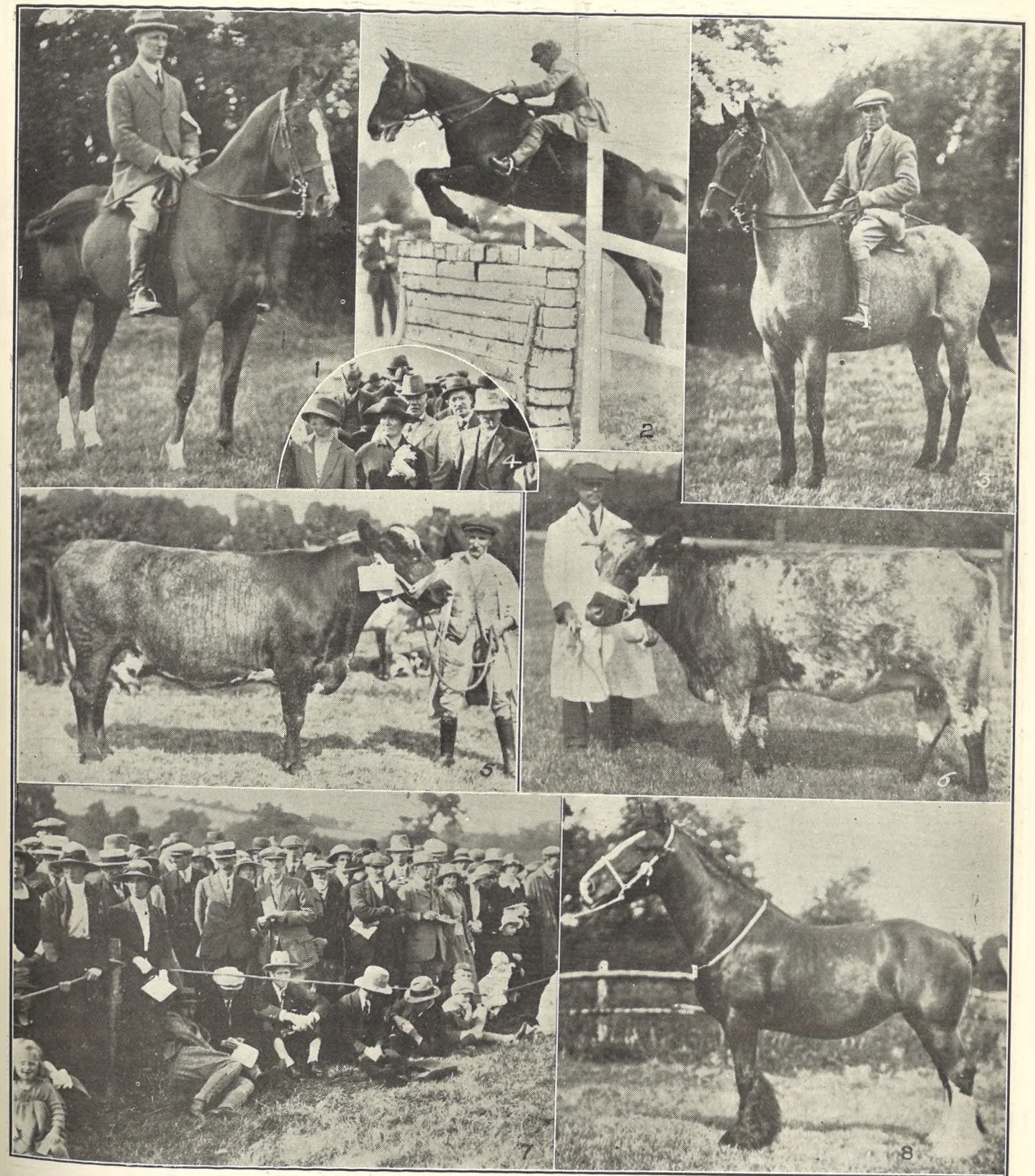

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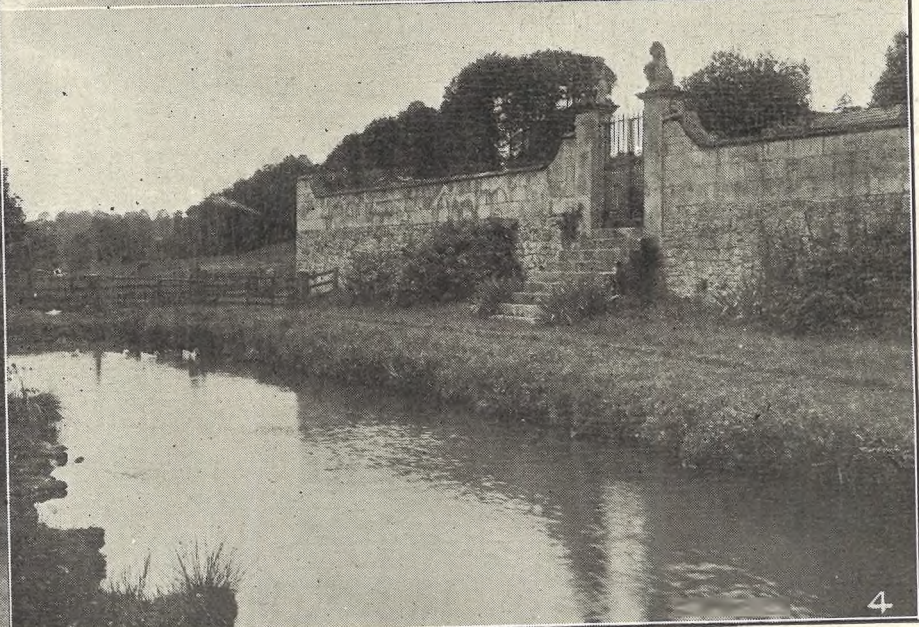
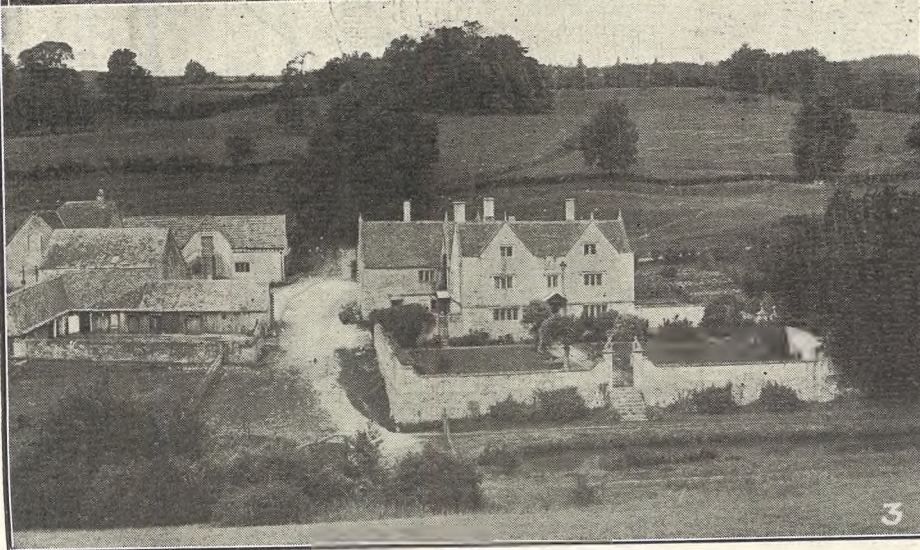
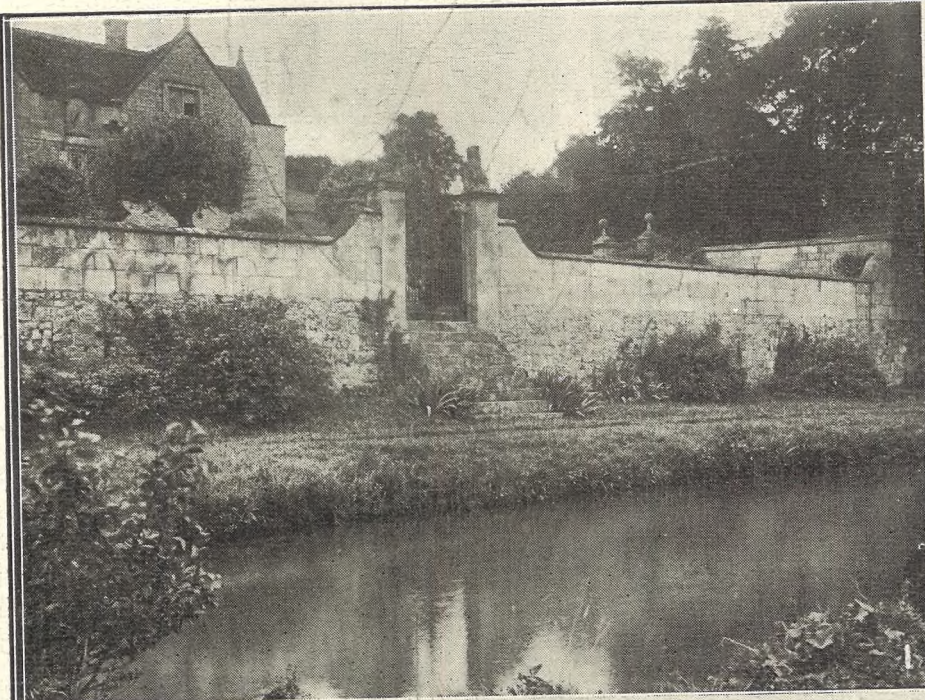


BOURTON PLOUGHING MATCH.

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—TOCKNELL'S FARM AND THE LODGE FARM, PAINSWICK.

It would be difficult to find two more interesting and picturesque Farm Houses than the above, both designated as of Painswick, although the former is nearer Cranham and the other nearer Sheepscombe. Tocknell's was built about 1595 by a family of that name and is very little changed from its original state. The Lodge Farm, the property and residence of Mr. Geo. Witcombe, is of much older date, in earlier times having some ecclesiastical connections, it probably being built about 1433. Sir Anthony Kingston, Governor of the Tower of London in Queen Mary's reign, owned it and lived here. He was responsible for burning Bishop Hooper at Gloucester in 1555. Built as a lintel over a piggery door is part of an altar table, with an inscription and two of the usual five crosses.

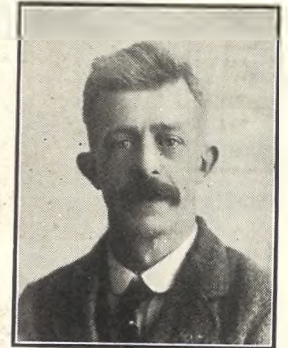
