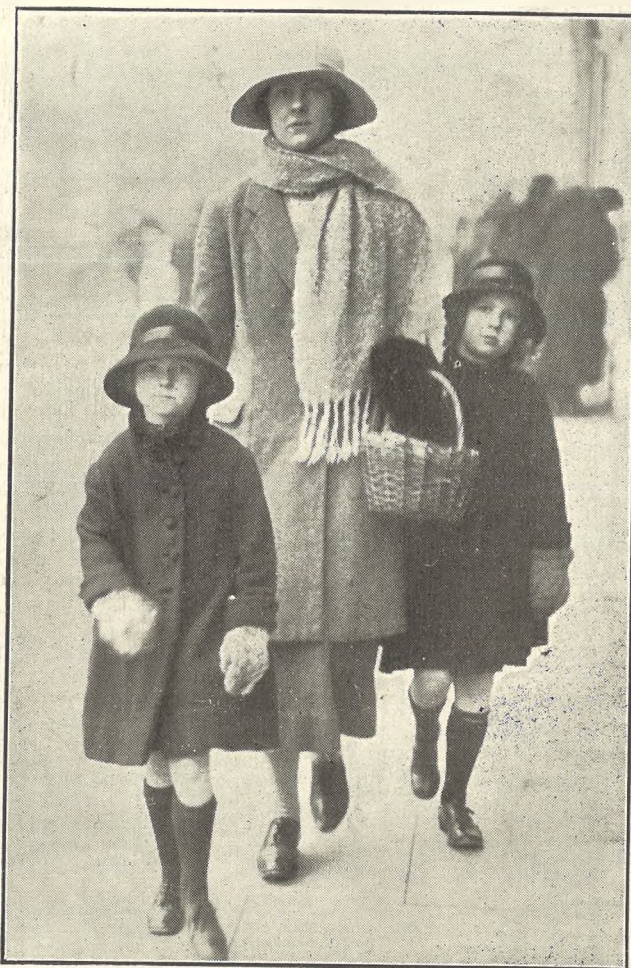

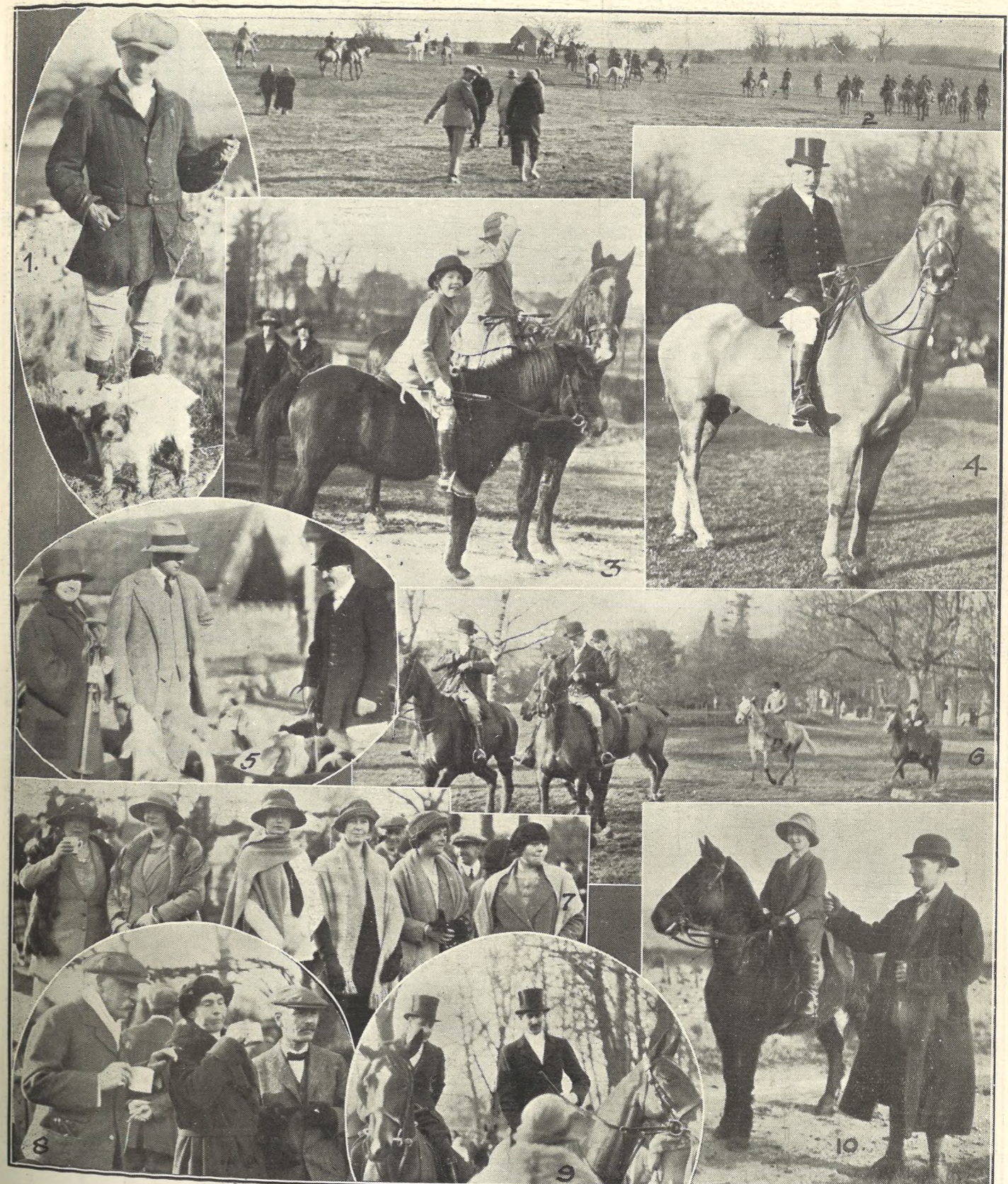


AMERICAN LADIES' HOCKEY TEAM IN CHELTENHAM.

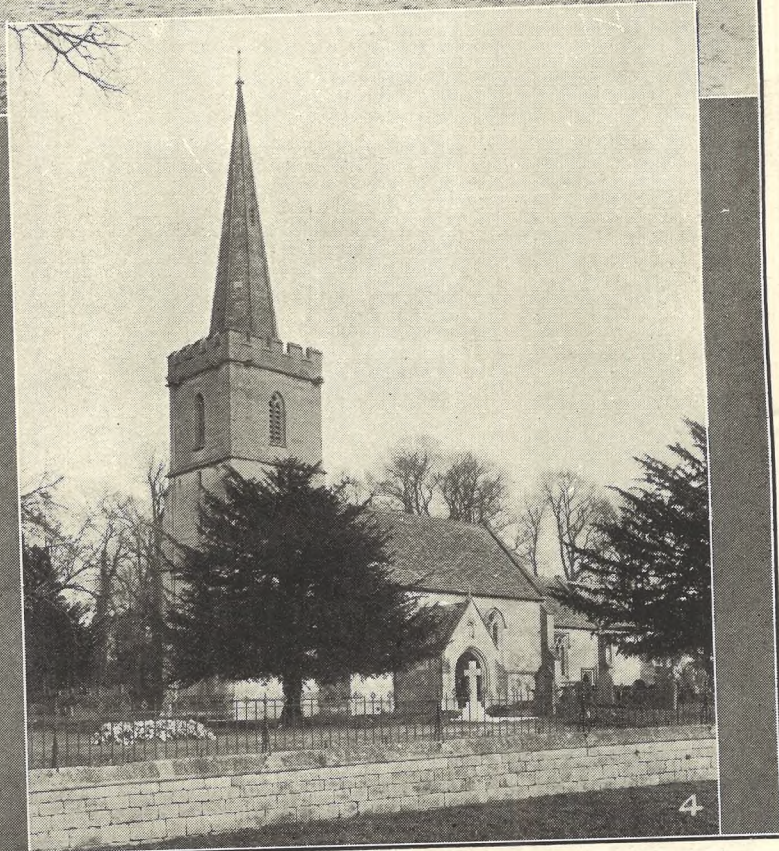
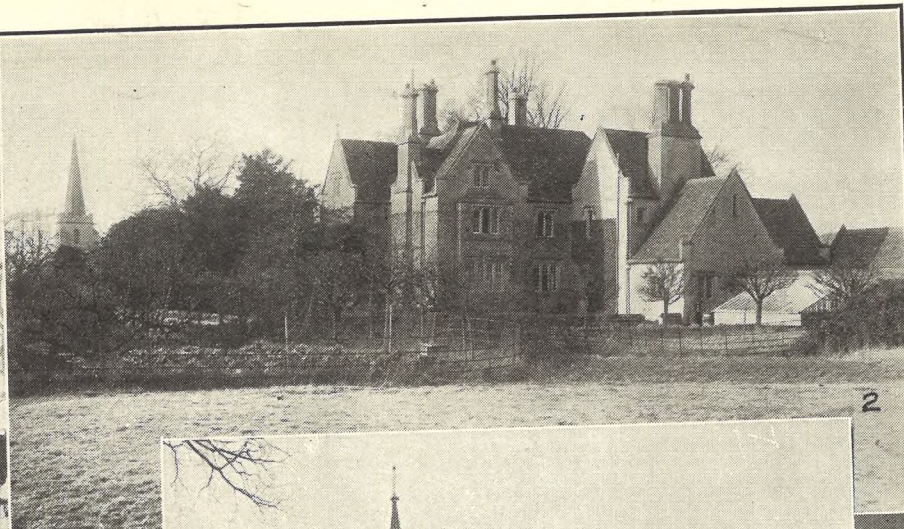


GOTSWOLD HOUNDS MEET AFTER THE BALL.

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—HARESFIELD.

Haresfield is a secluded and ancient village six miles south from Gloucester. The Court is a fine old stone mansion built about 1680, and was the residence of the late Mr. R. I. Tidswell, who was killed while hunting a fortnight ago, and whose widow and daughter now reside there. The Church is prettily situated in the Park, and is very ancient, containing traces of Norman work. Its register dates from 1565.

2.—The Vicarage, with Church spire in distance. The Vicarage is a very fine house, but is less than a century old.

The funeral of the late Mr. R. I. Tidswell, a veteran sportsman, who was killed while hunting, at the age of 77, and who was so much beloved and respected, took place on Thursday, January 24th, in wet weather, in the little churchyard at Haresfield. The large body of mourners, from every walk in life, who attended the funeral, was a tribute to the universal esteem in which he was held.

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—BROOKTHORPE.

Brookthorpe is a most picturesque village on the high road from Gloucester to Stroud, about four miles from Gloucester. It possesses some beautiful old houses, notably the Manor House, or Court, adjoining the Church.

- 1.—Front view of Brookthorpe Court. The addition of the half-timbered gable to the old rambling stone house makes it most striking and picturesque. The half-timbering is carried right through, there being a corresponding gable at the rear.
- 2.—Brookthorpe Post Office, surely as picturesque a post office as any in the country.
- 3.—Brookthorpe Church of St. Swithin. It is a very ancient building, in the First Pointed or Early English style of the 13th Century.
- 4.—Mulberry Tree Farm, Brookthorpe, a beautiful old Tudor farmhouse, with fine decorative stone finials to the gables.

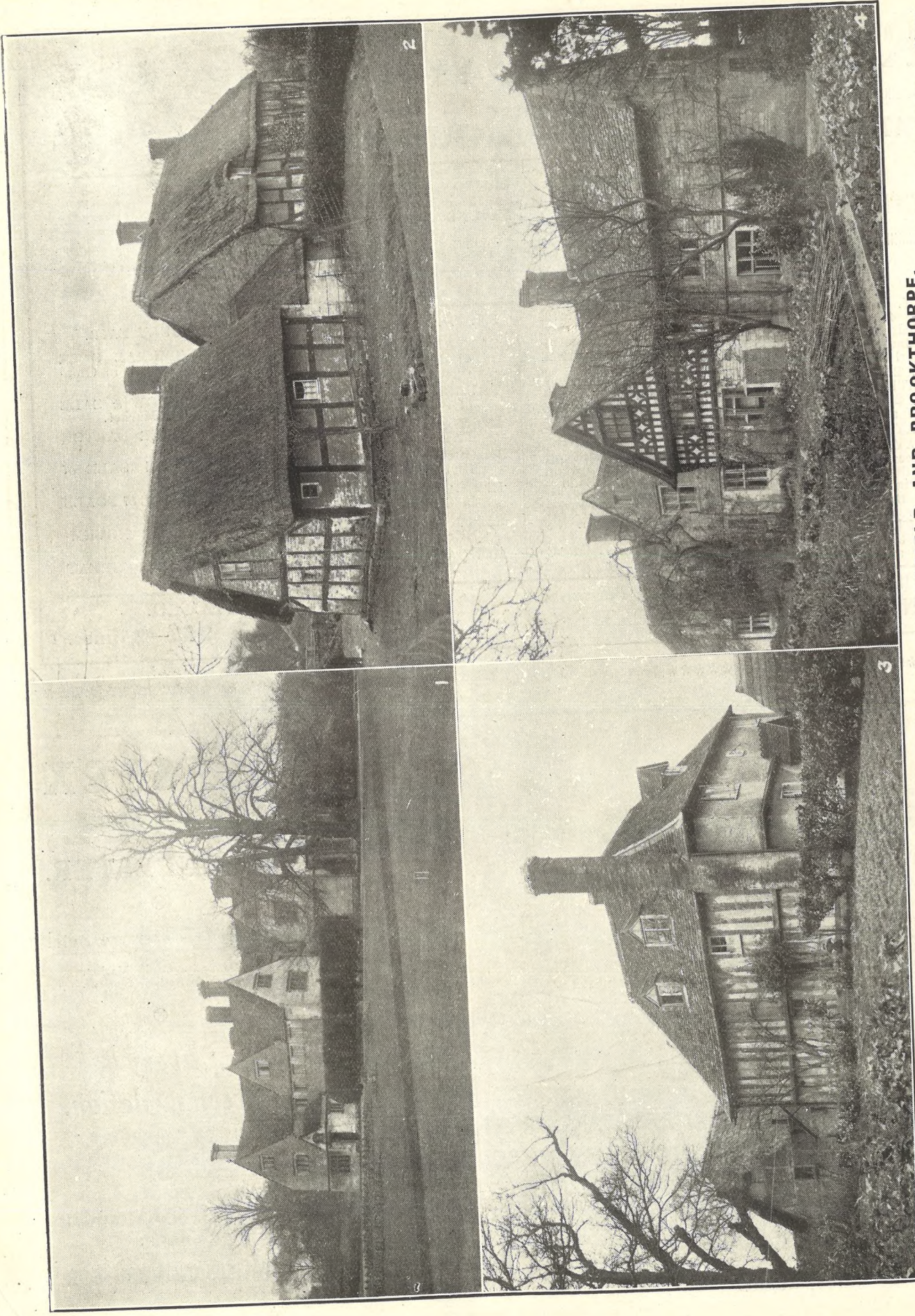

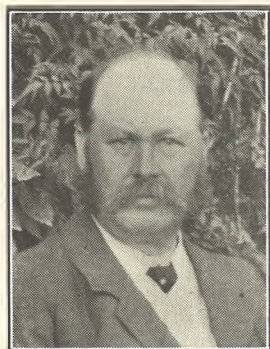
PHENOMENAL HAILSTONES.

The enclosed photograph may be of interest to those who know the Transvaal. On Christmas Day Pretoria was visited with one of the worst hailstorms in memory. It lasted only about ten minutes, but in that time did half a million pounds worth of damage, and was terrifying in its severity. All tiled roofs were smashed and rendered useless in a few minutes; windows were broken in thousands; one quite shattered bungalow had 39 windows broken. Five stones were picked up at the height of the storm weighing 1lb. 15ozs.—they were all shapes and sizes, many twice as large as a tennis ball. Fruit trees were ruined and garden devastated, the actual rainfall being .75 in ten minutes. Lightning flashes were recorded at 120 per minute. A cat running for shelter at Government House was killed instantly. The storm was preceded by intense heat. The town was visited ten days later by a swarm of locusts, each measuring 6½ inches long, the sky being entirely darkened by them. In spite of all this, the fertility of the soil is such that the gardens in a few weeks will have no trace of the devastation, though the fruit crop in that area is of course entirely spoilt.

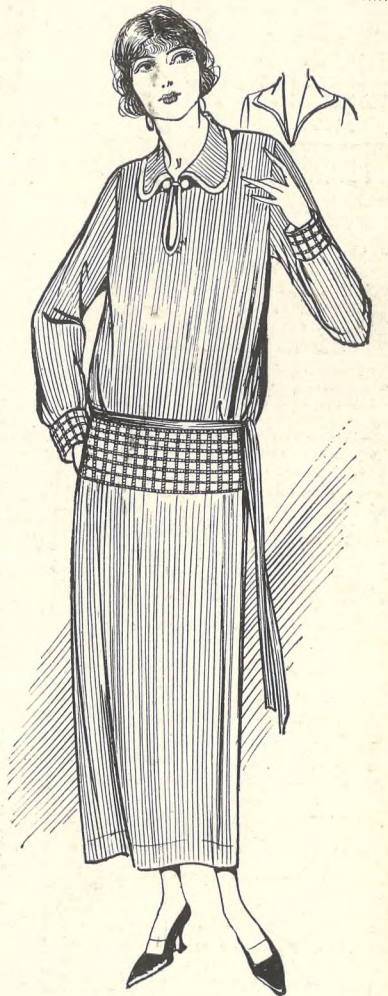

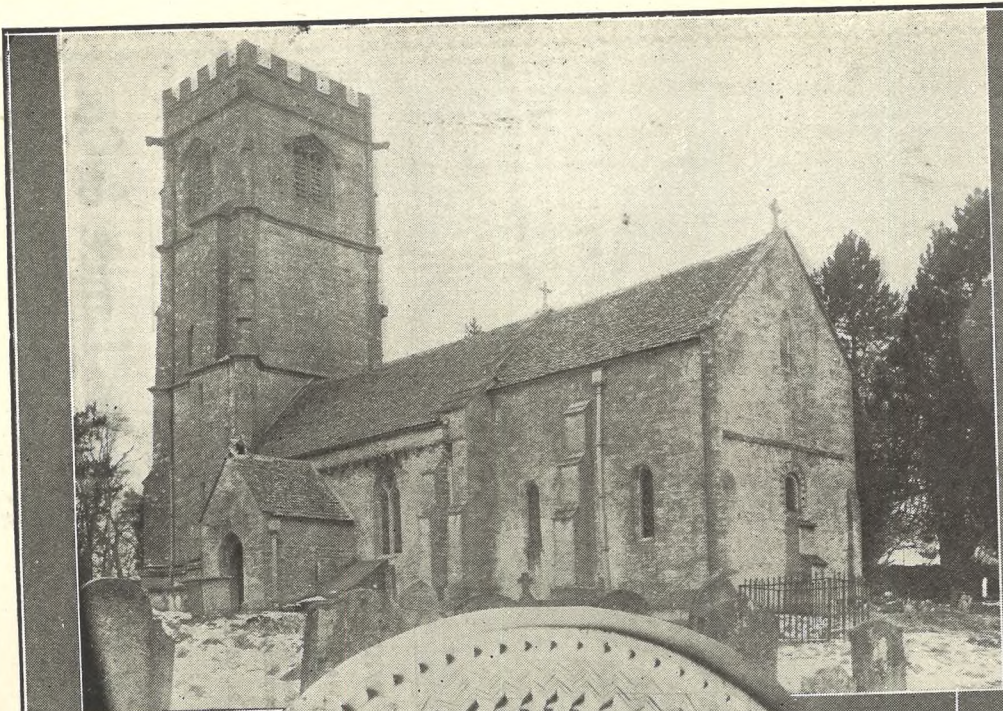

PICTURESQUE GLOUCESTERSHIRE.—ELKSTONE.

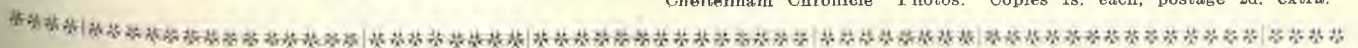
- Elkstone is an out-of-the-way village perched on the Cotswolds, situated between the Cheltenham to Cirencester and the Birdlip to Cirencester roads, and about six miles from Cheltenham. The wonderful Norman work in the Church of St. John the Evangelist gives distinction to the place, which is typically wild, bleak, and isolated.
- 1.—The exterior of the church, showing the south porch, the fine Perpendicular tower, the exterior cornice of the nave, relieved with carved heads, and the Norman East window.
 - 2.—The Tympanum of South Doorway, a remarkably preserved example of enriched Norman work.
 - 3.—The fine Norman groining and enriched arches of the chancel. There is a chamber formerly used as a pigeon-cote over the chancel.
 - 4.—The Rectory, now occupied by Rev. T. S. Tonkinson, B.A. It is of mediaeval construction.

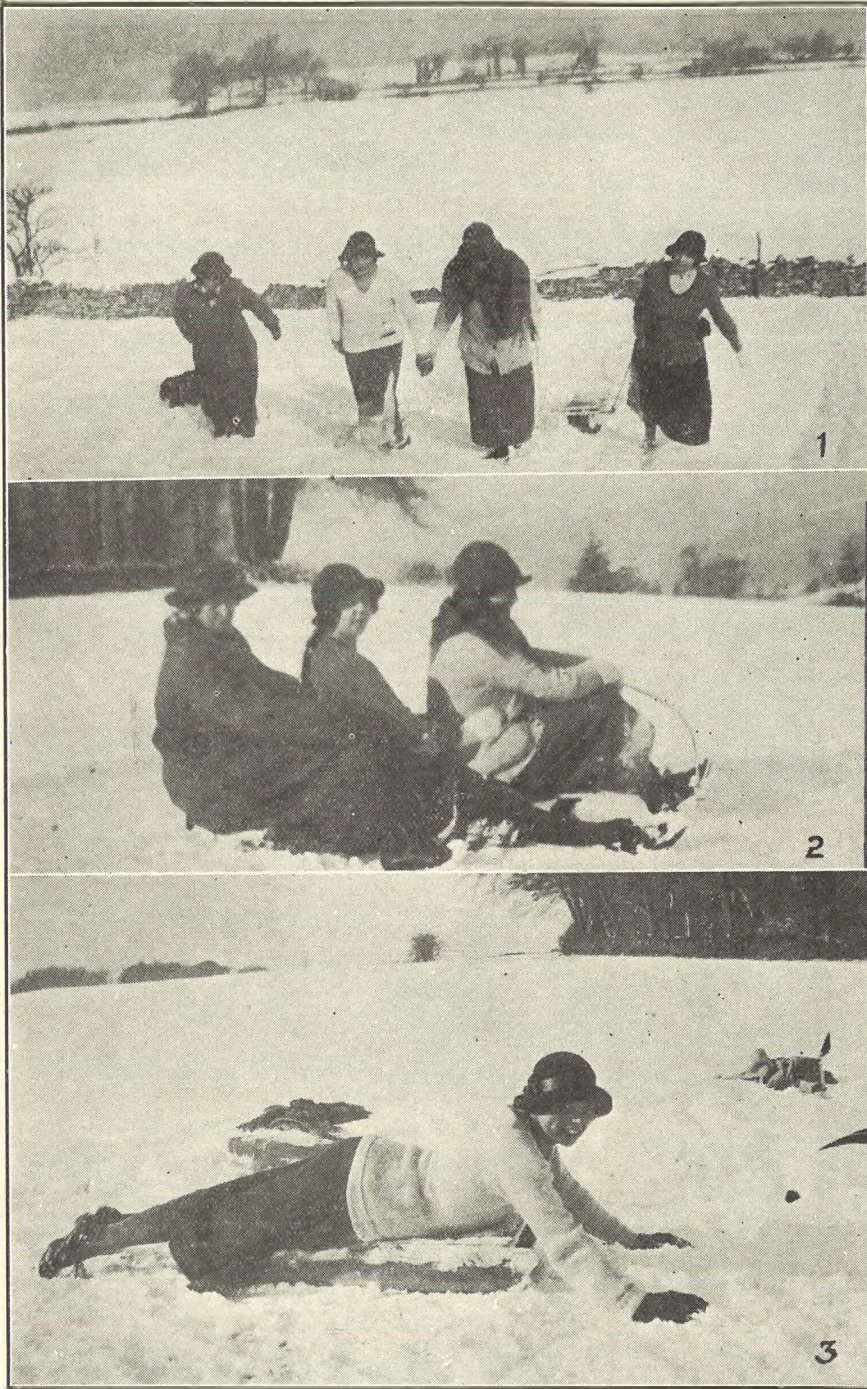


CHELTHENHAM TOWN v. CHELTHENHAM COLLEGE.

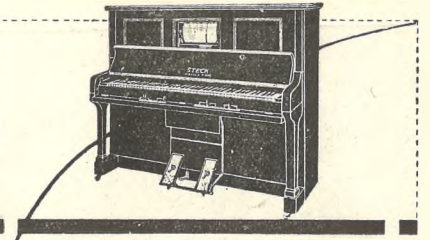
