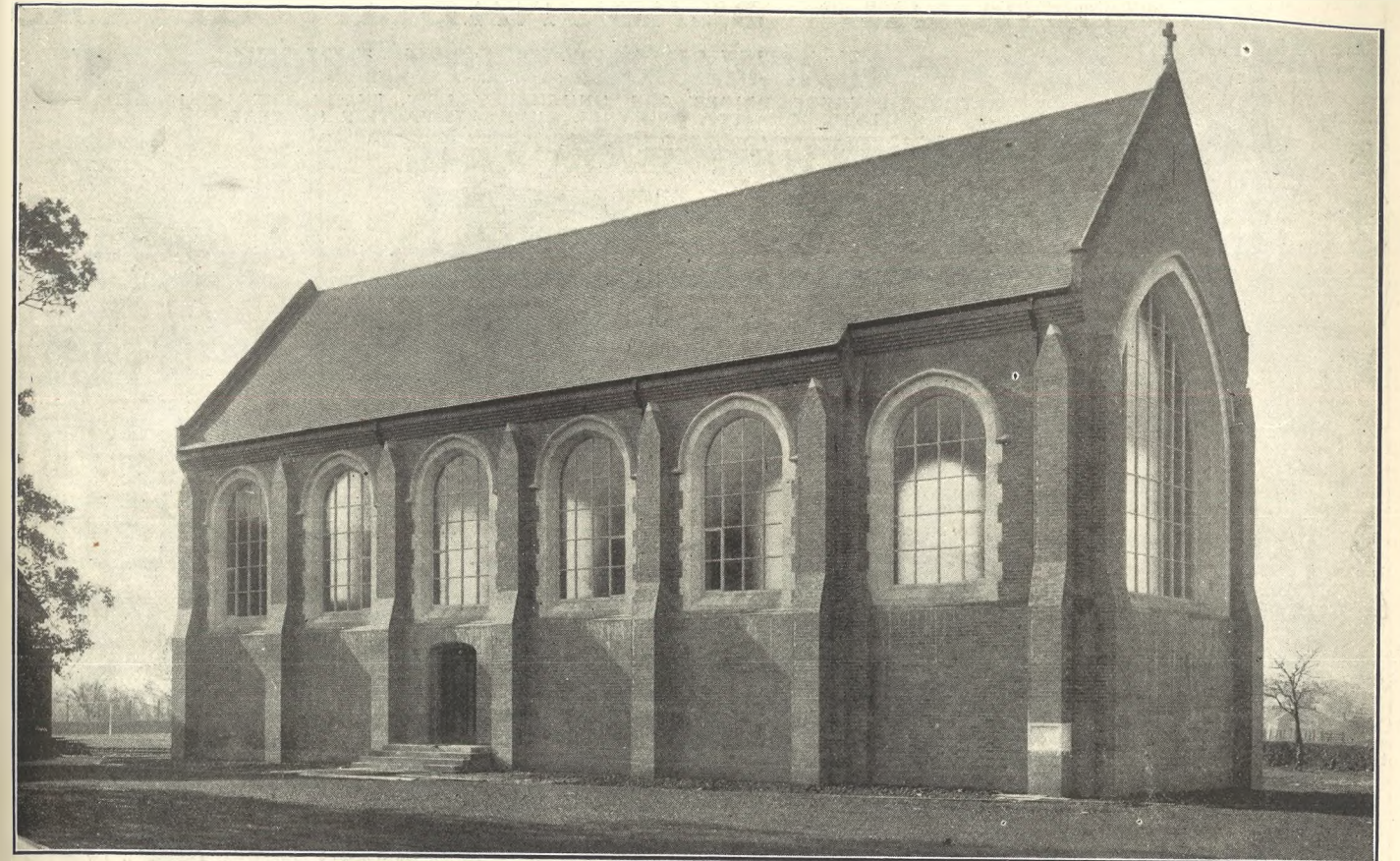

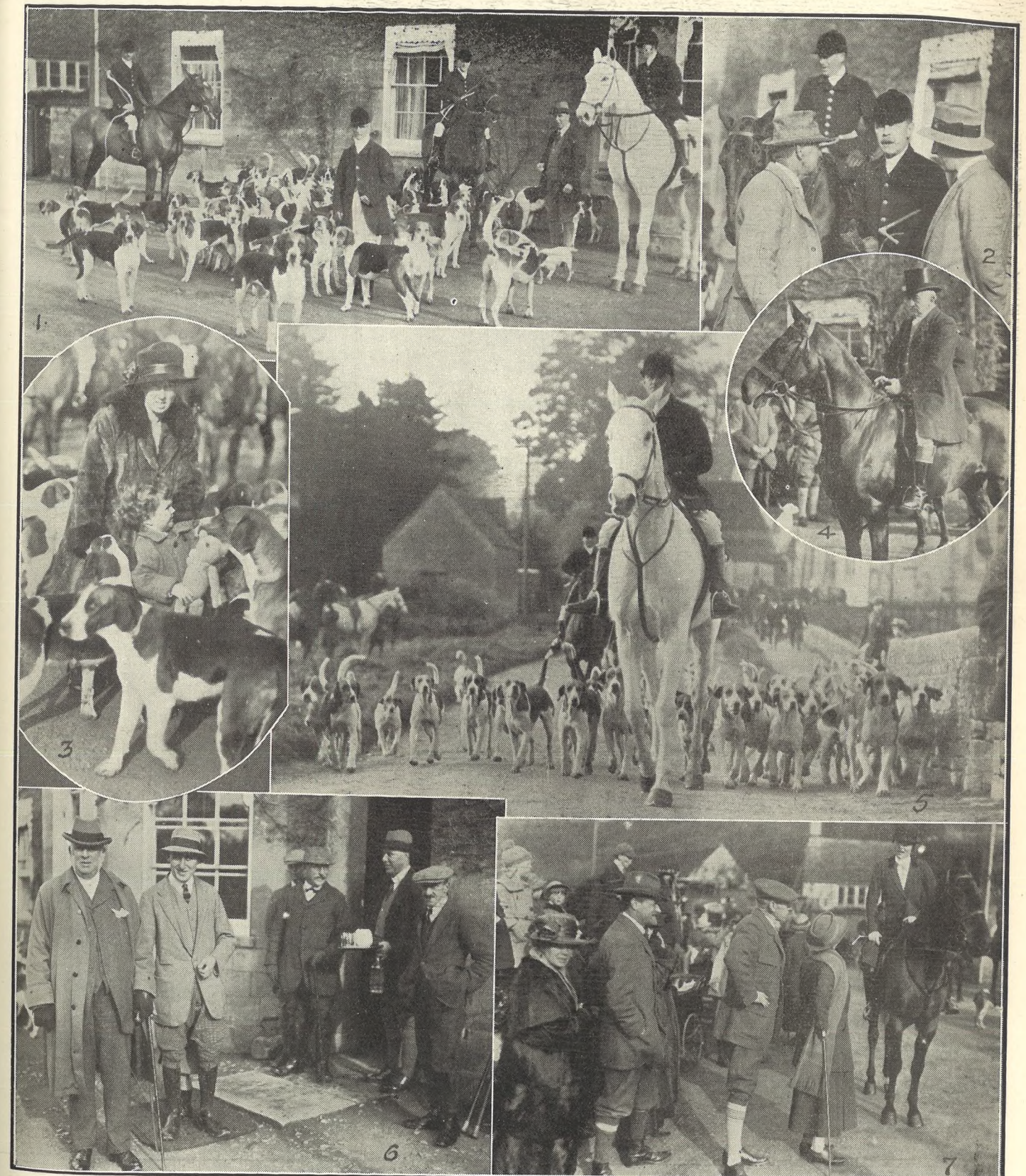


"HADDON HALL" BY GLOUCESTER AMATEURS.

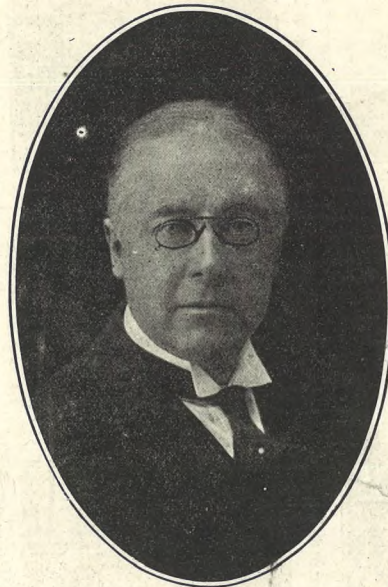

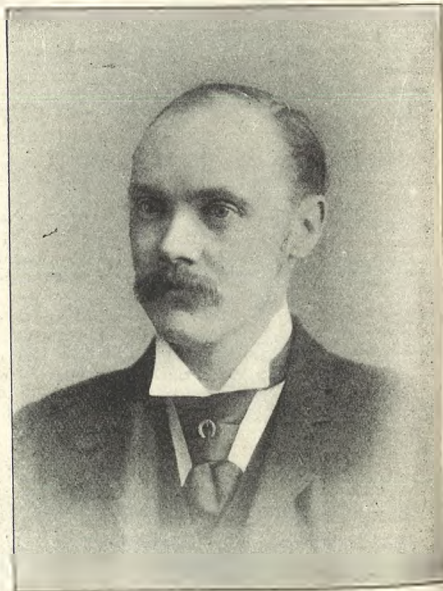

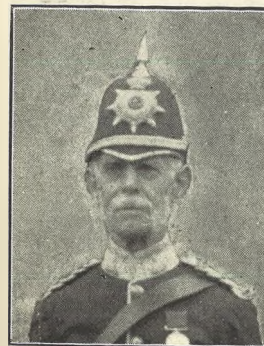

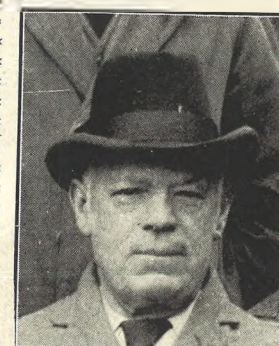

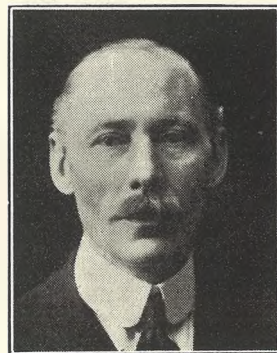
