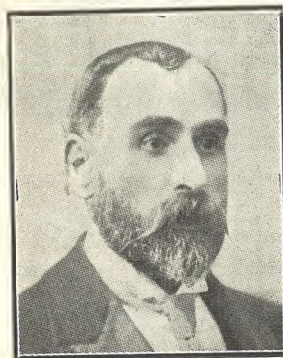

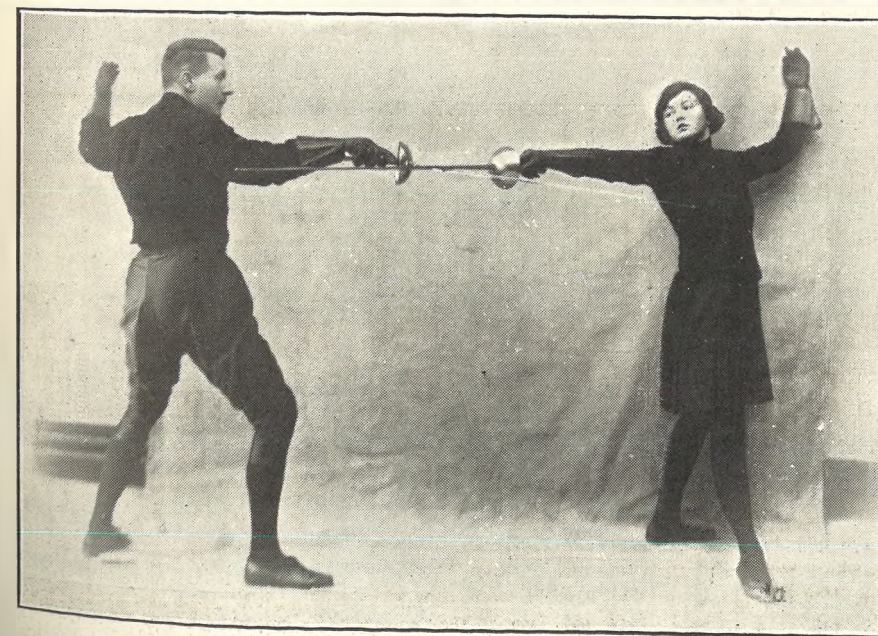

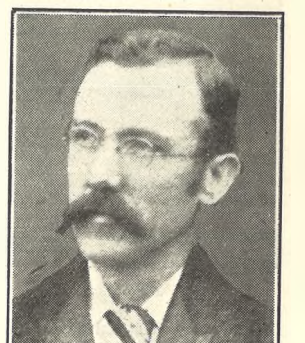

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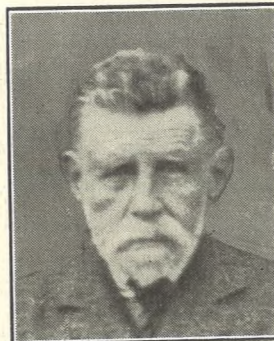

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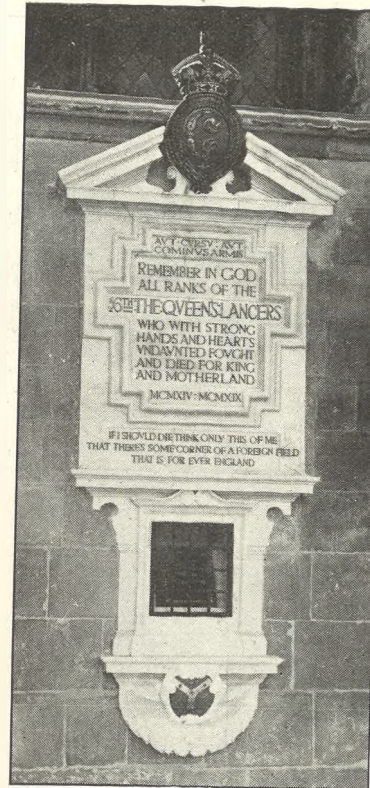


NATIONAL HUNT RACE MEETING AT CHELTENHAM.

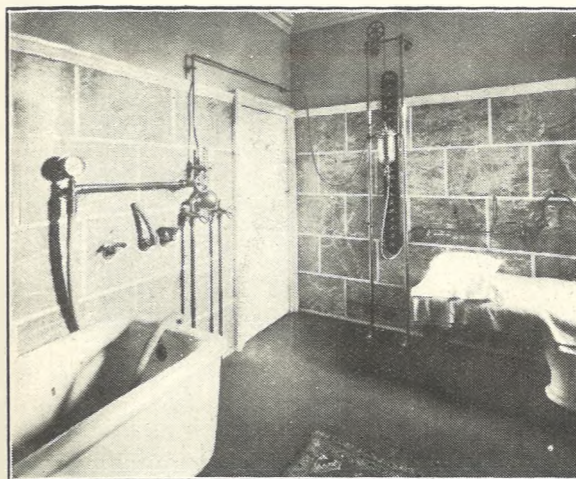

Elmstone was a parish formed about 1290 A.D., but is now only a hamlet containing about six houses. The Church of St. Mary Magdalene was first erected by the Benedictine Monks of Deerhurst, but it has been "restored" at different periods. Stoke Orchard is an adjoining hamlet, and this again joins Cleeve parish.

 4.—A fine old farmhouse at Stoke Orchard.

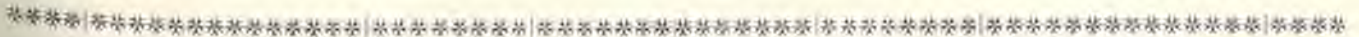

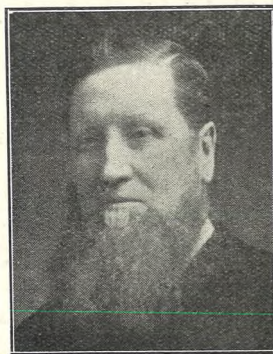

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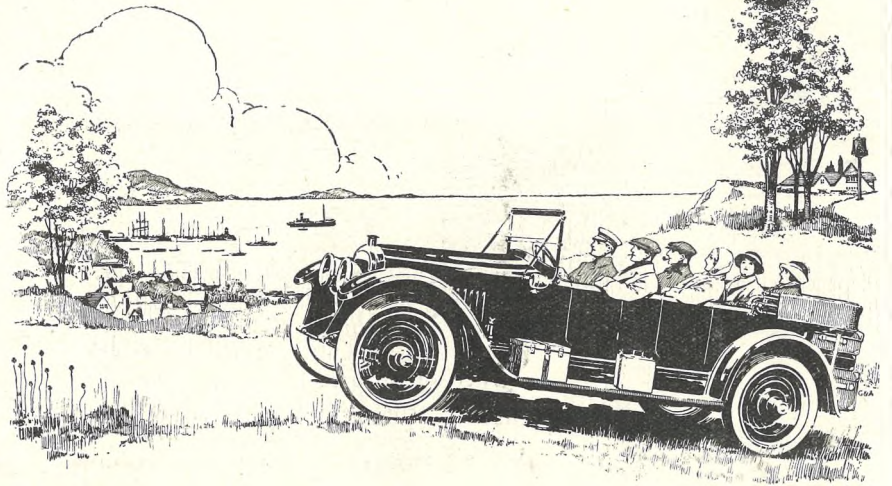


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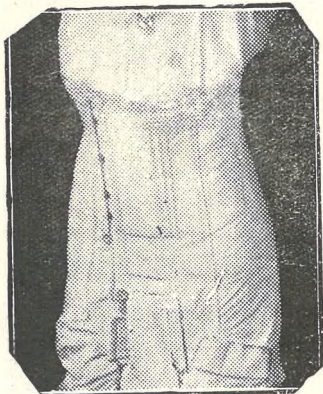
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Mr. Henry William Hill,
